I first met the old man when he was 70, but tales of his exploits had preceded our meeting. Early he had been afflicted with wanderlust, and he had made the grand tour. The world was his home. Eventually he met and



married a tiny little lady. Some way that small body contained a nurse, an artist, a carpenter, and a gardener. Time passed and a son was born.

But there was a fly in the ointment: he believed in free sex "so long as no one gets hurt" and that liquor is one of life's pleasurable necessities. She was so opposed to these two vices, which he refused to give up, that she divorced him. She didn't believe in divorce, either, but chose it as the lesser of the two evils. Better no father than a rotten example. Mother and son moved out of his life.

Fishers City Council approves 2024 city budget

Includes property tax rate decrease, historic investment *in neighborhood vibrancy*

The Fishers City Council approved the proposed 2024 City Budget Monday evening at the October City Council meeting.

The vote follows the September City Council meeting's public hearing and first reading, alongside several public meetings held since August 2023 to provide details of the proposed budget to members of the City Council and the public.

The 2024 budget showcases a significant investment in operational excellence, health, safety, and quality of life. Notably, property tax rates will decrease for the third consecutive year, marking the lowest rate since 2020.

"The adoption of the 2024 budget reflects our unwavering commitment to the people of Fishers to continue building a smart, vibrant, and entrepreneurial community all while holding ourselves accountable to fiscal responsibility," Mayor Scott Fadness said. "By prioritizing historic investments in neighborhood vibrancy, we're directly enhancing the lives of residents. This budget isn't just a financial plan; it's an investment in the pulse of the city – our community, neighborhoods, and schools.'

The vision behind this transformative project is to promote high-quality development that maximizes the potential of the 31 Corridor. FISHERS BUDGET

Highlights of the 2024 Fishers City Budget include:

Major project investments

Pivotal projects in 2024 include the completion and openings of the Fishers Municipal and Art Center, the Fishers Event Center, and completing the State Road 37 and 141st Street Interchange. Also, construction for the Fishers Community Center at Johnson Farm is slated to begin in 2024.

Road & infrastructure

City officials will prioritize several infrastructure investments, including roundabout installations at 126th Street and Southeastern Avenue and 96th Street and Allisonville Road, as well as road widening projects including 136th Street from Southeastern Avenue to Prairie Baptist Road. Design for the new 116th Street and Allisonville Road roundabout will launch in 2024 with a 2025 construction.

Trail connectivity & engagement

Investments in trail connectivity and addressing trail gaps are central to the 2024 budget. Three new trail connections are proposed alongside the establishment of a trail node at amenities for residents.

Neighborhood & community vibrancy

Historic investments are planned for neighborhood vibrancy and long-term sustainability, including investments in sidewalk repairs across multiple neighwith the planting of 2,000 trees, and the revitalization of the 96th Street corridor. Neighborhood Vibrancy Grant allocation will increase from \$100,000 to \$750,000, funding projects related to entrance upgrades, pond and greens-

'Knights of the Blind' assist schools with vision screening

Over 450 students tested by Westfield Lions Club

On Oct. 6 and 9, the Westfield Lions Club, in conjunction with the Zionsville Lions Club, screened third graders at Washington Woods, Carey Ridge, Monon Trail, and Shamrock Springs elementary schools. Over 450 students were able to get their screenings completed, removing a huge burden for the school nurses at those schools.

Each year in Indiana, students in grades 1, 3, 5, and 8 are required to have their vision screened by school nurses. This overwhelming task would take weeks to complete if it wasn't for the assistance of Lions Clubs.

The Lions Club's dedication to serving those with vision issues goes back to 1925 when Helen Keller challenged Lions Clubs International to be "Knights of the Blind in the crusade against darkness." That was the beginning of the Lions' deep and extensive commitment to sight programs aimed at preventable blindness. Over the years this has been expanded to include collecting and recycling used eyeglasses and conducting mission trips to perform eye exams and provide glasses in un-

Locally the Lions Clubs of Indiana, including the Westfield Lions Club, work closely with the Indiana School for the Blind and funds for the school's oper-





I hope that you have taken advantage over the summer months to enjoy the natural bounty of local farmers and gardeners and hopefully have had the opportunity to grow some of your own vegetables and produce.

Honestly, I am not a gardener, but I have so much respect for those who are! We do plant tomatoes, kale, radishes, and herbs such as rosemary and basil, and thankfully my husband here in Hamilton County to have access to several farmers market locations which provide ample produce for our consumption from spring through fall seasons.

Obviously, we can eat any variety of food items throughout the year as proaround the country and around the world can be found at local grocery stores.



An old favorite hits the stage at Beef & Boards this month

Beef and Boards Din-Theatre continues its 50th anniversary season with a dazzling presentation of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor



Dreamcoat. Director/Choreographer Doug King does inspired work alongside Musical Director Kristy Templet for this tour-worthy production.

Based on the Book of Genesis story, with lyrics by Tim Rice and music by Andrew Lloyd Webber, Joseph started in 1969 as a recorded LP musical (much like Rice/Webber's Jesus Christ Superstar) - long before finally hitting Broadway in 1982. It was nominated for six Tony Awards, including Best Musical and Best Original Score.

B&B's mounting of the show is full of highlights, brimming with the light-hearted story telling style that makes this musical piece one of my (and Mrs. K's) personal favorites.

TJ Wessel plays the title character, returning to the role he did at B&B in early 2017. He is magnificent, almost effortlessly enlivening the show's hero. His interpretation remains one of the best I have seen and is accentuated by his fine acting and vocal skills. Bridgette Ludlow joins him as The Narrator, with a powerful voice and a highly polished performance which fills the stage nicely.

Add in Logan Moore's remarkable work as Pharoah, plus Jeff Stockberger's comedic turn as patriarch Jacob, along with the shining efforts of the 11 brothers and their wives, and you have a completely wonderful and spectacular show which well-deserved the standing ovation it received after an energetic Megamix curtain-call. I don't think I ever stopped smiling through the entire program, save for during Joseph's lamentful "Close Every Door."

Doug King's choreography is very fresh - creating a stage picture that is lively and dynamic. Hats off to Kristy Templet for the job she does with the vocalizations here. on the Aisle at asota.wordpress.com.
