You will learn about Indiana's involvement in the war, Hamilton County's tribute to the Unknown dead of the war, and you might even be recruited to man a cannon in the artillery.



Heart of a pantry host

Pantries 57 and were placed in service this past week. Both were loaded in the back of a Gaylor Electric truck, driven to their permanent locations, and set up in Westfield along high-traffic

Driving away from the second deployment, I was caught up reflecting on all the families that are a part of FeedingTeam.org. Families who donate, volunteer, stock, organize, clean, fundraise and especially those that shop from one of the pantries. What occurred to me is that there is something I've not communicated very well over the years. Each pantry must be hosted by someone. We are so very grateful for those who host our pantries.

This month's column focuses on a critical part of FeedingTeam.org: our pantry hosts.

Our first host, Hamilton County FOP Lodge 103 in conjunction with Hamilton County Parks, will always be special because they took the first pantry years ago in Morse Beach Park. Since those beginnings pantry hosts include schools, businesses, parks, local government, churches, property owners, and civic organizations.

The hearts of people who host a pantry are special. They recognize that hunger is real in central Indiana and agree to help us in our mission to provide 24/7 no-questions-asked meals to hungry neighbors. In very practical terms, pantry hosts give their permission to locate a pantry on their property. While some hosts become involved with or adopt a pantry, many do not. Many of our busiest pantry locations are managed by FeedingTeam.org volunteers but hosted at locations generously offered by people from the community.

Over the years we have been told "no" many times when we ask to locate a pantry at a particular location. We have heard, "we don't want to attract that element," "it's not safe," and even "we don't have hungry people around here." With each no, we'd politely show the data and attempt to tug on a heartstring or two. We'd show folks we have a data-driven approach to map areas where families could become food challenged. If The pantries serve as many

it was still a no, we moved on to the next potential location.

We look at several data points for pantry locations:

1. Is the location near neighbors who fit the "gap family" de-

mographic? These are families whose income level exceeds the level for public assistance but whose income level isn't such that a financial problem wouldn't impact their ability to secure regular meals for their fam-

2. Is the location near where gap families frequent?

3. Is the location of moderate or high traffic volume?

4. How does this location fit with existing volunteer service routes, or do we need to recruit new volunteers to manage the pantry?

Several other considerations round out the final decision to deploy a pantry at a location. These include visibility, shelter from the elements, density of other pantry locations, anchoring ability, ease of access, and a potential location, please the amount of criminal activity in the immediate area. It's not unusual for a pantry to be located a few blocks away from a challenging area rather than directly in that neighborhood.

Suggestions of locations and pantry requests now drive much of our new deployment processes. In addition to requests from the community, over the coming months it is our intention to deploy more pantries in Westfield, Sheridan, and the northern portion of Hamilton County before returning to work more on additional locations in Fishers and Carmel in the spring of 2024.

With over 47,000 food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County, FeedingTeam.org is a registered 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization that provides outdoor 24/7/365 no-questions-asked free food pantries throughout the county.

The pantries exist to meet the food insecurity needs of gap families, neighbors who may not qualify for public assistance and could use a few meals before payday.

Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter is calling for sweeping changes to the criminal justice system in Indiana.

His call comes a few weeks after his outrage over a Marion County judge giving Luis Leyba-Gonzalez a \$1,000 cash bond and a \$50,000 surety bond for his role in a high-speed crash that killed three people.

Carter used that case as an example to say the criminal justice system is broken.

This is no one's fault. This is no one's fault," Carter said. "No one agency. No one judge. No one prosecutor. No one police agency. No one mayor. No one City-County Council."

Indianapolis Bar Association asks Indiana State Police superintendent to keep criticism private

Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter's criticism of the state's bond system is getting people talking. The Indianapolis Bar association would like to have those conversations not in public, but in private.

"I don't think it is unusual for a law enforcement officer to be critical. I think it doesn't help the situation," said Indianapolis attorney Jim Voyles on behalf of the Indianapolis Bar Association.

Voyles told I-Team 8's Richard Essex there is a forum in Marion County called the Criminal Justice Planning Commission to address issues like those brought up by Superintendent Carter.

"If you look at what Carter said, he obviously wants to have a dialogue about something," Voyles said. "I don't think the

press is the place for that until we can get together and figure out what his total complaints are and how we can react to those, and are they good complaints. We are no different on the bond issue than 91 other counties. These are not just Marion County problems."







Noblesville High School has had many great athletes and many great athletic achievements down through the years. I am always glad to be able to say I grew up Noblesville, Indiana. All the athletes who have done great things have had a wonderful support system from the community, great coaches who have inspired, taught, coached, and helped us to do great things. I want to apologize upfront if I did not remember someone's contribution.

It is rare in this day to find an outstanding foursport athlete because of the specialization for one sport. From 1969 to 1973 Noblesville had a great four-sport athlete, Mike Swaynie. It was my privilege to watch my friend Mike Swaynie play, run, compete, and improve each year. We played sports together from Little League through High School. I got a front-row seat to see a great athlete! Mike excelled at the sports he played as he got better each year. Mike played football, basketball, baseball, and ran track.

Mike also played Little League and Babe Ruth Baseball. When we were 15 years old and playing baseball for Hall of Fame Sports Editor Don Jellison, we finished second in the State of Indiana. Mike led the team in stolen bases with 22 stolen bases in a row! Never thrown out! In 1972, Mike was part of the first State Championship baseball team in Noblesville history as Noblesville won the Advanced Babe Ruth State Championship and went on to play in a seven-state playoff against other state champions where we defeated the Kentucky State Champion. The population of Noblesville was about 7,400 at the time. Quite an accomplishment!

As we entered high school in 1969, it was certainly a year of wondering where we fit in. Mike found his spot in sports. One thing that makes a great athlete is speed. Mike sure had that! 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

Purdue men's basketball starts at third in AP Poll

The Purdue Boilermakers will start the college basketball season with a num-

ber in front of their name. Last year's No. 1 team in the country is the thirdranked team heading into the 2023-24 season, according to the Associated Press's preseason men's basketball poll released Monday. This is the seventh time in the last nine years (second in the last three in the top 10) that Purdue as opened the season ranked. It's also the highest preseason ranking during that timespan.

The Boilers have been ranked in the top 5 for 17 straight weeks, which is the longest streak in the nation.

Kansas and Duke come in at No. 1 and 2 respectively, with Michigan State, Marquette, UConn, Houston, Creighton, Tennessee and Florida Atlantic in the rest of this year's preseason

Purdue returns a majority of last year's roster, most notably, defending National Player of the Year Zach Edey. Along with the 7-foot-4 big man, point guard Braden Smith, guard Fletcher Loyer and forwards Mason Gillis and Caleb Furst come back for another season. Four of last season's top five scorers remain on the roster.

A former Westfield High School standout, Smith was a consistent leader during his freshman season, averaging 9.7 points and 4.2 rebounds a game with 153 total assists. Loyer's sharpshooting from deep led Purdue with 181 threes, making 32.6 percent of his attempts. The Clarkston etteville, Ark.

High School alum was the Boilers second best scorer with 11 points a game.

Edey finished the season topping all major categories for Purdue – 22.3 points and 12.9 rebounds a game. The Big Ten Conference named Edey Preseason Player of the Year as he returns for another season instead of entering the NBA

The Boilers also added hotshot recruit Myles Colvin from Indianapolis' Heritage Christian for this year's team. Colvin averaged 19.3 points and 5.8 rebounds per game as a senior with the Eagles, while shooting 45.0 percent from the field with 45, 3-pointers.

Purdue's promise of a deep playoff run came to an abrupt and early end last season as No. 16-seed Fairleigh Dickinson upset then No. 1-seed Purdue in Columbus, Ohio during the First Round back in March. The Boilers hit a breaking point - literally - going viral after shattering a hole in the locker room white board following the 63-58 loss.

Prior to their March Madness exit, the Boilers swept the Big Ten Championship titles - both for the regular season and defeating Penn State 67-65.

Purdue will play six teams ranked in the preseason poll – No. 4 Michigan State, No. 11 Gonzaga, No. 12 Arizona, No. 24 Alabama in Toronto, and No. 25 Illinois. There's also a possibility of facing three others in Maui – No.1 Kansas, No. 5 Marquette and No. 9 Tennessee. The Boilers battle with No. 14 Arkansas for a charity scrimmage Oct. 28 in Fay-
