Perfectly Imperfect

Gov. Holcomb & Indiana National Guard break ground on Hamilton County Readiness Center

The Indiana National Guard held a groundbreaking ceremony Thursday for its newest readiness center near Atlanta.

During the ceremony, Gov. Eric J. Holcomb and Maj. Gen. Dale Lyles, Indiana's adjutant general, spoke and broke ground on the new facility.

"In May, I proudly signed a budget including \$8 million in funding for the Indiana National Guard's new Hamilton County Readiness Center," Gov. Holcomb said. "Indiana will continue to invest in supporting the men and women who answer a call to serve at home and abroad, respond to state emergencies and secure our peace and freedoms."

The facility, scheduled to open in 2026, will include approximately 66,000 square feet of space on an existing, state-owned 55-acre plot of land in Hamilton County.

The center will house the 38th Sustainment Brigade headquarters company, its detachment and special troops

The center will house the 38th Sustainment Brigade headquarters company, its detachment and special troops battalion, and the 338th Signal Company and approximately 300 Hoosier Guardsmen.

battalion, and the 338th Signal Company and approximately 300 Hoosier Guardsmen. The new facility will meet current code, American Disabilities Act and Anti-terrorism Force Protection requirements.

"The three units that will be supported here work together to support approximately 10,000 soldiers in support of large-scale combat operations and state active duty," Maj. Gen. Lyles said. "Ensuring

Carmel forms sister city partnership with Rueil-Malmaison, France

On Wednesday, Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard and Rueil-Malmaison Mayor Patrick Ollier signed an official Memorandum of Understanding establishing a formal sister city partnership between Carmel and Rueil-Malmaison, France.

In addition to serving as Rueil’s Mayor, Ollier is President of the Metropolis of Greater Paris and he was also a National Assembly deputy for Hautes-Alpes’ 2nd constituency.

Rueil-Malmaison, or simply Rueil, is in the western suburbs, about 20 minutes from the center of Paris. It has a population of nearly 80,000 and is one of the wealthiest suburbs of Paris. Rueil is famous for the Chateau de Malmaison, home of Napoleon Bonaparte’s first wife, Joséphine de Beauharnais.

Several major French companies have their world headquarters in Rueil-Mal-

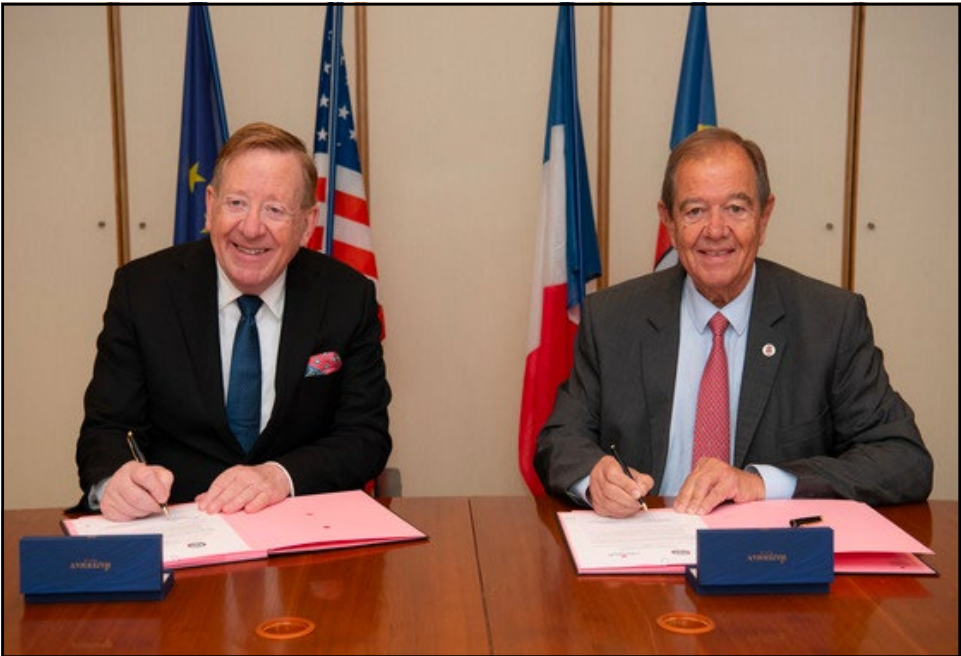

maison, which has an extensive fiber optics network in its business district. Many large international companies have also located their French headquarters in Rueil-Malmaison.

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Fishers man stuck in Palestine tries to get home

A Fishers man is caught in the chaos, trying to get out of Palestine and make it back home, but the border into Egypt is closed. His wife Susan says he was visiting family when the war broke out.

The Abdelsalams live in Fishers and have been married for more than 40 years, but Ramadan Abdelsalam is stuck in Palestine because he hasn't been able to cross the border. His wife Susan says with bombs dropping daily, she's hopeful the American government will do something to force a border opening and help bring him back home.

Susan Abdelsalam's phone doesn't leave her side just in case her husband Ramadan calls.

"It just breaks my heart to see this, and it's just not a Palestinian struggle. I know

there's a lot of Israelis really struggling also," Susan Abdelsalam said.

Between water and electricity outages, these calls are priceless – even if the reception holds on for minutes or just seconds, just long enough to hear he's okay or let her know about the non-stop echoing of bombs.

"It's very distressing, and it stresses me out," Susan said. "You don't know from one day to the next, if it's going to be the last time, I get to talk to him, and it's just breaking my heart."

Ramadan left Palestine back in the 70s and has lived in the States since then. At the end of September, he made the trip back. Ramadan initially planned to return to Indiana in early November, but then war broke out, and he was advised to head to the Egyptian border to try to get out.

"It's devastating, that's

what it is," Susan said. "It's devastating because I actually saw him on the BBC news a few nights, a few days ago when they said the border was supposed to be open. He was there standing by the gates, and of course it never opened, but I did get to see him."

Ramadan and hundreds of others have been unsuccessful in making it across as the border is closed. Susan says while Egypt has control, she'd like to see the American government step in and get it opened.

"The innocent victims, caught up in this war, pray for their freedom, and pray for them to get through this war," Susan said.

Abdelsalam says any support from the American government will not only help her husband, but hundreds of other Americans hoping to make it back home.

Franciscan HEALTH Franciscan Accountable Care Organization achieves \$31.4M in savings for Medicare Shared Savings Program

Newly released results for the 2022 Medicare Shared Savings Program (MSSP) show Franciscan ACO (Accountable Care Organization) far outperforming the national average.

In 2022, the first year under the Enhanced MSSP model, Franciscan ACO achieved a quality score of 86.36 percent and saved the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services \$31.4 million, earning Franciscan ACO \$23.1 million in shared savings.

As a participant in the MSSP, Franciscan ACO is responsible for the total cost and quality of care for approximately 41,000 patients. Franciscan partners with physician groups, hospitals, and other advance practice providers to provide highly coordinated, quality care to patients.

Franciscan ACO had the 23rd highest payout of all ACOs nationwide. Franciscan's savings rate, at 6.0 percent, is higher than the national average at 3.7 percent, and the 86.36 percent quality score is higher than the 81.5 percent national average.

Quality performance results that exceeded 90 percent included controlling high blood pressure; screening for future fall risk; tobacco use; screening and cessation intervention; and statin therapy for the prevention and treatment of cardiovascular disease.

Franciscan ACO patients' ratings on how well providers communicate was 93.92 percent and ratings of office staff courtesy and helpfulness was 93.16 percent. Both scores are above the national ACO mean.

"Each year we gain a better understanding of how to best serve those patients participating in the CMS Enhanced MSSP program," said Dr. Al Tomchaney, Chief Medical Officer of Franciscan Health. "Our providers focus first and foremost on improving the health status of our patients and utilize chronic care management, and health maintenance to lower the costs of caring for these individuals. Delivering the right care at the right time with a focus on prevention has enabled Franciscan Alliance to save the Medicare program \$31 million for the 2022 year."

Franciscan ACO is committed to identifying social determinants of health, reducing barriers to care and engaging patients in care plans that suit their needs, while reducing unnecessary costs in care to create higher patient satisfaction and a more efficient healthcare experience.

In 2012, Franciscan Health was the first hospital system in the state of Indiana to form an Accountable Care Organization (ACO) with Medicare as part of the Medicare Pioneer ACO program. Franciscan transitioned into the MSSP program in 2015 and continues to participate in similar shared savings, value-based care agreements with other Medicare Advantage and commercial payer groups.

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Seasons are changing, but central Indiana residential real estate market remained consistent in September

Consistency describes September’s residential real estate market, as year-to-date home sale prices continued to increase slightly, and inventory decreased by less than a percent throughout the 16-county central Indiana area.

According to F.C. Tucker Company, part of the Howard Hanna family of companies, in September 2023, available housing inventory decreased 0.5 percent. Year-to-date home sale prices increased 7.4 percent. Specifically:

- Available housing inventory decreased 0.5 percent compared to September 2022.
- Pended home sales decreased, down 16.8 percent compared to this time last year.
- The average September 2023 home sale price for the 16-county central Indiana region was \$289,650, a decrease of 9.4 percent compared to September 2022.

Specifically within Noblesville:

- Closed home sales decreased slightly, down 2 percent compared to September 2022.
- The average September 2023 home sale price increased 7.5 percent to \$422,402.

Homes spent more time on the market than this time last year, selling in 24 days – or 14 days slower than this time last year.

In Hamilton County:

- Pended home sales decreased 20.7 percent compared to this time last year.
- The average home sale price increased 7 percent to \$506,826.
- Available housing inventory decreased 6.1 percent compared to September 2022.

In September 2023, 2,605 central Indiana homes were purchased, down 16.8 percent from the 3,132 sold in September 2022.

Jennings County had the greatest increase in pended home sales in September 2023, up 110 percent compared to this time last year.

Jackson County pended sales had the greatest decrease with 51.1 percent fewer homes sold in September 2023 compared to September 2022.

Central Indiana year-to-date home sale prices increased, up 7.4 percent overall:

- Brown County recorded the highest average year-to-date home sale price increase at 16.5 percent.

Hamilton County had the highest average year-to-date home sale price in the region at \$506,826.

Homes sold in 22 days on average, remaining on the market four days, or 22.2 percent, longer than in 2022. All homes in central Indiana remained on the market longer than in September 2022 except Decatur County, which saw homes selling 11.4 percent faster than this time last year.

Central Indiana experienced a 0.5 percent decrease in overall available home inventory in September 2023, compared to September 2022, with 24 fewer homes available for sale.

Morgan County had the largest inventory increase – up 21.1 percent compared to September 2022.

Hancock County experienced the largest decrease in inventory – down 38.1 percent compared to this time last year.

“We generally see the market moderate during the fall months; however, central Indiana’s housing market continues to be strong with homes selling at about the same pace as this time last year,” F.C. Tucker Company President Jim Litten said. “While overall inventory is down slightly, almost half of central Indiana’s counties actually saw inventory increases during September, giving buyers more options to find a home that meets their family’s needs.”

Of the pended home sales in the region last month, nine were priced \$2,000,000 or higher; 45 were priced \$1,000,000 to \$1,999,999; 288 were priced \$500,000 to \$999,999; 802 were priced \$300,000 to \$499,999; 795 were priced \$200,000 to \$299,999; 542 were priced \$100,000 to \$199,999; and 124 were priced at \$99,999 or less.

Editor’s notes

All statistics were compiled by F.C. Tucker Company from a report drawn from BLC® statistics on October 5, 2023. Because of delayed processing through other agencies or boards, these numbers are subject to change.

Effective April 7, 2019, data from MIBOR only reports on single family homes and excludes condo sales. F.C. Tucker will continue to include condo sales in this report.

Girl Scouts of Central Indiana recently announced the launch of three new **mental wellness patches** within the Movement's Mental Health Initiative, which was launched in 2021 in response to the mental health crises today's young women face. Designed for girls in grades 4 through 12, these new patches provide useful tools to help them safely identify and explore their feelings, seek support, and find resources for help, if needed.

“In September, Girl Scouts of Central Indiana proudly shared the **Indiana Girl Report** commissioned through the Indiana Youth Institute in collaboration with Girl Scout councils from across the state and the Girl Coalition of Indiana,” Girl Scouts of Central Indiana CEO Danielle Shockey said. “The groundbreaking report provided data that calls attention to the critical state of mental health for Hoosier girls, and these new Girl Scout patches are perfectly timely for girls in our state.”

The patches include: *Knowing My Emotions*, *Finding My Voice*, and *Showing Up for Me and You*.

Each patch program includes an adult facilitator guide to help adults approach girls in a sensitive way, prompt important con-

The Indiana General Assembly has the legal authority to regulate those who pay bail for criminal defendants. Hoosiers have a legitimate interest in regulating their bail system. Violent or potentially violent offenders should not be on the streets whatsoever, especially when they are being bailed out by biased, political

organizations. There is an increase of crime in our country, and this only adds to this statistic. What they call “charitable bail” is not charitable at all – it erodes the rule of law and destroys the natural incentive built into our bail system. Without this incentive, there is no reason for these defendants to return when their court date occurs. During the 2020 Black Lives Matter riots, many looters, arsonists, and aggressors were released on

bail due to the contributions of organizations claiming to be advocates for racial justice. In actuality, they were advocating for people who took the opportunity of national unrest to steal from small businesses, destroy public property, and injure innocent people. Soccer Semi-state Previews

Millers hope for state championship repeats, Golden Eagles heading to Evansville for semi-state

In 2022, the Noblesville soccer teams made school history by winning both the boys and girls state championships on the same day.

The Millers are hoping history repeats itself this year. Both teams will play for a place in the Class 3A state finals on Saturday at the Kokomo semi-state. Noblesville’s No. 1-ranked boys take on No. 9 Lake Central at 3:30 p.m., with the No. 3 Noblesville girls playing No. 9 Crown Point at 6 p.m.

The Millers boys, sponsored by Tom Wood Volkswagen, are 16-0-5 for the season and are fresh off win-

ning a hair-raising regional. Noblesville needed penalty kicks to win both games of the regional, winning a semifinal at No. 19 Warsaw, then edging out No. 14 Fort Wayne Carroll in the championship at Kokomo. The Millers are 16-0-5 for the season.

The Lake Central Indians are 17-3 for the season. Lake Central easily won the Highland sectional, defeating Hammond 12-1, No. 13 Munster 3-1 and Hammond Central 5-0. The Indians hosted Hobart in the regional semifinal, beating the Brickies 3-1, then defeated Concord 1-0 at Penn for the regional title.

Noblesville’s offensive leader is senior Sam Holland, who tops the Millers’ list in both goals scored (16) and assists (seven). Freshman Ben Hewitt has put in 13 goals, while senior Ashton Craig has eight goals and five assists to his credit. Senior goalkeeper Cole Thompson has 53 saves and a 0.638 goals against average. (Lake Central stats are not available).

The Noblesville girls also had a dramatic regional final at Kokomo. The Millers edged out No. 7 Fort Wayne Carroll in the championship game, also by penalty kicks. Noblesville traveled to Fort Wayne Northrop for the regional

semifinal and cruised past the Bruins 7-2. The Millers are 15-1-3.

Crown Point is 18-2-1 for the season. The Bulldogs got past No. 14 Chesterton 1-0 in the semifinals and Valparaiso 3-2 in the championship to win the Hobart sectional. Crown Point played at Lake Central for the regional semifinals and got a 2-1 victory, then traveled to Penn for the championship, where the Bulldogs took care of No. 16 Northridge 2-0 in the final.

Sophomore Hannah Pesich leads Crown Point with 12 goals, followed by senior Emma Charles and junior Izzy Sainato with 10 goals each. Charles also has 12 assists. Goalkeeper Sam Quick has 33 saves on the season with a 1.556 goals against average.

Junior Meredith Tippler has been dominant for Noblesville, with 22 goals scored. Juniors Atley Pittman and Lily Ault both have five assists. Junior goalkeeper Bella Wyatt has made 56 saves for the season with a 0.731 GAA.

The Guerin Catholic girls team is traveling to Evansville North on Saturday to play in the Class 2A south semi-state. The No. 3 Golden Eagles will play No. 8 Evansville Memorial in a game that starts at 7 p.m. (6 p.m. Central Time).

The Tigers are one of the premier soccer teams in Indiana, as they won a state-record 19th regional title last week. Memorial traveled to No. 18 Silver Creek for the semifinal and defeated the Dragons 5-1. The Tigers then headed north to Washington for the regional title game and beat No. 20 Jasper 2-0 to claim title No. 19.

Memorial played at the Heritage Hills sectional, where it beat the host school 2-1 in the first round, No. 11 Gibson Southern 1-0 in the semifinals and Boonville 5-0 in the championship.

Junior Myla Browning is the offensive leader for the Tigers, with 18 goals and eight assists. Sophomore Emma Teague has been a force as goalkeeper, with 161 saves.

Guerin Catholic won its first regional since 2020 last week. The Golden Eagles won 3-0 at No. 19 Tri-West in the semifinals, then beat No. 10 Lawrenceburg 2-0 in the championship at Bishop Chatard.

Two seniors are on top of the goal-scoring list. Alex Soucie has 12 goals and 11 assists to her credit, with Annabel Wright adding 11 goals. Junior Olivia Eaton and senior Taylor Beard have been sharing goalkeeper duties, with Eaton getting 54 saves and a 0.922 GAA, and Beard totaling 40 saves and a 0.979 GAA.
