"This exhibit will be a place to learn and reflect on the Black pioneers who settled in northern Hamilton County before the Civil War and are part of the rich heritage and extraordinary history of our county and the state," Duke Energy Government & Community Relations Manager Mark LaBarr said.

When complete in mid-2024, visitors will be greeted by the State of Indiana Historical Marker and "Morning Light," a dazzling entry feature symbolizing exploration, discovery, opportunity, and ownership. Beyond, the legacy walk meanders through four separate interpretive-themed stations dedicated to Roots & Migration,

Workers who have experienced a company layoff may be eligible for free training and additional lifetime employment benefits even if they are currently working. Federal funds are available for qualifying workers through the Trade Adjustment (TAA) program. Benefits include training and job search assistance.

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Medicare Supplement Plan N goes unnoticed

Most people aging into Medicare usually have some idea of what type of insurance they want. Their sister is happy with Anthem Plan G, or their neighbor talks highly of Humana Plan G so that will do!

Plan G is the most popular way to supplement original Medicare. People still init is not available for sale to Part B after January 2020.

The vast majority of retirees who want a Supplement plan now know they want a Plan G. No one seems to talk about Plan N. There are many other plans, but the only other plan we commonly recommend is Plan N. It's more complicated than a Plan G, but it is worth a look.

Plan G is popular because it is easy to understand. You pay a monthly price and an annual deductible. There are no copays, coinsurance, or other out-of-pocket costs. If government Medicare pays, then the supplement will pay its share. Plan G, however, goes up in price from 5 to 15 percent per year. The price

that Plan N goes up slower on a national basis.

Plan N is more complicated. For a monthly price quire about old Plan F, but N offers the same annual deductible as Plan G, and you'll pay a \$20 copay per visit. You'll also pay \$50 if you go to the emergency room and it doesn't result in your admission to the hospital. Healthy people like the monthly savings because they rarely go to the doctor or the ER.

post it in the waiting room if they do not. If you buy a Plan N, it just becomes part of your routine to ask if the doctor accepts Medicare assignment - especially when getting a referral. It's easy to avoid this extra charge. Several states won't allow it by state law, such as Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Sick people won't buy Plan N because of the \$20 doctor copay. Healthy people buy this plan, which keeps the rates down. Plan N will go up much more slowerly in price than a Plan G. Since you can control the risk of paying any excess charges, this is a great plan to consider.



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

Carmel mayoral candidates each look to continue Brainard's legacy

Despite coming from opposing parties, Sue Finkam and Miles Nelson both said they want to continue the work done by Carmel's outgoing mayor.

Jim Brainard, a Republican, is stepping down after an unprecedented 28 years as mayor of Carmel, one of the longest stints of any mayor in the state's history. Finkam and Nelson both currently serve on the Carmel City Council, with Nelson being the first Democrat elected to the council in the in a three-way Republican city's history.

Carmel has long been a Republican stronghold, but Democrats have made inroads in the past few years. President Joe Biden won more votes in the city than former President Donald Trump in the 2020 election. Destiny Wells repeated the feat two years later in her unsuccessful bid for Secretary of State. That same year, Democrat Victoria Garcia Wilburn narrowly defeated Republican Fred Glynn to capture a new seat in the Indiana House of Representatives.

The race took an unexpected turn in June after the group Moms for Liberty published a newsletter which prominently featured a quote by Adolf Hitler. Nelson condemned the quote and called on other Hamilton County officials, Finkam in particular, to do the same. In an interview with News 8 for All INdiana Politics, Nelson said the problem for him wasn't so much the Hitler quote as the newsletter's attacks against a Carmel High School student group that supports the interests of LGBTQ+ students. SHERIDAN – The Sheridan football team got exactly the tournament start it wanted Friday night when the Blackhawks hosted Hagerstown to begin Sectional 45 play.

The 'Hawks, ranked No. 10 in the IFCA Class 1A poll, took care of the Tigers 41-0 at Bud Wright Stadium. Sheridan's running game and defense set the tone in the first half, and that carried the Blackhawks through to victory and a place in the sectional semifinals.

"It was a nice start," said Wright.

Hagerstown got the ball first, but Dayne Voege made an interception 30 seconds into the game, and Sheridan began its first offensive drive. It lasted over six minutes, with Eli Kolb, Zach Bales, Nolan Page and Owen Bell taking turns making short runs down the field. An 11-yard pass from Bell to Page got the ball to the two-yard line, and Bales took it in for the score.

The Blackhawks' second scoring drive followed the same pattern. During the five-minute march down the field, Bales had the majority of the runs, culminating in a one-yard punch into the end zone early in the second quarter. Bell made both extra-point kicks, and Sheridan was on top 14-0.
