Reducing the mental load at home: housecleaning

We're continuing our series on reducing our mental labor. Today we'll finish our focus on lightening the load of housecleaning. We've been discussing how to share this labor with others in our household.

When you've got older teenagers, you already have built-in help.

When our sons were in high school, they mowed the lawn and helped with various outdoor chores in warmer weather.

Jonathon oversaw taking out trash and recycling and he scooped the yard once a week for dog poo. Jacob cleaned the kitty box ev-

They unloaded the dishwasher whenever I was busy and didn't have time. I also informed them that I was no longer going to remind them to do chores. They were old enough to see when things needed to get done, so I took those off my management list. Things went well most of the time.

Having children do chores starting at a young age is important not just for the relief of an adult's mental labor, but to teach them valuable life skills. And I wasn't worried about my boys because they took over even more chores whenever John and I went away for a weekend or on a quick vacation.

One summer they cooked, did dishes, took care of laundry, and were completely in charge of the pets while we were away for five days in Branson, Mo. I also showed them how to do some basic meals and Jonathon took an Intro to Culinary class in high school. I figured they wouldn't starve in the future!

They've learned a lot with their first apartments and rental homes in college. That's where I got a crash course in housecleaning decades ago, and let me tell you, my roommates let me know when I was slacking. Thank you, Ladies, you taught me a lot!

John still works 50 to 60 hours a week, but he has always overseen organizing and cleaning the garage and trimming the lawn. He also loves winter (a crazy concept to me) and doesn't mind shoveling and snow blowing along with the boys sometimes.

When it comes to housework and cleaning, everyone must manage things differently according to their financial and life situation. I like our combination of hiring out the deep

Meijer participating in **National Prescription Drug Take Back Day**

National Prescription Drug Take Back Day is on Saturday, Oct. 28, and Meijer pharmacists located throughout Hamilton County are ready for an influx of customers to come in and dispose of their used and expired medications.

Meijer began its program in February 2019, and its Indiana pharmacies have collected more than 21 tons of unwanted medication since then. Overall, Meijer stores have collected more than 144 tons.

Customers can access the kiosks year-round for disposal of over-the-counter and prescription medications, including controlled substances, at Meijer stores during normal pharmacy hours. Customers can ask for help if needed, but kiosks are positioned near the pharmacies so they can simply come in and drop the medications off, no questions asked.

Items not accepted as part of the program include needles or other sharps, inhalers, mercury thermometers, medications that contain iodine and illicit drugs.

Carmel voters got a wake-up call this week when backers of the school bond issue on the November ballot blamed the State of Indiana for the lack of support.

The school bureaucracy wants \$39 million more added to its existing \$293 million total outstanding debt (according to data the school district provided the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance or IDLGF).

Carmel governments - city, schools, library, and township - have a combined total debt of \$1,973,104,415 as reported to the IDLGF.

Quibbling over state-required wording on the ballot, school administrators should be selling the bond idea. Turns out the "product" is too unattractive to sell.

They ask voters to vote blindly for a boost in the school's property tax rate that "will increase the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a residence within the school corporation by 28.3 percent." It does so by replacing an old bond issue with a new

Published reports indicate the Carmel school district is the only one statewide to complain about the new state

wording requirement. Is it possible the new wording, far from confusing voters, actually informs us too well?

This is the same school district which disclosed in January a \$9.5 million high school activities center would cost 60 percent more than estimated.

The same district which in June then reported a high school stadium upgrade estimated to cost \$5.8 million would cost 24 percent more (\$7.2 million).

It could be we need a school board that lives within its means, manages its P's and Q's, and tells the candid truth. Meanwhile, Carmel taxpayers should vote "NO" on
