Georgianne Davis Neal, 92, passed away Friday morning at her home. The widow of Noblesville former Ledger owner James T. Neal, Georgianne was an adopted daughter of Hamilton County. She was born in Indianapolis where she attended school until going to



Radcliffe College. Following graduation,

she joined the staff of the *Indianapolis News*. An intelligent, generous, and witty lady, she and Jim Neal were married in the mid-1950s and made their home in Hamilton County until Jim's retirement in 1986. After several years in Florida, they returned to the Indianapolis area. Their daughters Dede and Andrea, and three grandchildren survive.

Georgianne was involved in numerous community activities and was an avid collector of American Indian art and artifacts. She volunteered at Conner Prairie Pioneer Settlement and served in the Republican Party precinct organization. A major project of Georgianne's was assembling a collection of Indiana's pioneer and American Indian portraits, maps, and drawings, which she displayed for the public at the Ledger Building.

Services on Nov. 4 at Meridian Street Methodist Church, Indianapolis, will be at 1 p.m. with calling an hour before the service, and also an hour after the service at the church. Burial will be in Noblesville's Crownland Cemetery.





Attorney General Rokita cautions Hoosier parents of child identity theft

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita is warning Hoosiers that child identity theft is on the rise. A total of 1.3 million children have their identities stolen identity every year. This crime occurs when a hacker steals a child, is devas-

child's personal information uses it to receive services or bene-

"Having your stolen, as an adult or a tating financially mentally,"

AG Rokita said. "Our children do not typically have credit reports, which presents a blank slate for criminals to apply for credit and take out loans in their name. This type of theft can go undetected for years until they apply for a car loan or their first credit card."

Scammers often use children's Social Security number, name and address, or date of birth to apply for services, like health care coverage or nutrition assistance, open a bank or credit card account, apply for a loan, sign up for a utility service, or even rent a place

"The effects of identity fraud are not only a hinderance or an annoyance - they can also destroy the future of children who are navigating into adulthood," AG Rokita said. "As they apply for college loans or apply for a credit card, they can be completely denied due to unprotected data and greedy hackers."

AG Rokita, along with the Federal Trade Commission, offer the following tips to protect your child from identity theft:

Ask questions before giving anyone your child's Social Security number – even if it the child's school, ask

- these questions: • Why do you need it?
- How will you protect it? • Can you use a different identifier?
- Can you use just the last four digits of the Social Security number?

Protect documents with personal information.

• If you have documents with your child's personal

information, like medical bills or their Social Security card, keep them in a safe place, like a locked file cabinet.

• When you decide to get rid of those documents, shred them before

you throw them away. If you don't have a shredder, look for a local shred day. **Delete personal**

information before disposing a computer or cell phone.

· Your computer and phone might contain personal information about your child. Find out how to delete that information before you get rid of a computer or a cell phone.

Security freeze

- As a parent or legal guardian, a security freeze is one tool you can use to restrict certain access to your minor dependent's credit report. Should you request a security freeze be placed on your minor dependent's credit report, a credit report is created for the minor and then frozen.
- Once a security freeze is placed on your child's credit report, it restricts certain access to it, including by fraudsters who may be trying to open a new account using the child's ID.
- Security freezes are free but must be placed separately with all three national credit bureaus (Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion). You'll need to provide copies of documentation that verify your ID; the minor dependent's ID; and your relationship to them.

If your child's identity is hacked, report and close the fraudulent accounts, freeze your child's credit, and contact Attorney General Rokita's staff by visiting in.gov/ attorneygeneral or calling 1-800-382-5516. You also may report suspected cybercriminal scams to the FBI at ic3.gov or Identity-Theft.gov.



Jupiter shows its spooky face just in time for Halloween

Usually known for its

Great Red Spot, Jupiter shows a face just in time for Halloween. NASA's Juno mission

captured this view of the highlights the changing planet's northern region. The clouds form what looks like a frowning human face. Half of the image is in darkness, while the other half is on the planet's night side. This makes it look like the face is coming from behind a

The image was made with raw data from a citizen scientist. The raw image was taken well above Jupiter's cloud tops, about 4,800 miles.

You can see turbulent clouds and even storms along Jupiter's terminator. The terminator is the dividing line between the planet's day and night

sides. Scientists are continuing to study this part of Jupiter to better understand the processes playing out in its atmosphere.

The stormy scene was showcased even more by the low sun angle and topography on the fifth planet of our solar system.

Jupiter's clouds are demonstrating what's called pareidolia. According to Merriam-Webster's dictionary, pareidolia is "the tendency to perceive a specific, often meaningful image in a random or ambiguous visual pat-

More raw images are available to the public and can be seen here.


This isn't the first time during a spooky season we've seen these types of images. In the late 1990s, NASA posted images that appeared to look like there was a face on Mars.

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All 2023-2024 State Finals to stream exclusively at IHSAAtv.org

Livestreaming has become a fact of life in the television world over the past few years. More often, programming is being moved from linear (or conventional) television to streaming platforms.

Starting this school year, livestreaming on the IH-SAA Champions Network presented by Indiana Farm Bureau Insurance via IH-SAAtv.org will be the only way to view IHSAA State Finals broadcasts - including football and boys and girls basketball.

For the past decade, Bally Sports Indiana (formerly Fox Sports Indiana) had been the television home for the state finals. However, Diamond Sports Group which owns 19 regional sports networks, including Bally Sports Indiana – filed for bankruptcy this past March.

IHSAA Assistant Commissioner Chris Kaufman, Bally Sports Indiana informed the organization that the partnership would end.

"They called and said they weren't allowed to renew the contract with us,"

Kaufman said. "It was an amicable parting and, all in all, Bally was a great partner. We enjoyed working with them and we will stay in touch."

This means, at least for now, IHSAAtv.org will be the exclusive platform for the state finals and will be behind a paywall.

'The state finals have been on IHSAAtv.org for many years now," said Heath Shanahan, IHSAA's Director of Broadcasting/ Executive Producer. "It's been a destination website that people hit, not just for the state finals, but the entire tournament and regular ticket at the venue: gener-

"We decided this is a great release point, not just for the state, but worldwide," he added.

all state finals, except for golf, tennis, and Unified sports. Those broadcasts will remain free to view.

In June, according to events, viewers will need to download the free IH-SAAtv app to their devices (e.g., a computer, phone or OTT/television appliance device) or visit IHSAAtv. org. The prices to view state finals contests will be the same as buying a

Kaufman and Shanahan said IHSAA realizes there will be pushback due to a natural resistance to streaming content previously available on certain television packages.

"It can be difficult for some who aren't technologically savvy, but that's an issue we can't solve alone," Kaufman said. Since 2010, IHSAAtv. org has delivered streaming content. Shanahan said the site currently has 150 schools from across the state who contribute games on the network, along with 30-plus independent broadcasters.

While the state finals and semi-state contests are pay-per-view, the sectional and regional rounds of each state tournament - will remain free to view.

Also, the Champions Radio Network, supported by Indiana Farm Bureau Insurance, will not be impacted. In fact, that network added seven more stations this year, bringing the total to 79.

Carmel Clay Schools

Shall Carmel Clay Schools continue to impose increased property taxes paid to the school corporation by homeowners and businesses for eight (8) years immediately following the holding of the referendum for the purpose of retaining and attracting teachers, educational staff, and other support staff and fund educationally related programs at the current maximum referendum tax rate of \$0.19 per one hundred dollars (\$100) of assessed valuation? The property tax increase requested in this referendum was originally approved by the voters in 2017 and if extended will increase the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a residence within the school corporation by 28.3% and if extended will increase the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a business property within the school corporation by 28.3%.

Hamilton Southeastern Schools

The property tax increase requested in this referendum was originally approved by the voters in May, 2016 and if extended will increase the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a residence within the school corporation by 20.8% and if extended will increase the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a business property within the school corporation by 20.8%.

Shall Sheridan Community Schools continue to impose increased property taxes paid to the school corporation by homeowners and businesses for eight (8) years immediately following the holding of the referendum for the purpose of funding the retention and attraction of teachers and staff, academic related programs and operational expenses at the current maximum referendum tax rate of \$0.25? The property tax increase requested in this referendum was originally approved by the voters in 2017 and if extended will increase the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a residence within the school corporation by 23.05% and if extended will increase the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a business property within the school corporation by 23.05%.
