Heights wins inaugural Golden Shovel Award

Last week, students from Hamilton Heights High School and Garrett High School had the opportunity to compete in the first of what is expected to be an annual event, the Golden Shovel Competition.

Hosted by MacAllister Machinery Company in Indianapolis, construction trades education students from both districts had the opportunity to show their skill and knowledge in this inaugural heavy equipment construction skills competition.

According to Charlie Mc-Cullough, Communication Specialist for Indiana Constructors, Inc. and Work IN Roads, the competition centered on the Civil Construction Pathway education program and marks a significant milestone in civil construction education and Indiana's commitment to build Indiana's infrastructure. The Golden Shovel Competition is designed to bridge the gap between high school students and the con-tential employers.





Opening with a powerful and evocative performance of Valerie Coleman's "Umoja, Anthem of Unity," this CSO performance will weave together intricate melodies and rhythms inspired by African and African American musical traditions, creating a celebration of unity and cultural richness.

"This is truly a concert about unity in diversity," Guest Conducter David Commanday said. "Coleman's 'Anthem of Unity' is a tribal, choral piece that was orchestrated 20 years later for the Philadelphia Orchestra, the first time the orchestra had ever played a piece by an African American woman composer. It is truly a brilliant orchestration."

points through a variety of skill tests that included working as a team to survey a 20-by-20-foot square lot that was eight inches tall. They performed a job hazard analysis and a complete equipment check, loaded up a dump truck with dirt, unloaded it on the site, leveled and graded the lot within one inch of specs, and returned the lot to its original condition. Despite what team earned enough points a great way for students to to take a top spot, all participants had the opportunity to showcase their skills and learn a lot from the experience."

Hamilton Heights sent four teams of three students per team. Two teams were comprised of upper-class students, and two teams were comprised of freshmen and sophomore students. At the end of the day, the team comprised of Jake Drummond, Kendall Flanders, and Nate Williams won first place and the team comprised of Isabel Morrow, Ethan Halverson, and Logan Hickman placed third.

"I am really proud of our students," Sheets added. "I felt prepared, my team was prepared to handle whatever came our way, and at the end of the day, we did well," said Halverson, a student in Sheets' Civil whose team placed first in this year's competition.

"It was a great experience," said Junior Isabel Morrow, who is interested in pursuing a career as a residential electrician. "It wasn't your average offsite school function. It was a cool experience serving as a leader, working with who were there."

Bob Knight, the legendary basketball coach who won three NCAA championships at IU, has died at the age of 83.

His family announced the death Wednesday evening.

The statement read in part, "It is with heavy hearts that we share that Coach Bob Knight passed away at his home in Bloomington surrounded by his family. We are grateful for all the thoughts and prayers, and appreciate the continued respect for our privacy as Coach requested a private family gathering, which is being honored. We will continue to celebrate his life and remember him, today and forever as a beloved Husband, Father, Coach, and Friend."

Knight was the head coach at IU for 29 seasons. His first year in Bloomington was the 1971-72 season, leading IU to a 17-8 record during his first season at Indiana.

It didn't take long for Knight to find success as the Hoosiers head coach.

That was the first of five Final Four appearances that he had during his tenure.

Knight ultimately won complishment, three national titles during his time in Bloomington. Those three titles came in 1976, 1981 and 1987. In fact, the 1987 national championship was the last NCAA Tournament title the IU men's basketball program has won.

Knight went 902-371 during a 42-year head coaching career, which included stops at Army (1966-71), Indiana (1972-2000) and Texas Tech (2022-08). When Knight retired in our 1976 team, which I was 2008, his 902 wins were ranked No. 1 all time.

Knight was inducted into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in 1991, the College Basketball Hall of Fame in 2006 and the IU Athletics Hall of Fame in
