### Reducing the mental load at home: shopping & meal planning

We're continuing our series on reducing our mental labor. For the next couple of weeks, we'll focus on shopping and meal planning.

Groceries. Personal hygiene items. Pet Prescriptions. Clothing. These items are necessary for most

households, but they don't magically appear

when we need them. (Darn it!) For groceries and most personal items, you can always go the delivery or pick-up

In central Indiana, I've used Shipt, a service that delivers things from local stores.

Of course, there are other options, but this is the one I'm most familiar with.

With Shipt, you simply select what you need online using an app or visiting their website. You pay an annual fee of \$99 or \$10.99 a month. Prices on some items are slightly higher than what you would find in the store, although they have many things on sale each week. And you should tip your shopper.

This all may sound too expensive, but if you are often guilty of making impulse buys, you could come out even. I know I'm not the only one who runs to Target to buy a few things and ends up coming home with 20!

### AG Rokita makes statement after Supreme Court's public reprimand

### The REPORTER

In September, the Indiana Supreme Court Disciplinary Commission filed a

complaint against Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita, claiming three counts of professional misregarding conduct his handling of the case of Dr. Caitlin Bernard – the doctor who performed an abortion last year for the 10-year-old rape victim from Ohio.

The case drew national attention after Dr. Bernard shared the story with The Indianapolis Star. The complaint sought disciplinary action against Rokita.

The Indiana Supreme Court Disciplinary Commission reprimanded Rokita on Thursday The reprimand came with no sanctions, no suspension of his license to practice law, and no fines. He will, however, have to pay \$250 in court fees.

First things first: I deny and was not found to have violated anyone's confidentiality or any laws. I was not fined. And I will continue as Indiana's duly-elected attorney general.



### Study: Carmel economy sees big boost from arts & cultural activities

The REPORTER

Nonprofit arts and cultural activities in Carmel generated \$42.7 million in economic activity last year, according to the latest **Arts** & Economic Prosperity study conducted by Americans for the Arts.

The total includes \$17 million in spending by arts and culture organizations and \$25.7 million in event-related spending by their audiences. Nearly 49 percent of the people attending local arts and cultural events in 2022 came from outside Hamilton Coun- sults of the study.

ty, according to the study, for which the Center for the Performing Arts and its Resident Companies assisted in gathering data. All that activity supported the equivalent of 981 jobs and generated \$10 million in local, state, and federal government revenue.

### Using voice search? Use caution when asking for auto dial from a smart device

Tell Alexa to play your favorite song. Ask Siri about the weather. Use Google Assistant to turn down the air conditioner. But don't ask your smart device to look up a phone number, because it could accidentally point you to a scam.

#### How the scam works

You need the phone number for a company, so you ask your home's smart device, which might be Google Home, Siri, or Alexa, to find and dial it for you. But when the company's "representative" answers, you start to notice some red flags. This repcan only help you if you make a payment by wire transfer or prepaid debit cards. Other times, they demand remote access to your computer or point you to a scam website.

One recent victim reported to BBB Scam Tracker: "I used Siri to

look up the United Air- bad actors hope that when mobile app or website. This lines customer service consumers do a voice search line. Somehow, the call was connected to a different company ... The agent pretended to be a United Airlines agent and said he could help me cancel my flight. The fee was \$125. I was convinced it was United Airlines, but the next day I realized my mistake. They said they would refund my money, but only after I threatened to call the police. I'm still waiting for

a refund." In another version of this scam, a consumer tried using voice search to contact Roku with a question about setting up their device. Instead, someone predoesn't exist.

In all versions of this scam, the "representative" isn't from the company you were searching for at all. Instead, scammers created a fake customer service number and bumped it to the top of the search results. These

using Siri, Alexa, or another device, the algorithm will accidentally pick their scam number and an unsuspecting victim will contact them directly.

#### Tips to avoid this scam

Be careful when searching for support phone numbers. Rather than doing an online search or letting your smart device look up a number, use the contact information on the business's website (always double check the URL) on your bill, receipt, or in your confirmation email.

· Beware of fake ads. Scammers create bad ads tending to represent Roku with fake customer service vation fee" for a service that to find a number can make it harder to tell a phony listing from the real one. Get your information from the official company website or official correspondence.

> Go straight to the source. For example, if you need to get in touch with Amazon, use the Amazon
