Young liver transplant recipient embraces charity & joy

Beckett Culp, a student at Hamilton Heights Little Huskies Learning Center in Arcadia, has been named a 2024 Riley Champion!

Culp, who is also a patient at Riley Children's Hospital, was selected for his optimism and ongoing charitable work. A special celebration to recognize this honor and celebrate Culp took place at the preschool.

As a baby, Culp was diagnosed with a protein deficiency that affected his liver. By the age of three, he needed a liver transplant. Just three months later he underwent surgery at Riley Children's Hospital to receive his new liver.

Culp's donor was Hunter Tuzinski who died at age 7. It was both boys' love of Hot Wheels that sparked the idea to host a drive for these timeless toys. The Culp and Tuzinski families worked together to collect thousands of Hot Wheels for Riley and the hospital that treated Hunter.

Culp has continued the effort in which his classmates recently collected over 250 Hot Wheels for the Child Life Department at Riley in Hunter's honor.

Lilly gives teachers \$15K for self-discovery

The Lilly Endowment has awarded two teachers from Westfield Washington Schools (WWS) with the 2024 Teacher Creativity Fellowship Program (TCFP) grant enabling them to renew their commitment to teaching through exploration and self-discovery.

Science teachers Amy Kempler and Bridget Wede were each awarded \$15,000 to explore areas of interest, stimulate personal growth, and rekindle their dedication to teaching. Though diverse in their passions, both teachers are using the money to travel internationally this summer.

Kempler

Kempler has been teaching general science at Westfield Middle School for 24 years. As a veteran teacher, she plans to use her grant to jumpstart her enthusiasm for teaching by fully immersing herself in the cultures of Southern Europe and Southeast Asia.

Kempler's itinerary includes an 8-day sailing excursion through towns and villages in Montenegro, a week of touring Croatia, and a sixweek exploration of Thailand, Vietnam, and Cambodia. While visiting Phnom Penh, the capital of Cambodia, Kempler is also looking forward to the opportunity to visit her family living in the capital city.



INGREDIENTS

- 1 package of cream cheese, softened
- 36 Oreo cookies, crushed
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Cover large, rimmed baking sheet with wax paper.
- 2. Mix cream cheese and cookie crumbs until blended.
- 3. Shape cream cheese mixture into one-inch balls.
- 4. Roll each ball in sugar until evenly coated on all sides.
- 5. Place in a single layer on the prepared baking sheet.
- 6. Refrigerate 1 hour or until firm. Keep refrigerated until ready to serve.



Rob Evans left a 23-year career with Hamilton County Department of Probation Services to start his own company called Parenting Solutions which focuses on providing guidance, resources, and support for the parents of strongwilled children.

"Essentially it's the same program that I helped teach for the Hamilton County Probation Department," Evans told The Reporter. "I did that for 10 years. This program called The Parent Project, and it's a 27-and-a-halfhour program for support for parents, essentially. We help give practical solutions for dealing with out-of-control behaviors."

The program is 11 weeks long and provides an abundance of both information and resources.

Life lessons. We all have them.

We all have things in our lives that have taught us hard learned lessons. Often, those things are the things we thought were the worst things to ever happen to us. When we look back, sometimes we realize that maybe they

It has been emotionally healing for me.

Make your email signature come alive

I love how email has evolved in recent years. It's great that you can add your picture or one that represents who you are or what your company does. And with social media's popularity, having a picture and some extras in our emails makes a lot of sense.



People are used to more and more visuals in communication now. But most of us spend less time on our email signatures than our voicemails. However, this is another opportunity to make a strong first impression.

Your department or company may want all email signatures to be similar, perhaps including a logo, website, social media channels, office number, disclaimer, etc. My company, Green Avenue, is the same way.

But I can still personalize my email with a nice head shot. And instead of saying "Warm Regards" or "Yours Truly" at the end, for years I've written "With Enthusiasm" before my name. My former boss at the Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District had a beautiful picture of a drop of water bouncing and leaving ripples in her email signature. She definitely captured what we did – and you know the saying, "a picture is worth a thousand words."

Another former City of Noblesville coworker named Cindy always signed her emails, "Serving Joyfully." This reflected her personality well.

Maybe you have some leeway, and you can explore different fonts and colors for your email signature. Or perhaps you'd just like a little help in this area because you're short on time. You can try one of these three email signature generators: WiseStamp, NewOldStamp, or htmlsig.

No matter what direction you choose, follow the same guidelines as with voicemail. Be positive, be brief, and only give pertinent information. For example, it's not necessary to put your email address at the bottom of the message, since people can just hit "reply" to get it.

But your email signature might be a great opportunity to provide a link for your latest promotion, such as an annual native tree sale if you work for a soil and water conservation district. With a little thought and effort, your signature could bring you and your company more benefits than you ever imagined and show the world your positive attitude.

Here's more of my mother's wit and wisdom.

One of my friends never had a doll. Those who are too young to remember the depression cannot understand that. Children now have too many toys. It stifles their creativity. But to grow up without

a doll would have been tragic.



Billy Bunk was a small, celluloid doll. There is a picture of Billy lying on the ground in front of our Christmas tree. (It

had been moved outside.) Ruth and I are in the picture, too. The doll was named for "Billy," my first-grade teacher. Her name was Helen Gookins, but her dad, "Bunk" Gookins called her "Billy." Everyone called him "Bunk." I don't remember his name.

Martha Lou was a "Mama doll." Mama dolls said "Mama" when turned over. She was almost as large as a real baby, and she wore my baby coat. The coat was white, very long and had a large cape-like collar. The collar had a lot of white embroidery on it. Mary Jane was an Effanbee jointed doll with long brown curls. I got her from Sears Roebuck. I had announced to my older brothers and Uncle Will that I was "saving up." They generously gave me nickels and dimes. Sometimes I was required to earn my money by doing small chores such as shining a pair of shoes.

Finally, I had enough money to send an order for a doll which fit my fancy and my pocketbook. Several days later my package arrived. With it was an explanation that they had sold out of the doll I ordered. In its place they sent one of "equal or better value." The doll was beautiful and I promptly dubbed her "Mary Jane." That name had just jumped into my mind. Later we checked the catalog hoping to find a picture of Mary Jane. Yes, we found her and her catalog name was Mary Jane. No wonder that name had popped into my mind. We also learned she was one of the most expensive dolls they offered. I suspect that was the reason I hadn't chosen her.

My sister had a doll just like Mary Jane but the elastic, which made its joints move, had worn out. By then Ruth was more interested in boys than dolls and her doll was never repaired.

Sometime after I was married, my oldest brother decided to do some housecleaning for our parents. I had left my toys in the old smokehouse which for years had served as my playhouse. I thought the toys were safe there; my parents would have left them there till I decided to bring them home.

Brother did not know the value of old old toys. He thought he was being helpful when he burned my dolls, my baby coat, a small wooden truck he had given me one Christmas, a large, leather-covered camel-back trunk and anything else he could find that was burnable. I was glad I had given my doll bed and my fanciest doll to two little neighbor girls. (Otherwise they wouldn't have had any Christmas gifts.) Also I had given my doll buggy to my niece. At least that much didn't burn!

Uncle Will made the doll bed when I was about 6 or 7. Cousin Vera bought the beautiful sleeping eyed doll. Aunt Dora made pillow, mattress, bed covers, silk doll dresses and an everyday outfit. The silk dress was white, trimmed with pink silk ribbon down the front and around the neck and sleeves. I don't recall this doll's name. Another doll I had was handed down from Vera. The body was rag but the head was China. Heads like hers are quite valuable now. Poor thing met a sad fate at the hands of my youngest brother. He made a parachute consisting of a large handkerchief, some string and a bolt. To see how well the parachute would worked, my brother borrowed my doll. Too bad bolts and China heads aren't more compatible.

Little girls outgrow their dolls as a multitude of other interests takeover. In later years the interest sometimes returns. One lady got disgusted with her alcoholic friend and told him not to come back. Then she bought a crib and a baby doll. That arrangement was much more satisfactory, she said.

There are several lessons to glean from my doll stories. One obvious one is to take care of your own belongings. If you don't, don't blame anyone who destroys them. Also, don't loan anything that isn't expendable. Remember, one man's junk may be another man's treasure.

If you happen to be the one who is doing the burning, find out the value of the article before deciding whether to destroy it. My brother could quote you prices on old furniture and old China. He obviously didn't know much about toys. (I once saw a tin toy at a yard sale. The



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

For Black History Month, the Hamilton County Artists' Association (HCAA) is celebrating the life of Barney Stone, a Noblesville resident.

Stone was born into slavery in 1847 on a large farm in Kentucky. He was one of 10 children and never knew his father, who was enslaved on another farm. His slave owner would hire him out to sire enslaved women for profit.



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

Kincaide made an ambitious promise to Noblesville wrestling coach Michael Weimer five years ago.

Last Saturday during the 86th Annual IHSAA Wrestling State Finals at the Ford Center in Evansville, Kincaide lived up to those words, placing fourth at 157 pounds to become coach Weimer's first-ever state medalist.

Kincaide advanced to Saturday's medal rounds after upsetting Bellmont junior Gavin Davis (28-2) by decision 6-3 on opening night. Davis was ranked eighth in the state by Indianamat.

Kincaide fell short during his consolation third-place match, placing fourth following a narrow 3-2 loss against Warren Central's fifth-ranked Anthony Cashman, who also bested him during the New Castle Semi-state finals last weekend in sudden victory,

"The coolest thing about this and when he won (last Friday) is that I reflected back to when he was in fourth grade. I took over when he was in third grade, and I've been coaching him since," Weimer said.

Despite two medical conditions, Anthony Russell keep his commitment to himself & other players

Imagine that one minute, you're playing the sport that you love – then the next minute, you're passed out on the ice.

As scary as it sounds, it's the reality for Anthony Russell. The Hamilton Southeastern senior who has a passion for the sport of hockey has been dealing with that reality for the past couple of years. His condition was undiagnosed until recently when he found out he had POTS syndrome, a blood circulation disorder, and neurocardiogenic syncope, a fainting spell that happens when someone's body overreacts to certain triggers.

Despite these lifelone challenges, Russell is determined to not let his conditions stop him "from staying close to the game I adore. I refuse to let go of my passion. I turned these challenges into opportunities for growth."

Russell said he has been playing hockey since he was "6 or 7 years old." During his sophomore year at HSE, he began to experience what he called "troubling symptoms: dizziness, breathlessness and weakness." He went to the doctor and after an EKG test, was prevented from playing hockey. But it turned out there was an error with the ma-
