Fishers may lower \$50 parking fee at Geist beach for nonresidents

Nearly a year after Fishers City Council set a \$50-a-day fee for non-residents to park vehicles at the new beach at Geist Waterfront Park, a proposal could be approved Monday to lower that cost.

The Fishers Board of Works on Tuesday signed off on a proposal to drop the fee to \$25 a day.

People have criticized the fee as discriminatory, with some noting that \$50 was the maximum cost for top-tier daily parking last year at Walt Disney World in Florida.

Shortly after passing the fee in May, Fishers officials denied it was a form of discrimination. A spokesperson for the city government told News 8 in May that the fee was "for safety," to keep the number of beach visitors limited for lifeguards "to have the appropriate numbers for people to keep track of."

The spokesperson for Fishers also noted that Fishers taxpayers were footing the bill for the park, and it should be

a benefit preserved for city residents. Fishers residents can enter Geist Waterfront Park with their **SmartPass** badges. Nonresidents must register and pay online for parking. Motorists without SmartPass badges cannot show up at Geist Waterfront Park and enter the parking lot by paying there.

The park's website says, "Parking passes for non-residents are only required if the individual or group is driving into the park and occupying a parking space. Pedestrians and bike traffic are welcome and do not

need a parking pass. This is the only free option for non-residents at this time."

WISHTV.com in May had created a **poll asking viewers** if they agreed or disagreed with the Fishers City Council's decision to create the fee; a vast majority, 84 percent of 1,700 respondents, said they did not agree with the fee.

In May, seven of nine councilors voted in favor of the seasonal parking pass. Council members Jocelyn Vare and Crystal Neumann opposed the **measure**. While some council mem-

bers raised concerns about the affordability of the fee for visitors, a majority supported the fee as a means of recouping taxpayers' investment. The city in 2023 said it'd spent \$15 million to develop the park.

The proposal to lower the fee goes before the Fishers City Council at its meeting at 7 p.m. Monday. The proposal also would allow the city's recreation and wellness director to determine the days and times to charge the fee during beach season, which a city ordinance defines as being from

Memorial Day weekend to no later than Nov. 1.

Geist Waterfront Park sits on Geist Reservoir southeast of the Olivo Road bridge. The beach opened on Memorial Day weekend in 2023. The park also has a playground, walking trails, and kayak rentals. The parking lot can hold 240 vehicles. The cove can handle upwards of 300 swimmers.

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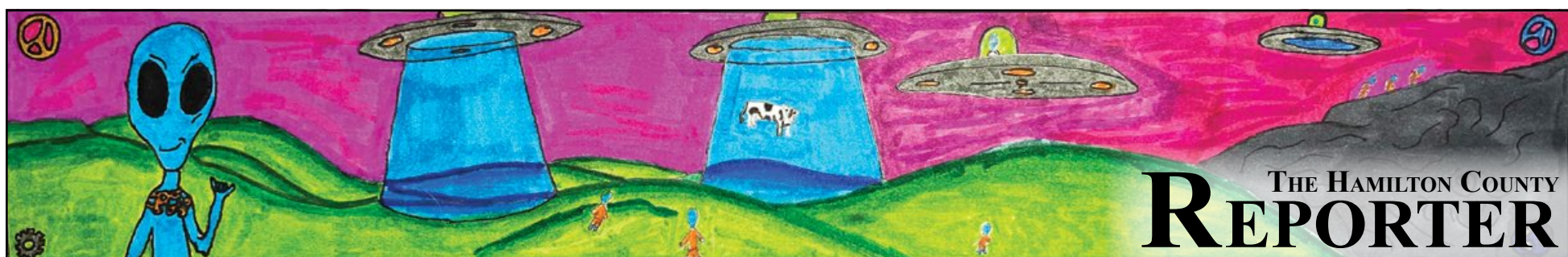

I saw my foreign self in the phone's screen, all sock-cap skulled and stubbly, the beginning of a beard sprouting from the weathered face of this wayfarer stranger adrift on some famous French waterway while enduring the spittle of heavy gray Paris sky; the Eiffel Tower behind me, The Louvre at left, Notre-Dame ahead. I had never felt more cosmopolitan. I had never felt so not me.

Normally I shave each morning, but I accidentally left my razor behind in Poland. I really wasn't in the mood to shop for le rasoir on my first full day in Paris - too scared perhaps that I might pronounce it wrong for the store clerk, only to end up having to say, "Hey, I don't want these raisins! I said razor!"

I had never considered growing a beard before, which was weird for a bald guy. In case you haven't noticed, bald guys typically tend to sport facial hair, as if to draw unwanted attention from their perpetual chrome dome - even though it makes them look even balder. Basically, I always feared that any attempt of mine to grow a beard would be futile, adding yet another follicle failure to forever haunt this international man of misery.

While growing up, there weren't any notable beards

in my family. My dad sported a rare spotty one during the Great Blizzard of '78, which gave him sort of that crazed look made famous by Jack Nicholson in The Shining two years later. It was like a deranged stranger had moved into our house. He disappeared a lot out in nature's deep freeze to chop wood (we didn't own a fireplace) or, if he was really pacing the cage, to brave the insane southern Indiana snowdrifts in his pickup and help stranded travelers out of ditches - the victims likely being other newly-bearded men who also, fueled by cabin fever, decided to go mano a mano with what the headlines called "the great white hurricane," a modern-day Donner Party in the making.

A few months before Paris, a former girlfriend said I had a baby face and suggested I stop shaving, which I ignored. She didn't stick around, returning, I think, to her former Sasquatch of a boyfriend. But it did get me thinking that maybe she was onto something. After all, my unshaven approach to life wasn't, as they say, causing the ladies to beat down my front door - not that that would be necessary for them to do since I typically left the door unlocked due to endless wishful thinking. Who am I kidding? - not only

was the door unlocked, but I seldom closed it. Who am I kidding? - the front door had been removed from its hinges at that point.

So yes, the beard seed was planted by a former heartbreaker, and my new face took bloom in Paris on Sept. 19, 2015. After 45 days bearded, as feared, it seemed to be a hopeless endeavor. One friend merely referred to it as my "growth," as if I was flaunting a cancer. "How's your growth today?" she'd ask over the phone, likely using "air quotes" at the g-word.

A guy at work with a cool beard commented that he liked the "Walter White" look I had going on. I assumed that was a compliment. I love Breaking Bad. Did my beard make me look like a meth dealer?

Mom was strangely silent since seeing my post-Paris face. She usually had something nice to say about everything I did. Even if I had

an arrow sticking through my head à la Steve Martin, she'd compliment the look before calling 9-1-1.

All Dad said was, "Haven't you heard the saying that you should never trust a man with a mustache?" "That's OK," I replied. "People probably shouldn't trust me without one either."

My 16-year-old said she liked it. She even encouraged me to stay the course, making me suspect I was being set up for further social ridicule. Never trust the teen daughter of a man with a mustache.

Some assumed I was a participant in "No Shave November." Most "No Shave November" guys have more facial hair on Nov. 2 than I have by Nov. 30.

Before I finally shaved

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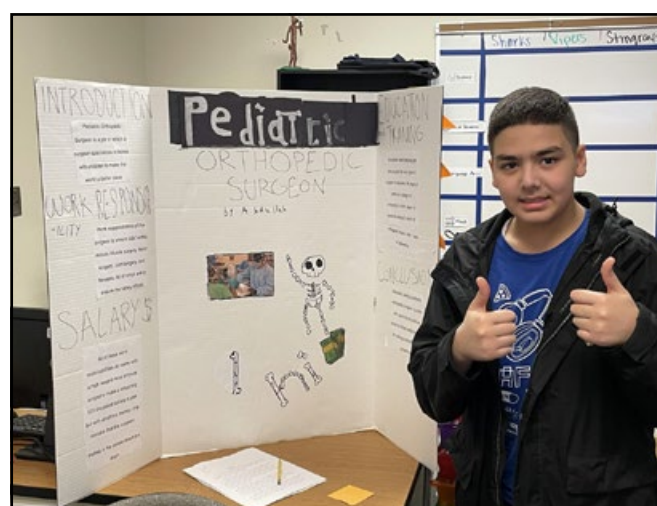
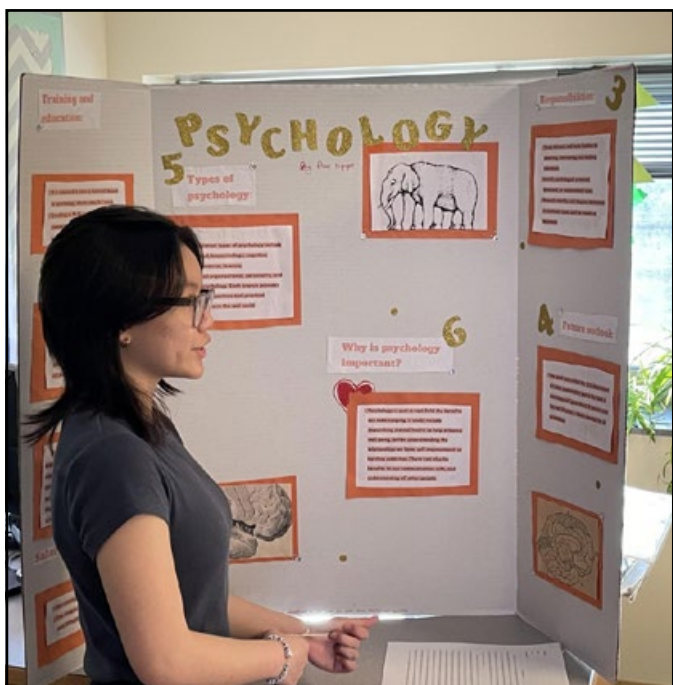

Meijer Grocery posts 250 job openings at new Noblesville store

Meijer plans to hire 250 people for a new grocery-only store and a new gas station and convenience store in Noblesville.

Unlike a supercenter, the Meijer Grocery will only sell produce, meat, and goods for health and beauty care, babies, and pets. The grocery also will have a deli, a bakery, and a pharmacy. It also will sell flowers, greeting cards and party supplies.

A Meijer Express, a gas station and convenience store, also will be opening near the grocery.

A news release from Meijer did not specify employees' compensation but called it "competitive and based on experience level and specific skills" with "access to health insurance and the option for 401k retirement planning."

The Meijer Grocery and Express will be at 5956 Promenade Shops Blvd., which is northeast of the intersection of State Road 32 and Hazel Dell Road. That's an area with several stores and restaurants.

Potential applicants were asked to go to [jobs.meijer.com/stores](https://www.meijer.com/stores), find the "Search New Store Open Jobs" section, and then look for jobs for the Noblesville location. Interviews were expected to happen in early May, the release says.

On Thursday night, the job listings posted in the past two to three weeks included bakery supervisors, cake decorators, cashiers, customer service department supervisors, customer service employees, deli-bakery employees, food clerks, gas station clerks, inventory employees, meat cutters, office cashiers, overnight department managers, overnight stocking clerks, parking lot attendants, pharmacy tech-

nicians, price associates, receivers of store deliveries, and store detectives. The website offers job descriptions and requirements.

The Noblesville Meijer Grocery will be 90,000 square feet. Most newer Meijer supercenters are about 150,000 square feet.

Hamilton County has three Meijer supercenters, and another on 96th Street near Interstate 69 in Indianapolis just south of the border with Fishers. The Meijer supercenter in Noblesville is off State Road 37 on Mercantile Boulevard. The Carmel, Noblesville and Westfield Meijer supercenters also have Meijer Express locations.

Meijer is headquartered

in Grand Rapids, Mich. The retailer opened its first Meijer Grocery locations in January 2023 in metropolitan Detroit.

"I look forward to working with an incredible staff of professionals who join ecumenical and interfaith partners as well as other United Methodist Boards and agencies in the work of amplifying the voice and vote of those who often are not represented in the decisions that benefit the favored few," Bishop Trimble said.

A graduate of Illinois State University and Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, Bishop Trimble received his Doctor of Ministry degree from Ashland Theological Seminary in Ohio.

Before his election as a bishop, he served as adjunct instructor at United Methodist-related Baldwin-Wallace College in Berea, Ohio, where he taught courses on the African American religious experience and the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Bishop Trimble married First Lady Racelder Grandberry-Trimble, a professional counselor and graduate of Methodist Theological School in Ohio in May 1979. The couple has three adult children: Cameron C., Candace R. (Herman Wake), and Julius Thomas. In June 2018, the Trimbles celebrated the birth of their first granddaughter, Corrine.

Bishop Trimble has preached throughout the United States, Africa, and the Holy Land. He is also the recipient of numerous honors and awards, including the Outstanding Alumni Award in 1998 from Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, the 2007 Bishop James S. Thomas Social Action Award from the Meth-

odist Federation for Social Action at Lakeside, Ohio, the Iowa MFA Social Action Award in 2015, and a Doctor of Divinity from United Seminary in 2017 for work in social justice in

recognition of his exceptional spiritual leadership, compassion for all people, and powerful witness to the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Ohio-based seminary noted his engagement in faith-based work to address social justice issues, as well as his work of advocacy for the United Methodist Global Health Initiative, especially in the efforts to make the world malaria- and AIDS-free.

Ten-time robber sentenced to 11 years in federal prison for \$20,000 robbery of credit union in Carmel

Marty McConnell, 64, Indianapolis, has been sentenced to 11 years in federal prison after pleading guilty to bank robbery.

According to court documents, on May 8, 2023, the defendant entered a Teachers Credit Union in Carmel, approached the bank teller and gave him a note threatening to “blow [the teller’s] f****g head off” unless he handed over all the money at his station. The teller gave the defendant \$20,000 and he subsequently left the credit union.

Carmel Police Department Officers immediately arrived on the scene and

quickly located McConnell. During a recorded interview with officers, McConnell admitted to committing the robbery and keeping the majority of money in his car. He also stated that he used a portion of money from the robbery to get his car out of pawn, buy new shoes, and buy drugs. Officers searched McConnell’s vehicle and located \$12,600 in cash and the clothing worn during the robbery.

Before robbing the Carmel Teachers Credit Union, McConnell was convicted of three armed robberies, six other robberies, and three batteries over a 36 span. He was most recently discharged from parole in No-

vember 2020, after his release from prison for a prior robbery spree.

“For three decades this violent criminal has terrorized innocent people, seeking quick money through force, violence, and intimidation. His crime spree stops here,” said Zachary A. Myers, U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of Indiana. “Violent crimes rob entire communities of their safety and peace of mind. Working closely with our partners at the Carmel Police Department and FBI, our federal prosecutors will continue our work to make our communities safer and hold violent, repeat crimi-

nals accountable.”

“This sentence sends a clear message that robbing a bank in Indiana will result in significant time in federal prison,” FBI Indianapolis Special Agent in Charge Herbert J. Stapleton said. “Our law enforcement partnerships ensure that those engaging in violent behavior will be caught and held accountable.”

The FBI investigated this case. The sentence was imposed by U.S. District Court Judge James P. Hanlon. Judge Hanlon also ordered that McConnell be supervised by the U.S. Probation Office for three years following his release from federal prison and pay

\$20,000 in restitution.

U.S. Attorney Myers thanked Assistant U.S. Attorney Jeremy C. Fugate, who prosecuted this case.

This case is part of Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), a program bringing together all levels of law enforcement and the communities they serve to reduce violent crime and gun violence, and to make neighborhoods safer for ev-

eryone. On May 26, 2021, the Department launched a violent crime reduction strategy strengthening PSN based on these core principles: fostering trust and legitimacy in our communities, supporting community-based organizations that help prevent violence from occurring in the first place, setting focused and strategic enforcement priorities, and measuring the results.

Tigers play close with Roncalli, rebound at Midwest battle

FISHERS – The two boys volleyball teams that played for a state championship in 2023 faced off Thursday night at the Fishers Tiger Den.

Fishers hosted Roncalli, a battle between the No. 2-ranked Royals and the No. 3 Tigers. When the two teams played each other last May for the state title, Roncalli edged out Fishers in four tight sets.

The Thursday match was

even closer, as the Royals needed five sets to beat the Tigers. The final score was 25-16, 22-25, 25-21, 21-25, 15-13. Fishers trailed 11-6 in the fifth set before rallying to keep the set close.

“I love it,” said Tigers coach Carlos Capó. “This is what volleyball’s all about. It could have gone either way. They played a great game, they had amazing digs and started playing a little bit better.”

Roncalli and Fishers have won the last five state championships. The Roy-

als also won state in 2018 and 2022, with the Tigers winning in 2019 and 2021. (There was no state tournament in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.)

“Every time we play, it’s always a battle,” said Capó.

Fishers bounced back from that loss to win two matches Friday at the Midwest Battle, which the Tigers are hosting this weekend. Fishers swept Olentangy (Ohio) 25-19, 25-17 and No. 6-ranked Hamilton Southeastern 25-22, 25-21. The Tigers will play Southeast-

ern again on April 23 for the Mudsock trophy.

Fishers is 13-3 this season and has only lost seven sets during its 2024 campaign. The Tigers fell to No. 1-ranked Cathedral and Louisville St. Xavier during a tournament on March 9. Fishers has gotten some solid wins, beating No. 4 Westfield in four sets on March 25, and collected sweeps of No. 5 Boone Grove and No. 10 Franklin Community early in the season as well.

“I believe this year, we

easily have six to seven teams that could easily win a state championship,” said Capó. “It’s all about who comes up to play.”

The Tigers have a solid roster of seniors this season. Colin Ryan put down 18 kills during the Roncalli match, while Gavin Hagerty made 16 digs. Ryan collected 14 digs and Dieter Hamm had 11. Hagerty dished out 46 assists.

The junior class is also contributing for Fishers. Nate Fitzwater hit 15 kills, while libero Ian Pifer led the

digs with 23.

“He did a great job,” said Capó. “Colin had some really good digs. (Junior) Davis Theobald also had some really good digs.”

Ryan is leading the Tigers’ offense this season with 3.4 kills per set, while Fitzwater averages 3.0 kills per set. Pifer has 3.4 digs per set and Hagerty averages 9.5 assists per set.

Fishers takes on Lincoln-Way East (Ill.) in a match at 11:30 a.m. today, with other matches to follow.

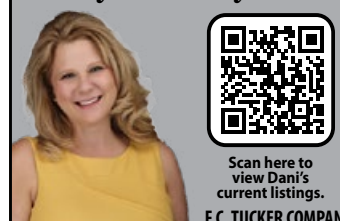
The Westfield girls tennis team won its Hoosier Crossroads Conference opener on Friday, beating Avon 5-0 in a dual meet that included 35 mph winds.

Post-eclipse washout at IMS provides little information heading into May

As beautiful as the week began with clear skies, warm temperatures, and a once-in-a-lifetime experience of witnessing a total solar eclipse, the remainder of the week was dreary, filled with rain, rain, and more rain.

Cars were on the track at Indianapolis Motor Speedway doing demonstration runs for the more than 50,000 people who observed the eclipse at the track. Anticipation was building for the Indianapolis 500 Open Test that was to take place at IMS on Wednesday and Thursday. Unfortunately, weather limited the test to just a few hours.

Teams were on track Wednesday morning for sev-

eral hours to get up to speed with their cars and the track. After the initial session, the rookie and reorientation session was run for those either new to Indianapolis or who had run limited ovals in the last 12 months. That is when rain began breaking up the session with several yellow flags. Eventually, the track dried and was open to all the teams, but for only a short stint as the rain came back. Constant rain washed out Wednesday afternoon and Thursday, and with more rain forecasted on Friday, the Open Test was ultimately canceled.

The biggest story of the test was Kyle Larson, who will make his first Indianapolis 500 attempt this May. The 31-year-old and 2021 NASCAR Cup Series Champion is a generational racing talent and often compared to the likes of A.J. Foyt and Mario Andretti for his ability to excel in anything with four wheels. Like Foyt and Andretti, Larson grew up racing midgets and sprint cars. Unlike Foyt and Andretti, Larson's journey led him to full-time stock car racing in NASCAR. From his early years in NASCAR, many hoped Larson would make an Indianapolis 500 attempt, particularly because he drove for Chip Ganassi. However, it was Rick Hendrick and a partnership between Hendrick Motorsports and Arrow McLaren that enabled Larson to make the Indy attempt.

With limited testing on Wednesday, it was hard to

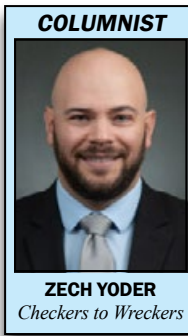
assess the field. Joseph Newgarden ended the test on top with a speed of 228.811 mph. Kyle Larson was second at 226.384 and the rest of the top 5 was Scot Dixon, Alex Palou, and Colton Herta.

Although it was hard to determine who will have speed come May from the limited test, I think those who finished in the top 5 should all be considered legitimate contenders. Newgarden got the Indianapolis 500 monkey off his back last May, and I expect him to be extremely fast. Alex Palou, the reigning INDYCAR Champion, dominated the early stages of last year's Indianapolis 500 before a collision on pit road likely ruined his opportunity at a win. Dixon, a past 500 Champion, is always a threat to win.

Others to watch are Marcus Ericsson, the 2021 Indianapolis 500 Champion, who posted the 14th quickest time, and Pato O'Ward, who has challenged for the win the last couple years, despite finishing the test in the middle of the pack.

May is fast approaching. Cars will take to the track for the Sonso Grand Prix May 9 to 11. Then it is on to the 108th Running of the Indianapolis 500.

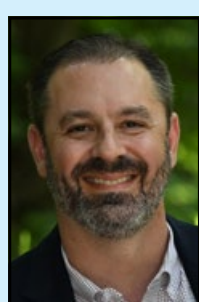

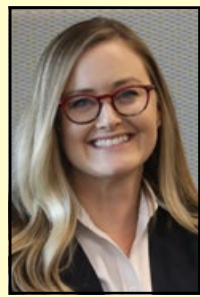

Hamilton County's rate of return was 3.95% in 2023 and 0.99% in 2022 compared to 5.30% and 1.48% for the State of Indiana's Investment fund (www.TrustIndiana.gov). Matching the state fund would have resulted in an additional \$8.7 million in investment income over 2 years.

2. Adopt benchmarks to evaluate investment performance:

Currently, there is no stated benchmark for investment returns. I will adopt the US Treasury three-month Bill ETF (TBIL) and the "Trust Indiana" fund as our benchmarks to properly evaluate performance.

3. Increase transparency in investments:

Currently, there is no data on invested funds on the Treasurer's web page. I will post investment returns and investment composition every quarter.

4. Increase adoption rates for E-billing of property tax statements:

The Treasurer mailed 125,000 paper copies of property tax bills in 2023. E-billing has been available for 12 years but I do not believe it has been communicated effectively. I believe we can save over \$50,000 a year by reducing paper statements.

I am a lifelong investor and a fiscal conservative with over 30 years' service to Hamilton County. I am a 1989 graduate of Taylor University.

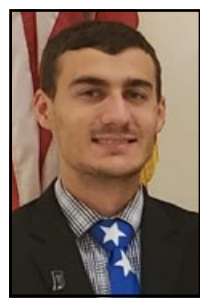
