Fishers awards over \$30K to local teachers


Three teachers from HSE Schools receive Educator Innovation Grants to fuel innovation in the classroom

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness surprised three local teachers in their classrooms Wednesday as he awarded over \$30,000 in funds as part of the city's new Educator Innovation Grant program.

"It's vital that we invest in our schools and empower our teachers with the tools to foster curiosity through hands-on learning," Mayor Fadness said. "This program celebrates the creativity and commitment of our educators and the spirit of innovation that makes Fishers unique."

The city launched the grant program earlier this year, allocating \$500,000 from the 2024 budget to empowering educators within HSE Schools with the resources to bring innovation to the



classroom and inspire students to rethink learning. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis and there is no funding cap on project requests. Grants are awarded by a selection committee comprised of educators, community entrepreneurs, and HSE alumni.

"One of the things we truly believe in at Hamilton Southeastern Schools is that schools equal strong communities," HSE Schools Superintendent Patrick Mapes said. "We are so happy to have a partnership with the City of Fishers to support our students, teachers, and our mission to have a top-quality education program in our community."

Liberty Fund names Gordon Wood as inaugural recipient of George F. Will Award

Liberty Fund, based in Carmel, announced Thursday that Gordon Wood, the noted historian of the American Revolution, is the winner of the inaugural George F. Will Award for the Advancement of Liberty and the Free Society.

Wood received his award at a ceremony and dinner held Wednesday in Washington, D.C. It was presented to him by George F. Will and Mitch Daniels, a senior adviser to the Liberty Fund, president emeritus of Purdue University, and a former governor of Indiana.

'Gordon Wood and George F. Will are two titans of American thought," Liberty Fund Board Chairman Nate Feltman said. "It is a real privilege to honor these great writers in this way. Throughout their extraordinary careers, Professor Wood and Mr. Will have both shown us that ideas have consequences. They have helped us understand our country's roots and inspired us to think about the meaning of the Founding for today."

"The Award celebrates original thinkers who, like George F. Will, have made exceptional contributions to the public's understanding of individual liberty, markets, self-government, constitutional government, and the rule of law," Liberty Fund President and CEO Sean Shelby said.

NFD rescues family dog from house fire

Shortly before 1 p.m. on Sunday, April 14, the Noblesville Fire Department (NFD) responded to the 6000 block of Rothwell Drive for a possible residence fire. A neighbor who could see smoke coming from the home called 911. Upon arrival, Engine 74 firefighters could see smoke coming from the home, but they found no one was home. During the search of the home, Ladder 72 firefighters rescued one dog from inside the home. The dog was treated for smoke inhalation outside and later transported to a veterinarian clinic for further care. Shortly after entering the structure, firefighters marked the fire as under control. The cause of the fire is still under investigation. NFD was assisted by the Cicero Fire Department and the Noblesville Police Department. NFD reminds residents to ensure they have functioning smoke detectors in their homes.



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

Westfield Police Department receives CALEA reaccreditation

The Westfield Police Department (WPD) was recently awarded national accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). The agency was first accredited in 2016.

Following a multi-year self-assessment phase and a meticulous site-based assessment of community engagement, policy, procedures, equipment, and facilities by CALEA assessors, WPD Lieutenant Brodie Houston and Captain James "Jim" Lilly attended the CALEA conference in Montgomery, Ala. Each agency being reviewed goes before CALEA's 21-member Board of Commissioners, which reviews all findings and determines the agencies' accreditation status.

On the evening of the hearing, CALEA President Marcus Brown and Executive Director Craig Hartley awarded WPD reaccreditation, which signifies excellence in public safety and commitment to the community. This is WPD's third award of national accreditation; the department now moves into CALEA's four-year accreditation cycle which includes four annual remote, web-based file reviews and a site-based assessment in the fourth year.

"We've continued to tell the story that the men and women of the Westfield Police Department are some of the best in public safety, and this reaccreditation with CALEA confirms what we already knew," Mayor Scott Willis said.

In 1979, the Commission was created through the combined efforts of four major law enforcement organizations: the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the National Organization of Black Law En-National Sheriffs' Association, and the Police Executive Research Forum.

The Commission's purpose is to develop standards based on international best practices in public safety and establish and administer the accreditation process. The accreditation process is how a public safety agency voluntarily demonstrates that it meets professionally recognized criteria for excellence in management and service delivery.

"This award of accreditation does not come easy," Brown said. "Agencies implement the necessary es. The process does not stop at that point. By voluntarily seeking CALEA ac- source allocation.

creditation, the agency commits to an ongoing review of adherence to CALEA's standards. Each community with CALEA accredited agencies should feel confident that their public safety organization is going above and beyond and operating under the highest standards in public safety."

Hamilton County's rate of return was 3.95% in 2023 and 0.99% in 2022 compared to 5.30% and 1.48% for the State of Indiana's Investment fund (www. TrustINdiana.in.gov). Matching the state fund would have result-



ed in an additional \$8.7 million in investment income over 2 years.

2. Adopt benchmarks to evaluate investment perfor-

Currently, there is no data on invested funds on the Treasurer's web page. I will post investment returns and investment composition every quarter. 4. Increase adoption rates for E-billing of property

The Treasurer mailed 125,000 paper copies of prop-

erty tax bills in 2023. E-billing has been available for 12 years but I do not believe it has been communicated effectively. I believe we can save over \$50,000 a year by reducing paper statements.

I am a lifelong investor and a fiscal conservative with over 30 years' service to Hamilton County. I am a 1989 graduate of Taylor University.
