

Noblesville considers allowing alcohol drinking in Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area

Noblesville could allow outdoor drinking of alcohol in the downtown area if the City Council on Tuesday passes an ordinance to create a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area.

Known by the acronym DORA, the special area allows people to carry open containers of alcohol inside it. The Noblesville DORA would include the majority of the downtown area east of the White River and, on the other side of the waterway, extend west to the Federal Hill Commons park.

The goal is to increase foot traffic and encourage people to come downtown.


The DORA would operate from noon to 11 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays, and 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. Fridays through Sundays.

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen told News 8 on Friday that the city lobbied Indiana legislators for communities' ability to create the special drinking districts. The governor signed the proposal into law in July, and at least 11 communities so far have adopted ordinances to allow and regulate and regulating **Designated Outdoor** Refreshment Areas.

"We hope that this gives a boost not only to our restaurant and bar scene downtown, but to our retail scene in downtown, which is overall really critically important to our overall economic vibrancy in our city," Jensen said.

People taking to-go drinks will be required to use plastic cups labeled with a Noblesville DORA logo and finish their drinks before entering

another bar or restaurant.

"This is done in a uniform way so they will be in plastic DORA-designated cups," Jensen said. "They can take them into establishments that have signage that allow them to be in there."

Downtown bars are on board; about a dozen have agreed with the city's plan. signed up to be participating locations.

Michael Smith, general manager of **Syd's Fine Food** attractions – car shows, and Spirits, told News 8, "You'll be able to come to al Hill park – and it will be Syd's and you'll be able to grab a pint or a cocktail, walk around the [Hamilton County Courthouse] Square, go to some of the shops that are around here, and kind of keep people in the downtown Noblesville area."

Smith says the Noblesville DORA will be good for and bike patrols downtown,

"People are going to be able to come in with their families, get a drink, come

out to the Square, hang out with their families on the Square instead of in a bar atmosphere," Smith said. "I think it's a really good thing for downtown Noblesville and all the young families coming in.'

The Indiana Alcohol and Tobacco Commission says 11 communities have already set up Designated Outdoor Refreshment Areas: Batesville, Fort Wayne, Greensburg, Huntingburg, Jasper, Jeffersonville, Kirklin, Lawrenceburg, Shelbyville, Winona Lake, and Yorktown.

Wisconsin and Ohio are among other states with DORAs.

Saving sick pups: Humane Society for Hamilton County & Elanco partner for first National Parvo Awareness Day

Each year, more than 330,000 puppies are diagnosed with canine parvovirus (parvo) and as many as 91 percent of those pups will die if left untreated.

Parvo is highly contagious and spreads through contact – at the dog park, at kennels, through food and water bowls, in homes with multiple pets and through the hands and clothing of people who care for infected dogs. The main culprit is infected dog feces.

Yet Elanco research estimates that only 44 percent of dog owners truly know what parvo is.



This Child Abuse Prevention Month, I'm calling for accountability for residential care facility industry

The sobering truth about childhood sexual abuse is that it is likely much more prevalent than we understand it to be and instances of it are incredibly underreported.

Currently, it's that estimated

one in four girls and one in 20 boys experience sexual abuse before turning 18 in the United States. Beyond the immediate horrors of this violation, victims are likely to experience health struggles throughout their life, including substance use disorder, PTSD, major depression, risky sexual behaviors, future additional victimization, and perpetration of sexual violence.

As the nation takes a moment to reflect on the prevalence of child abuse during Child Abuse Prevention Month this April, I want to point to a growing issue that we are only starting to grasp the full extent of: young adult residential care facilities. For example, if it becomes clear throughout the process of investigating child abuse at a residential care facility that DCS wasn't the first point of contact for the employee who discovered this potential abuse, there must be an audit of that facility's employee handbook and follow-up to ensure the handbook is changed. Per state law, being a mandatory reporter means reporting suspicious behavior to the state first – not up the chain of command at your job. In addition, if DCS finds that a facility and its employees do not have a thorough understanding of the specific laws that apply to them surrounding criminality and child sex abuse, onsite training from DCS needs to take place.

These policies will go far toward creating the culture of accountability that the residential care facility industry sorely needs. Facilities that receive state funding to care for kids should be held to the highest of standards.
