Westfield HS uses 'Drunk Busters' goggles to educate on dangers of drunk driving

Over several weeks leading up to prom, Westfield High School (WHS) offered students the opportunity to attend one of several impaired driving dents could choose to take awareness courses.



Women are also born to be wild

Editor's note: This week, Scott Saalman yields his time to his friend C.L. Stambush. We're not certain, but Scott may be out riding high and getting wild.

I'd parked and was walking toward the office when I noticed a



But when I reached for the door handle, he leaned toward me, his brown eyes locking onto my green, and uttered the sweetest words, "Whoa, I thought you'd be a dude."

But I am not a dude – or even a dudette. I am a woman who rides a motorcycle.

And, as I swing my leg off the saddle and slip my helmet from my head, the element of surprise chokes these words from the most macho man, and for a moment, the world becomes a sweet, sweet place.

When a woman slips into the saddle of her own motorcycle, a rush of power comes over her, different than that a man experiences because of the social taboos she is breaking by crossing into a man's world.

Women motorcyclists, however, are not new to the experience of riding; they have been holding bikes between their legs for the past 121 years. It may chagrin some men to learn that women have been riding since the invention of the motorcycle in 1885, although American women did not get the opportunity to straddle the machine until 1901. That was the year E. R. Thomas of Germany began shipping and selling his gasoline-powered bicycles to riders in the United States.

Adams explained to the students that skewed vision is just one small piece of how being impaired affects a person's ability to drive.

"You think walking with these goggles is hard," Adams said to them. "Now imagine what it does if 10 other parts of your body are being impaired at the same time."


Some have criticized the use of goggles like Drunk Busters, saying the kids don't really learn important lessons about the dangers of impaired driv-However, Clary said

With engines snuggled into the bellies of bikes, the urge to race was irresistible – even to women. In October 1910, 18-yearold Clara Wagner rode a four-horsepower motorcycle in a 365-mile endurance race from Chicago to Indianapolis. Battling brutal roads and foul weather, she finished with a perfect score, bettering most men in the race. But alas, the judges refused to acknowledge Wagner's perfect score because she was a woman and gave her trophy to a male rider instead.

While many men do not view women and motorcycles as the perfect pair, this has not stopped women throughout history from striving to change that by achieving greater goals as motorcyclists.

In 1915, Effie Hotchkiss and her mother, Avis, became the first women to ride I love so much. round-trip, coast-to-coast,

gender or race hamper her from breaking barriers. As a young black wife and mother devastated by the deaths of her three children, she turned to riding motorcycles in 1928. "I'd toss a penny landed I'd go," she said.

Fifty years later, stuntwoman Marcia Holly rode a Kawasaki-based streamliner to set a land-speed record of 229.361 MPH, becoming the first woman to break into Bonneville's 200 MPH Club.





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Westfield takes steps to make Monon Trail safer

Westfield city government plans to add a Monon Trail bridge over one street crossing and a tunnel under another to reduce vehicle collisions with pedestrians and bicyclists.

Mayor Scott Willis said the bridge for the trail will go up at 191st Street.

"It's a blind intersection, as you can tell when the trail meets the road, (with) heavy vegetation. It's hard to see as a pedestrian coming up to the area," Willis said Friday.

The Republican mayor says the 191st Street project is in the design phase without a price tag or start date – but the bridge was needed because injuries have happened at the intersection.

In April 2025, 191st Street will be expanded from two to four lanes for motorists from Tomlinson Road to Grand Park Boulevard, the mayor says. A second phase will change the street from two to four lanes from Grand Park Boulevard to Spring Mill Road. Willis estimated the entire road expansion could range from \$15 million to \$20 million.

On another part of the Monon Trail in the Hamilton County city, construction will begin soon on a tunnel under 161st Street. The price tag will be from \$7 million to \$8 million.

The mayor said of 161st Street, "That's probably our most dangerous intersection in the city due to the elevation changes com-

Reader: time for political leaders to get answers on pharmacy benefit managers

Dear Editor

I am writing to bring your attention to the cost of prescription drugs. Without argument, it is clear – they are too high. This is especially true for seniors who often must take more medications than the average American as the risk for chronic health conditions and other diseases increase with age.

Most patients rely on their insurance to shoulder the costs of these prescriptions necessary to maintain their quality of life. However, middlemen called pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) work with insurance companies to develop and administer benefits.

PBMs too often put seniors in a bind by increasing medication costs, creating complex formularies, and implementing tiered pricing to determine what medications they can access and afford, and even limiting the choices of pharmacies they can use.

Optum Rx, one of the nation's largest and fastest growing PBMs, is affiliated with United Health Group (UHG), which will be in the federal spotlight as CEO Andrew Witty testifies before the Senate Finance Committee on May 1. It is my hope that Senator Todd Young will also take this chance to hold UHG and its middlemen accountable and ask how they plan to lower the cost of prescriptions.

The time for PBM reform is now and our leaders can start by demanding answers.



A celebration of Jean's life will be planned for this



1. Maximize return on investments with minimal risk:

Hamilton County's rate of return was 3.95% in 2023 and 0.99% in 2022 compared to 5.30% and 1.48% for the State of Indiana's Investment fund (www. TrustINdiana.in.gov). Matching the state fund would have resulted in an additional \$8.7 million in investment income



over 2 years. 2. Adopt benchmarks to evaluate investment perfor-

Currently, there is no stated benchmark for investment returns. I will adopt the US Treasury three-month Bill ETF (TBIL) and the "Trust Indiana" fund as our benchmarks to properly evaluate performance.

3. Increase transparency in investments:

Currently, there is no data on invested funds on the Treasurer's web page. I will post investment returns and investment composition every quarter.

4. Increase adoption rates for E-billing of property tax statements:

The Treasurer mailed 125,000 paper copies of property tax bills in 2023. E-billing has been available for 12 years but I do not believe it has been communicated effectively. I believe we can save over \$50,000 a year by reducing paper statements.

I am a lifelong investor and a fiscal conservative with over 30 years' service to Hamilton County. I am a 1989 graduate of Taylor University.
