O'Malia's Living introduces novel grill promotion

Trade in your barbecue within seven years for a new unit

The REPORTER

O'Malia's Living, 115 Medical Drive, Carmel, has introduced a barbecue grill trade-in program that is novel and the first of its kind in the retail industry.

Customers can trade in their old grill purchased from O'Malia's for any reason within seven years. This includes damaged or dirty grills.

Unlike other promotions, this is not a limited-time offer. Any grill or barbecue sold as of May 1, 2024, will be eligible for the trade-in offer. While the manufacturer warranty will apply, the trade-in value will go above and beyond. Families will have options that extend beyond what a traditional warranty offers, including grills that are damaged from weather or barbecues that no longer meets the needs of the family.

"We feel the trade in program will be of interest to families who want to start small and upgrade their grill over time," O'Malia's Living Store Manager Brad Renner said.

O'Malia's Living carries a variety of gas, wood, electric, and charcoal grills including Fire Magic, Twin Eagles, American Outdoor Grill, Big Green Egg, and Solaire grills. O'Malia's also carries its own private label line of gas grills called Ambiance.

This announcement corresponds with National Barbecue Month, which runs from May 1 to 31. Any grill sold beginning May 1, 2024, will be eligible for the trade in program. Some rules do apply. The trade-in must have been purchased at O'Malia's during the promotion and the new grill must

be an upgrade. Accessories and labor are not included in the promotion.

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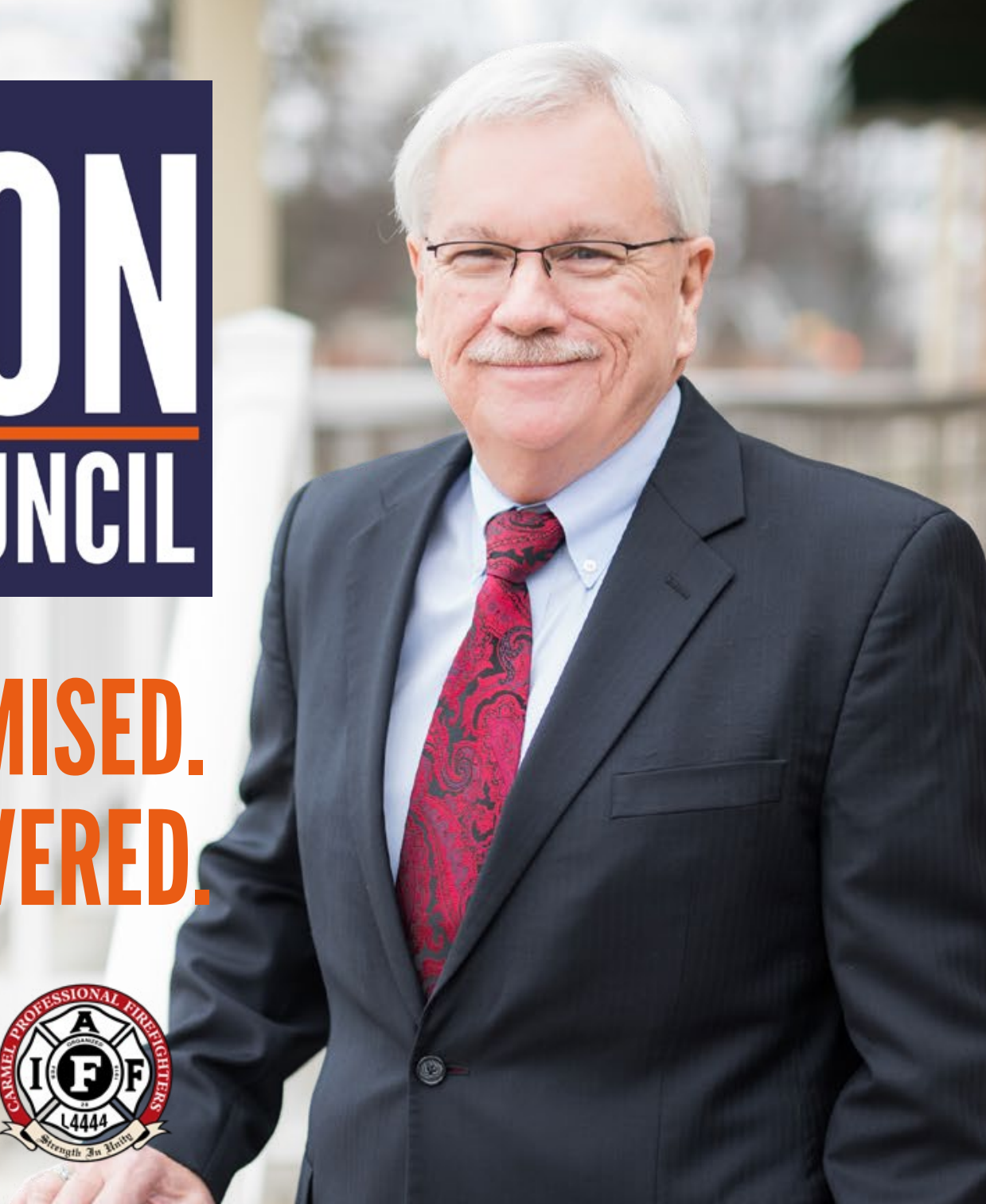

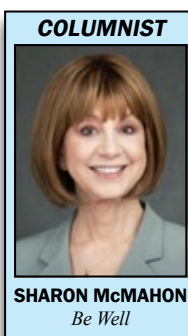
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Supermoms need to care for themselves better than they do

Financial assistance now available for Callery pear removal in Hamilton County

The Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) and Hamilton County Invasives Partnership (HIP) have announced the launch of a new Callery Pear Removal Cost Share Program, aimed at assisting homeowners in the removal of landscape Callery pear trees from their properties.

This initiative is a part of ongoing efforts to combat the spread of invasive species and promote the health and biodiversity of local ecosystems.

The Callery pear tree, with varieties commonly known as the Bradford, Aristocrat, Cleveland, and others, has become a significant environmental concern due to its ability

to escape cultivation and spread rapidly along tree lines, roadsides, and through woodlands. In response to this issue, SWCD is offering a cost-sharing program to incentivize homeowners to remove these trees from their landscapes. Under the program, homeowners can receive reimbursement for half of the cost of removing landscape Callery pear trees from their property, up to a maximum of \$400. This financial assistance aims to alleviate the financial burden associated with tree removal while encouraging proactive steps towards environmental stewardship. Additionally, three local tree companies are partnering with the SWCD

to offer discounted rates on Callery pear removal. By utilizing the services of Nature's Canopy, Climbing High Tree Service, or Engledow Tree Experts, participants can stretch their grant dollars even further. To participate in the program, homeowners must apply prior to having trees removed. Reimbursements will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis, subject to available funding. This program can be used in conjunction

with the district's Native for Invasive Trade In Program which makes free native trees and shrubs available after the removal of invasive species. SWCD is also offering financial assistance for larger scale invasive species removal and restoration projects. Funding is made available through a Clean Water Indiana grant. 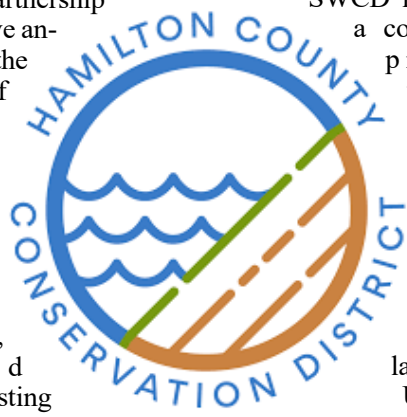

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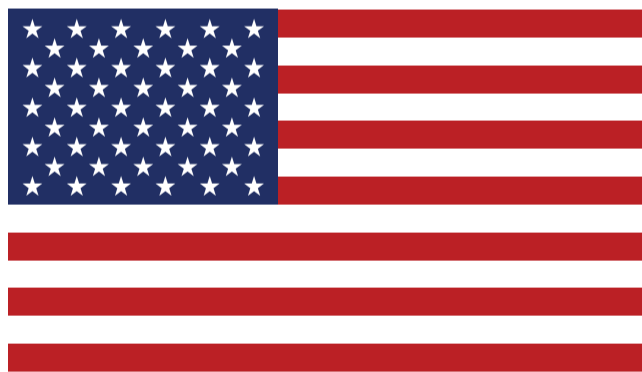
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Indiana State Police K9 Maverick retires

Indiana State Police K9 Maverick has officially retired. He has faithfully served for more than eight years, working with his partner Sergeant Susan Rinschler.

Maverick, a nine-and-one-half-year-old Shepard/Malinois mix, was selected as a dual-purpose K9 for the Indianapolis District in 2016.

K9 Maverick impacted the community during demonstrations, which resulted in multiple request appearances in schools and other agencies' community events. He was able to show off his skills while educating the community on how K9s keep commu-

nities safe.

His service was used trusted by other districts, local and federal agencies on numerous occasions. He was regularly deployed with the Indiana State Police SWAT team assisting with building searches. The U.S. Marshals Service regularly requested him to assist with the apprehension of violent felons. He assisted the United States Postal Service in seizing several hundred pounds of illegal narcotics along with hundreds of thousands of dollars in drug money. The Indianapolis Postal Inspectors made Maverick an honorary member and presented him with a patch.

K9 Maverick assisted

the Fishers Police Department when officers started a drug interdiction program. He is responsible for their team's first significant money seizure. Later in his career, K9 Maverick worked closely with members of the IMPD Violent Crime Reduction Team. He assisted in locating narcotics, and evidence and was involved in many vehicle pursuits and high-risk traffic stops.

K9 Maverick also assisted the FBI, DEA, and the ATF countless times when they had an investigation in District 52. He had deployments in all seven counties of District 52 and other counties across the state. He is responsible for over a thousand pounds of

illegal narcotics, over \$2 million in seized currency, hundreds of drug arrests, finding multiple suspects located after pursuits, and locating key evidence.

On one occasion, K9 Maverick assisted a suicidal individual after they requested that Maverick sit with them, which helped to encourage them to go to the hospital.

K9 Maverick has had an amazing career and has protected his partner, other officers, and citizens for many years, and even got a pat on the head from former Vice President Mike Pence.

Maverick will now enjoy his retirement as a family pet with Sergeant Rinschler.

AG Todd Rokita & State Rep. Mike Speedy announce advisory opinion clarifying that no laws require use of preferred pronouns

After State Rep. Mike Speedy raised the issue, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita this week produced an advisory opinion clarifying that neither state nor federal law requires a coworker to use the preferred pronouns and names of fellow employees.

An employer therefore is likely not liable in cases where staff members choose not to use new

names and pronouns that are gender-nonconforming, the opinion states – provided that a reasonable person would not find the work environment to be objectively hostile.

“Hoosier businesses should not be burdened with policing employees’ words to make sure their attitudes align with the latest, wokest fads,” State Rep. Speedy said. “They face enough needless government regu-

lations without being on the hook for enforcing politically correct views of transgenderism.”

No federal court, AG Rokita said, has found occasional use of non-preferred pronouns alone, even if intentional, to be actionable discrimination or create a hostile work environment.

“Most Hoosiers agree that we all should extend love and compassion toward individuals beset with gender dysphoria,” Rokita said. “Treating these individuals with respect, however, does not require us to deny basic truths, as we see them.”

Rokita added that “the

times call for common sense.”

“We must oppose the radical agendas of extremists,” Rokita said, “who would force us all to march in lockstep with the transanity that dominates so many facets of society, from Hollywood to corporate boardrooms.”

The advisory opinion notes that courts have left unsettled the question of how a pattern of pronoun

usage in referring to another person might create a hostile working environment that potentially could give rise to an action under Title VII – which is part of the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 that prohibits employment discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex and national origin.

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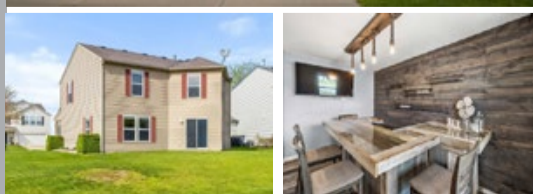
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Hamilton Heights' Lily Roush signs to play softball for IU Indianapolis

1. Maximize return on investments with minimal risk:

Hamilton County's rate of return was 3.95% in 2023 and 0.99% in 2022 compared to 5.30% and 1.48% for the State of Indiana's Investment fund (www.TrustIndiana.in.gov). Matching the state fund would have resulted in an additional \$8.7 million in investment income over 2 years.

2. Adopt benchmarks to evaluate investment performance:

Currently, there is no stated benchmark for investment returns. I will adopt the US Treasury three-month Bill ETF (TBIL) and the "Trust Indiana" fund as our benchmarks to properly evaluate performance.

3. Increase transparency in investments:

Currently, there is no data on invested funds on the Treasurer's web page. I will post investment returns and investment composition every quarter.

4. Increase adoption rates for E-billing of property tax statements:

The Treasurer mailed 125,000 paper copies of property tax bills in 2023. E-billing has been available for 12 years but I do not believe it has been communicated effectively. I believe we can save over \$50,000 a year by reducing paper statements.

I am a lifelong investor and a fiscal conservative with over 30 years' service to Hamilton County. I am a 1989 graduate of Taylor University.
