Unlike other promotions, this is not a limited-time offer. Any grill or barbecue sold as of May 1, 2024, will be eligible for the trade-in offer. While the manufacturer warranty will apply, the trade-in value will go above and beyond. Families will have options that extend beyond what a traditional warranty offers, including grills that are damaged from weather or barbecues that no longer meets the needs of the family.

'We feel the trade in program will be of interest to families who want to start small and upgrade their grill over time," O'Malia's Living Store Manager Brad Renner said.

O'Malia's Living carries a variety of gas, wood, electric, and charcoal grills including Fire Magic, Twin Eagles, American Outdoor Grill, Big Green Egg, and Solaire grills. O'Malia's also carries its own private label line of gas grills called Ambiance.

This announcement corresponds with National Barbecue Month, which runs from May 1 to 31. Any grill sold beginning May 1, 2024, will be eligible for the trade in program. Some rules do apply. The tradein must have been purchased at O'Malia's during the promotion and the new grill must

This continues a growth pattern for O'Malia's Living as the company were honored in 2023 with the Apollo Award for the Midwest by the International Casual Furnishings Association.



Noblesville Creates HATCH Fest (formerly the Maker Faire), presented by Duke Energy, will be held on Saturday, June 15 from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., including a Juneteenth Celebration and the time-honored St. Michael's Strawberry Festival.

HATCH - which stands for Hamilton County Arts, Technology, Craft, and Heritage-is a multi-faceted festival showcasing the works of talented local artisans and makers on the downtown Noblesville Courthouse Square.

Talented artisans, makers, and craftspeople from Noblesville and the surrounding areas will showcase their one-of-a-kind creations, offering a unique selection of handcrafted items for sale for festival goers. Alongside the shopping, there will be engaging demonstrations, performances, and activities hosted by local cultural groups, nonprofits, and businesses around the Courthouse Square.

"HATCH Fest was originally designed to provide emerging artists and established artists with a high-quality opportunity to sell their artwork," Noblesville Creates Executive Director Aili McGill said. "However, the event has grown to include artists of all skills and experience levels, with a strong encouragement for first-time vendors to apply."

2. Adopt benchmarks to evaluate investment performance:

Currently, there is no stated benchmark for investment returns. I will adopt the US Treasury three-month Bill ETF (TBIL) and the "Trust Indiana" fund as our benchmarks to properly evaluate performance.

3. Increase transparency in investments:

Currently, there is no data on invested funds on the Treasurer's web page. I will post investment returns and investment composition every quarter.

4. Increase adoption rates for E-billing of property tax statements:

The Treasurer mailed 125,000 paper copies of property tax bills in 2023. E-billing has been available for 12 years but I do not believe it has been communicated effectively. I believe we can save over \$50,000 a year by reducing paper statements.

I am a lifelong investor and a fiscal conservative with over 30 years' service to Hamilton County. I am a 1989 graduate of Taylor University.
