

The brief history of his Standing-O

I experienced my first-ever STANDING OVATION – finally!

This, after hosting, and performing in, an estimated 160 musical-comedy benefit shows from 2011 to 2024, first "Will Read and Sing for Food," then its spinoff, "Wait ... What?'

Yes – a Standing-O.

Thirteen years in the making!

Not the obligatory Sitting-O, for which I've been conditioned. I've experienced plenty of applause from audiences who stayed seated. Deserved or not, it provided sustenance for my withering ego, an audible fix for me, a pathetic affirmation junkie.

To applaud one's performance is Audience Etiquette 101, stretching to ancient times. It likely occurred in the Bible when Jesus pulled off his much-touted "great haul of fishes" miracle – as noted in the Book of Zebco. It is assumed that the fishermen applauded this net-stretching miracle ... well, maybe, at first there was an awkward silence that caused Jesus to realize he needed to desperately end his act on a more dramatic note, thus resorting to a showman's flourish of simultaneously snapping his fingers, swiveling his left forearm vertically, opening his left palm heavenward, and exclaiming, "Ta-da!" After that, I bet everyone clapped ... well, except maybe for that one fuddy-duddy fisherman of the bunch who complained: "Wouldn't you think the Son of God could've at least cleaned the fish while he was at it? Jeez, must we always do everything? Fish! That's what he gives us? We are seaside! What's so miraculous about fish? Pizza would've added a nice flair. Slices from John's of Bleeker Street. Now that would've been a miracle."

CBS News Sunday Morning recently aired a segment about the history of applause. Jane Pauley, show host and a great Hoosier, reported that claps were all the rage in early French theatre. In fact, actors were hired just to sit in the audience and applaud the much more accomplished A-list actors actually on stage. They also laughed on cue - or cried - whatever the role required! That they were paid to applaud isn't a real surprise considering ... well ... they were having to painfully endure French theatre. Without staged, compensated applause, all that likely would've been heard at a performance's end would be the French chirps of crickets.

Centuries later, this French practice, originally known as "Les acteurs applaudissent les acteurs," was renamed "Hollywood



of Suicide in Service Members, Veterans, and their Families and Caregivers has been a collaborative effort since late 2021 to reduce the number of veteran suicides in Hamilton County. Under the umbrella and leadership of A Healthier Hamilton County: Systems of Care, anyone is welcome to join the Coalition who is interested in preventing suicide. Members include veteran-serving organizations, non-profits, local government, and other entities throughout the county including volunteers and veterans and service mem-

bers themselves. The coalition has teamed up with the Indiana Department of Veterans Affairs (IDVA) and will be launching the Governor's Challenge to fight suicide in Veterans here in Hamilton County. We are working collaboratively to leverage all resources for our service members, veterans, and their families to bring meaning and value to their lives. We plan to do this through three the Pillars of the Governor's Challenge – 1. Identifying the service members, veterans, and their families and caregivers, 2. connecting them to resources no matter the level of need, and 3. promoting safety for those in a suicidal crisis.

How will we do all this? We need everyone's help!

The Ask The Question Initiative is part of the Governor's Challenge and has become part of our Plan in Hamilton County. Five local entities have partially launched our Pilot Group and we plan to close that gap soon. We will then promote the initiative to the community, asking that any person-serving organization go through the Ask The Question Initiative process.

The key to Ask The Question is changing how we identify Service Members, Veterans, and their Families and Caregivers in our county. We encourage and will help organizations change their current identification question to the more inclusive "Have you or a family member ever served in the US Military?". If the answer to that broader question is yes, the person will be provided with a QR code that will start the process of linking them to resources.

There are a myriad of resources available for those who are serving, have served, or are related to or caring for someone who was/is in the US Military. Homeowners will be notified via door hangers prior to any curb reconstruction near their home. After ADA ramp and curb reconstruction is completed, those areas will be restored with topsoil and seed. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to water the seed for the seed to germinate. Prior to road resurfacing, residents will be notified via street signage for street parking restrictions.





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

Jacquin Gallagher and her son Andrew Herran will be traveling to Birmingham, Ala. next week for one of the more meaningful sports competitions in the country.

opening ceremonies.


"In the past, it's a very emotional one where they recognize all the donors that gave their life for that person's life to continue, and then also the living donors," said Gallagher.





In 2006, he was promoted to the Cup Series to drive the No. 1 car for Dale Earnhardt Inc. Unfortunately, DEI was in decline, and four years.

Truex, Jr. moved from MWR. He picked up his second career win at Sonoma in 2014. However, the 2014 season and his tenure with MWR was tarnished by the 2014 Fall Richmond race in which his MWR teammate, Clint Bowyer, intentional spun to ensure Truex would make the playoffs. The incident led to the departure of Truex from MWR.

In 2014, Truex joined Furniture Row Racing in the No. 78 car, a move that changed Truex's career and began an unprecedented run for the single car team. From 2014 through 2018, Truex won 16 races and the 2017 NASCAR Cup Series Championship. It was almost unheard of for a single car team like Furni-Truex dominated the Cup Series during those years.

After Furniture Row closed its doors at the end of the 2018 season, Truex moved to Joe Gibbs Racing and the No. 19 car. His success continued with additional two Championship 4

appearances and fifteen additional wins.

Study: economic impact of 2024 NBA All-Star Game tops \$400M

Local leaders who tout sports as a boon for Indianapolis have a new batch of numbers to bolster their case.

Pacers Sports & Entertainment is sharing the results of a study done with Temple University, looking at the economic impact of the 2024 NBA All-Star game and surrounding events.

The highlights:

• \$403 million in estimated economic value across Indianapolis: \$290.7 million total economic impact and \$112.6 million in estimated earned media value

• 81,000 people from 44 states and 55 countries attended the game or various other events

supported, or expanded

The numbers represent a delayed payoff for the city. Indianapolis was initially slated to host the 2021 game, but the COVID-19 pandemic forced a wait of three extra years. Comments from the organizers indicate it was all worth the wait.

Rick Fuson, chair of the NBA All-Star 2024 Host Committee, is quoted as saying, "The results speak for themselves, and we are so proud of the way our city turned out to make this such a special and successful event."

The study also gauges the All-Star weekend's lasting impacts on central Indiana's charitable efforts, with grants aimed at helping 24 cities en time and again that when and towns in the state through grants.
