# INDOT: State Road 32/38 to reopen in early August

Underground fuel tanks in downtown Noblesville deemed safe

Indiana transportation officials on Wednesday said the discovery of underground fuel tanks along State Road 32/38 on the downtown Courthouse Square put a road reconstruction project about a week behind schedule.

Work was paused earlier this month while inspectors checked tanks that were once used to heat buildings in downtown Noblesville. Officials said work resumed on Wednesday after inspectors concluded the tanks were safe. One will be removed while the rest will be filled.

The delay means another week of significantly depressed foot traffic at Kari Clouse's boutique shop. She said the Indiana Department of Transportation and city construction projects have taken up space outside her store for the past three months. She said she estimates her foot traffic is about 10 percent of what it normally is.



A few weeks went by, and I hadn't heard anything. I started to become concerned, so my parents suggested I call the department.





Legally [ Blonde originated as a 2001 novel by Amanda Brown, based on Ms. Brown's experiences as a law student at Stanford University. Miraculously, a film version also came out in 2001,





# Remembering Steffanie Pickett, Hamilton County dispatcher killed in motorcycle crash

The Hamilton County Public Safety Communications team suffered a significant loss in June when a dispatcher was killed in a motorcycle crash shortly after leaving a training ses-

Steffanie Pickett was only 31 years old when she died in the crash on June 12. Her colleagues say she had her entire life ahead of her and was dedicating it to helping others each day as a 911 dispatcher.

Michael Hubbs, the director of Hamilton County Public Safety Communications and Pickett's boss, says taking these calls is extremely stressful but Steffanie, or Steff, was drawn to the career to make a difference.

"Steff should be remembered as a homegrown young lady from Hamilton County, who was born and raised here, went to school here, has true roots in the community of Hamilton

she served her county. She served with honor.'

She was the passenger on a motorcycle her fiancé was driving on June 12. Pickett was killed when an SUV turned into oncoming traffic on Cumberland Road. Her fiancé survived but was taken to the hospital in critical condition.

"It was very hard for the dispatchers working because they had to handle the incident. They had to take the call and they had to dispatch," Hubbs said. "The dispatchers were very quick to realize Steffanie was the victim in the fatal accident."

Pickett was a rising star in the dispatch center, having earned a "Life Saving Award" after working there for just under five years.

"In this particular incident, Steff answered a 911 call and helped a citizen administer CPR," Hubbs said. "It was a cardiac arrest."

Hubbs says everyone is still mourning this loss.

"There was a bond,



naturally, by being in the same profession, and Steff was no exception. She had amazing friends in there," Hubbs said.

"They're still grieving today and we're moving through with it because that's what they are, they're tough and Steff was tough. And there's one thing we all agree on here in the de-

partment. Steff didn't want us to stop."

The crash is still under review by law enforcement. This story was origi-



"Our office will continue to pressure companies like Change Healthcare to hold Hoosiers' data privacy at the highest standards – and know that we will hold all health care operators accountable for any and all breaches," Rokita said.

### U.S. Senate passes bipartisan Braun/Ossoff bill to improve federal prisons through independent oversight

The Federal Prison Oversight Act, a bipartisan bill to strengthen federal prison

oversight by Senator Mike Braun (R-Ind.), Senator Jon Ossoff (D-Ga.), and Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Dick Durbin (D-Ill.), has passed the U.S. Senate and now heads to the President's desk to become law.

The bipartisan Federal Prison Oversight Act will require the Department of Justice's Inspector General (IG) to conduct comprehensive, risk-based inspections of the Bureau of Prisons' (BOP) 122 correctional facilities, provide recommendations to fix problems, and assign each facility a risk score, with higher-risk facilities required to be inspected more often. The IG must also report its findings and recommendations to Congress and the public, and the BOP must respond to all inspection

corrective action plan. The bipartisan bill will establish an independent Ombudsman to investigate the health, safety, welfare, and rights of prisoners and staff.


"More transparency and accountability will create a safer environment for correctional officers and staff who work in our federal prisons as well as the inmates incarcerated them," Sen. Braun said. "This bill

does not allow the Department of Justice to intervene into the affairs of state and local jails, and will help to improve working conditions and keep our federal corrections officers safe."

The bipartisan bill is co-sponsored by Senators Joe Manchin (I-W.V.), Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.V.); and Tim Kaine (D-Va.). Congresswoman Lucy McBath (D-Ga.-07) and Congressman Kelly Armstrong (R-N.D.-At Large) introduced and led the companion bipartisan bill in the House, which has nearly 40 co-sponsors.

The Federal Prison Oversight Act passed the U.S. House last month.




