## When a T-shirt is not just a T-shirt

I start my loops around the airport. Walking in various public spaces wearing a "Kamala Harris for President 2024" T-shirt has become my favorite form of casual election canvassing.

I am a white woman of a certain age who doesn't often sport a T-shirt and jeans, but today I feel like a rock star. Young people who might otherwise have ignored me nod and say, "Nice shirt!" Some reach out for a fist bump. A few want to stop and chat.

A middle-aged man shakes his head as I walk past. That's OK. I've grown accustomed to occasional dismissals, concerned looks and grimaces while wearing my T-shirt in the wild, especially in states where many voters choose the opposite

My one-person parade is an effort to both state my personal views for public consumption and to gage the zeitgeist in these fraught political times. It's a new approach for someone who has long held her tongue in her home state, Mississippi, which is overwhelmingly red - something that I am not.

One old guy sitting on an electric scooter at a local Walmart actually booed me after he noticed my T-shirt.

My views are legible on my chest for all the world to see. Those views do not, however, represent a chip on my shoulder.

The elderly man's opinion is actually audible and seems to originate from a dark space that I do not particularly want to visit. Yet, here we are. I try not to take it personally. As it turns out, he is not down with talking. A childish boo is all he's willing to muster.

I am a big believer in political debate. We all see the world differently. That is one reason I'm wearing my T-shirt – to prompt conversations.

For the past four years I've been surrounded by neighbors with decidedly different political views who tend to vehemently decry the current administration (which, big surprise, I support). They tend to respond angrily to differing political views. It has occurred to me that it must be tiring to be so angry all the time.

But now, I feel a sense of hope, and after holding my tongue for years, I want to engage. I want to live in a country where we look after each other, where we talk things through, where we don't boo each other at

For a while, I was angry, too. I even bought a T-shirt that belittled the chosen symbols of the opposing side by explicitly stating: "Your Trump flag is stupid." But I never wore that shirt because: why be mean? It's also not the best way to start a conversation.

Wearing a political T-shirt in the current environment can be an act of courage. How strange is that? Some people may enjoy actively hating as a pastime, as a form of entertainment, but all that hating wears a body down.



Obviously, not everyone feels as we do. That boo from the elderly man on the Walmart scooter drives the point home. But it is reassuring, in the moment, to know that we live in a country where we can agree to disagree, in public, even if it leads to occasionally awkward interactions. 



## Beware large 401(k) withdrawals' impact on Medicare prices

Many people retire and are not sure what to do with the money in their 401(k) from their former Do employer. not withdraw all the money out of your 401(k) just because you can. There is no tax



PENALTY for withdrawing after age 59 ½, but if you are age 63 and take a large amount of money out and just sit it in your savings account, you might have made a big mistake as far as Medicare is concerned.

Why would Medicare care about your 401(k)? Most people don't realize that the cost you pay for Medicare Parts B and D are based on your income (not assets). The rich pay more for Medicare. You may not be rich, but your 401(k) and regular IRA withdrawals become taxable income, and you may look rich to Medicare. If you take out too much tax-deferred money, it can cause your Medicare monthly premiums to go up. This is called IRMAA (income related monthly adjustment amount). I call it the "rich tax."

What does Medicare consider to be "rich"?

Medicare will not look at your savings account or stock portfolio. This is not an asset test. The Medicare IRMAA is based on your modified adjusted gross income from two years prior. If you are turning 65 this year, look at your 2022 tax returns. If you earned over \$103,000 as a single person or \$206,000 as a couple, then you'll pay the IRMAA surcharge for one year. You only have to be over the limit by \$1 to trigger this surcharge.

There are currently five IRMAA brackets which I have listed on our website, The Medicare Family.com. It's a moving target since the government adjusts these amounts annually. and retirement.

For people retiring in 2025, we don't know what the exact dollar amounts are until November 2024. You could pay a little extra each month (\$80) or you could pay almost \$500 ex-

tra per month depending on which bracket you fall into.

Educate yourself on Medicare IRMAA if you are within two years of starting Medicare because there are other things that can trigger it that you may be able to avoid with some planning, such as selling a property. Those profits often cause IRMAA. If you can, plan to sell that property at age 62 instead of age 63. Capital gains from the sale at 62 won't impact you since Medicare doesn't begin till age 65. When you take withdrawals out of your 401(k) and IRA, stay below the expected IRMAA limits in the future.

Medicare IRMAA does not only impact you when you turn 65.


It can impact you every year that you are enrolled into Medicare. Age 65 is just the first age people find out about this extra cost. Every year that you are on Medicare, they will cross reference with the IRS to see your Modified Adjusted Gross income from two years prior, and if you are over the limit, they charge you more each month for

This is not a permanent increase. If you sold a house and it caused you to pay more for Medicare, it's only for one year.

## Preparing for the future: the new Indiana diploma

In its Aug. 19, 2024, edition, The Reporter published an article on Westfield teachers expressing concerns over the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) proposed diploma requirements.




rigorous standards for all." The IDOE is looking to be the first in the states to redesign diplomas. On its website, IDOE claims to change the current high school diploma in order "to better prepare our students for the future." The first draft proposal received backlash during the listening sessions held around the state. Currently, the IDOE has a second draft proposal and is again holding listening sessions. To their credit, the IDOE reworked their draft proposal to cut out a second diploma and replace it with what they are referring to as "Honors Seals" and "Honors Plus Seals."

One of the priorities for the new diploma is that the course requirements "prepare every student for success regardless of their post-high school plans." I believe that as the draft proposal stands currently, the students will be prepared to pursue a post-secondary education or a trade after graduation. But, will this second draft proposal really prepare our students for the 21st-century future?

Here are three trends that should be taken into consideration when finalizing the proposed diploma:

1. Historically, 18- to 24-year-olds tend to change jobs and careers most frequently with an average of 5.7



3. The Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) conducts a two-hour test every three years to test the critical thinking of 15-year-olds in math, science, and reading in over 65 countries. Test questions don't gauge memorization of facts but demand that students draw on real-world problem-solving skills and knowledge. The last test was conducted in 2022 with around 6,300 students participating. The United States ranked 18th in overall score, unchanged from the previous test.

United States hav- the students are not mandated to take economics or world history. Although the honors seals require a demonstration of communication, collaboration, and work ethic, it does not mention the essential skill of critical thinking. I agree with Dawn Knight, WHS English teacher, who stated, "I think we are doing our kids a disservice if we aren't giving them the global education they need."

We all want our graduating students to be well-prepared for their future. I just believe that it should go beyond the first job or career. In addition, our graduating students should be prepared to compete with graduates from other states. If Indiana leaders are proposing a vision for the future, that vision should include changes that will put our students on par with other developed countries.

2. Despite the in social studies, meaning Education to adopt the new high school diploma rule by Dec. 31, 2024. Final requirements become effective for all students beginning with the class of 2029, or students currently in eighth grade.

> As with most things, the devil is in the details. The new diploma requirements are the 36,000-foot view. The IDOE will set the standards for each course and then the school districts will develop curricula for each course. Educators and parents need to be vigilant to ensure that the goals of the new diploma are achieved.







#### TODAY'S BIBLE READING

THE PASSOVER AND THE FESTIVAL OF UNLEAVENED BREAD

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in Egypt, "This month is to be for you the first month, the first month of your year. Tell the whole community of Israel that on the tenth day of this month each man is to take a lamb for his family, one for each household. If any household is too small for a whole lamb, they must share one with their nearest neighbor, having taken into account the number of people there are. You are to determine the amount of lamb needed in accordance with what each person will eat. The animals you choose must be year-old males without defect, and you may take them from the sheep or the goats. Take care of them until the fourteenth day of the month, when all the members of the community of Israel must slaughter them at twilight. Then they are to take some of the blood and put it on the sides and tops of the doorframes of the houses where they eat the lambs. That same night they are to eat the meat roasted over the fire, along with bitter herbs, and bread made without yeast. Do not eat the meat raw or boiled in water, but roast it over a fire—with the head, legs and internal organs. Do not leave any of it till morning; if some is left till morning, you must burn it. This is how you are to eat it: with your cloak tucked into your belt, your sandals on your feet and your staff in your hand. Eat it in haste; it is the Lord's Passover.

Home of the Tifosi, the enthusiastic Italian supporters of Ferrari, the Italian Grand Prix is a Formula 1 crown jewel event that is hosted at one of the world's greatest motorsports circuits, Autodromo Nazionale Monza. Monza is often referred to as the temple of speed for its simple design and multiple long straightaways.

As its name suggests, the Italian Grand Prix is all about speed. Cars will be trimmed out with minimum downforce in hopes of maximizing top-end speed. Monza has produced surprise winners in recent years. including Pierre Gasly in 2020 and Daniel Riccardo in 2021. With the recent dominance of McLaren and drop in performance by Red Bull, the Italian Grand Prix could be quite a nail-bitter.

#### 3. INDYCAR hleheader at Milwaukee Mile

For the first time in nine years, INDYCAR returns to one of the oldest racetracks in the United States, the Milwaukee Mile, for not one, but two races. In what is shaping up to be an epic championship battle, the Milwaukee Mile will host the last two of three races on the INDYCAR calendar (all ovals).

Alex Palou has a size-

able points lead but Will Power is charging. Power and his Team Penske teammates have dominant on ovals this year. Penske drivers have won all four oval races this year with Power

winning Race 1 at Iowa. Power will likely need to win at least one of the races this weekend at Milwaukee to keep his championship hopes alive.

Given Penske's ability on ovals, I'd say he has a great shot. The bigger question will be Palou's response to Power and Penske. Palou has never won on an oval. Does it happen this weekend?

#### 4. Southern 500 at **Darlington**

Finally, the biggest racing event of the weekend: the Southern 500. A NA-SCAR tradition that began on Labor Day Weekend 54 years ago. The Southern 500 is a NASCAR crown jewel perhaps second only behind the Daytona 500. Not only is it the Southern 500 but it is the final race of the regular season. This will be the last chance for drivers to lock themselves into the NASCAR Cup Series playoffs.

Currently, Bubba Wallace and Ross Chastain sit below the points cutline. They will need excellent points days and for Chris Buescher to have a bad day if they expect to lock themselves in the playoffs on points. However, they should not count on that. Buescher almost won the Spring Race in Darlington before colliding with Tyler Reddick for the race lead with only a handful of laps to go. For Wallace or Chastain to make the playoffs, they will likely need a win.

But there are other drivrs still looking for their first win of 2024. None bigger than Kyle Busch, who is currently out of the playoffs and winless for the first time in 20 years. Expect ole Rowdy Busch to be up on the wheel and at the front.

Who will claim the final playoff spot? Hopefully we'll know by Monday.
