





Reader calls on voters to choose representatives who value all workers

Is your retirement secure? Overreach by the federal government decimated the retirement plans of over 20,000 employees nationwide.

When General Motors filed for bankruptcy in 2009, the United Auto Workers were protected by contract that any loss of benefits was a 'strikable' violation. In 2009, the overall economy was on a slippery slope, and a nationwide GM strike could have resulted in a United States economic depression. An ad hoc federal government Auto Task Team was formed to oversee the bankruptcy. The result: the UAW kept 100 percent of their pensions and full health care. However, the Delphi salaried, non-union employees lost 100 percent of their health care, 100 percent of their life insurance, and as much as 70 percent of their pensions. For the nation, this impacts more than 20,000, and for Indiana over 4,000 retirees, plus their families.

In 1974, the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) was signed into law to protect retirees; however, the calculation of the fair market value of the salaried pension funds was not followed. Additionally, the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC), a United States federally-chartered corporation, in 2023 revised the method to calculate the pension assets but will not recalculate the Delphi Salaried Pension assets. When following the correct methods, the Delphi Salaried Pension Plan was completely funded.

Since 2009, the Delphi Salaried have been fighting to get their retirements restored. There is legislation named after Susan Muffley to restore pensions. Her husband, David, worked at Delphi as an electronics technician for 31 years, but lost the full value of his pension in 2009. Despite health problems, Susan avoided seeing her doctor given her family's financial constraints due to losing their pension. She was ultimately diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and passed away on Aug. 9, 2012.

This is NOT a bailout of any sort. It is instead a Congressional act to restore pensions that were wrongfully removed by the federal government in the "heat of the moment" to prevent a national shutdown.

I want to give an expression of sincere gratitude to our current senators Mike Braun and Todd Young for actively showing support for the bipartisan Susan Muffley Act. Congressman Jim Banks - currently running for the Senate as a Republican – has not shown any support for the Susan Muffley Act. This is currently on hold in the House Committee on Education and the Workforce, of which Banks is a member.

From the House side, there is active support from Victoria Spartz (Co-Sponsor and Champion), Jim Baird (Co-Sponsor), Frank Mrvan (Co-Sponsor), Erin Houchin, and Rudy Yakym. The remaining Representatives are non-committal including Jim Banks, Greg Pence, Andre Carson, and Larry Buchon. There are other bipartisan Senators and House Representatives around the nation that are supportive of the Susan Muf-

For those of you that are not Delphi Retirees, ask yourself: could something like this happen to my health care, my life insurance, my matching 401 funds, other pension funds or benefits?

When voting, vote for the people who value fairness for all workers.

Respecting those in need

Over the twoplus decades of doing food charity work, we have had the opportunity to meet many neighbors in need. Generally, as a rule, when we meet someone at a pantry, we give them space

and let people go about their business. We do not engage with them unless they initiate a conversation. Those who engage with a volunteer are usually thankful, many are sad, and a few are angry over the circumstances that have them shopping for a meal at the pantry.

Regardless of how the neighbor is feeling, our response is the same: empathy, listen, and show respect.

Many of our neighbors who shop from a Feeding Team pantry are not used to taking help from someone else. They are hesitant and cautious; the last thing that they need to experience is disrespect, shame, or embarrassment.

This month, I received a troubling social media message from a neighbor asking me to call her to talk about her recent pantry experience. When we spoke on the phone, this young lady told me her story.

She was shopping at an area pantry on behalf of an unemployed friend with no transportation. As she was taking items to her SUV



she said as she took out her phone and began filming. I'll spare everyone the next several minutes where the interaction reverted to what can best be described as a fifth-grade playground "nanny nanny boo boo" and tattling session.

We absolutely appreciate each person who contributes to, sorts, cleans, supports, and pays attention to the pantries. Yes, it is disappointing when people take more than they should, and yes, it happens more than we would like. However, disrespecting those in need – or, in this case, a neighbor shopping to help someone else – doesn't represent what Feeding Team stands for. The right answer never includes disrespect. Most shoppers respect the model and just take what they need.

Feeding Team has always been aware that our model for feeding hungry neighbors is susceptible to abuse. We take the position that when that happens it's between them and God. If we interact with neigh-

another woman bors in these situations, our response is always to respectfully ask them to keep their selections to six items and refer the shopper to food pantries that are better equipped to accommodate larger needs. Hunger in our county is real; respect in serving those in need is our approach, every time!

People are not entitled to receive the Feeding Team's help; we give it freely to the best of our ability. Further, we encourage as much grace as possible as a response to situations. That is the takeaway, and that is the lesson from this month's situation.

Feeding Team provides a way and a place for those in need to get food for their family. While each pantry really is just a big wooden yellow box, it means so much more for donors and for families in need. You are welcome to join us as together we fight to eliminate hunger in our area cities. With over 40,000

food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County, FeedingTeam.org is a registered not-for-profit 501(c)(3)organization that provides outdoor 24/7/365 no-questions-asked free food pantries throughout the county.

The pantries exist to meet the food insecurity needs of gap families, neighbors who may not qualify for public assistance and could use a few meals before payday.






Fred Thomas "Tom" Benefiel October 11, 1926 – August 30, 2024


