# Westfield Lions back to fryin' Imperfect homes Event raises \$3,000 for Westfield High School scholarships

After not holding a fish fry in 2023, the Westfield Lions Club brought back its annual fish fry on Sept. 6 and 7 at Christ United Methodist Church (CUMC) – making this the 92nd fish fry since the club was founded in 1930. COVID caused the Club to miss one fish fry and renovation work at the Lions' clubhouse and at CUMC forced them to cancel the 2023 event.



Through a partnership with the Westfield Police Department, Westfield Washington Schools has six School Resource Officers (SROs) within the district. Their locations are strategically distributed to ensure comprehensive coverage and quick response:

• Two SROs cover our six elementary schools, and the Early Learning Center (ELC).

• One SRO is assigned to Westfield Intermediate School (WIS).

• One SRO is stationed at Westfield Middle School (WMS).

• Two SROs are dedicated to Westfield High School (WHS).

Every school in the school district is designated as a police substation. This

means that officers are encouraged to use these spaces to write reports and spend time walking through the buildings, further strengthening the security and presence in the schools. From August 2023 to February 2024, WPD had almost 3,000 school visits and 300 substation visits. That totaled almost 1,000 hours of time police officers spent inside the schools in addition to the six SROs activity and time spent in our schools.

4,730 school visits

• 477 substation visits

• 1,812 hours of time police officers have spent inside the schools.

These figures do not include the six School Resource Officers' activity and their time spent in Westfield schools.

# **Carmel Housing Task Force** releases initial recommendations

Report among first critical step in addressing housing inventory & needs

### **The REPORTER**

The Carmel Housing Task Force, a team of local leaders, experts, and Carmel citizens established to study the state of housing in the city, shared its report in a public meeting this morning.

Designed to ensure the housing needs of all Carmel residents and support workforce needs of the business community, the task force was announced in February to take a lead role in informing the city's future housing strategy.

The task force spent the past months learning from residents about the housing needs of the community and from industry experts about best practices to support them, looking to data and trends from the city, region, and nation.

Over a series of eight meetings that included robust input from the community, the task force identified key challenges related to the housing market, including lack of supply, increased and shifting demand, and affordability.

Highlights from the 13 key recommendations included in the Finding and **Recommendations Report**:

• Continuing the work of the task force by making it a permanent committee to advise the mayor

• Developing a housing strategy and vision plan to further identify the life cycle of housing needs

• Facilitate development of missing middle housing smaller ownership units desired by both seniors looking to downsize and young, first-time home buyers

· Adopt a development strategy for new apartment construction • Acquisition of green space

Mayor Sue Finkam formed committee the with three goals in mind: securing

data to better understand the myriad issues facing the city, providing transparency through engaging residents in the process and creating a blueprint to support a longterm plan.

Noting that, as part of Carmel's recent community survey, 97 percent of respondents described the quality of life in Carmel as excellent, Mayor Finkam emphasized that housing plays a key role chants Capital in supporting livability.

"Lack of desired housing leads to lifestyle compromises, talent and business attraction concerns. These can all negatively impact the way we interact with and enjoy our community, and our mel Plan Commission, Task potential future success," Finkam said. "We have led on the issue of providing viable and varied housing options, and we will continue to lead on this issue."

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# Harvest season is here: tips to stay safe around farm equipment while driving

Harvest season is officially underway for Indiana's 94,000 farmers, which means more slow-moving farm equipment will be on Indiana's rural roads and highways. To keep Hoosiers safe this year, state agencies are asking motorists to be alert and patient, as they share the road with farm equipment this fall.

"The fall is an exciting time for all Hoosiers as the temperatures cool and the leaves turn colors. And Hoosier farmers share that excitement as they prepare to begin harvest," said Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch, who serves as Indiana's Secretary of Agriculture and Rural Development. "While ment, our roads are safer. By

"Moving farm equipment can be one of the most dangerous parts of a farmers job," Indiana State Department of Agriculture Director Don Lamb said. "When motorists know how to safely navigate around farm equipensure they arrive safely to their destination."

It may appear that the driver is pulling over for you to pass when it is actually preparing to turn. 

At a time of unprecedented antisemitism across the United States, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita makes clear in an advisory opinion that laws protect Jewish individuals from many forms of antisemitic harassment in educational settings.

In the three months following the Oct. 7, 2023, massacre in Israel, the Anti-Defamation League recorded 3.291 antisemitic incidents across the United States – a level unprecedented during any previous three-month period over the last decade and a 361 percent increase compared to the same period the previous year. On university campuses in particular, antisemitic incidents have recently increased again as colleges resume classes for the fall semester.



# **Royals sweep rival Tigers for Mudsock win**

FISHERS - The Fishers Tigers jostled the Hamilton Southeastern Royals' crown momentarily on Thursday night, but they could do little to dethrone the nation's third-best volleyball program.

The host Tigers forced 18 ties through three games and led by as many as three points in the first set against Class 4A No. 1 HSE, and then the Royals remembered who they are.

The two-time defending state champion Royals put together a pair of decisive runs in the first and second sets to win both games by a margin of 25-17 before capping their three-game, Mudsock sweep 25-14 in the third.

"Both of our soccer teams tied (Fishers this week), so we were kind of that match that decides the Mudsock. We're in the lead now, so that's really good for our team," HSE senior Lindsey Mangleson said. "I feel like this win was really good because there's just so much energy here. We just all played out, and it really feels good."

Playing in front of a lively crowd at Fishers High School, both rival Hoosier Crossroads Conference programs battled through four ties and two lead changes in the first set and nine ties in the second with six lead changes.

In both sets, Mangleson, a Mississippi State recruit, powered HSE's deciding rallies, including an ace in the first, which kicked off a 7-3 run, and a kill for the fourth point during the sec-

ond set's 10-3 swing. The Tigers (11-6, 2-1 HCC) and Royals (11-1, 2-1 HCC) were deadlocked 9-9 in the first before HSE charged ahead 16-9. In the second, an 11-11 tie quickly turned into a 21-14 HSE advantage.

"I feel like we had all the momentum, and then we just made big defensive plays that helped us push, and we just won the game," said Mangleson, who was named the game's inaugural most valuable player.


