

## The valley of anticipatory grief

Recently, I was asked by my writer/author/podcaster friend, Lisa Appelo, to share some thoughts on grief with her readers. She knows the pain and storm of grief after suddenly losing her husband, leaving her with seven children ages 4 to 19. Lisa has



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over 30,000 followers on social media. You can find all about her at lisaappelo.com.

In her book, Life Can Be Good Again, she shares how to navigate life after losing someone you love.

While I have written before about anticipatory grief, I thought some may now be in the midst of it, so I would, again, share my thoughts with my readers.

The pain, sadness, and hard emotions that come from grieving a loss before it happens has a name: anticipatory grief. Janet Hart Leonard shares six lessons she learned about the valley of anticipatory grief in her mom's final months this side of heaven.

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil for you are with me; your rod and your staff they comfort me." (Psalm 23:4-5, ESV)

For two years, I walked through that valley – a valley of anticipatory grief.

I never heard of anticipatory grief until I was thrown into the depths of it. The anticipatory grief got deeper as my mother began to struggle with her health and mobility.

I define anticipatory grief not as waves of grief but as an undertow. It is the current beneath the surface of every decision, health crisis, and holiday. That current is strong and flows away from the life you have always known with a loved one.





Thacker was appointed to the position in August 2024, following his role as executive director of the Indiana Department of Home-



## **ANTICIPATE**

The valley of the shadow of death is long, lonely, and full of what-ifs and when. Here's what I learned about the valley of anticipatory grief.

1. Anticipatory grief starts slowly.

In the middle of the emergency" operator with pany. Mom had fallen again. The first responders were on their way to her house. I took off running, as she lived only three blocks from my house.

With every middle-ofthe-night phone call, I knew we were approaching the day the calls would stop.

2. Anticipatory grief worsens as our loved one's health worsens.

We met with a social worker in the hospital who told my mother the doctors thought it was time she moved to an assisted living facility. My mom was silent, but I assured her we'd researched a wonderful place only 10 minutes from my home, and she reluctantly agreed.

On moving day, Mom, dressed in a new outfit, rose from her chair, moved from her recliner into her wheelchair, and slowly looked around. She knew. I knew. She would never be back.

I had just taken a deep dive into anticipatory grief. We got her moved into her cutely decorated apartment. After showing her around and meeting the residents and nursing staff, I got into my car, gripped the steering wheel, and wept. earlier. I was losing my mother.

God comfort her and keep her safe, I prayed. Please, Lord, help her to find friends who will love her well. And God, if it's not too much to ask, could you comfort me, too?

3. Anticipatory grief triggers guilt.

"Janet, I want to go home."

My heart felt like it was being stabbed, and the tears fell as I told her that wasn't possible.

"Janet, your dad would be so disappointed in you that you would do this to me," she said, then hung up. Anticipatory grief found a new level of brutality. I was drowning in guilt.

My daughter convinced her that I loved her enough to do this hard thing. She called me, apologized for what she said, and told me she would be okay. The question was, would I be emotions during the two

4. Anticipatory grief is a waiting game.

The anticipatory grief grew greater with each trip to the ER for recurring urinary tract infections. Her symptoms often included verbal salads where she I would try to talk but would use words that made no sense. She was very confused and it was scary for both of us.

As she lost the ability to walk, the nursing staff suggested it was time to move her to a healthcare campus. We never used the word nursing home. Soon after

dad passed some 14 years and broke a rib. I knew it was time to move her.

It was another difficult discussion, but she knew she needed more care. The problem was that she would have to share a room which meant sorting through more of the things she could not take. Every time I packed away something, it reminded me that someday A few days after mov- I would be sorting for the ing my mom to her assisted last time. It wasn't just stuff living facility, I got a call, I was packing away, but memories.

My mind played mean games. Every holiday, is this the last one? Last Christmas, last Easter, and last Mother's Day?

5. Anticipatory grief involves a host of hard emotions.

Anticipatory grief is "a feeling of grief that occurs before a loss." It's an intense and overwhelming form of grief that includes a mix of emotions like numbness, disbelief, sadness, anger, fear, and shock.

I felt every one of those years before my mother's death. It is said that anticipatory grief can be just as painful as the actual loss, but it also allows the family to prepare for the inevitable death.

During those years, embraced the psalms. I wrote dates and thoughts in the margins of my Bible, which became my grief journal. Psalms 34:18 says, 'The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit.'

6. Anticipatory grief doesn't eliminate grief after our loved one passes. In November 2020, I re-

COVID. The facility let me know she would not recover as blood clots made their way throughout her body.

Dressed in safety gear, I was allowed to be with her in a private room for three hours daily. We sang her favorite hymns and talked about what heaven would be like. I read the Psalms to her. We shared memories and held hands, but most of all, we shared our love.

That room was sacred ground. On December 16, I kissed her cheek and whispered, "I love you, Mom. I'll see you in heaven."

The next morning, my phone rang. I no longer felt the pain of anticipatory grief. The grief was now that of deep mourning. God was close to this brokenhearted daughter and had been faithful to both of us while in the valley. I knew as she gently fell into Jesus' arms, her legacy of faith would live on in me.

# Carmel Mayor's Housing Task Force releases its initial recommendations

The Carmel Housing Task Force, a team of local leaders, experts, and Carm-

el citizens established to study the state of housing in the city, shared its report in a public meeting this morning.

Designed to ensure the housing needs of all Carmel residents and support work-

force needs of the business community, the task force was announced in February to take a lead role in informing the city's future housing strategy.

The task force spent the past months learning from residents about the housing needs of the community and from industry experts about best practices to support them, looking to data and trends from the city, region, and nation.

Over a series of eight meetings that included robust input from the community, the task force identified key challenges related to the housing market, including lack of supply, increased and shifting demand, and affordability.

Highlights from the 13 key recommendations included in the Finding and Recommendations Report:

- Continuing the work of the task force by making it a permanent committee to advise the mayor
- Developing a housing strategy and vision plan to further identify the life cycle of housing needs
- Facilitate development of missing middle housing smaller ownership units desired by both seniors looking to downsize and young, first-time home buyers
- strategy for new apartment construction

· Acquisition of green

Mayor Sue Finkam formed the committee with three goals in mind: securing data to better understand the myriad issues facing the city, providing transparency

through engaging residents in the process and creating a blueprint to support a longterm plan.

> Noting that, as part of Carmel's recent community survey, 97 percent of respondents described the quality of life in Carmel as excellent, Mayor Finkam emphasized that housing plays a key role in

supporting livability. "Lack of desired housing leads to lifestyle compromises, talent and business attraction concerns. These can all negatively impact the way we interact with and enjoy our community, and our potential future success," Finkam said. "We have led on the issue of providing viable and varied housing options, and we will continue to lead on this issue."

Mayor Finkam will continue reviewing the findings of the group and expressed thanks to the task force members, citing their tireless efforts and thoughtful recommendations.

"This work will serve as a vital resource as we strive to create better housing solutions for our residents,' she said.



170 this last legislature, now part of I.C. § 3-5-2-19.8.

In general, it makes it a Level 6 Felony under certain circumstances to threaten an election worker or to obstruct, interfere with, or injure an elec-



tion worker. Election workers include the Secretary of State, employees of the election division, members of the commission, a precinct election officer, a member of a county election board, and a circuit court clerk. It also includes an employee of the office of the circuit court clerk, a member of a town election board, a challenger and poll book holder, a watcher or those appointed to the absentee voter boards or to serve as an absentee ballot counter or courier. There is no requirement in the definition that the election worker be paid to qualify.

Any person who knowingly obstructs or interferes with an election worker discharging the election worker's duty or knowingly obstructs and interferes with a voter within the voting chute commits a Level 6 Felony.

It is also a Level 6 Felony if any person who – for the purposes of influencing a voter, an election worker, or candidate seeks to enforce payment of debt by force or threat of force, ejects or threatens to eject the person from a house they occupy, begins a criminal prosecution, communicates a threat, commit a forcible felony, or damages the trade or business of the voter election worker or candidate.

The Hamilton County Election Board is diligent in seeking to make sure we have fair and safe elections. I encourage you if you think there is violation to file a complaint with the election board or your local police department.

In 2022, Brynne and visited the sacred grounds of the 9/11 Memorial and Миseum. Inside, I saw a portrait



of my high school classmate's (Stacey) face. I choked up. It still seemed so surreal, so fresh. We took plenty of Kleenex. What follows is an account of my first visit to the memorial a few years earlier.

A business-related trip in 2017 took me to the Big Apple for the first time in my life, so I tagged on a weekend to achieve a few personal goals, the utmost being to visit the memorial erected in honor of the victims of 19 terrorists, those nearly 3,000 people whose sad fates we witnessed via live TV and computer on Sept. 11, 2001.

My sobbing surprised me down near the toe tip of Manhattan. After all, at that time, 16 years had passed since it all came crumbling down on this sacred, somber spot forever known as Ground Zero. Sure, I expected to be emotionally moved in some way during my visit, but not moved to tears, not after so much time having

Sept. 11, 2001:

Flight 11 cut into the north face of the North Tower. My god, how could a pilot mess up so badly, I remember thinking. A second airliner, Flight 175, sliced through the south face of the South Tower. My mind switched blame from pilot error to air traffic control error. Computer glitch obviously. I remained in a TV trance.

I no longer remember when terrorism was first theorized. Hijackings seemed to be happening all over the place that morning, a hornet's nest shake at humanity. I remember being glued to CNN. More unthinkable news. Flight 77 penetrated The Pentagon. Flight 93 crashed into a field in Pennsylvania. Gravity at its cruelest during the bluest of blue skies.

The Twin Towers rumbled and tumbled, first the South Tower, second the North Tower. (In 1974, as a 10-year-old, I watched awestruck as the evening news showed a mysterious Frenchman magically using a high-wire to cross the void between the strong Twin Towers, my first recollection of them on the New York skyline.) A simultaneous release of souls occurred as the storied steel castles, proud symbols of

our country's financial might, vaporized before our very eyes.

The hellish plumes up high. The billow below that turned the day to night, devouring the streets and avenues, as if we were witnessing the getaway of pure evil.

Ash and paper. Paper and ash. Public radio's Robert Siegel so eloquently reported this later about the pieces of paper that somehow remained intact, the litter from what once was: "Paper, after all, is the great product of Manhattan: securities analyses, stock certificates, depositions, federal filings, licenses. It is the stuff that enters the workplace unfinished and exits filled with the marks of commerce, finance and government, signed, sworn or notarized. The papers underfoot, I found, documented what a nexus the World Trade Center had been, linking people all over the world through commerce."

I no longer remember how long it took for the national local news for the many of us across the country and throughout the globe who read the local names of people lost that day, the subsequent obituaries about our very own.

Stacey Peak graduated with me from Tell City High School in 1983. She grew up to become an energy power stockbroker for Cantor Fitzgerald on the 105th floor of the North Tower, several floors above where the first hijacked plane hit its mark.

The news went like this: Stacey called her mother. She said there was a fire in her building. She sounded composed, despite chaos in the background. She said her coworkers were considering going to the roof. She told her mother she loved her. Then the phone connection between a mother in Tell City, Indiana, and her daughter in Lower Manhattan died.

I walked from Midtown South, mostly via Sixth Avenue, to the National 9/11 Memorial just to find my high-school moved through the crowd in news about 9/11 to splinter into friend in the form of a name on a search of private space (imposbronze panel.

Even though almost 16 Septembers would pass before my fingertips would trace her name inscribed in bronze, the blue sky reflecting off its sheen, I was immediately overwhelmed at the moment of our reunion, as if her death was only a day old. I told her hello. Feeling out of sorts, I needed to escape the strangers amassed at the memorial, all those hands tracing all those names, people representing so many nationalities who man@gmail.com.

surrounded me. They were likely on similar missions to mine, some being way more personal in scope. I was merely a Hoosier boy who did nothing more than joke and laugh a few times with a smart, pretty, redheaded girl, who called me "Saalmy" in a high school hallway a long time ago.

I was tight in the throat. I sible) and composure (impossible). I passed a 20-something woman telling three children, ... one theory is terrorists aboard planes ...

Theory?!!!

I escaped into the Westfield World Trade Center shopping mall. I knelt behind an advertisement. I cried. Colorful, slick shopping bags in tight grips hurried by. I didn't remember our jokes, but I remembered her laughter. I remembered that about Stacey. And for that, I crumbled.

## Royals sweep rival Tigers for Mudsock win

FISHERS - The Fishers Tigers jostled the Hamilton Southeastern Royals' crown momentarily on Thursday night, but they could do little to dethrone the nation's third-best volleyball program.

The host Tigers forced 18 ties through three games and led by as many as three points in the first set against Class 4A No. 1 HSE, and then the Royals remembered who they are.

The two-time defending state champion Royals put together a pair of decisive runs in the first and second sets to win both games by a margin of 25-17 before capping their three-game, Mudsock sweep 25-14 in the third.

"Both of our soccer teams tied (Fishers this week), so we were kind of that match that decides the Mudsock. We're in the lead now, so that's really good for our team." HSE senior Lindsey Mangleson said. "I feel like this win was really good because there's just so much energy here. We just all played out, and it really feels good."

Playing in front of a lively crowd at Fishers High School, both rival Hoosier Crossroads Conference programs battled through four ties and two lead changes in the first set and nine ties in the second with six lead changes.

In both sets, Mangleson, a Mississippi State recruit, powered HSE's deciding rallies, including an ace in the first, which kicked off a 7-3 run, and a kill for the fourth point during the second set's 10-3 swing.

The Tigers (11-6, 2-1 HCC) and Royals (13-1,

9-9 in the first before HSE charged ahead 16-9. In the second, an 11-11 tie quickly turned into a 21-14 HSE advantage.

"I feel like we had all the momentum, and then we just made big defensive plays that helped us push, and we just won the game," said Mangleson, who was named the game's inaugural most valuable player.

'In a rivalry such as this, records and favorites don't matter. It's about who can get the job done on this particular night in front of a really good crowd on both sides," HSE head coach Jason Young said.

"I've always said, it's special just because we're playing against neighbors, against teammates, against people we care about. Usually, it's just about fun bragging rights and that makes this game special. It's one district with two schools, but we're all in this togeth-


