Bud Wright remains head coach

Kevin Wright & Jake Chesney named associate head coaches

 On Monday evening, Sheridan Community Schools released the following statement regarding the suspension of longtime head football coach, Larry "Bud" Wright, which was announced last Friday afternoon.
 "Sheridan Community Schools has named Kevin Wright and Jake Chesney as Associate Head Coaches beginning immediately. Coach Bud Wright will continue in his role as Head Coach. Coach Wright was placed on a paid administrative leave while a review of the program took place. It was determined that Coach (Bud) Wright should continue to be the Head Coach with the

Associate Coaches in place."
 Kevin Wright played for his father at Sheridan High School, graduating in 1983. He then played four years of college football at Western Kentucky University, where he was a wide receiver. Wright coached at Frankfort for one year, 1991, before heading to Noblesville, where he coached from 1992 to 1998 and leading the Millers to a sectional title in 1997. From there, Wright spent one year at Louisville Trini-

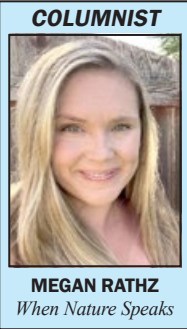


ty (1999), then had six highly successful seasons at Warren Central (2000-05). The Warriors won three state championships under Wright's supervision, in 2003, 2004, 2005 and claimed at least a sectional title in all six seasons. After stops at Union High School in Oklahoma and a two-year stint as offensive coordinator at his alma mater Western Kentucky, Wright returned to Hamilton County in 2010 to coach Carmel. He spent five seasons coaching

the Greyhounds, winning state in 2011 and finishing as runner-up in 2013 and 2014. Wright coached at IMG Academy, the nationally recognized prep school in Bradenton, Fla, for four years (2015-19). Wright led IMG to an undefeated season in his first season. After that, Wright accepted the tight ends coach position at Indiana University, coaching there from 2020 to 2023. Chesney graduated from Sheridan in 2015, where he was a multi-sport star in football, basketball and baseball. He would go on to play football at Trine University all four years and has been with the Blackhawks' staff the past few seasons.

Westfield buys Wood Wind Golf Club, announces future plans

Wood Wind Golf Club will remain a golf course for the foreseeable future, Westfield city leaders announced Monday.
 Mayor Scott Willis confirmed the city has reached an agreement to buy the 147-acre golf course located near the intersection of 161st Street and Towne Road.
 The \$3.1 million purchase price includes all buildings on the grounds, the clubhouse and party pavilion, and site amenities, including two pickleball courts, golf carts, maintenance equipment, and furnishings.
 Willis said he hopes the purchase will end speculation that Wood Wind would close to make room for new housing.
 "Since my first day in office, the owner has pitched ideas to develop the course into a high-density housing development," Willis said in a news release. "The city purchasing the course ensures that it will remain a community asset for decades to come and the open green space the area offers will be preserved."
 Willis also says he expects the course will continue generating revenue, and that the profits will be reinvested in the course and additional community amenities.
 It will become Westfield's first city-owned golf course.
 Wood Wind was developed in 1990 by Ron and Gary Kern, well-known golf course architects in Indiana.

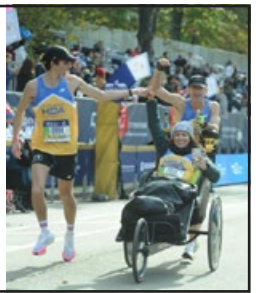

Are you already registered? You can check or update your voter registration status, find your nearest voting location, and see who's on your ballot while on the [state's website](#).

The deadline to register

to vote in Indiana is Oct. 7 and early voting begins Oct. 8. The General Election is set for Tuesday, Nov. 5.

You can request an absentee ballot at [this link](#) if you are unable to vote in-person at your polling location.

Citizen poll workers play a critical role in ensuring elections run smoothly and efficiently, from welcoming voters to verifying registrations and issuing ballots. If you're interested in serving your community as a poll worker, you will receive training and can earn compensation for your service depending on the county. 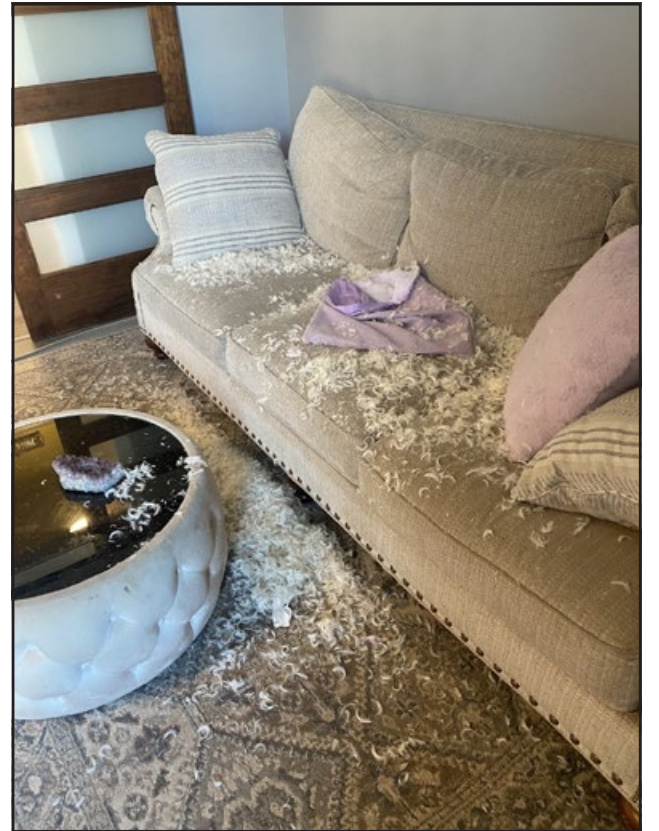

The Man in Black would be proud of this show

Actors Theatre of Indiana (ATI) opens its 2024-25 season with *Ring of Fire: The Music of Johnny Cash*.

The song-filled show loosely traces the life of the singer/songwriter from his youthful days in the Arkansas cotton fields, through his early musical successes and marriage to June Carter, on to the very pinnacle of his life as a performer. Cash's story is told almost entirely through a cornucopia of songs – a pleasing arrangement that both tells his tale and lifts our spirit into a delightful nostalgia.

Led by Kent M. Lewis as the narrator, who also directs and choreographs the show, the remarkably talented ensemble fills the

stage with Cash's catalogue. Lewis brings an uncanny vocal quality to his role – so much like Cash in timbre, tone, and expression, if you closed your eyes to listen to his interpretations, you would swear it was The Man in Black.

In her ATI debut, Sarah Hund does outstanding work portraying the females in Cash's life. Long ago, I proclaimed her "the most talented performer I know," and Ms. Hund retains that title with a performance full of vocals and instrumentations that are a pleasure to watch and hear.

Joining with Lewis and Ms. Hund are a number of other accomplished musical performers, each playing a variety of instruments and singing in turn. I have seen

Brandon Alstott play Cash in ATI's *Million Dollar Quartet* and he often adds a worthy portrayal of the man to these proceedings. Matt McClure's electric guitar work and the stand-up bass-playing of Jordan Simmons, along with musical director/pianist Nathan

Perry, fill out the musical picture with aplomb. All six cast members readily combine their vocals resulting in some very fine close harmony work.

Praise must be added for Bernie Killian's

INDOT to unveil plans for I-465/U.S. 31 project in Carmel

The Indiana Department of Transportation next week will roll out a timeline on a new construction project at the Interstate 465 inter-

change for U.S. 31 in Carmel.

Kyleigh Cramer, public relations director for INDOT, said the project will make it easier for drivers to merge on and off the interstate to U.S. 31.

"This project is aiming at addressing capacity and also efficiency in this area, those are the two biggest ones, we're seeing a lot of traffic in this area, again Hamilton County is growing," Cramer said.

The project includes an interchange modification to the I-465 and U.S. 31 interchange to add capacity, and increase efficiency and safety by eliminating traffic weaving and merging.

"It's almost 105,000 vehicles that travel U.S. 31 in both directions per day, estimated for 2025," Cramer said.

That number will grow to 160,000 by the year 2045.

Cramer says details of the project, including lane closures and the start and completion dates, will be outlined at a public meeting Sept. 26.

"This does allow the project team and the motoring public to sit down and talk about upcoming milestones we're going to hit," she said.

Feedback from drivers will be taken into consideration as INDOT drafts a final outline of the project, which will be presented at a second meeting.

"I think a lot of people will agree, this project needs to be done," Cramer said. "It's growing so rapidly in this area and with that comes more people, move vehicles and more traffic."

The public meeting will be Sept. 26 at the Drury Plaza Hotel, 9625 N. Meridian St. Doors will open at 5:30 p.m. with a formal presentation beginning at 6 p.m.

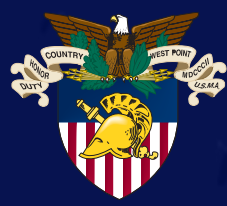
Swimmer turned political activist Riley Gaines speaks at Indiana Family Institute's fall dinner

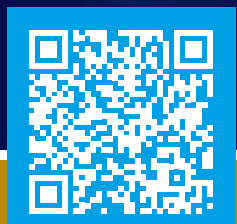

County Health Department accepting grant applications

The Hamilton County Health Department is now accepting grant applications from organizations with projects that address gaps in health care in Hamilton County.

The grants will be funded through the state's Health First Indiana program created by Senate Enrolled Act 4. The General Assembly passed legislation last year that will invest \$225 million in public health over the next two years.

"Each local health department that opted into the program is allowed to determine and invest in

the unique needs of their communities," Health Department Administrator Jason LeMaster said. "We look forward to partnering with other health-focused organizations to address gaps in our public health services and find ways to enhance the health and well-being of our residents."

Applicants are encouraged to propose projects, programs, or activities aligned with the following priority Core Public Health Service (CPHS) areas for

Hamilton County:

- Maternal and Child Health
- Improved Birth Outcome programs
- Child & Adult Immunizations
- School Health
- Fatality Prevention Initiatives
- Referral programs
- Chronic Disease Prevention
- Access to and Linkage to Clinical Care
- Trauma and Injury Prevention
- Tobacco Prevention and Cessation

There is currently no set limit on how much an organization can request in funding. Eligible and complete applications will be evaluated in accordance with the review criteria and must be approved by the Hamilton County Commissioners. Awards will be disbursed in single payments in January 2025.

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office will play host to the fourth annual bloodhound seminar from Sept. 22 to 26. With over 20 teams from across the United States attending, this training offers over 40 hours of fieldwork for these handler and K-9 duos.

"Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has this workshop to provide education and support to K-9 teams throughout the county and beyond," said Deputy Neal Hoard, seminar host. "With five groups from the state, this week specifically increases training to teams in central Indiana, so that our bloodhound handlers are equipped to handle any re-

al-life scenario."

The training spans past fieldwork alone, offering scenario-based workshops, and legal and medical roundtables to the attendees. Two instructors are designated to every five handlers allowing for an individualized approach to teaching.

The seminar is held at The Diabetes Youth Foundation of Indiana Camp each year and the handlers train throughout Hamilton County. Registration for the seminar opened in late spring and closed beginning of August. 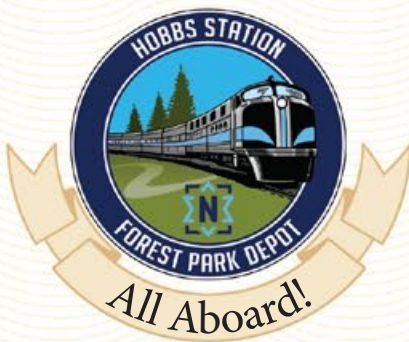

Electric car ignites at dealership, highlights firefighting challenge

An electric car fire at the Audi dealership on 96th Street over the weekend has highlighting the challenges firefighters are facing when EVs catch fire.

The lithium ion battery in the car is what gave firefighters such a challenge.

Tim Griffin, a spokesman for Carmel Fire Department, said, "The dealership did have a sprinkler system,

which probably helped the spread, but it wasn't putting that out. It took the firefighters and us getting hoses in there and on that car to cool it off enough to actually be able to move it."

Griffin told I-Team 8 that fire departments across the country are still trying to figure out the best way to fight electric vehicle fires.

"Every fire is difficult, right, but these are just a different set of difficulties and they do burn at a high level of heat and a lot of times they're not going to go out."

They experienced that with this fire as well. "We followed it on the wrecker because it did reignite a couple times while moving it out of the building."

The Carmel Fire Department is not necessarily seeing more electric vehicle fires. They just have not perfected how to fight them.

"A new technology comes in and things change, so we treat it like we do. We adapt. We overcome," Griffin said.

I-Team 8 called the Audi dealership where the fire happened to find out if it will change how they market electric vehicles, but no one had returned the call before the story aired Tuesday.

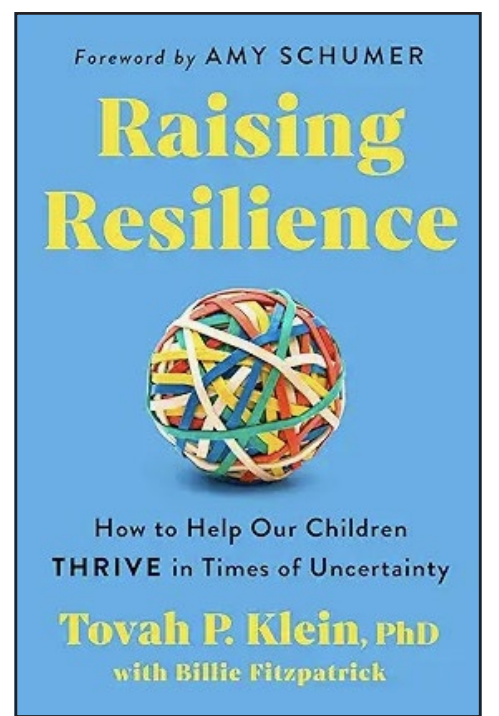

Young introduces bill to protect American energy

U.S. Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) joined with fellow Senate Commerce Committee Republicans in introducing the Safe and Secure Transportation of American Energy Act to protect American energy from attacks or the threat of attacks.

The legislation would deter domestic "eco-terrorists" from targeting pipelines that transport oil and

gas in the U.S. by expanding the current criminal penalties to cover vandalism, tampering with, or disrupting the operations or construction of a pipeline.

"About 90 percent of America's transportation sector is reliant on oil, and pipeline dis-

ruptions pose a major threat to America's energy security," Sen. Young said. "Our legislation takes much-needed steps to better protect our critical infrastructure and deter attacks on America's pipelines."

Current federal law allows for criminal charges

against individuals who damage or destroy operating pipelines. However, the law does not clearly apply these penalties to those who vandalize, tamper with, or disrupt the operation or construction of a pipeline. The Safe and Secure Transportation of American Energy Act would correct that oversight.

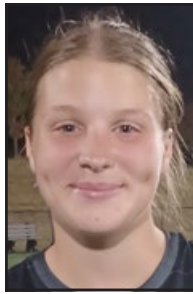

Golden Eagles soar in final conference match

NOBLESVILLE — It was by far the biggest goal of the year for the Guerrin Catholic girls soccer team.

Senior Ella Sumski got to start for the Class 2A No. 6 Golden Eagles in their Senior Night game against 1A No. 1 Heritage Christian Tuesday at the Eagles Nest. And did she ever make the most of it: Sumski scored her first-ever goal within the first minute of the game.

Golden Eagles coach Sean Yau said that first goal symbolizes the senior class that's leading the 2A

defending champions. Yau said "the amount of faith and love that they showed within each other culminated in Ella Sumski, who never scored all four years, and then on Senior Night,

of all times, to score the game winner against a really good Heritage Christian team. That's pretty much the epitome of our senior class."

Royals, Rocks tie in HCC showdown

FISHERS — The Westfield Shamrocks were looking to play spoiler both on Hamilton Southeastern's senior night and in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference title race.
