County hires dedicated cybersecurity expert

New position responsible for protecting the county from cyber threats

Hamilton County's Information Systems Services (ISS) Department has hired a Chief Information Security Officer (CISO), a position created to enhance the county's cybersecurity posture.

Timothy Renick brings extensive experience from his previous roles as Head of Technology for the City of Carmel and Madison County, Ill.

The establishment of this dedicated cybersecurity role comes in response to increasing cyber threats affecting municipalities across Indiana and nationwide. As part of the 2024 budget process,

additional funds were allocated to secure the expertise required for this critical position.

"Having a dedicated CISO is essential for Hamilton County," ISS Department Director Chris Mertens said. "We have various cybersecurity measures in place, but it's crucial to have someone overseeing the entire landscape to identify any potential

In his role, Renick will oversee the establishment and execution of security strategies, policies, and standards, including those related to emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence. He will also work to safeguard the county's information assets, conduct risk assessments, manage compliance issues, and coordinate incident response plans to ensure critical services remain operational.

"The recent surge in cyberattacks has highlighted the necessity of being prepared," Mertens added. "With the vast amount of data we manage, this is the right time to strengthen our defenses and ensure consistency in our security practices across all departments. Having someone solely dedicated to cybersecurity is a significant and positive step for our long-term resilience."

The event is being held at 19201 Grassy Branch Road, Westfield, on the CrossRoads Church at Westfield's campus.

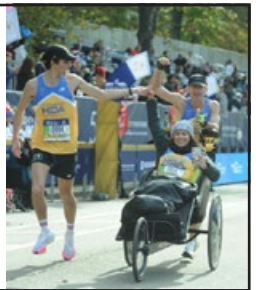

Indiana National Guard troops heading to Middle East say goodbyes

About 600 Indiana National Guard troops prepared Wednesday to deploy overseas to the Middle East.

A departure celebration at Camp Atterbury near Edinburgh was bittersweet and emotional. Some soldiers were excited. Some family members were teary-eyed. [Click here](#) to see photos from the event.

Gerardo Sanchez said of his departure, "Excited. I'm ready to go. This is checking-the-box kinda thing."

His sister Matzine Sanchez got emotional. "I'm very proud of him. I'm going to miss him a lot."

Gerardo and other Indiana National Guard troops

will train for a month in Texas and then head to the Middle East to support the Army's Operation Spartan Shield. They'll be placed in several key locations including Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, and Jordan. Their deployment will be about a year.

Griffey Nolder Sr. is being deployed for the first time. He cradled his six-week-old son, Griffey Jr. "It's hard being away from him but it's good to help him out."

Another Indiana Guard Member being deployed is an Indianapolis Metro-

politan Police Department officer. Connor Finch said, "Just one more thing I can do to help better the lives of others. Really just make my life worth more than myself."

Finch's message to his fellow brother and sisters in blue: "Hold the line guys, I'll be home soon."

Maj. Gen. R. Dale Lyles, the head of the Indiana National Guard, said of the deployment, "Ensuring safety and security in the Middle East and deterring violence and ensuring that all Americans live free and are protected against our

adversary."

He told the Indiana National Guard troops as they prepared to leave, "This country owes you a great debt of gratitude that we can never repay."

Due to security reasons, the exact date of when the troops will be deployed was not made public, but a spokesperson for the Indiana National Guard says it'll be in the next few days.

Franciscan Health to hold ASIST suicide intervention course next month in Carmel

Franciscan Health in conjunction with the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention will hold a LivingWorks Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) course on Wednesday, Oct. 2 and Thursday, Oct. 3 at Franciscan Health Orthopedic Hospital Carmel.

The course will run from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day and attendees must be present for both days of the course to receive certification. Also, attendees must register for the course.

LivingWorks ASIST is a two-day, two-trainer workshop designed for members of all caregiving groups. Family, friends, and other community members



may be the first to talk with a person at risk but have little or no training. ASIST can also provide those in formal helping roles with professional development to ensure that they are prepared to provide suicide first aid help as part of the care they provide.

The emphasis of the course is on teaching suicide first-aid to help a person at risk stay safe and seek further help as needed. Participants learn to use a suicide intervention model to identify persons with thoughts of suicide, seek a shared understanding of reasons for dying and living, develop a safe plan based upon a review of risk, be prepared to

do follow-up, and become involved in suicide-safer community.

The learning process used is based on adult learning principles and highly participatory. Graduated skills development occurs through mini lectures, facilitated discussions, group simulations, and role plays.

The course will be led by Tina Hoffman, Community Health Improvement coordinator at Franciscan Health.

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Hamilton County 911 rolls out new technology to streamline dispatch

New system designed to reduce time it takes to dispatch responders

Hamilton County 911 recently rolled out a new countywide location system aimed at significantly improving emergency response times and communication for first responders.

This new technology will streamline dispatch processes, allowing first responders to receive critical information more quickly and accurately.

The location system automates emergency alerts, providing essential details such as location and nature

of the call immediately upon dispatch. This ensures that first responders are alerted without unnecessary delays. The system is designed to facilitate “zoned” dispatching, ensuring that only those first responders who are needed for a specific call receive the alert, minimizing disruptions to others.

“We are excited to introduce this system to our

county’s emergency response teams,” said Mike Hubbs, Director of the 911 Communications Department. “This system not only enhances our operational efficiency but also improves the service we provide to our community. By reducing the time it takes to dispatch responders, we are ultimately saving lives.”

The innovative system also allows dispatchers to

maintain communication with callers while sending out alerts, ensuring that vital information can be relayed in real-time without compromising the speed of response.

“Our goal with this roll-out is to ensure that our responders have the tools they need to perform their duties effectively,” Hubbs added. “With this system in place, we are taking a significant step forward in modernizing our dispatch operations and improving overall safety for our residents.”

Carmel Fire Department receives multiple grants to support training, emergency response, & community safety initiatives

The Carmel Fire Department (CFD) announces the receipt of several significant grants aimed at enhancing training programs, emergency response capabilities, and community safety initiatives.

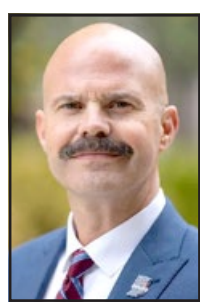
These grants, totaling more than \$169,000, will fund critical equipment, personnel training, and innovative safety programs benefiting the Carmel community.

“These grants are crucial in enabling us to continue our work of protecting the Carmel community,” Fire Chief Joel Thacker said. “From enhancing our training programs to equipping our firefighters with the best tools and providing critical community safety initiatives, this funding ensures that we are always ready to respond to emergencies and address evolving public safety needs. We’re grateful to the organizations for supporting our firefighters and, by extension, the citizens of Carmel.”

The public safety grants awarded to the CFD include:

- **Indiana Department of Workforce Development – Next Level Jobs: Employer Training Grant:** CFD was awarded a \$50,000 grant to support its 2024 recruit class. The funding covered expenses such as textbooks, testing fees, and personnel costs to help train the next generation of firefighters. This grant is part of Indiana’s effort to help employers fill in-demand positions, including firefighting, by supporting workforce development.

- **Indiana Department of Homeland Security – 2024 Paramedic School:** CFD has been awarded a \$41,500 grant to cover expenses related to the upcoming 2024 paramedic class, including tuition and training costs for future paramedics. This funding will ensure that CFD remains equipped to handle the growing demand for advanced medical services. The grant will be distributed upon the program’s

completion in December 2024/January 2025.

- **Indiana Department of Homeland Security – EMS Commission: Mobile Integrated Health Program:** To proactively reduce fall incidents and improve safety for Carmel’s aging population and residents with mobility issues, CFD has received a \$32,875 grant to develop the Steady Steps: Journey to Fall-Free Living program. The initiative aims to lessen the burden on emergency services by addressing community health needs through the Fall Prevention initiative. The grant is to be fully utilized by December 2024.

- **Central Indiana Community Foundation – Hamilton County Community Foundation: Behavioral Health:** CFD received \$7,500 to fund the full-day International Association of Fire Fighters Resiliency Training workshop, “Learn to Survive and Thrive in the Fire

Service.” The workshop was held on Sept. 25 and addressed pressing mental health challenges within the fire service, including post-traumatic stress, substance abuse and burnout, and focusing on building individual and organizational resilience.

- **Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation:** CFD was awarded \$37,211 to purchase a rescue boat that will enhance the department’s water rescue operations. With the expansion of Conner Prairie and increased activity along the White River, this new equipment will significantly improve emergency response efforts. The rescue boat is currently on order and expected to arrive in October 2024.

These grants represent the continued efforts of the Carmel Fire Department to lead the way in emergency preparedness, advanced medical care, and community health initiatives.

Reader calls on Spartz to support more research for Alzheimer’s

Dear Editor:

Did you know nearly seven million Americans are living with Alzheimer’s Disease and over 11 million Americans provide unpaid care for people with Alzheimer’s or other dementias?

I happen to be one of those unpaid caregivers.

My father, who is 87 and lives in California, was diagnosed with Alzheimer’s last year. I knew something was “off” with him several months before and started flying out to see him every month to check on him. His refrigerator was always near empty or contained expired foods and I noticed how frail he was. At 5-foot-7, he weighed only 122 pounds. I observed during my stays that he would forget to eat and stay hydrated. I would need to remind him when it was time for a meal.

I became extremely concerned about him.

It wasn’t long before he had a fall in his home last summer, becoming extremely disoriented to the point that he couldn’t walk unassisted and didn’t know where his unit was in his building. Thankfully, soon after the fall, he agreed to 24/7 in-home caregivers.

Meanwhile, I became involved with the Greater Indiana Chapter of the Alzheimer’s Association. I attend a monthly caregiver support group that has been extremely helpful. (There are online and in-person groups all around the state.)

I am also an advocacy volunteer, working with the Alzheimer’s Association team to amplify their work in increasing funding for much needed research. The Alzheimer’s Association’s commitment to ending Alzheimer’s has led to monumental investments in dementia, research, care, and support over the past decade, but we must keep working to secure critical advancements in detection, diagnosis, and treatment of Alzheimer’s and all other dementia.

That is why I am asking my Representative, Victoria Spartz, to support increased research funding at the National Institutes of Health.

I invite you to join me in this fight by contacting your representative in Congress. Visit alz.org to learn more about the Alzheimer’s advocacy efforts and how you can become involved. Together, we can bring an end to Alzheimer’s and All Other Dementia™.

Since January, I’ve been visiting my dad every other month to attend doctor’s appointments, to handle finances, and to spend time with the man who I have most admired in my life – before he can no longer remember me.

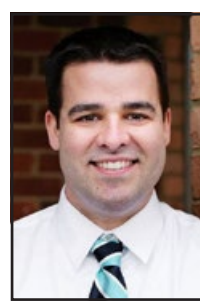
Reno Family Dentistry will participate in Freedom Day USA by offering free dental care to veterans and active-duty military personnel on Tuesday, Oct. 1.

Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training Oct 2-3



APPLIED SUICIDE INTERVENTION SKILLS TRAINING (ASIST)

What Does ASIST Offer?
LivingWorks ASIST is a two-day, two-trainer, workshop designed for members of all caregiving groups. Family, friends, and other community members may be the first to talk with a person at risk, but have little or no training. ASIST can also provide those in formal helping roles with professional development to ensure that they are prepared to provide suicide first aid help as part of the care they provide.

The emphasis is on teaching suicide first-aid to help a person at risk stay safe and seek further help as needed. Participants learn to use a suicide intervention model to identify persons with thoughts of suicide, seek a shared understanding of reasons for dying and living, develop a safe plan based upon a review of risk, be prepared to do follow-up, and become involved in suicide-safer community networks. The learning process is based on adult learning principles and highly participatory. Graduated skills development occurs through mini-lectures, facilitated discussions, group simulations, and role plays.

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Spartz supporters gather for late summer Saturday

The event was a well-attended fundraiser for the 2024 Spartz reelection campaign filled with people from across Hamilton County, Indiana's 5th Congressional District, and beyond.

Former Social Security Administration employee sentenced for fraudulent telework, emergency childcare & medical leave schemes

Christopher Markham, 40, Westfield, has been sentenced to two years of probation and has been ordered to pay \$49,255 in restitution after pleading guilty to wire fraud. According to court documents, Markham was employed by the Social Security Administration and assigned to an office in Anderson, Ind. Between Feb. 13, 2019, and June 17, 2022, he engaged in a scheme by which he made it appear as though he was teleworking full-time for Social Security Administration (SSA) during workdays, when in reality he was earning income working as a home inspector for his personal business. He was paid his full federal salary and benefits, while concealing the fact that he was working for his personal business and not for SSA. Markham routinely performed home inspections

for his personal business during the workweek while purporting to "telework" on official SSA time. He concealed the fact that he was not performing SSA work during official work hours by having his wife and his mother access the SSA computer system and send emails to supervisors to make it appear as though he was online and working. Markham nevertheless sought to be paid in full during this period and submitted 53 fraudulent time reports to SSA's online timekeeping portal, as well as falsified daily work logs to his supervisors. Additionally, Markham engaged in other fraud schemes to obtain Emergency Paid Leave by falsely claiming he was required to stay home to take care of his children. In fact, his children were in daycare, and he was again performing work for and earning income from his personal

business. He allegedly performed at least 70 home inspections for his personal business while claiming to be providing emergency care for his children. Finally, on multiple occasions, Markham fraudulently claimed benefits under the Family and Medical Leave Act ("FMLA") by falsely claiming he was unable to work due to illness - when he was actually doing home inspections for his personal business. Markham even attended an F.C. Tucker retreat promoting his business while claiming he was on FMLA leave. On June 4 and 5, 2020, Markham was granted administrative leave after claiming that the internet wire to his home had been cut. He advised that his internet provider would not be able to send anyone to his home to repair the wire until Friday, June 5, 2020. In reality, his internet provider

had no record of a damaged wire, and he used the administrative leave to take an unapproved, paid vacation to Gatlinburg, Tenn. In total, Markham's fraudulent conduct caused a loss to the SSA of approximately \$49,255, which he has been court ordered to repay. Markham's failure to perform his duties caused needy members of the public to have their social security benefits delayed, including people with autism, blindness, and end stage cancer.

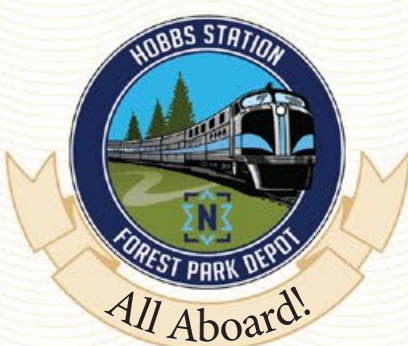

Braun to Novo Nordisk CEO: "Why are Americans paying more for the same drug?"

On Tuesday, U.S. Senator Mike Braun (R-Ind.) questioned Novo Nordisk CEO Lars Fruergaard Jorgensen at the Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Committee hearing about the high prices of the company's weight loss drug, Ozempic, in the United States.

"This has everything to do with a system that's broken with no transparency, no competition, barriers to entry, and by the way, a consumer who doesn't have the tools to really measure what the best value is," Braun said.

Here's a partial transcript of the exchange:

Braun: "Are you making a profit on your Ozempic product when you're selling it to Australia for \$87 and you're selling to the U.S. for \$936? Are you making a profit at \$87?"

Jorgensen: "Yes, we are and the price you mentioned in the U.S. is not what we get. That's the list price."

Braun: "So what are you getting in the U.S.? What price?"

Jorgensen: "So I mentioned that on average for our products we give 74 percent in rebates to PBMs."

Braun: "And that was the chart that Senator Marshall held up that PBMs are making 74 percent and you're getting 26 percent."

So, you've got a screwed-up industry. Number one, when I've talked to other pharma folks, they regret that PBMs ever came into it. It would seem like since you make the product, that you could disassemble them or do something to go around it, if in fact this place won't do something about it. Have you ever thought of that?"

Jorgensen: "It's very difficult Senator because they control what insurance is put in front of patients so they have integrated themselves with insurance companies and we negotiating against the PBMs, but they're owned by the insurance companies so no matter what we do, they decide what products—"

Braun: "Okay, and that's kind of the conundrum, but you're making a profit at \$87 and of the \$936, it would be the list price? Is that total being split between you and the PBM? I know you give big discounts to the PBM. Why do you give them such large discounts for them to make that much money?"

Jorgensen: "On this we have a high list price and give them rebates, we are not making it onto the insurance formulary. So, they make a fee based on the list price, you mentioned distribution,

they don't get a flat fee for the distribution."

Braun: "So, after you give the discounts, and you do everything, what is your revenue on Ozempic, roughly?"

Jorgensen: "I don't have that number from the top of my head."

Braun: "That is something that ought to be on the top of your head because most of us would want to see that so you could make the case against PBMs. That basic lack of transparency, that to me comes from the top, that cloaks the system, in general, is what is impacting the future of why in our own country it is 18 percent of our GDP and from Canada and Europe it is 12 percent of their GDP, Eastern Europe it is 6 to 7 percent. And yes, rationing is maybe going to be one of the results, but it should never be to where some-

thing is going to cost that much more here versus there when you're making a profit on it. Until you figure that out, everyone is going to think your industry is screwed up."

Braun is the leader in the Senate on reforming PBMs and lowering drug prices through transparency:

- Senator Braun's **Drug Price Transparency Act** would end the broken PBM system by requiring insurers and PBMs to pass rebates directly to consumers enrolled in commercial health plans and Medicare Part D.

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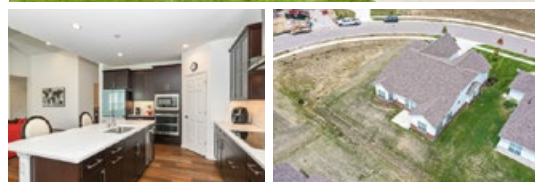


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McDermand breaks through for BC39 prelim feature victory at IMS

Local driver Leary wins inaugural Stoops sprint car invitational

Chase McDermand picked the most famous racetrack in the world to earn his first USAC NOS Energy Drink Midget National Championship feature victory Thursday night.

McDermand, from Springfield, Illinois, led the last 16 laps of the 30-lap preliminary feature for the Driven2SaveLives BC39 presented by Avanti Windows & Doors at The Dirt Track at Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

"This one has been a long time coming," McDermand said. "You can never take a win for granted because you just never know when the next one is coming, and it took us a long time. To do it here, to do it at the BC39 - granted, it's just a prelim night, but still we beat the best of the best here tonight. I'm super happy for my team and all of our partners."

Cannon McIntosh finished second, with series points leader Daison Pursley third.

Pole sitter Thomas Meseraull and Zach Daum swapped the lead on Lap 2 of the feature before Meseraull returned to the front on Lap 3 in the No. 7x machine.

On Lap 14, McDermand drove his No. 40 family-owned car past Meseraull by taking the high line between Turns 3 and 4 on the quarter-mile dirt oval. He never trailed thereafter, but two cautions kept him on top of his steering wheel for restarts.

"The line he (Meseraull) was kind of running kept me from getting all of my momentum down the straightaway," McDermand said. "So, once I was able to

finally clear him and I feel like I could set my own pace and dictate the corner entry, I feel like I was better. The car was super good tonight."

McDermand held off Meseraull on one restart with 14 laps to go and started to pull away on cruise control for victory. But a three-car tangle between Glenn Styres, Joel Myers Jr. and Luke Hall with two laps to go triggered the final caution period of the race.

Once again, McDermand powered away at the green flag with two laps to go, this time pulling away from Daum's No. 16 machine. Daum was shuffled back to sixth over the last two laps, with McIntosh charging forward to finish second.

Local hero C.J. Leary made history by winning the inaugural Stoops Sprint Car Invitational, the first time USAC AMSOIL National Sprint Cars have raced at IMS.

2019 USAC National Sprint Car champion Leary, from Greenfield, Indiana, passed pole sitter Pursley for the lead with eight laps remaining in the 20-lap feature and led the rest of the way in the 10-car exhibi-

tion race. Pursley held on to finish second, with Mitchel Moles third.

While this was a non-points race, it was Leary's first victory in a USAC Sprint Car since winning a series race Feb. 16 at Ocala Speedway in Ocala, Florida.

"Pretty special," Leary said. "I didn't know if we knew how to win anymore. It's been a long time. Really good race car. This thing was dialed in."

"Last time this car ran was at Kokomo during (Indiana) Sprint Week, and it did pretty poorly, and I didn't like it that much. I think my opinion has changed a little bit."

Pursley stuck to the high line to hold off second-place Moles in the first half of the race. But then Leary, who started seventh, entered the picture at the halfway point while running the low line. He pulled even with Pursley as they exited Turn 4 with eight laps to go and eased ahead at the flag stand, never trailing thereafter.

"I came here and tested two years ago, and I feel like that gave me a little bit of an edge," Leary said. "We knew what kind of gear to run and just a little bit about

what to think. It's just super cool to be down here in Victory Lane. I've run here since the start of the BC39 and I've never really done very good, so it feels good to win something."

Action resumes at 6:30 p.m. ET Friday night at The Dirt Track. The second half of the 59-car field will compete in heat races, qualifying races and a semi-feature, concluding with another 30-lap feature paying \$5,000 to win.

On Saturday night, multiple C-Mains, semi-features and a Last Chance Race will precede the 39-lap BC39 feature for USAC NOS Energy Drink Midget National Championship competitors.

Public gates open at 4 p.m. ET Friday night at The Dirt Track. Visit IMS.com to buy tickets and pit passes or for more information.
