had just settled in for a very mentally taxing 26.2 miles (or 42.195 kilometers there) running the streets of Berlin, with about 58,000 other runners.

This marathon was different in so many ways for us. Different country, larger in size

than any other (fun fact, we were part of setting a new world record with a record number 54,280 crossing the finish line that day!) While that may be a cool thing to have been a part of, for a duo bike team, it caused many challenges.

If you are not familiar with a marathon course, they have water stations along the way for those who do not run with their own water supply. My husband always has his own that I refill along the way, so we do not stop for water. We try to stay right down the middle of the water stations, which are on both sides of the road. It can be a very chaotic part of the course. Normally, the cups are paper, so when they are thrown after someone takes a quick drink, it does not hurt too bad if one slaps you in the face. In Berlin, the cups were a hard plastic. So, each time we passed through, I would take cover. That was a crazy experience in itself! I am pleased to say we made it through the water stations injury-free.

Hamilton County Election Office reporting significant participation thanks to early voters

Early voting is underway in Hamilton County. Here are some preliminary statistics as of the end of business Wednesday, courtesy of the County Election Office:

• 14,037 early voters (also called "walk-in absentee")

• More than 19,000 absentee mail ballots requested

Using the number of registered voters in the May 2024 primary, that means approximately 12 percent of Hamilton County's electorate has either voted early or requested to vote by mail.

There are only 19 days left until Nov. 5, but Elections Administrator Beth Sheller said there is still time to request your mail-in ballot if you choose.

For this year's general election, your application to vote by mail must be received by the County Election Office in Noblesville (not just postmarked) by 11:59 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 24. The requirements for receiving a mail-in ballot can be found on the Indiana Secretary of State's website at this link.

No application is necessary to vote early in person, DROP BALLOT HEF NO POSTAGE REQUIRE

Part of what I enjoy during the marathon is documenting and sharing the experience from my unique point of view. I often "go live" on social media because I know others enjoy seeing us in action along the course. This time, I just did not have much opportunity to document the experience in the same way. I was too busy ensuring that others, as well as my husband and I, stayed accident-free.

There was never a time of open road where we felt we could relax during our 3 hours and 24 minutes along the course. There were people dodging in, out and around the entire time. There were several near misses as people thought they could hop over the front wheel of the bike as we were moving. I would not recommend.

Another thing I enjoy is interacting with the crowds during the marathons. People get very enthusiastic when we come by in the bike. If I raise my arm and ring my cowbell in the crowds, they erupt in loud cheering and screaming. It sometimes gets a bit overwhelming for my husband as he is running. While it is awesome to hear and feel the support, ironically it can have the opposite effect on him. It gets VERY loud. The crowds for this marathon were nothing in comparison to New York, Chicago, and Boston. Those are hard to beat.

training had paid off. We completed our fifth marathon together as a team. Team Humbly Courageous.

Many would see us and think that my husband is just a pusher, doing all the hard physical work. Obviously, he is, but he would never want someone to see us that way. We have been a team from the beginning, and this passion of ours is no different. We support each other, encourage one another and step outside our comfort zones together.

It is not easy to roll by in that giant bike with all eyes on you. We get all kinds of looks and comments. I doubt there is one we have not heard. Mostly, it is admiration, and what we hope most of all ... is that it raises awareness for Muscular Dystrophy and serves as a symbol of hope for others. Our favorite thing is when we pass by someone in a wheelchair and their face just lights up, as if to say, "hey, maybe I could do that too!"

While I may not be able to run on my own two feet, it is our humble courage that provides me with the closest I will ever get to running a marathon in this lifetime.

Next week, we will celebrate 25 years of marriage. While Berlin had many challenges, it was symbolic of our life together. There is always a way to get to the end. You just have to be willing to find it.

• Watch for traffic before crossing any street.

· Avoid costumes that are long, which could cause tripping or costumes that have hard plastic or wood props like swords that could be a hazard.

• Face paint is often a safer alternative to masks that may obstruct vision.

• It is also important to inspect candy before allowing children to have it; dispose of any candy that is unwrapped.







DNR awards community & urban forestry grants

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Division of Forestry has awarded \$238,000 in grants to 10 communities and organizations to support tree planting and maintenance, education, tree inventory, and management projects. Among the recipients is Carmel Clay Parks and Recreation.

The projects were selected by the DNR Community and Urban Forestry (CUF) program and are funded through the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forest Service, Urban & Community Forestry program. Communities and or-

ganizations receiving grants include:

• City of Plainfield: \$25,000

• Carmel Clay Parks and Recreation: \$25,000

• TREES Inc.: \$25,000

• City of West Lafayette: \$24,557

• Town of Nashville: \$20,000

• Indiana Arborist Association: \$14,650

• Indiana University (Indianapolis): \$13,800

Additionally, the DNR awarded a Natural Disaster Recovery grant to Indiana University's Bloomington and Southeast campuses, each of which received \$20,000 to plant trees after a tornado and other severe weather events.

Also, the DNR awarded the city of New Albany a State Urban Forest Resilience grant of \$50,000 to treat ash trees for emerald ash borer (EAB) and to plant trees in locations where EAB killed ash trees.

Fishers woman facing federal charges for fraud & forging federal judge's signature

The REPORTER

A federal grand jury has returned an indictment charging Christi Lee Dodd, 51, Fishers, with wire fraud and forging the signature of a federal judge.

According to the court documents, Dodd first filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy in the Southern District of Indiana in January 2015. In April 2015, a federal bankruptcy judge issued a signed discharge order releasing Dodd from liability for any remaining debts not resolved in the bankruptcy proceedings.

In December 2019, Dodd again filed for Chap-

ter 13 bankruptcy in the ing that she had received Southern District of Indiana, but later decided not to bankruptcy case so that she proceed and moved to have could obtain a line of credthe 2019 case dismissed. In it to pay outstanding debts June 2022, the bankruptcy court dismissed Dodd's 2019 bankruptcy petition. The court did not issue a discharge order in the 2019 case, and none of Dodd's unpaid debts were resolved.

In 2023, Dodd allegedly created and forged a discharge order purporting to absolve her of debts related to her 2019 Chapter 13 bankruptcy petition. Dodd emailed the fraudulent document to a financial institution purportedly prov-

a discharge in her 2019 owed by the trucking business she owned.

The emailed document was purportedly filed in Dodd's second bankruptcy case with the heading, "DISCHARGE OF DEBTOR IN A CHAP-TER 13 CASE." As alleged in the indictment, the forged document was in fact created by Dodd using the discharge order from her first bankruptcy under Chapter 7 and contained the forged signature of the judge who issued the 2015 at the very core of the indischarge order.

"Protecting the integrity and efficiency of the bankruptcy system is an important priority of the Department of Justice," said Zachary A. Myers, United States Attorney for the Southern District of Indiana. "Our office is committed to working closely with our partners at the U.S. Trustee Program to uphold the law and protect the interests of debtors and creditors."

'The filing of a fraudulent court order containing

tegrity of the bankruptcy system and will not be tolerated," said Nancy J. Gargula, United States Trustee for Indiana and the Central and Southern Districts of Illinois (Region 10). "We are grateful for U.S. Attorney Myers and our law enforcement partners for their commitment to protect the integrity of the bankruptcy process in the Southern District of Indiana., as demonstrated by this indictment."

The FBI and U.S. Trustee's Office is investigating this case in collaboration the forged signature of a with the Southern District bankruptcy judge strikes of Indiana Bankruptcy

Fraud Working Group. The United States Trustee Program is the component of the Department of Justice responsible for overseeing the administration of bankruptcy cases and litigating to enforce the bankruptcy laws. If convicted, Dodd faces up to 25 years in federal prison.

U.S. Attorney Myers thanked Assistant U.S. Attorney Adam Eakman, who is prosecuting this case.

An indictment is merely an allegation. All defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.



Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita is taking action to protect states' authority to prohibit sexchange procedures from being performed on minors co-leading a 22-state brief to the U.S. Supreme Court aimed at thwarting the Biden-Harris administration's efforts to override state laws.

"The Biden-Harris administration will stop at nothing to impose its radical transgender ideology on all Americans," AG Rokita said. "But Hoosiers elect state lawmakers to represent their values, and the Indiana General Assembly has passed a law



Rokita brief, the attorneys general support the State of Tennessee's authority to enforce a law that – similar to Indiana's – prohibits medical interventions before age 18 intended to alter boys' or girls' physical appearances so that they resemble members of the opposite sex.

"The leaves to states the right to remotely suggests that the

make decisions about how best to protect children from unproven and risky interventions," AG Rokita said. "Here in Indiana, we have laws rooted in common sense, compassion, and science."

That lack of authority did not prevent the federal government from supporting a lawsuit against Tennessee that claims the Tennessee law violates the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment.

"Nothing in passing the Fourteenth Amendment," Constitution the amicus brief states,"

Equal Protection Clause was meant to override the States' traditional role in regulating medicine."

Joining AG Rokita in leading the amicus brief are the attorneys general of Arkansas and Kentucky. "In our federalist sys-

tem," the brief further observes, "the States get to decide within their borders what interventions are available for boys and girls suffering from gender dysphoria. Tennessee gets to decide that using puberty blockers and hormones ... is not sufficiently safe or beneficial – that long-term it will do more harm than good. No equal-protection challenge can change that."





"These are the laws you are to set before them:

HEBREW SERVANTS

"If you buy a Hebrew servant, he is to serve you for six years. But in the seventh year, he shall go free, without paying anything. If he comes alone, he is to go free alone; but if he has a wife when he comes, she is to go with him. If his master gives him a wife and she bears him sons or daughters, the woman and her children shall belong to her master, and only the man shall go free.


