Eagletown barn holds history

The beautiful red barn north of Eagletown marks the land of the Reynolds family. With the year 1888 emblazoned across the roof, the barn has not only stood witness to nearly 135 years of change in the outskirts of Westfield, but it also holds a collection of that history inside.

Though the barn is not open to the public, owner Randy Reynolds welcomed around 40 people on Tuesday, Oct. 15, at an event hosted by the Westfield Washington Historical Society. Refreshments were served as guests milled around, inside and out, taking in the Reynolds family's collection.

"I just think there are so many unique items here, and

The search for an endgame to tobacco use, part 2

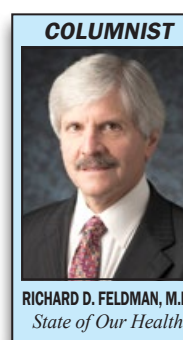
My column last month discussed one of the "endgame" approaches to finally end tobacco smoking. This approach is the "birthdate-based phaseout" of tobacco use whereby people born after a certain date would never be able to legally buy tobacco their entire lives. Over time, this would produce a total phaseout of legal tobacco sales and use.

Here's another endgame approach: The reduction of nicotine in combustible tobacco, either progressively or abruptly, to non-addictive or minimally addictive amounts.

Combustible tobacco is the most toxic of tobacco products. According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration this endgame strategy could result in 13 million smokers quitting over five years; it could prevent 33 million youth and young adults from becoming regular smokers and 8 million tobacco-caused deaths by the end of this century.

In 2009, Congress gave authority to the FDA to comprehensively regulate tobacco and nicotine products including limitation (but not to zero) of the amount of nicotine, the addictive component in tobacco. Although nicotine is not the direct cause of smoking-related diseases, it is integral in causation because nicotine addiction sustains the smoking behavior. Cigarette smoking usually begins in youth and nicotine addiction is important in the transition of adolescent experimentation to a lifetime of smoking.

Hamilton County launches interactive map for nine early voting locations

Program allows voters to see where & when polls are open

As of today, Oct. 23, early voting has expanded to seven additional locations in Carmel, Fishers, and Westfield. Early voting is already taking place in Noblesville at the Judicial Center and 4-H Fairgrounds.

"The beautiful thing about early voting is you can vote anywhere and whenever is most convenient for you," County Elections Administrator Beth Sheller said. "Say you live in Noblesville but find yourself shopping in Carmel.

You can stop in and vote at the Carmel Library. Or if you live in Fishers, but your kids are playing soccer at Grand Park. Drop by Westfield Town Hall."

The Election Office recently teamed up with the Hamilton County GIS team to make find-

ing those locations a bit easier. A new interactive map allows voters to find the early voting locations nearest to them, offering the dates and operating hours of each.

"Working together across departments to create this tool has been incredibly reward-

ing," County Director of Information Technology Chris Mertens said. "Our goal is to make voting easier and more accessible for all residents. It's exciting to see technology being used in a way that benefits our community."

Early voting is available at nine locations throughout the county, with two locations each in Noblesville, Fishers, and Westfield, and three in Carmel. To access the interactive map, voters can visit geohub.hamiltoncounty.in.gov.

Carmel City Council passes \$232.6M budget

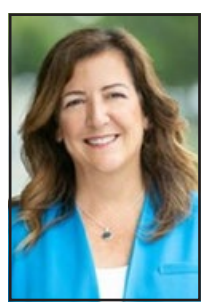
Carmel City Council members approved on Monday night a 2025 budget that aligns with the city's strategic goals and addresses the complex challenges of the growing city.

The approved budget totals \$232.6 million, with a General Fund budget of \$143.9 million. Carmel's budget for 2024 was nearly \$209 million.

"Thanks to broad input from the community and the support of the council, we have aligned our planned spending with our community's evolving needs,"

Mayor Sue Finkam said. "Like any prosperous city, we are addressing competing needs in a time of escalating costs and our budget prepares us to thrive."

In his opening remarks, council president Tony Green, who led the council through a comprehensive review of the budget, was a strong partner in

forward to working with the mayor to ensure dollars are used in an accountable and effective manner."

The 2025 proposed city budget was provided to the council Sept. 1 then was outlined

the process. "I enjoyed having the council debate and discuss details of the budget," Green said, "and look

in budget workshops late last month and was formally introduced to the council on Oct. 7. For the first time, the city pursued a zero-based budgeting model, an approach widely recognized for supporting data-driven, transparent operations, as well as fiscal discipline.

The budget continues strategic investments for the city that supports the Elevate Carmel strategic plan goals including:

- **World-Class Public Safety:** Ensuring unparalleled community protection through

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Butler Blue IV delivers hope to Noblesville's BARN

Max Habel, celebrating his resilience

Butler University's live mascot, **Butler Blue IV**, embarked on a special mission to surprise one high school senior this year with his long-awaited college acceptance letter.

Butler University's beloved mascot has delivered acceptance letters to students nationwide. Still, Monday's trip to Noblesville held a special meaning as it honored a student's resilience and community impact.

The iconic bulldog, adorned in Butler's signature blue and white, approached the Habel home to bring joy to people who've witnessed Max Habel's resilience and generosity.

Evan Krauss, the handler of the bulldog mascot, said outside Habel's front door, "We have Butler Blue IV here, and we have come from Butler University to inform you that you are the first student to be admitted to Butler next year. Congratulations!"

The Noblesville High School senior faced unimaginable adversity when

he lost his father in 2021 to a brain injury suffered from an accidental fall while on a family vacation.

Habel's reaction was a heartwarming mix of disbelief and delight. "I feel like I'm so thankful for this opportunity. I'm excited to be admitted to Butler. It's exceptional that out of all the kids in Indiana, they picked me."

Habel became determined to honor his father's memory by partnering with a nonprofit to create HabelFest, an annual barbecue competition to raise funds for **NeuroHope**, a neurological rehabilitation center.

Krauss said, "Max has used this opportunity to start a nonprofit barbecue competition to raise money for head trauma research. His resilience and strength just blew us away."

Habel said, "It'll be three years ago in like two weeks. But, every year, we host this barbecue competition in downtown Noblesville in Forest Park called **Habel Fest**, and it's extraordinary as we use it to commemorate what he meant to us."

The senior expressed

gratitude toward Butler for the honor and emphasized his desire to continue his advocacy work through his education. Habel said of his father, "I think he would've been impressed. He would've said this was a lot of hard work that paid off, and I think he would've been as excited as I am right

Habel's journey is set to take flight at Butler, where he is destined to continue making a difference, one step at a time.

people have driven by the barn for years not knowing what's here," WWHS Program Coordinator Barbara Day said. "It's kind of a little gem."

Randy Reynolds' great-grandparents built the house where he has lived since 1980, but the family began collecting long before he moved in. Reynolds even ran an antique store for a while.

"I just had too much," Reynolds said. "I was renting four buildings to keep my junk in. I had an auction and sold 99 percent of my stuff."

The remaining one percent that Reynolds chose to keep consists of family heirlooms.

Adding onto the original barn, Reynolds created a space so that his family's collection could be viewed and enjoyed.

"Everything in here has a history to it," Reynolds said.

Each of the hundreds of items has been carefully cleaned and restored and placed in just the perfect spot

for viewing.

Display cases hold everything from a worn book from the 1860s that belonged to Reynolds' great-great-grandmother to a shiny red bicycle that was given to his mother on her 13th birthday.

Reynolds' father worked with Oldsmobile in Noblesville, so there's a collection of Oldsmobile paraphernalia. His father later painted tractors, so there's a sizable collection of miniature tractors.

Coca-Cola. International Harvester. Corvette. Whizzer. Cub Cadet. These brand names and more fill the space from floor to ceiling.

"I didn't make it big enough," Reynolds said. "I can always make it bigger later on."

Up until closing his shop in August, Reynolds worked on cars. But even in retirement, he stays busy.

"I still have projects," he said.

One of those projects is restoring the Corvette he bought the week he graduated from high school.

In 2018, the FDA initiated a regulatory plan to investigate the reduction of nicotine in cigarettes with consideration of the risks and benefits to the entire population, both smokers and non-smokers.

According to Havard public-health professor Howard Koh, the tobacco industry has long contended that combustible tobacco use is about choice, not addiction. On one would think, then, that the industry would support reducing tobacco's nicotine content. This isn't the case.

A big question is whether to reduce nicotine to minimal levels abruptly or gradually. It seems counterintuitive, but smokers in a 2018 *Journal of the American Medical Association* study tolerated an abrupt change well. Abrupt reduction was also associated with greater reductions in smoking, dependence, and increased cessation.

Intuitively, one would also think that smokers who switch to very low nicotine cigarettes would smoke more and inhale more deeply to obtain their needed nicotine fix, thus actually increasing their exposure to tobacco's toxins and carcinogens. However, the FDA notes studies demonstrating that smokers using minimal-dose nicotine cigarettes had difficulty discriminating between typical-cigarette nicotine levels and minimally-addicting levels, reducing their consumption.

For this strategy to work, it would be necessary to reduce nicotine in all combustible tobacco products, not just ciga-

rettes, to prevent product switching. Exclusion of vaping products in the regulation should be considered. Although long-term studies of vapes are lacking, they are still thought to be less toxic than combustible tobacco. It would be important to have non-combustible nicotine products available, possibly including vapes, for those needing transitional nicotine supplementation.

The tobacco industry has been very adept in manipulating the design and composition of cigarettes to maximize addictiveness. Caution must be paid to the industry's response to circumvent the nicotine limitation and undermine its effectiveness.

A recent article in the *New England Journal of Medicine* outlines these potential actions by Big Tobacco: physical and chemical redesign of filters; nicotine-loaded wrappers; tobacco additives to enhance nicotine delivery, bioavailability, or attachment of nicotine to brain nicotine receptors; addition of addictive nicotine derivatives without increasing actual nicotine; and addition of substances that would inhibit the metabolism of nicotine or of the reward neurotransmitter, dopamine, that nicotine ignites.

How this endgame strategy unfolds will be fascinating.

Foster Success expands each to support record number of older foster youth

Indiana nonprofit Foster Success has released a new **Impact Report** showing it has supported more than 1,100 older foster youth throughout the state for the first time, a 10 percent increase over the prior year. The organization also reached young people in 84 percent of Indiana's 92 counties.

“One reason for the growth in the number of young people we’ve supported is the addition of the new M.A.P.S program, which helps connect those who have lived in foster care with immediate mental health services and then works with them to find a longer-term provider,” Foster Success President and CEO Dr. Maggie Stevens said. “According to our most recent impact survey, 60 percent of young people report having a mental health diagnosis. This statistic highlights the pressing need for accessible mental health services, a need

that M.A.P.S. is actively addressing. We also have other programs to address Basic Needs, Educational Success, Financial Empowerment and so much more.”

The impact survey shows that 70 percent of young people supported by Foster Success are at or below the federal poverty level. Foster Success distributed more than \$1.3 million to older foster youth across all programs to help them pull themselves out of poverty and into stable housing and jobs.

Board Chair Kate Hussey hints that more growth is on the horizon for Foster Success.

“In our new strategic plan, we are expanding our programs and services to better support teens and young adults with lived experience in foster care, guiding them on their path to self-sufficiency,” Hussey said.

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Hamilton County Historical Society seeking two new board members

The Board of Directors for the Hamilton County Historical Society is seeking volunteers for a Vice President and Treasurer.

The Historical Society, which is run by a 13-person board that includes a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and nine at-large members, manages the Historic Sheriff's Residence and Jail Museum on the square in Noblesville, the Museum Director, and regular Society business that includes events, fundraising, and caring for a historic collection of artifacts related to Hamilton County history. It's an exciting time to be involved as the society is establishing a strategic plan and also helps convene a county-wide history organization collaborative group.

Potential board members should meet the summarized criteria below, a full copy of which is available upon request. The board is especially seeking people with some nonprofit experience, either in grant applications, managing accounts, or other related tasks.

Diversity statement

The Hamilton County Historical Society seeks to represent all history of the county. This includes geographically (all nine townships) as well as demographically. As the society works to tell the story of Hamilton County, the board should reflect this diversity and diverse candidates are encouraged to apply.

Length of term

At-large board member terms are for three years and officer terms are for two years. President and Vice-President are limited to three consecutive terms. (Note: the open seats include two officer terms – both of which are a single year, January to December 2025, then subject to re-election for a traditional two-year term.)

Time commitment

Must be able to attend a majority of board meetings, on the first Tuesday evening of most months, volunteer for at least one event held during each year, and assist the museum director for at least two shifts each year at the museum during regular open hours from noon to 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Other requirements

Must live in Hamilton County or have significant business or personal interests in the area, and a knowledge of Hamilton County or Midwest history is a major bonus. Also must pass a provided background check to volunteer at events.

Expectations

In addition to bringing enthusiasm to the society and preparing for meetings in advance, board members should advocate for the museum and its strategic principles.

A further description of the Vice President position is as follows:

The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of the President and shall chair the Program Committee if the VP does not appoint a chair. Ideally, the Vice President would serve as a coordinator for grant applications.

A further description of the Treasurer position is as follows:


The Treasurer shall keep correct and complete records of accounts and shall present a financial report at all regularly scheduled Board meetings and at the annual meeting of the membership. The Treasurer shall make all financial books and records available for inspection at reasonable times to any member of the Board. The Treasurer shall prepare and file or have prepared and filed on behalf of the HCHS any reports that may be required to maintain the HCHS in good standing under the law. The Finance Committee may conduct an audit of the books internally or externally. (Details on the extent of financial holdings available upon request.)

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Questions remain about budget, future tax rates in Sheridan reorganization effort

As the proposed reorganization between Sheridan and Adams Township has developed over the past several months, we have continued to ask questions and provide information to local leaders and our constituents.

Most recently, when Sheridan and Adams Township published their budget notices, we raised questions about the need to include a combined budget or tax levy impact for a reorganized Sheridan, which are required by state law.

They subsequently corrected those mistakes, and a new budget has been published.

However, the now-corrected budget still does not address questions concerning the adequacy of the budget and impact on future tax rates.

As we have stated before, it appears that the budgets do not provide sufficient funding for critical public safety and infrastructure services that are currently provided to unincorporated Adams Township by the county. We have based this on the county's costs to patrol the 100 miles of roads within the area, as well as the costs to maintain and improve these roads, repair and replace small bridges and culverts, conduct snow removal operations, fund capital projects, undertake water conservation efforts and more.

Because these services appear to be underfunded, if reorganization is approved, area residents would likely either pay higher taxes than advertised or see a reduction in the scope or quality of services provided, especially for roads. The county would, however, consider an interlocal agreement to provide road maintenance if the county could maintain the roads to our standards and if the reorganized town would cover all expenses.

The state Department of Local Government Finance also reported that costs not fully accounted for in the budgets could affect taxes and other services.

We have shared this information publicly, most recently at a meeting last month in Sheridan, and directly with the local leaders of Sheridan and Adams Township multiple times. Minutes from the September meeting, fact sheets and presentation materials have all been published on our website at [this link](#).

Ultimately, we want to ensure that the taxpayers in unincorporated Adams Township understand the impact of the reorganization plan and that they may ultimately pay the higher tax rate that current town residents pay. The reorganization plan states “all residents would also

be responsible for the tax rate associated with the town district.” Even if that is not what is intended, the reorganization plan allows the future town council to convert or reclassify unincorporated Adams Township into the town tax district without the obligation to provide services or other protections from annexation.

Importantly, residents within those areas may not have the ability to remonstrate against future reclassification other than to ask town councilors to vote against it. While reclassifying unincorporated Adams Township property into the town tax district will allow a reorganized Sheridan to raise the additional revenue to fund services that are underfunded in their proposed budget, it will also mean higher taxes

for those property owners.

As your county commissioners, we will continue to ask questions, answer your questions and provide any information we can about the proposed reorganization and how

it may impact you.

Indiana hospitals conserving resources amid national IV fluid shortage

Emergency care & urgent surgeries remain unaffected; some non-emergent procedures may be rescheduled to preserve supplies

Indiana hospitals are closely monitoring the ongoing national shortage of IV fluids that has impacted hospitals and health care providers across the country. While hospitals are experiencing varying degrees of impact related to the shortage, recent delays in shipments from third-party vendors have forced some hospitals to reassess their stock levels and prioritize their current supply for patients in critical need.

"Despite Baxter's return to 60 percent production, and the incoming shipments from international suppliers, it could take weeks until some hospitals begin receiving their allocation of IV fluids," Indiana Hospital Association

(IHA) Interim President Blake Dye said.

Indiana hospitals have implemented comprehensive conservation plans, which include reviewing and optimizing fluid use for each patient, exploring alternative therapies, and prioritizing the available supply for critical care.

While hospitals are working to ensure continued care for Hoosier patients, some are having to reschedule elective and non-emergent procedures as part of their efforts to preserve supplies. In these cases, patients will be notified by their provider to reschedule their care.

Emergency care and urgent surgeries remain unaffected.

"We're certainly not

alone in this predicament as this is a nationwide shortage impacting every state," Dye said. "Hoosiers should feel confident that Indiana's hospitals are managing through the current situation, taking proactive measures that are aligned with clinical best practices, and are working diligently to minimize the impact on patient care."

IHA continues to work closely with its 174 member hospitals, the Indiana Department of Health (IDOH), and the American Hospital Association, who is in frequent discussions with officials from Baxter, their distributors, and the federal administration to assess current supply levels and convey the impact of the disruption

In statewide issues, Rokita prosecuted two separate defendant/cases accused of trying to defraud financially distressed Hoosier homeowners; added regulations to the “charitable bail industry” and preventing these bailout industries from bailing out anyone charged with a violent crime in Indiana, as well as anyone with a past conviction for a violent crime who is charged with any new felony; warned three cities and one county to rescind their sanctuary city policies as the flood of illegal immigrants harms all Hoosier tax-

payers financially; and released a multi-year analysis of COVID-19 data, shedding light on a great deal of misinformation about the pandemic that has been long accepted as factual. The data found statistics inflated by counting people who died with COVID as having died because of COVID.

Rokita advocated in an 18-state brief for the result of the Supreme Court’s decision that presidents cannot be prosecuted for official actions taken while serving, as that kind of manipulation is wrong and dangerous to our republic.

Rokita led the fight to protect and defend civilian access to ammunition with several states. This also involved supporting military contractor Lake City Ammunition and its 1,700 workers operating at maximum capacity. The civilian law-abiding gun owners who buy Lake City ammunition are subsidizing national defense and military readiness.

Rokita co-led 17 states in asking a federal appeals court to rule in favor of defending a former Brownsburg High School teacher forced to

resign because he declined to use the preferred names and pronouns of transgender students. This violated this teacher’s religious liberty and forced a good teacher to resign when teachers are in short supply.

Todd Rokita is co-leading a multistate lawsuit against invasive federal encroachment efforts that would undermine state regulatory authority over surface coal mining and reclamation. Coal mining is essential for the health of this nation’s energy industry, economy, and national security.

Todd Rokita and Iowa Attorney General are co-leading a 22-state letter calling on Congress to pass the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (“SAVE”) Act, which prohibits individuals who are ineligible to vote, like illegal aliens, from doing so.

These state and federal cases represented by Todd Rokita and other attorney generals show how they are supporting and protecting American citizens who truly care about and love our country.

If the audience's reaction at Thursday night's preview of Zach&Zack's production of *Richard O'Brien's The Rocky Horror Show* is any indication, this show is anything but horrific. It is in fact, dare I say, sex-sational!

Much like *The Rocky Horror Show*, Zach&Zack – led by Zack Neiditch and Zach Rosing – have developed their own cult following. The dynamic duo has produced or collaborated on several standout productions, such as *Heathers*, *Bat Boy*, *The Great Bike Race*, *Mad, Mad Hercules*, and *Hedwig and the Angry Inch*, among others. I am sure this production, their fourth or fifth remounting, will only deepen their following.

In my opinion, this show, directed by Zack Neiditch, checks all the boxes for me:

1. Solid pre-show playlist, check.
2. Powerhouse opening number, check.
3. An amazingly talented band led by Musical Director Tené B. C. Karimu, check.
4. Audience participa-

tion – although limited and guided, check.

5. Creative use of technology, check.

6. Fabulous costumes by Anthony James Sirk, check.

7. Sultry and sexy choreography by Kenny Shepard, check.

8. Dynamic vocals, check, check, check, check, and check!

While everyone in the cast shines in their own ways, some of my favorites included:

1. Matthew Altman's portrayal of Columbia. After seeing him do his thing in the ensemble year after year, it was nice to watch him living his best life in a role he was born to play.

2. Logan Hill as Janet is equal parts Sunday school teacher and naughty school-girl.

3. Elizabeth Gee and Matt Branic deliver the best vocals of the night, hands down, by far, no contest.

4. Tim Hunt is playfully sexy and delightfully charming as Dr. Frank-N-Furter ... almost too charming. By the end of the show, I asked myself, "Why do they want to kill that charming man, who is fulfilling everyone's fantasies, and throws a festive

Anderson accountant sentenced to federal prison for embezzling nearly \$1M from his employer

Nathaniel Wills, 34, Anderson, has been sentenced to 41 months in federal prison, followed by three years of supervised release, and ordered to pay \$877,507 in restitution after pleading guilty to wire fraud.

According to court documents, for nearly six years, Wills was employed as an accountant and Director of Administration for an Indiana business. In these roles, he was entrusted with performing business accounting functions including among other things, writing and signing checks, making electronic payments, performing reconciliations between the company's accounting and banking records, and maintaining the company's accounting ledgers.

Beginning in August 2020, and continuing un-

til at least February 2022, Wills defrauded his employer by transferring nearly \$1 million to which he knew he was not entitled from the company's payroll and operating accounts to his personal bank accounts.

The stolen funds were used to pay off his outstanding personal debts and for his own personal use, including online gambling.

In an attempt to conceal his scheme, Wills made false entries in the company's accounting system by recording that transfers of funds were payments of invoices, falsifying inventory logs, listing jobs as unpaid, and voiding checks. He also obtained a principal advance of \$80,000 from his employer's line of credit in order to meet the company's payroll and vendor pay-

ment obligations.

In total, Wills stole approximately \$952,237.06 from his employer through 120 transactions. Wills' conduct resulted in substantial financial hardship to the company.

“For a year and a half, this defendant repaid the trust of his employer with deceit and theft, helping himself to nearly \$1 million and cooking the books to hide the evidence,” said Zachary A. Myers, U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of Indiana. “Fraud and embezzlement can have devastating effects on the victim individuals and companies. The federal prison sentence imposed here demonstrates that those who commit financial crimes will pay a serious price. I commend the FBI and our federal prosecutors for their efforts to investigate these crimes

and hold the defendant accountable.”

“This was not just a financial crime but an act of betrayal of the defendant's employer that could have had a devastating and crippling effect on the business and its employees,” said FBI Indianapolis Special Agent in Charge Herbert J. Stapleton. “Anyone who believes they can steal without consequence will find out the FBI aggressively pursues those who exploit their positions of trust for personal gain to ensure they are held accountable.”

The FBI investigated this case. The sentence was imposed by U.S. District Judge James P. Hanlon.

U.S. Attorney Myers thanked Assistant U.S. Attorneys Meredith Wood and Tiffany J. Preston, who prosecuted this case.

Guerin Catholic hosts first-time opponent West Vigo

Class 3A Sectional 29: West Vigo (4-5) at 3A No. 14 Guerin Catholic (4-5)

The Guerin Catholic Golden Eagles get to work in sectional play at home and face a first-time opponent. The West Vigo Vikings hail from West Terre Haute and are part of the Western Indiana Conference, Green Division.

Guerin started the season 3-0 with wins at home over McCutcheon (36-17), at Lebanon (35-31) and back at home over Heritage Christian (53-34).

Then, the meat of the schedule showed its grit. The Golden Eagles lost four in a row mid-season against Brebeuf Jesuit (69-62), at Roncalli (38-23), at Bishop Chatard (48-13) and at home versus Pike (42-3).

The Brebeuf game saw numerous school and state records be set by quarterback Malcolm Houze with 40 completions, 56 attempts and 638 yards and eight TD passes and wide receiver Hayden Cler, who also set a single-game national record for receptions (26) in a game. That went along with his 396 yards and six touchdown catches.

Since then, the ship has been turned around. With a convincing win at Class 5A Terre Haute North (41-18), strides were made in a heartbreaking loss at Class 2A No. 1 Lafayette Central Catholic (22-21) to close out the regular season. Guerin held the lead until the Knights mounted a comeback late in the game.

Senior Malcolm Houze leads the offense by completing 157 of 257 passes

(61.1 percent) for 1,955 yards, with 23 TDs and just five interceptions. He's also ran 57 times for 366 yards and another eight scores.

Junior Jack Linden leads the backfield with 740 yards on 148 carries and five touchdowns. Freshman Kolbe Klee has come on since mid-season, rushing 50 for 239 and has also caught seven for 50 yards.

Senior Hayden Cler is on top of the receivers chart, catching 61 for 781 yards and 10 TDs. Sophomore Aidan Horn has 29 receptions for 424 yards and seven touchdowns, while junior Trevor Macey has 22 for 342 and four scores and senior Julian Melendez 12 for 135 at the tight end position.

Defensively, Guerin is anchored by senior Dylan Vargas (97 tackles), junior Aidan Ferry (eight pass deflections) and senior Dominic Elliott with 88 each. Junior Quentin Klee has 84 stops and senior Elias Niccum 66 and seven sacks.

Aaron Clements is in his third season with West Vigo and is 10-20. Overall, Clements is 18-32 with two previous seasons at Tell City (8-12) in 2018-19 before heading to Terre Haute.

The Vikings are led by quarterback Landon Fields. The junior is 45 of 96 passing for 724 yards with four TDs and six interceptions. Fields has also run 32 times for 130 and a score.

A run first offense, Jacob Dewey is the leading rusher with 909 yards on 134 runs (6.8 average). The tandem of Ryan Cobb (505) and Connor Wallace (480) help account for the 2,114 rushing yards as a team for a 7.1 yard per carry average.

Carmel's Bao and Mu headed all the way up to La Porte for their regional try and won both matches easily. The Greyhounds took care of the Lowell team of senior Cooper Benton and sophomore Dylan Bisacchi 6-0, 6-0 in the semis, then beat Seeger sophomores James Cooksey and Macyn Hughes 6-2, 6-1 in the championship.

Carmel High School's JD Stein commits to Wake Forest University

CARMEL – JD Stein, Carmel High School's senior shortstop, started playing baseball at the young age of four, and he hasn't looked back since.

"Hitting apples in my grandparents' backyard, it was kind of my thing, I loved it," Stein said. "I kept playing, worked hard, and didn't take many days off, still don't."

Stein talked to News 8's Phil Sanchez over the phone while he was at a baseball tournament in Florida.

Stein's hard work paid off as he announced his commitment to play for Wake Forest University next year.

"Right when I stepped on campus, it was kind of a different feel," Stein said. "All the guys have the same external goal of winning. There's not one thing they do that's not competitive, even ping pong in the clubhouse, it's all competitive, and that's who I am. I feed into that."

His commitment to a Power Five school came as no surprise to anyone. Stein originally committed to Louisville when he was in the eighth grade, but decommitted earlier this year.

"I was really young when I committed to Louisville, and I didn't explore any other options," Stein said. "So, I just wanted to step back and make sure I make the right decision."

Prep Baseball Reports ranks Stein as the 10th best player in Indiana for the class of 2025, but even with so much success early on, there were still naysayers.

"There have been some people who said I was too small or not built enough, but you can't worry about that," Stein said. "You just have to keep working."

It's a mindset that he developed while working with his hitting coach and Chicago White Sox Scouting Director Mike Shirley, who is from Anderson, Indiana.
