I had to face another “never” – I said years ago that I’d “never” have a business partner after witnessing a bad experience. My

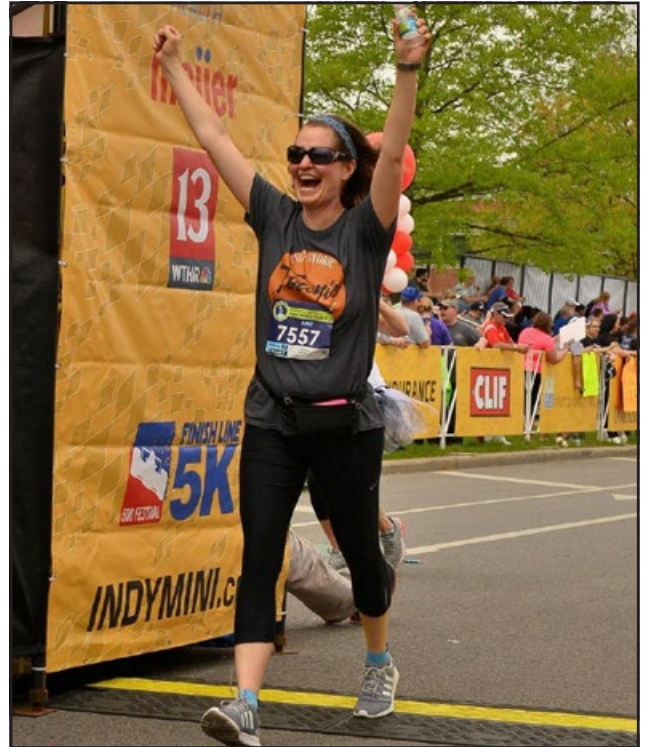

# Indiana State Police partners with DEA for 27<sup>th</sup> Drug Take Back Day

On Saturday, Oct. 26, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) is sponsoring the 27th nationwide “Prescription Drug Take Back” initiative. The “Take Back” initiative seeks to prevent prescription drug abuse and theft through proper disposal of prescription drugs.

Collection sites will be set up nationwide for expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs which will be properly disposed of without threat to the environment. This program is for liquid and pill medications. Vaping pens without batteries and vaping cartridges will also be taken. Needles, new or used, WILL NOT be accepted for disposal.

This service is free and anonymous with no questions asked.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates

of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines – flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash – pose potential safety and health hazards.

As in the past, unwanted medications may be dropped off at any Indiana State Police Post, except for the Toll Road Post. The event will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 26.

## Indiana ballot question would remove obsolete office from line of succession

Indiana voters face an unusual ballot question as they go to the polls this fall.

The question asks voters to amend Indiana’s constitution to remove the superintendent of public instruction from the line of succession to the governor’s office. Under **Article 5, Section 10 of the Indiana Constitution**, the superintendent of public instruction is the seventh and final official in the line of succession, after the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the House, the president pro tempore of the Senate, the state treasurer, the state auditor (now known as the state comptroller) and the secretary of state.

State lawmakers replaced that office, which was elected, with an appointed secretary of education, effective in 2021. Rep. J.D. Prescott, R-Union City, said the line of succession should only include officials who have already been vetted by voters.

“Just simply given the fact that the governor’s office is an elected position by the voters of the state, a statewide elected office, I think it’s important to have a path for anybody that’s in that position to be somebody that’s at least have to be vetted by the citizens of the state,” he said.

Prescott in 2023 **wrote the resolution** that put the question on the ballot. It passed both chambers of the General Assembly unanimously. Prescott and Rep. Ed DeLaney, D-Indianapolis, said it’s very unlikely the state would ever need to go that far down the line of succession. DeLaney said the amendment would have no substantive effect.

“It really doesn’t make sense to have an unelected person on the list of successors to the governor. It’s that simple,” DeLaney said. “I would say we should never have put that office on that list, but we did and we’re just cleaning up the constitution.”

Any succession beyond the lieutenant governor likely would be temporary. The constitution requires the General Assembly to meet within 48 hours and elect a new governor if the offices of both the governor and the lieutenant governor are vacant. The person they choose must come from the same political party as the governor they replace.

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 5. Early voting continues until noon on Monday, Nov. 4.



### Hamilton County legislators: paid Statehouse internship applications close soon

The Oct. 31 deadline to apply for an Indiana House Republican internship during the 2025 legislative session is fast approaching, according to area lawmakers.

House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said this full-time, spring semester internship is Monday through Friday at the Statehouse in Indianapolis during the legislative session, which will start in January and conclude in April. House interns earn \$900 biweekly and can gain academic credit through their college or university.

“Developing skills through an internship is essential for young Hoosiers to gain experience and explore different careers,” Huston said. “No matter your major or job interest, a House Republican internship can be a launching point for your future.”

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers) said interested college sophomores, juniors, seniors, graduate students, and recent graduates of all majors should visit [indianahousepublicans.com/internship](http://indianahousepublicans.com/internship) to complete the application before Oct. 31.

“Interns get to network with lawmakers, business owners and other professionals in the public and private sectors from around the state,” Jeter said. “I encourage students of all majors to apply now for this experience and opportunity to build their resume.”

State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville) said Indiana House internships include free parking, career and professional development assistance, and enrollment access to an Indiana

government class. Interns are also eligible to apply for a competitive \$3,000 scholarship to use toward undergraduate and graduate expenses.

“Hands-on learning opportunities like internships not only boost students’ resumes, but also help them develop tangible skills that can translate to any career path,” Goodrich said. “This is a great opportunity for young Hoosiers to set them apart from other candidates in today’s highly competitive job market.”

State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) said the program offers opportunities for students to work in various departments related to their studies, including legislative operations, policy, and communications.

“This program provides unique opportunities for young professionals to develop their skills and learn more about different policy and public service,” Schaibley said. “Interns help full-time staff prepare documents, press releases and handouts that legislators can use when they meet with constituents and stakeholders to better inform their communities about the work being done at the Statehouse.”

“A strong education paired with an internship experience makes a graduate even more marketable to future employers,” State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel) said. “No matter your interests, interning with Indiana House Republicans can open doors to many possibilities in the public and private sectors.”

# Noblesville reader makes detailed case for Crosser, Lambert & Richardson

Dear Editor:  
I'm writing to express my support for three candidates for the Noblesville School Board: Christi Crosser, Stephanie Lambert, and Bret Richardson. I am an engaged parent of three Noblesville Schools students, an active volunteer and mentor in the school district, a Miller Ambassador, a graduate of NHS, a lifelong Noblesville resident, and a Conservative.

While the other slate proclaims to be the "Conservative Choice" (in this "non-partisan" race), that proclamation is certainly not enough to earn my vote, and I hope it's not enough to earn yours, either. I attended both the Noblesville Common Council and the student-led Noblesville High School candidate forums (which you can watch online), and there are four key areas in which Christi, Stephanie, and Bret stand out: Engagement, Preparation, Leadership, and Vision.

# National Weather Service updates cold weather alerts for Indiana’s winter

Central Indiana typically has a few “wind chill warnings” or “wind chill advisories” in a given winter.

Those terms, however, will no longer be issued as the National Weather Service (NWS) makes changes to its cold weather alerts for this upcoming winter.

The goal of the changes is to clarify that cold can be dangerous with or without wind.

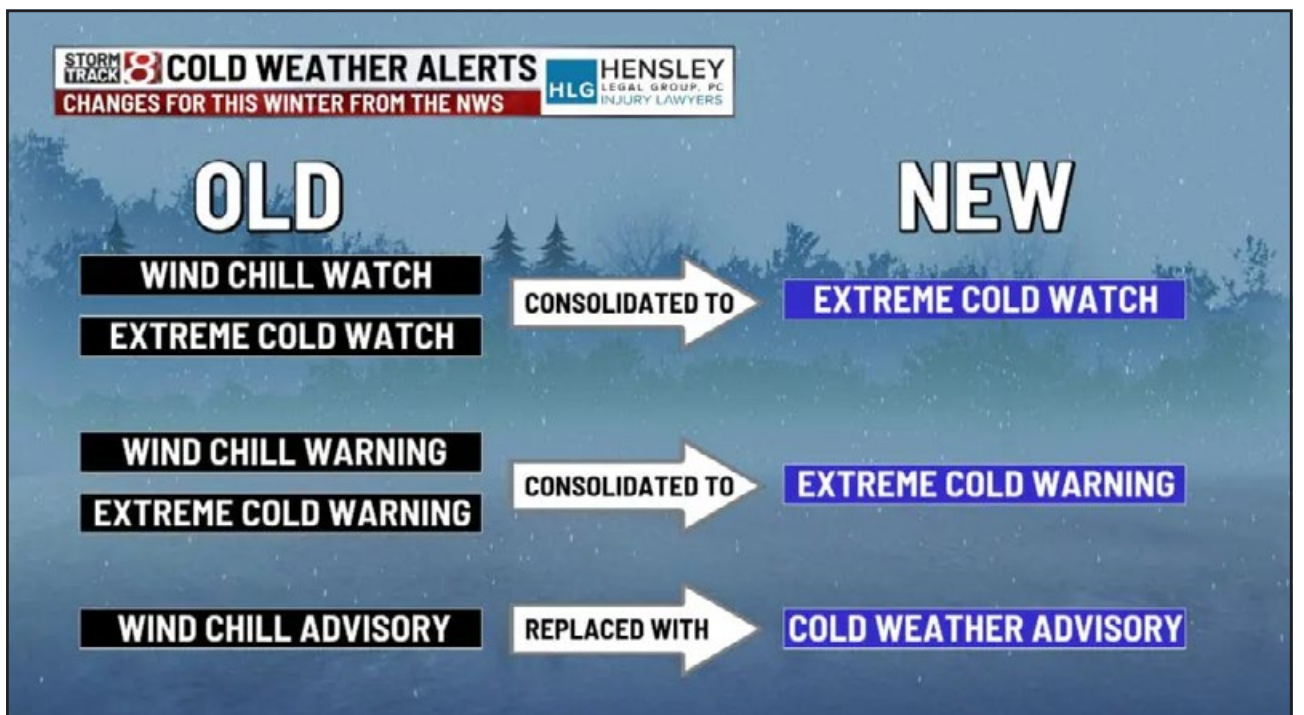
A wind chill watch has been consolidated with an extreme cold watch to become an extreme cold watch. Wind chill advisories have been replaced altogether with cold weather advisories. Finally, the wind chill warning and extreme cold warning

have been merged into an extreme cold warning.

Extreme cold warnings are issued when dangerously cold air with or without wind is expected. In Indiana, the threshold is different because we have multiple NWS offices that cover the state. For central Indiana, an air temperature or wind chill of -20 degrees will trigger this type of warning.

Cold weather advisories are less severe than extreme cold warnings. Wind chill values of air temperatures in the range of -10 degrees to -19 degrees will prompt these advisories in central Indiana.

Extreme cold watches will be used when cold air with or without wind is possible. When these are issued, be sure to follow



the forecast closely in the coming days. This type of cold alert would be issued prior to an extreme cold

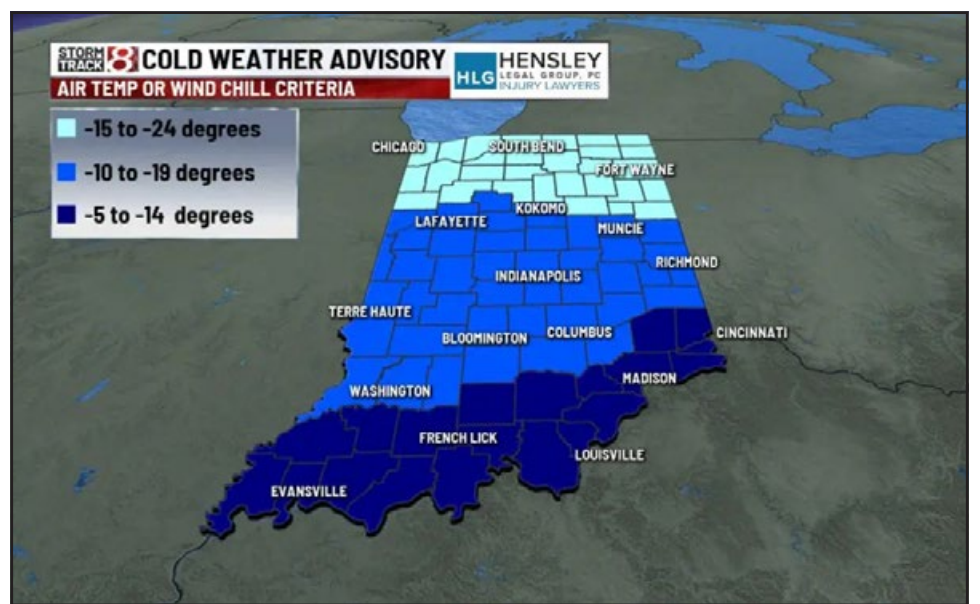
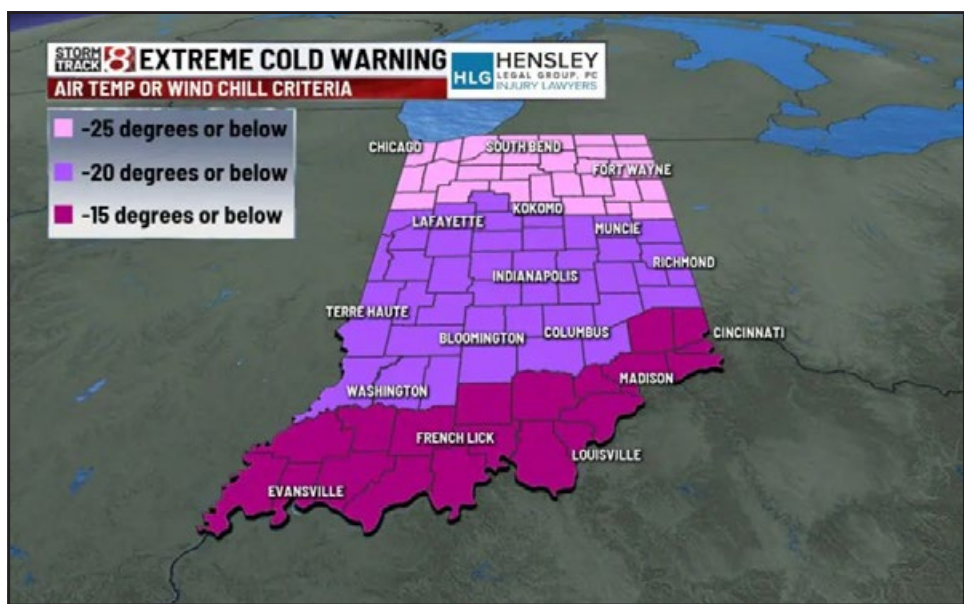
warning or a cold weather advisory.

# Sheridan gets set for clash with HHC rival Clinton Central

### Class 1A Sectional 46: Sheridan (4-5) at Clinton Central (3-6)

The Blackhawks on are a quest for a third straight sectional championship and it starts tonight in Michigantown at Clinton Central. This will be the 43rd time that Sheridan faces the Bulldogs and has a commanding 38-4 lead in the overall series.

Winning all but four in the series, Sheridan has won 14 straight against Clinton Central and hasn't lost to the Bulldogs since 2009.

Legendary head coach Bud Wright leads the Blackhawks in his 59th season at Sheridan, where he's 460-215. He has an overall record of 461-218 in 60 seasons as the all-time leader in the state of Indiana.

Sheridan started off the season rough at 0-2 with a home loss to Class 2A No. 8 Western Boone (35-14) and on the road at Class 1A No. 13 North Miami (27-17).

Hoosier Heartland Conference victories over Tri-Central (29-0), this same Clinton Central squad (43-26) and Clinton Prairie (24-6) got them to a 3-2 record.

The three-game win streak snapped in the Blackhawks' first loss to Taylor, 12-11. But they bounced back on the road at Delphi the following week with a 21-7 win.

Sheridan's searching for answers heading into sectional play with two consecutive losses to end the regular season to Eastern 38-23 and on the road at Carroll 28-0.

It's been a combination of senior Owen Bell and sophomore Brock Hagan at the quarterback spot. The two have completed 35 of 85 passes for 503 yards for

seven touchdowns and seven interceptions.

Alex Cravens has established himself as the main running back, carrying 159 times for 678 yards and seven touchdowns. Jaylen Arnold helps give the one-two punch with 91 carries for 520 yards and three TDs to his credit. Jon Barnes also has 315 on 58 runs to help add to the team total of 1,866 rushing yards.

Caleb Alexander (194 yards) and Dayne Voegel (165) each have eight receptions. Alexander has three touchdowns and Voegel two.

Defensively, Voegel is the leading tackler with 75 and two fumble recoveries. Cravens is second with 61, while Owen Treitsch and Jacob Hall each are at 59 and Jaden Dunbar 55. Landon Moffitt has a team best two interceptions and Brody Heck 12 pass deflections.

Head coach Jeremy

Fendley is in his second season leading the Bulldogs, with a 4-14 record.

The Bulldogs got off to a 2-0 start with wins at Frankfort (41-22) and at home over Faith Christian (68-0).

Clinton Central then lost two in a row at Clinton Prairie (28-26) and a home game with Sheridan (43-26). They squeezed in win number three over Taylor (48-6) on Sept. 20.

Over the final four games of the regular season, they lost at Eastern 18-0 and Carroll 45-6, along with two road games at Delphi (44-21) and Tri-Central (35-13) to close out the regular season.

Klayton Stevens runs the offense at quarterback. Stevens has completed 33 of 75 passes for 541 yards with six TDs and three interceptions.

Creed Mennen is the face of the CC offense. Mennen has 70 carries for 554 yards (7.9 average) and eight

touchdowns. Amrin Barrett has 80 for 527 and seven scores, while Stevens has run the most with 94 to total 445 yards and four TDs.

Mennen is also the leading receiver with 14 receptions for 246 yards and another three scores. Luke Shelley has also scored three times on his 11 catches for 204 yards.

Nate Wells' 76 tackles lead the defense, while also grabbing an interception and recovering a fumble. Collin Washburn is second with 69 stops with two sacks and a pair of interceptions. Shelley has 56 tackles, two picks and a fumble recovery, while Mennen has 42 stops and three interceptions.

Sheridan is looking for its second sectional championship in a row and 22nd overall. Clinton Central has not won a sectional since 2009 and has four in its football history.

# Millers make progress in second year at state meet

For the second year in a row, the Noblesville boys tennis team made it to the state finals.

The Millers were again one of the final eight teams left standing in Indiana when the state quarterfinals began last Friday at North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center. Noblesville's season came to an end in the quarters, as it lost to Jasper, the same result as the year before.

But there was tangible progress made by the Millers at the state meet. In 2023, Noblesville was swept by the Wildcats 5-0. This season, the Millers picked up a match victory, a satisfying win for senior Ethan Feliciano at No. 1 singles. Noblesville Coach Chris Pyle said the other matches were also competitive.

"Overall, we were much more competitive than last year," said Pyle. "We didn't stick out like a sore thumb. This year, four of the five courts, you can say that we were very competitive, and we ended up winning a match, which is awesome."

Feliciano beat Jasper's Joel Levy 6-2, 6-4, making history as the first Millers player to win a match at the state tournament. After his victory, Feliciano said that was the best he ever played and his coaches agreed.

"He had the hardest job on the team, and that's to be the best player because you're going against everybody's best," said Pyle. "Every team has a good 1 singles, so you have no nights off at that position. For a couple weeks, he was not playing his best. Over the past week, we had really sat down with him and we came up with a plan that

suiting his strengths, and he executed it to a tee against Jasper."

In the other matches, No. 2 singles Zane Panning lost 6-2, 6-4 and No. 3 singles Max Habel dropped a tough match 6-4, 6-7 (3), 10-7, with the last set a 10-point super tiebreak. Both are seniors, along with Feliciano. Despite the tough competition, Feliciano finished the season with 10 wins. Panning and Habel each collected 18 wins.

Also graduating is Jack Brenneman, who played No. 1 doubles with junior Dane Campbell. They fell to Jasper's Eli Flick and Caleb Schnarr 7-5, 6-3; the Wildcats duo will play in the individual state tournament that begins today at Park Tudor.

The Millers' No. 2 doubles team were juniors Parker Stallings and Dustin Turpin. They lost 6-2, 6-3 but will return next season along with Campbell.

"I'm really excited to see how Dane, Parker and Dustin fit into the equation (next season)," said Pyle. "All three of them can play singles, all three of them can play doubles. I think we'll be a versatile team again."

Now that the Millers have established a standard, Pyle wants to make sure that success becomes the norm at Noblesville. The coach said he thinks the Millers are "at a point where we're going to be a pretty good team every year. If we're a top 20 team every year, I'll be happy."

"We're just going to reload players," said Pyle. The coach said there are players coming in every year playing at a high level that just need to get some experience on junior varsity before
