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Scouting For Food to fill shelves at Open Doors Rollercoaster prayers

On Saturday, Nov. 2 from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., Westfield residents are likely to see Scouts strolling their neighborhoods.

Westfield Scouting America Boys Troop 107 and Girls Troop 1070 will be holding their annual Scouting For Food on Sat., Nov. 2. From 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., Scouts will be canvassing Westfield neighborhoods to gather nonperishable food items to stock the critically low shelves of Open Doors of Westfield.

"We have partnered with Open Doors for well over 20 years with a fall food drive and collected thousands of pounds of food each year to be distributed to Westfield families in need," Troop 1070 Committee Chair Barry Simpson said.

Last November, they collected and sorted more than 4,000 pounds of food. This year, the troops will be joined


A look at our Civil War past: the Hamilton County Quartermasters

Hamilton County has a rich history when it comes to the American Civil War.

If you were to walk through Crownland Cemetery in Noblesville, you would be reminded of what I mean, beginning with the 28.5-foot marble Civil War Monument that sits in the cemetery along Monument Street. If you could make them out, you would find nearly 2,400 names etched into the monument, listing the men from Hamilton County who volunteered to fight to keep our nation from permanently fracturing.

The Civil War lasted for four years: from 1861 to 1865. These four years changed our nation and changed the world. When the war first started, President Lincoln called for a volunteer army of 75,000 to be raised to put down the rebellion of the South. Although many states were reluctant to go to war, Hoosier men flocked to Indianapolis to volunteer. Men from Hamilton County were among the first to sign up to join the fight.

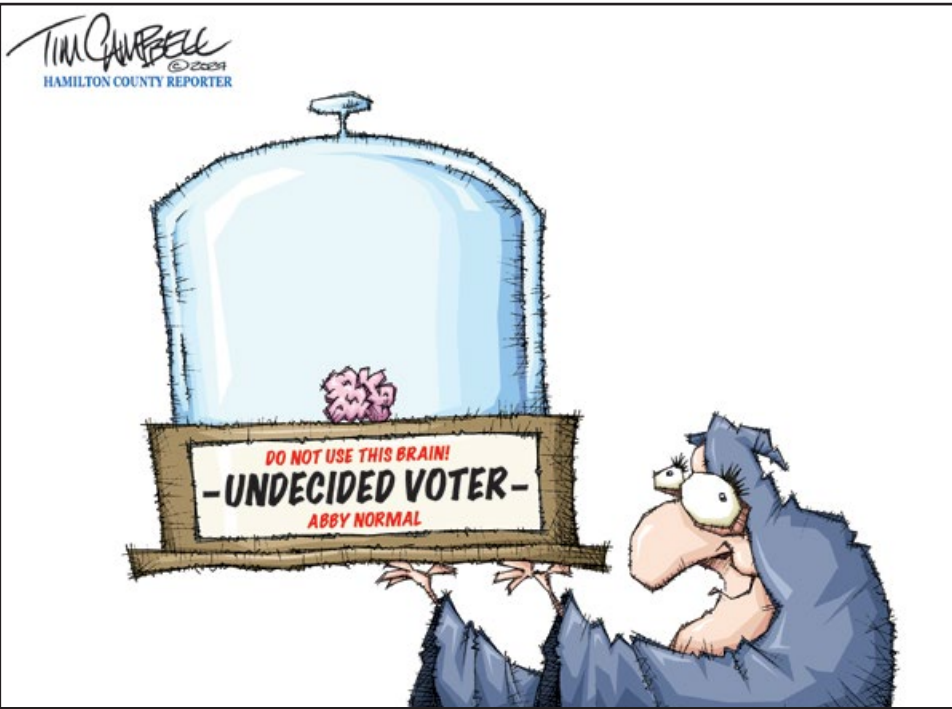

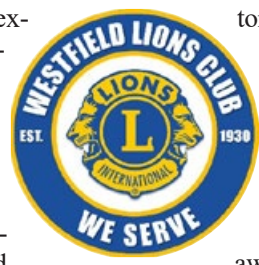
to Lions for exceptional dedication and service to others in accord with the mission of Indiana Lions Speech & Hearing, Incorporated.

Initially, this was thought to be a short-term war. Lincoln asked for a three-month commitment. It did not take long to realize that the Civil War would last much longer and require many more volunteers. By the end of the war, 210,000 Hoosier men had joined the war effort. One out of every 10 men of the 2.1 million soldiers and sailors of the Union forces were from Indiana. Sixty-three percent of men in the state between the ages of 15 and 50 took part in the war.

In order to sustain the needs of this vast volunteer army, a highly organized military structure was formed. Particularly for the Federal Army, everything that was needed to move, equip, feed, house and support soldiers was packed up and taken in wagon trains. Think of it as a big box store on wheels. Since the war was largely supplied by the states, not the federal government, it became imperative that the men in charge of maintaining all these necessary goods be shrewd businessmen, well connected with merchants back home.

That is where the quartermaster fit into the scheme.

Each regiment was assigned a quartermaster who made sure all the goods were organized, stored, dispersed and accounted for. They were in charge of meeting the needs of 1,000 men. They were responsible for all the livestock and pack animals (there were three million horses and mules used in the war), wagons, food, clothing, tents, weapons and ammunition, medicine, payroll, and burial of the dead. Without them, the North would have never prevailed against the South. This was well known by a former regimental quartermaster, General Ulysses S. Grant, and he used it to defeat the South.

If you wander into Crownland Cemetery and take a look at the Civil War Monument, you will notice that two quartermasters are listed near the top of the “Register of the Heroes of Hamilton County.” Captain William A. Wainwright of the Indiana 75th Volunteer Infantry and Lieutenant William Henry Conner of the Indiana 101st Infantry (the son of William Conner who help found Noblesville) are both listed in the scroll with the regimental officers from the county.

Just to the east of the monument, you find the graves of both of these men. If you pass that way, take time to stop at their headstones for a moment. Their work helped win the war.

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Butler Blue IV delivers hope to Noblesville’s Max Habel, celebrating his resilience

Butler University’s live mascot, Butler Blue IV, embarked on a special mission to surprise one high school senior this year with his long-awaited college acceptance letter.

Butler University’s beloved mascot has delivered acceptance letters to students nationwide. Still, the Oct. 21 trip to Noblesville held a special meaning as it honored a student’s resilience and community impact.

The iconic bulldog, adorned in Butler’s signature blue and white, approached the Habel home to bring joy to people who’ve witnessed Max Habel’s resilience and generosity.

Evan Krauss, the handler of the bulldog mascot, said outside Habel’s front door, “We have Butler Blue IV here, and we have come from Butler University to inform you that you are the first student to be admitted to Butler next year. Congratulations!”

The Noblesville High School senior faced unimaginable adversity when

he lost his father in 2021 to a brain injury suffered from an accidental fall while on a family vacation.

Habel’s reaction was a heartwarming mix of disbelief and delight. “I feel like I’m so thankful for this opportunity. I’m excited to be admitted to Butler. It’s exceptional that out of all the kids in Indiana, they picked me.”

Habel became determined to honor his father’s memory by partnering with a nonprofit to create HabelFest, an annual barbecue competition to raise funds for NeuroHope (neurohopewellness.org), a neurological rehabilitation center.

Krauss said, “Max has used this opportunity to start a nonprofit barbecue competition to raise money for head trauma research. His resilience and strength just blew us away.”

Habel said, “It’ll be three years ago in like two weeks. But, every year, we host this barbecue competition in downtown Noblesville in Forest Park called Habel Fest, and it’s extraordinary as we use it to commemorate what he meant to us.”

The senior expressed

gratitude toward Butler for the honor and emphasized his desire to continue his advocacy work through his education. Habel said of his father, “I think he would’ve been impressed. He would’ve said this was a lot of hard work that paid off, and I think he would’ve been as excited as I am

right now.” Habel’s journey is set to take flight at Butler, where he is destined to continue making a difference, one step at a time.

Hamilton County Historical Society seeking two new board members

The Board of Directors for the Hamilton County Historical Society is seeking volunteers for a Vice President and Treasurer.

The Historical Society, which is run by a 13-person board that includes a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and nine at-large members, manages the Historic Sheriff’s Residence and Jail Museum on the square in Noblesville, the Museum Director, and regular Society business that includes events, fundraising, and caring for a historic collection of artifacts related to Hamilton County history. It’s an exciting time to be involved as the society is establishing a strategic plan and also helps convene a county-wide history organization collaborative group.

Potential board members should meet the summarized criteria below, a full copy of which is available upon request. The board is especially seeking people with some nonprofit experience, either in grant applications, managing accounts, or other related tasks.

Diversity statement

The Hamilton County Historical Society seeks to represent all history of the county. This includes geographically (all nine townships) as well as demographically. As the society works to tell the story of Hamilton County, the board should reflect this diversity and diverse candidates are encouraged to apply.

Length of term

At-large board member terms are for three years and officer terms are for two years. President and Vice-President are limited to three consecutive terms. (Note: the open seats include two officer terms – both of which are a single year, January to December 2025, then subject to re-election for a traditional two-year term.)

Time commitment

Must be able to attend a majority of board meetings, on the first Tuesday evening of most months, volunteer for at least one event held during each year, and assist the museum director for at least two shifts each year at the museum during regular open hours from noon to 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Other requirements

Must live in Hamilton County or have significant business or personal interests in the area, and a knowledge of Hamilton County or Midwest history is a major bonus. Also must pass a provided background check to volunteer at events.

Expectations

In addition to bringing enthusiasm to the society and preparing for meetings in advance, board members should advocate for the museum and its strategic principles.

A further description of the Vice President position is as follows:

The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of the President and shall chair the Program Committee if the VP does not appoint a chair. Ideally, the Vice President would serve as a coordinator for grant applications.

A further description of the Treasurer position is as follows:

The Treasurer shall keep correct and complete records of accounts and shall present a financial report at all regularly scheduled Board meetings and at the annual meeting of the membership. The Treasurer shall make all financial books and records available for inspection at reasonable times to any member of the Board. The Treasurer shall prepare and file or have prepared and filed on behalf of the HCHS any reports that may be required to maintain the HCHS in good standing under the law. The Finance Committee may conduct an audit of the books internally or externally. (Details on the extent of financial holdings available upon request.)

Eagletown barn holds history

The beautiful red barn north of Eagletown marks the land of the Reynolds family. With the year 1888 emblazoned across the roof, the barn has not only stood witness to nearly 135 years of change in the outskirts of Westfield, but it also holds a collection of that history inside.

Though the barn is not open to the public, owner Randy Reynolds welcomed around 40 people on Tuesday, Oct. 15, at an event hosted by the Westfield Washington Historical Society. Refreshments were served as guests milled around, inside and out, taking in the Reynolds family’s collection.

“I just think there are so many unique items here, and people have driven by the barn for years not knowing what’s here,” WWHHS Program Coordinator Barbara Day said. “It’s kind of a little gem.”

Randy Reynolds’ great-grandparents built the house where he has lived since 1980, but the family began collecting long before he moved in. Reynolds even ran an antique store for a while.

“I just had too much,” Reynolds said. “I was renting four buildings to keep my

junk in. I had an auction and sold 99 percent of my stuff.”

The remaining one percent that Reynolds chose to keep consists of family heirlooms.

Adding onto the original barn, Reynolds created a space so that his family’s collection could be viewed and enjoyed.

“Everything in here has a history to it,” Reynolds said.

Each of the hundreds of items has been carefully cleaned and restored and placed in just the perfect

spot for viewing.

Display cases hold everything from a worn book from the 1860s that belonged to Reynolds’ great-great-grandmother to a shiny red bicycle that was given to his mother on her 13th birthday.

Reynolds’ father worked with Oldsmobile in Noblesville, so there’s a collection of Oldsmobile paraphernalia. His father later painted tractors, so there’s a sizable collection of miniature tractors. Coca-Cola. International Harvester. Corvette.


Whizzer. Cub Cadet. These brand names and more fill the space from floor to ceiling.

“I didn’t make it big enough,” Reynolds said. “I can always make it bigger later on.”

Up until closing his shop in August, Reynolds worked on cars. But even in retirement, he stays busy.

“I still have projects,” he said.

One of those projects is restoring the Corvette he bought the week he graduated from high school.

Family Nurse Practitioner Alissa McDivitt has spent more than two decades in the medical field. Her experience in pharmacies, cardiology, emergency medicine, intensive care, and occupational healthcare have all played a part in making her the functional medical professional she is today.

However, it was McDivitt’s own health journey that has sparked her passion for functional medicine. In August, McDivitt opened her practice, Spark Vital Health, where she is committed to providing a patient-centered, collaborative approach to health care. Providing in-person and telehealth

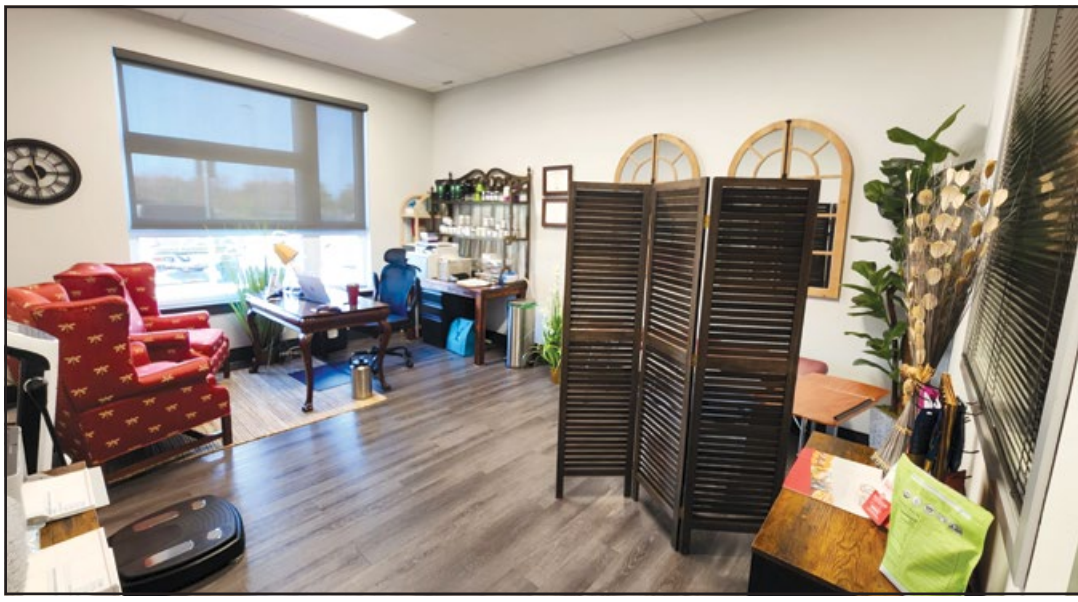

consultations, McDivitt tailors treatment plans to each individual patient.

In traditional medicine, a practitioner may diagnose a patient with a specific condition and offer treatment.

“It’s not that simple,” McDivitt said. “I ask why a person has that condition. I like to look at the root.”

In order to find the root cause of a medical condition, McDivitt takes a very detailed approach.

“I look at history, going back to when they were in their mother’s womb,” she said. “I look at the pillars of their health: brain, sleep, bowel habits, movement, nutrition.”

While traditional medical practitioners may be hesitant to run expensive tests, McDivitt has access to extensive testing of gut flora, pathogens, and inflammatory markers.

Carmel City Council passes \$232.6M budget

Carmel City Council members approved on Oct. 21 a 2025 budget that aligns with the city’s strategic goals and addresses the complex challenges of the growing city.

The approved budget totals \$232.6 million, with a General Fund budget of \$143.9 million. Carmel’s budget for 2024 was nearly \$209 million.

“Thanks to broad input from the community and the support of the council, we have aligned our planned spending with our community’s evolving needs,” Mayor Sue Finkam said. “Like any prosperous city, we are addressing competing needs in a time of escalating costs and our budget prepares us to thrive.”

In his opening remarks, council president Tony Green,

who led the council through a comprehensive review of the budget, was a strong partner in the process.

“I enjoyed having the council debate and discuss details of the budget,” Green said, “and look forward to working with the mayor to ensure dollars are used in an accountable and effective manner.”

The 2025 proposed city budget was provided to the council Sept. 1 then was outlined in budget workshops late last month and was formally introduced to the council on Oct. 7.

For the first time, the city

operations, as well as fiscal discipline.

The budget continues strategic investments for the city that supports the Elevate Carmel strategic plan goals including:

- **World-Class Public Safety:** Ensuring unparalleled community protection through proactive risk management and professional emergency response.

- **Fiscal Responsibility:** Optimizing resource allocation to guarantee long-term finan-

cial stability and growth.

- **Aesthetic Appeal:** Cultivating a visually stunning community that captivates residents and visitors.

- **Innovation and Growth:** Nurturing a thriving ecosystem for city initiatives and businesses, embracing bold opportunities to expand, modernize, and drive economic prosperity.

“The approved budget positions our city to be a model of fiscal responsibility and innovation,” Mayor Finkam said. “We are building a brighter future for our city and all who call Carmel home.”

My father warns me of the danger of battery acid. So I avoid the car battery. And then there’s those crazy fan blades promising the amputation of digits. And some things are very hot. And the turning of fan belts could snap a tie-wearing man’s neck if he’s not careful. Not that I wear ties ... but just saying. There are too many things to watch out for under a hood. Too much danger. I only have two eyes. I’d like to keep it that way.

I just don’t see how he does it. I really don’t. He can lie inside the damn thing, under the hood, his legs dangling out, making it look as if he’s being devoured by Jaws, and still get the job done.

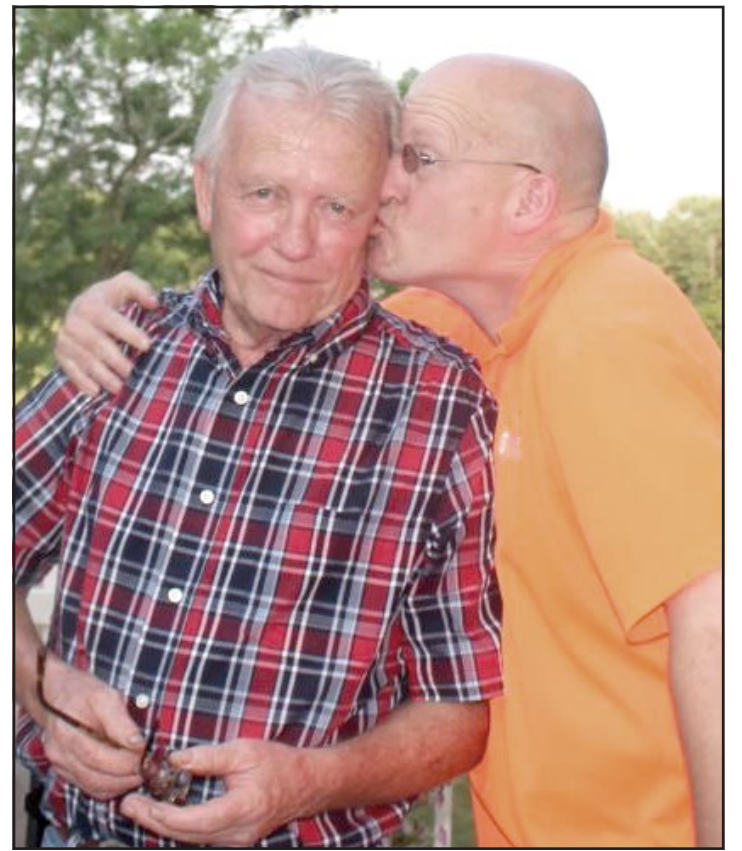

The search for an endgame to tobacco use, part 2

My column last month discussed one of the “endgame” approaches to finally end tobacco smoking. This approach is the “birthdate-based phaseout” of tobacco use whereby people born after a certain date would never be able to legally buy tobacco their entire lives. Over time, this would produce a total phaseout of legal tobacco sales and use.

Here’s another endgame approach: The reduction of nicotine in combustible tobacco, either progressively or abruptly, to non-addictive or minimally addictive amounts.

Combustible tobacco is the most toxic of tobacco products. According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration this endgame strategy could result in 13 million smokers quitting over five years; it could prevent 33 million youth and young adults from becoming regular smokers and 8 million tobacco-caused deaths by the end of this century.

In 2009, Congress gave authority to the FDA to comprehensively regulate tobacco and nicotine products includ-

ing limitation (but not to zero) of the amount of nicotine, the addictive component in tobacco. Although nicotine is not the direct cause of smoking-related diseases, it is integral in causation because nicotine addiction sustains the smoking behavior. Cigarette smoking usually begins in youth and nicotine addiction is important in the transition of adolescent experimentation to a lifetime of smoking.

In 2018, the FDA initiated a regulatory plan to investigate the reduction of nicotine in cigarettes with consideration of the risks and benefits to the entire population, both smokers and non-smokers.

According to Harvard public-health professor Howard Koh, the tobacco industry has long contended that combustible tobacco use is about choice, not addiction. On one would think, then, that the industry would support reducing tobacco’s nicotine content. This isn’t the case.

A big question is whether to reduce nicotine to minimal levels abruptly or gradually.

It seems counterintuitive, but smokers in a 2018 *Journal of the American Medical Association* study tolerated an abrupt change well. Abrupt reduction was also associated with greater reductions in smoking, dependence, and increased cessation.

Intuitively, one would also think that smokers who switch to very low nicotine cigarettes would smoke more and inhale more deeply to obtain their needed nicotine fix, thus actually increasing their exposure to tobacco’s toxins and carcinogens. However, the FDA notes studies demonstrating that smokers using minimal-dose nicotine cigarettes had difficulty discriminating between typical-cigarette nicotine levels and minimally-addicting levels, reducing their consumption.

For this strategy to work, it would be necessary to reduce nicotine in all combustible tobacco products, not just cigarettes, to prevent product switching. Exclusion of vaping products in the regulation should be considered. Although long-term studies of vapes are lacking, they are still thought to be less toxic than combustible tobacco. It would be important to have non-combustible nicotine products available, possi-

bly including vapes, for those needing transitional nicotine supplementation.

The tobacco industry has been very adept in manipulating the design and composition of cigarettes to maximize addictiveness. Caution must be paid to the industry’s response to circumvent the nicotine limitation and undermine its effectiveness.

A recent article in the *New England Journal of Medicine* outlines these potential actions by Big Tobacco: physical and chemical redesign of filters; nicotine-loaded wrappers; tobacco additives to enhance nicotine delivery, bioavailability, or attachment of nicotine to brain nicotine receptors; addition of addictive nicotine derivatives without increasing actual nicotine; and addition of substances that would inhibit the metabolism of nicotine or of the reward neurotransmitter, dopamine, that nicotine ignites.

How this endgame strategy unfolds will be fascinating.

Questions remain about budget, future tax rates in Sheridan reorganization effort

As the proposed reorganization between Sheridan and Adams Township has developed over the past several months, we have continued to ask questions and provide information to local leaders and our constituents.

Most recently, when Sheridan and Adams Township published their budget notices, we raised questions about the need to include a combined budget or tax levy impact for a reorganized Sheridan, which are required by state law.

They subsequently corrected those mistakes, and a new budget has been published.

However, the now-corrected budget still does not address questions concerning the adequacy of the budget and impact on future tax rates.

As we have stated before, it appears that the budgets do not provide sufficient funding for critical public safety and infrastructure services that are currently

provided to unincorporated Adams Township by the county. We have based this on the county's costs to patrol the 100 miles of roads within the area, as well as the costs to maintain and improve these roads, repair and replace small bridges and culverts, conduct snow removal operations, fund capital projects, undertake water conservation efforts and more.

Because these services appear to be underfunded, if reorganization is approved, area residents would likely either pay higher taxes than advertised or see a reduction in the scope or quality of services provided, especially for roads. The county would, however, consider an interlocal agreement to provide road maintenance if the county could maintain the roads to our standards and if the reorganized town would cover all expenses.

The state Department of Local Govern-

ment Finance also reported that costs not fully accounted for in the budgets could affect taxes and other services.

We have shared this information publicly, most recently at a meeting last month in Sheridan, and directly with the local leaders of Sheridan and Adams Township multiple times. Minutes from the September meeting, fact sheets and presentation materials have all been published on our website at tinyurl.com/33phtud8.

Ultimately, we want to ensure that the taxpayers in unincorporated Adams Township understand the impact of the reorganization plan and that they may ultimately pay the higher tax rate that current town residents pay. The reorganization plan states “all residents would also be responsible for the tax rate associated with the town district.” Even if that is not what is intended, the reorgani-

zation plan allows the future town council to convert or reclassify unincorporated Adams Township into the town tax district without the obligation to provide services or other protections from annexation.

Importantly, residents within those areas may not have the ability to remonstrate against future reclassification other than to ask town councilors to vote against it. While reclassifying unincorporated Adams Township property into the town tax district will allow a reorganized Sheridan to raise the additional revenue to fund services that are underfunded in their proposed budget, it will also mean higher taxes for those property owners.

As your county commissioners, we will continue to ask questions, answer your questions and provide any information we can about the proposed reorganization and how it may impact you.

“It is our choices, Harry, that show what we truly are, far more than our abilities.” – J.K. Rowling, *Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets*

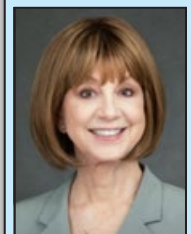
Habits, anyone? With each

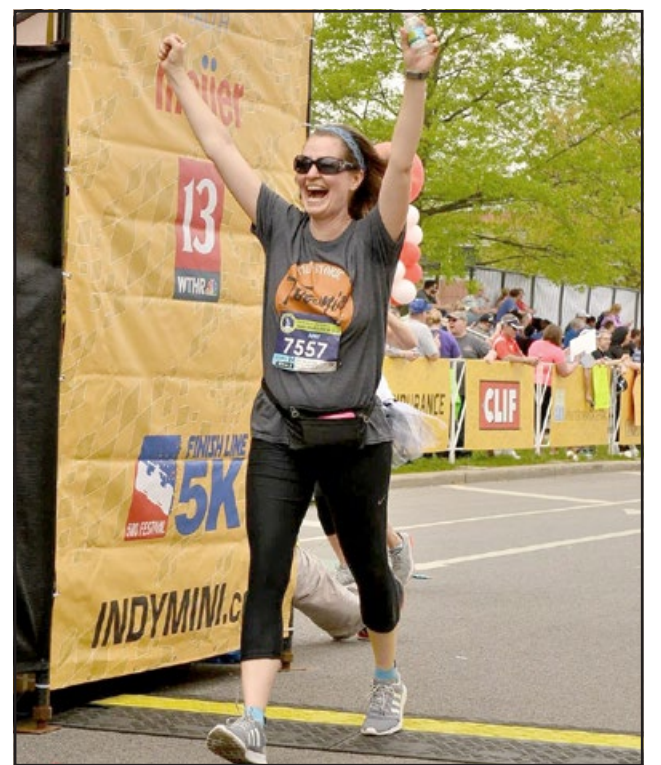

“Having originally joined FAC in early 2018 as the Board Treasurer, I’ve seen the wonderful things we can do, simply based

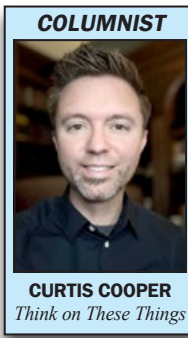

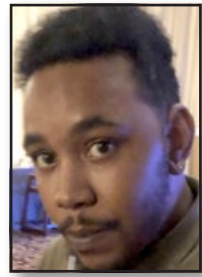

Golden Eagles trounce West Vigo

NOBLESVILLE – The first round of the IHSAA football post-season began last Friday, and Guerin Catholic couldn't have asked for a better start.

The Golden Eagles played solid football from start to finish in their Class 3A Sectional 29 first round game, overpowering West Vigo 49-0 at the Eagles Nest. Guerin Catholic scored touchdowns on its first five drives of the game and kept the momentum rolling in the second half with two more scores.

It was the Golden Eagles' first shutout victory since Oct. 6, 2013, when they won a Week 8 game over Terre Haute North 42-0.

"The guys executed," said GC coach Tom Dilley. "Certainly you want to go watch the film and there'll be plenty of mistakes to correct. But I thought in general, they had a great game plan, the offensive coaches, and carried it out. And defensively, for the most part, did what we were supposed to do and tackled pretty well. The kids played hard."

West Vigo 32. Again, the Golden Eagles wasted no time scoring: Houze connected with Kolbe Klee to get GC to the 12, then Jack Linden made two runs to score, finishing with a three-yard trip to the end zone.

The pattern repeated itself in the next drive. Deklyn Frazer intercepted a Vikings pass, which resulted in another Guerin march to the end zone. Linden finished the drive with a five-yard TD run with less than a minute left in the first quarter.

Carmel's Bao & Mu earn runner-up status

INDIANAPOLIS – The Carmel tennis doubles team of Michael Bao and Grant Mu finished as state runner-up last Saturday at the IHSAA's individual state finals at Park Tudor.

The senior Bao and sophomore Mu played Jasper seniors Caleb Schnarr and Eli Flick in the championship match. The Wildcats were leading 5-4, 40-15 in the first set when Mu injured his ankle. Mu received a medical timeout and tried to continue playing, but was unable to, thus ending the match early in the second set, with the Jasper team winning 6-1, 1-1 retired.

The match was on serve for the first three games, then the Wildcats broke the Greyhounds to lead 3-1. Mu put up some resistance in that game, coming back from 0-40 down to ad-out with four straight service winners before Flick got the break with an overhead smash.

A Flick volley winner gave Jasper two set points at 40-15, which is when Mu was injured. "I sprained it," he said of his ankle. After the medical timeout, Bao saved a set point with a volley winner, but Schnarr's service winner gave the Wildcats the first set.

Carmel bravely held on, winning the first game of the second set on Bao's serve, including a second serve ace. Jasper won the next game to tie it at 1-1, bringing up Mu to serve. He tried serving underhand for two points, but it became obvious the match would need to end.

"We weren't going to win that way," said Mu.

Schnarr and Flick finished their season 29-1. Bao and Mu compiled an 18-4 record, including an individual regional win at La Porte.

"It was fun," said Bao. Mu agreed, saying they "got closer as a team."

Mao and Bu advanced to the finals by winning an all-county semifinal over the Hamilton Southeastern team of senior Tyler Rich and junior Landon Osswald 6-0, 6-2.

"We had our ups and downs, but overall, especially recently, I think I played really good," said Rich. "Give it all I can, 100 percent effort."

Noblesville boys end 19-year drought, Carmel girls dominate

The Noblesville boys cross country team broke a 19-year regional drought last Saturday.

The Millers triumphed at the Shelbyville regional, which took place at the city's Blue River Park course. Noblesville won by a comfortable margin, scoring 45 points to runner-up Hamilton Southeastern's 78 points. It's the Millers' first regional triumph since 1995 and their fifth win in program history.

Noblesville had its first five runners land in the top 20, closing off its scoring early. John Libs led the Millers pack with a runner-up finish, clocking in at 15 minutes, 21.5 seconds. Banner Barnes placed ninth, Isaiah Vohs was 10th and Jack Strong placed 11th to help keep the score low; they scored eight, nine and 10 points respectively.

Ronnie Neal finished things off with an 18th-place result, scoring 16 team points. Noblesville qualified for state for the 14th time in school history.

Southeastern was led by Liam Powers, who took third place. Nicolas Vega (14th) and Aidan Lawson (16th) both reached the top 20, helping the Royals qualify for state for the 19th time.

Fishers finished fourth, qualifying for state for the 11th consecutive time and 14th overall. The Tigers had the race winner, as Sam Quagliaroli sailed through the course in 14:57.2.

The top five teams advance to state; third-place Franklin Central and fifth-place Mount Vernon also qualified. The top 15 individuals not on an advancing team also go to state, and that list includes three county runners: Guerin Catholic's Luke Moster (12th), Westfield's Ty Conner (29th) and Hamilton

Heights' Rudy Bowman (34th).

In the girls meet, Franklin Central triumphed with a score of 73 points. Noblesville placed second by scoring 90 points. Riley Flynn paced the Millers with a 10th-place finish. Other top 20 Noblesville runners were Ansley Applegate (13th), Brinkley Cooper (18th) and Jayde Stamm (19th). The Millers are headed to state for the 15th time.

Hamilton Southeastern took third with 140 points. Elizabeth Butler led the way by finishing fifth, while Catherine Campbell placed 12th. The Royals advanced to state for the 13th time.

Westfield took fourth with 148 points. The Shamrocks had the top county runner: Alivia Lozier took fourth place in a time of 18:10.5, leading Westfield to state for the 17th time.

Five girls runners qualified for state as individuals. They are Hamilton Heights' Allie Bushey (16th) and

Anna Monnin (27th), Fishers' Bella Murch (22nd) and Caitlin Hawkins (23rd) and Guerin Catholic's Taylor Tragesser (26th).

Carmel's girls team dominated the Brownsburg regional last Saturday.

The Greyhounds scored 26 points, well ahead of runner-up Brebeuf Jesuit's 78 points. Carmel had six runners finish in the top 15, including a 2-3-4 sweep of Sadie Foley (17:50.7), Anabel Pollert (17:51.5) and Larkin Taylor (17:53.0).

Olivia Mundt placed eighth (18:10.2) and Ella Gaddis was ninth (18:17.1). Margo Halle finished 13th (18:24.9) and Katy Dascoli completed the lineup by placing 31st (19:09.9). The Hounds have qualified for every state meet since it began in 1981 and won their 33rd regional title. Only Columbus North has won more: the Bull Dogs claimed their 34th title at the Evansville Mater Dei

regional at Angel Mounds.

University had two girls runners at the regional. Laurel Gough-McKeown placed 74th (20:35.7) and Kelley Trowbridge was 127th (21:37.5).

In the boys meet, Carmel finished second to Brownsburg. The Bulldogs won with 47 points to the Greyhounds' 65 points.

Carmel had four runners place in the top 20: Jonah Kaul was ninth (15:38.0), Jack Capes took 14th (15:43.8), Zach Flint was 16th (15:48.8) and Carter Buhr placed 19th (15:54.1). Other Greyhounds runners were Deklin Bowser (25th, 16:01.0), Will Gilhooly (50th, 16:28.8) and Kiefer Jay (54th, 16:32.2). Carmel reached the state meet for the 51st time.

University had four boys runners at the regional: Finlay Reid (96th, 17:03.5), Mario Buoscio (158th, 17:48.8), Henry Wang (168th, 17:56.3) and Walter Wilson (180th, 18:11.0).

Millers make progress in second year at state meet

For the second year in a row, the Noblesville boys tennis team made it to the state finals.

The Millers were again one of the final eight teams left standing in Indiana when the state quarterfinals began Oct. 18 at North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center. Noblesville's season came to an end in the quarters, as it lost to Jasper, the same result as the year before.

But there was tangible progress made by the Millers at the state meet. In 2023, Noblesville was swept by the Wildcats 5-0. This season, the Millers picked up a match victory, a satisfying win for senior Ethan Feliciano at No. 1 singles. Noblesville Chris Pyle said the other matches were also competitive.

"Overall, we were much more competitive than last year," said Pyle. "We didn't stick out like a sore thumb. This year, four of the five courts, you can say that we were very competitive, and we ended up winning a match, which is awesome."

Feliciano beat Jasper's Joel Levy 6-2, 6-4, making history as the first Millers player to win a match at the state tournament. After his victory, Feliciano said that was the best he ever played and his coaches agreed.

"He had the hardest job on the team, and that's to be the best player because you're going against everybody's best," said Pyle. "Every team has a good 1 singles, so you have no nights off at that position. For a couple weeks, he was not playing his best. Over the past week, we had really sat down with him and we came up with a plan that suited his strengths, and he executed it to a tee against Jasper."

In the other matches, No. 2 singles Zane Panning 6-2, 6-4 and No. 3 singles Max Habel dropped a tough match 6-4, 6-7 (3), 10-7, with the last set a 10-point super tiebreak. Both are seniors, along with

Feliciano. Despite the tough competition, Feliciano finished the season with 10 wins. Panning and Habel each collected 18 wins.

Also graduating is Jack Brenneman, who played No. 1 doubles with junior Dane Campbell. They fell to Jasper's Eli Flick and Caleb Schnarr 7-5, 6-3; the Wildcats duo will play in the individual state tournament that begins today at Park Tudor.

The Millers' No. 2 doubles team were juniors Parker Stallings and Dustin Turpin. They lost 6-2, 6-3 but will return next season along with Campbell.

"I'm really excited to see how Dane, Parker and Dustin fit into the equation (next season)," said Pyle. "All three of them can play singles, all three of them can play doubles. I think we'll be a versatile team again."

Now that the Millers have established a standard, Pyle wants to make sure that success becomes the norm at Noblesville. The coach said he thinks the Millers are "at a point where we're going to be a pretty good team every year. If we're a top 20 team every year, I'll be happy."

"We're just going to reload players," said Pyle. The coach said there are players coming in every year playing at a high level that just need to get some experience on junior varsity before heading up to varsity. For example, Noblesville's No. 2 and No. 3 JV singles players were freshmen, and Pyle said he was "really excited about their commitment" during the off-season.

"Even our middle school teams come out and see us play and they're really impressed with the way the team is going," said Pyle. "Our summer camps are getting bigger every year. Obviously our facility really helps with kids wanting to play here."

"For us, there's no rebuilding phase anymore for Noblesville," said Pyle. "We're going to reload and we're going to keep fighting for another sectional title every single year."

Westfield’s own Brette Hanavan wins individual medalist honors, helps her college team take national title

They may have been behind after the first day and playing against the wind, but Brette Hanavan and the Grace College women’s golf team kept calm and carried on.

By doing that, the Lancers took control of the leaderboard during the next two days of the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) Women’s National Championship, which took place last week at Hammock Beach Resort in Plam Coast, Fla. In the end, Grace College won the team championship with a three-day score of 320-315-315=950 to claim its second national title.

In addition, Hanavan won individual medalist honors. The 2022 Westfield graduate and current Lancers junior also came from behind to score that victory, finished with a three-day round of 79-74-79=232. Hanavan finished three strokes ahead of second place.

Hanavan was tied for sixth place after the first round, five strokes back from the lead. But Hanavan turned it on in the second round with a 74, the low score of the second day. Her two-round total was 153, just one behind Bethel’s Aynslee Myer, who totaled 152.

Hanavan pulled ahead of Myer in last Wednesday’s third round with another 79. She drained five

birdies for the tournament, making three in the second round and one each in the first and third rounds.

“My mental game was really strong throughout the tournament,” said Hanavan. “I think my putting won the tournament for me.” Hanavan said she followed an old golf rule: “Drive for show, but you putt for dough.”

“It worked in this context because my putting did amazing,” said Hanavan.

A strong mental game helped the entire Grace College team as well. The Lancers were in second place after the first round with their score of 320. Bethel was the leader with 309, so Grace College was down by a daunting 11 strokes.

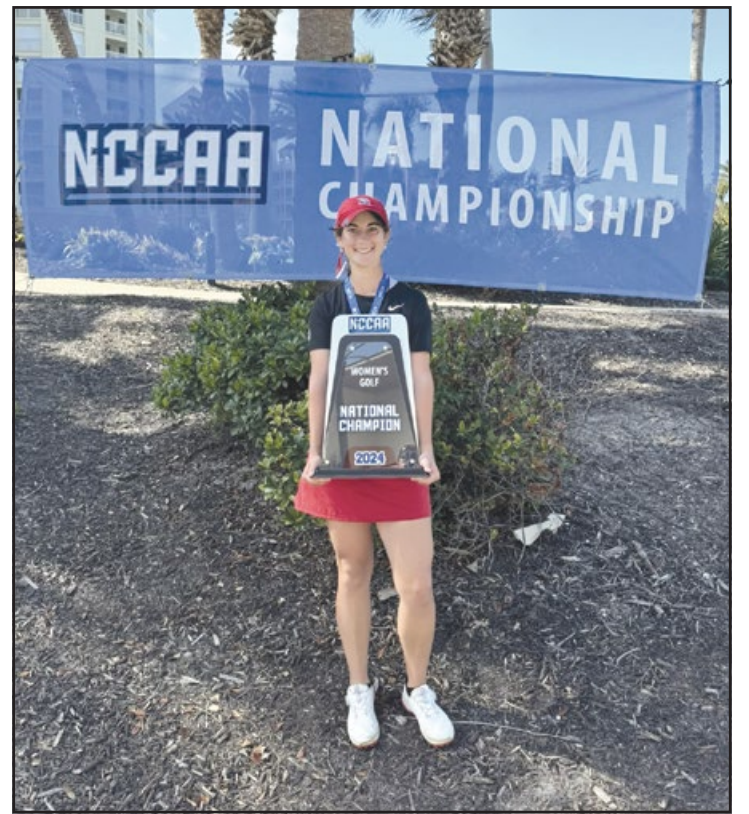
“I think it’s amazing that we could come back and win,” said Hanavan. “It’s tough to be back by 11 strokes after the first day.”

Nothing to lose

But Hanavan said everyone on the team had each other’s back, which made it “a lot better going into the next two days.”

“As a team, we had nothing to lose, because we were already in a losing position, so we could just be very calm going into the next two days,” said Hanavan.

The Lancers improved five strokes for their second day score by totaling 315. That brought them into a winning position, as they were only five down going into the third round. In that final round, Grace out-

eled Bethel 315-326 to soar to the win.

“I think we played great,” said Hanavan. She said the conditions were very tough “because the course is on the ocean.”

The championship was played on the Hammock Beach Resort’s Ocean Course, and there is no messing around: several of the course’s holes are right on the Atlantic Ocean. (Hammock Beach is located a little over an hour south of Jacksonville.) Since those holes are by the ocean and its waves, “the wind made it pretty tough.”

“Our team just did a good job of staying in the moment and grinding through those tough conditions and making sure every shot mattered,” said Hanavan.

The Lancers have built a solid golf tradition. Grace won its first national championship in 2019, while Summer Stillson won the individual championship in 2022. Hanavan has been on the Lancers team since her freshman year; she said she’s made some of her best friends at Grace and “couldn’t have asked for a better team.”

“I love Grace,” said

Hanavan, who is majoring in accounting and plans to get a master’s in business administration. “It’s definitely where I’m meant to be. Coach (Denny) Duncan is an amazing coach.”

Westfield coach Josh Bryant said that Hanavan is the “consummate amateur

professional” and is very proud of her accomplishments.

“It doesn’t surprise me to see that she’s won, although it’s an amazing accomplishment,” said Bryant. “Her mental attitude, the strength of her character bleeds into her golf.”

Based on an estimated maximum average interest rate that will be paid in connection with the Bonds of six percent (6.00%) per annum, the total interest cost associated therewith, including any capitalized interest that may be paid by the School Corporation or the Building Corporation on all or a portion of the Bonds, is \$26,592,500. The Township's lease payments under the proposed Lease will be payable from ad valorem property taxes levied and collected on all taxable property within the geographic boundaries of the Township. The proposed Lease will have a term no longer than twenty-two (22) years, commencing on the date of issuance of the Bonds. Including interest costs, the maximum annual lease rental to be paid by the Township under the proposed lease is not more than \$960,000 and the maximum lease rental over the term of the Lease is not more than \$19,764,150. The estimated interest rate that will be paid on the Bonds is 5.0% and the total estimated interest cost for the life of the Bonds is \$7,764,150. Based on the designed use of the Project, lease payments will be allocated and levied with 44.25% levied and collected throughout the Township (including all municipalities) and 55.75% collected within the Township's Fire District only (which excludes municipalities). The Millers are 18-0-2 for the season and will play No. 14-ranked Center Grove in the 3A state championship game. Noblesville will take on the Trojans at 6:30 p.m. Saturday at IUPUI's Michael A. Carroll Stadium.

CARMEL – JD Stein, Carmel High School's senior shortstop, started playing baseball at the young age of four, and he hasn't looked back since.

Prep Baseball Reports ranks Stein as the 10th best player in Indiana for the class of 2025, but even with so much success early on, there were still nay-

sayers. "There have been some people who said I was too small or not built enough, but you can't worry about that," Stein said. "You just have to keep working."

"He was a huge impact in my life, not just in baseball," Stein said. "He pushed me and taught me to embrace the struggle."

Stein credits his family for his success. His mother Lisa and his father Mike who, along with his two sisters, helped him get to where he is today.

"My dad played centerfield for Northwestern," Stein said. "So, I guess it's in the blood."
