Carmel Police Department announces launch of Drone First Responder Program

The Carmel Police Department (CPD) announces the launch of its Drone First Responder (DFR) Program, which serves to enhance the existing patrol-led drone operations under the Carmel Police Air Support Unit.

Operating under a waiver from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), CPD's DFR drones respond directly to calls for service along with patrol officers and often arrive on the scene before them.



Hamilton County Council wraps 2025 budget hearings

New hires & salary adjustments top list of expenditures

The Hamilton County Councilors, financial stewards of Hamilton County government, have finalized and adopted the 2025 budget.

The proposed budget, totaling over \$312 million, includes funding of major capital projects and salary adjustments for deputies and correction officers at the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, in addition to 16 new positions to help manage county growth. Councilors approved the hiring of two additional sheriff's deputies, a deputy coroner, three deputy prosecutors, an assistant county attorney, a staff attorney, and a court administrative

'We are investing in the safety and well-being of our

community," Council President Amy Massillamany said. "Hamilton County is one of the fastest growing counties in Indiana, requiring additional manpower to litigate and try the additional caseloads that our growth creates while still maintaining the high standard of service our residents deserve."

The council also approved the creation of three new positions: Director of Jail Programs, Maintenance Supervisor, and Procurement Director.

"With increased projects and demands on our resources, a dedicated procurement professional will streamline our purchasing processes, ensure fiscal responsibility, and enhance efficiency," Massillamany

In a continued effort to make government more transparent and accessible, the City of Carmel on Tuesday announced the launch of its financial transparency portal.

The portal will provide residents with a clear and detailed look into the city's financials, making it easier than ever to track where and how public funds are being spent. The portal was detailed at Tuesday's State of the City address and stems from one of Mayor Sue Finkam's key goals for her first year in office – ensuring greater transparency in local government operations.

"Our residents have a right to know how their tax dollars are being spent, and the portal system makes it easier than ever to access that information," Mayor commission, board, and Finkam said. "By providing a clear and user-friendly platform, we're empowering citizens, businesses, and stakeholders to stay informed about the city's financial decisions anytime, it into clear, easy-to-unfrom anywhere."

They contain essential fiber, which can help reduce the risk of type 2 diabetes, colorectal cancer, stroke, and heart disease. Many whole foods contain chemicals that promote health, such as antioxidants - substances that slow down a natural process leading to cell and tissue damage.1

Balance is the real issue here. I absolutely do take supplements. I take only those that I know to be addressing, for me, any shortfall I may have in my nutrition plan. I primarily obtain my necessary nutrition from whole foods but I benefit from certain additional nutrients which are available in high-quality supplements. Do your homework! DAR Marian Anderson Legacy Scholarship now open for applications

Beginning today, Nov. 1, undergraduate and graduate students studying music can apply for the DAR Marian Anderson Legacy Scholarship. Sponsored by the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), the scholarship provides a one-time \$5,000 award to one student annually who is pursuing undergraduate or graduate study in music.

Marian Anderson (1897-1993) was a groundbreaking African American contralto and an inspiration for civil rights.

"This scholarship pays tribute to Marian Anderson's life, and the Daughters of the American Revolution seeks to honor her legacy through today's aspiring musicians," DAR President General Pamela Wright said. "Her legacy lives on in others who aim for excellence in musical studies, are committed to their communities, and willing to stand up for what is right."

Applicants should be accepted or currently enrolled in an accredited university or college in the United States and have a concentration in music in their course of study. Music performance, composition, theory, or education are all areas that students may be specialized in to qualify for the scholarship. They should have a minimum grade-point average (GPA) of 3.0 on a Marian Anderson called





When buying tickets, here are several tips to make sure you are "Ready For It" and avoid potential scams:

• "You Need To Calm Down" and investigate offers that you know are too good to be true. Sellers, especially on online marketplaces and social media websites, may offer tickets at face value (or below) for events that are sold out or in high demand. Many offers end up being scams. Some sellers may say they need to sell tickets quickly, falsely claiming, for example, that they have a sick relative. medical emergency, or an is trustworthy. 



Tacitus and Suetonius were some of Rome's greatest historians. They wrote about people like Octavian (Augustus Caesar), Bruits, Cassius, Mark Anthony, and Cleopatra. These historians are the reason we believe them to be real people. SIDE NOTE: Do you know who else they wrote about? Jesus and Christians. Yet, the New Testament has by far more historical and manuscript evidence for its reliability.



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United Way of Central Indiana awards \$17.8 million to 72 nonprofits in region

Funding will help nonprofits address basic needs, improve the education, financial stability & well-being of whole families

The REPORTER

United Way of Central Indiana announced Wednesday that it is awarding \$17.8 million to 72 nonprofits in the region to help meet the basic needs of Hoosiers and improve the education, financial stability and well-being of families.

The grants come from United Way's Basic Needs and Family Opportunity

Funds. The Basic Needs Fund focuses on safe and affordable housing, healthy food access, transportation and health services. The Family Opportunity Fund supports integrated programming that serves both youth and adults in the same household, aimed at improving the education, financial stability and well-being of the whole family.

Three organizations "Systems-Levreceived el" grants for work that addresses poverty through a broad, industry-wide approach, including building, maintaining and training the sector's workforce and other system-wide strategies and public policy efforts to advance the sector in reducing poverty.

The grants range from \$40,000 to \$470,000 and are being awarded to nonprofits accredited with United Way of Central **Indiana**. Funding contracts begin Jan. 1, 2025.

A separate grant cycle is currently underway for nonprofits outside United Way's accredited network, with that funding announcement expected in February.

For this round of funding, a committee of 16 people – United Way staff, board members and community volunteers - reviewed Basic Needs Fund applications, and a committee of 15 people reviewed Family Opportunity Fund applications. These committees made funding recommendations, which were approved by United Way's Board of Directors at its Oct. 24 meeting.
