## A good cry at a psychic fair

Editor's Note: This story originally appeared in Next Avenue on Oct. 31, 2024.

Last October, Brynne showed me an advertisement for a psychic fair. I arched a quizzical eyebrow, in jest to her kookiness.

"I have something to work through," she said, shrugging.

"I'll wait in the car," I said, anticipating time alone to work through my own angst.

'Today's the second anniversary of your mom's death," she said in the parking lot at her psychic fair. Brynne, always the mind reader, finally addressed the elephant in the room – well, in the Corolla. The approaching anniversary gnawed, numbed - and now it was here.

That first year after her death, I wrote about my loss, conjuring my shattered, scattered orphan thoughts onto ghostly laptop glow, as if my fingertips piggybacked a planchette at a Ouija board. Often, my aimless, keyboard finger taps were as futile as failed SOS Morse code.

"I'll still write about you," I promised Mom throughout her five-year sentence on cancer's death row. She smiled. My last words to her: "You were a great mom. It's OK to let go." She was lost to merciful morphine then, mouth agape (a near-death mask).

With written words, I tried to crawl from, and claw my way out of, the surrealism of an emotional ground zero. Also, as promised to her, I called Dad, checking on



him like clockwork. Mom worried more about him than herself. "Me and Jesus, we're good," she said, "like in that Tom T. Hall song." We had never talked Jesus before ... much like we never spoke of her cigarettes either, those telltale smoke signals from the far corner of our house, smoke rings floating like ghostly nicotine nooses, from where she attempted to hide her habit, as if saving an impressionable son in his single-digit years from secondhand smoke or bitter disappointment. It was deception with mercy.

## See "Small Treasures" by Jeremy Mallov at Art Gallery at City Hall in Fishers

The Fishers Arts Council (FAC) artist for the month of November is Jeremy Mallov – artist, teacher, parent, husband, and longtime appreciator of art. His exhibit is titled "Small Treasures" because his recent focus is painting beautiful things in small packages.

The exhibit is on display at the Art Gallery at City Hall located in the Fishers Municipal Center, 1 Municipal Drive, Monday, Nov. 4 through Dec. 2, excluding holidays, and can be viewed Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and at the Second Friday free public reception from 6 to 8 p.m. Nov. 8.

When Mallov began his college work at Indiana University, he intended to major in psychology. However, he says, "after sophomore year I got bitten bad by the art bug," and a psychology degree was no longer his objective. He knew, though, that he would have to be able to earn a living, so he decided he would combine his love of art with a love of teaching art and became a licensed art education teacher. He has now been teaching art at Amy Beverland Elementary School in Lawrence Township for 21 years, after spending a half-year teaching at Carmel High School and a year at Belzer Middle school.

Mallov notes that as an

his paintings were inspired by the exotic locales where he had traveled. He created a series of paintings of Venetian canals and Israeli architecture and French and Spanish cityscapes. However, he notes that a lot has changed in his life as an artist. He says he has "four amazing daughters, ages 9 to 16, three cats, one dog, a whole series of foster cats, and our travels have now consisted of Disneyland and beaches" with his daughters and his wife, who is a writer and a lawyer.

Of November's "Small Treasures" exhibit of his work, Mallov says, "Finding time to paint has become a challenge, and the source of my November art show is all about creating 'small treasures' in the time I have and finding inspiration where I can. I've found myself making smaller 8-by-10-inch paintings while sitting in the waiting room of a cheer studio or gymnastics studio and painting a picture of the absolutely gorgeous sunrise I saw one morning while at car drop-off duty at school. Or I'll paint a picture of the view across a retention pond I noticed while taking a walk with my wife. I've learned to see the beauty in the small, the everyday. My newest paintings are like a short story, giving you a glimpse into my world, without tellwithout deeper meaning. As an art teacher, I spend about a third of class time presenting students with a work of art and having them analyze what deeper meaning the artist was trying to express about life."

Mallov says that when he paints, he measures the success of each painting in terms of whether it accurately captures the feeling of what he was trying to create. He also says that when he's teaching, he measures his success on whether he's introduced his students to something meaningful to them in terms of art, and if he's created a love of art in them. Just as he was "bitten bad by the art bug," he hopes to share his enthusiasm for and appreciation of art in his students. He hopes that the "art bug" will "bite"

## **AG Todd Rokita delivers** another blow to Big Pharma

\$49.1 million national settlement to resolve price-fixing allegations involving generic drugs

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita, as part of a coalition of 46 states and four territories, has secured \$49.1 million in settlements to resolve allegations that two companies engaged in widespread, long-running conspiracies to artificially inflate and manipulate prices, reduce competition, and unreasonably restrain trade with regard to numerous generic prescription drugs.

The two companies represent only a fraction of those implicated in such alleged misconduct. Indiana and other states are pressing forward with lawsuits against the remaining companies not participating in the settlements.

"Hoosiers deserve to know that the prices they pay for generic drugs arise from free and fair competition among pharmaceuti-cal companies," AG Rokita said. "The fight is not over, and we continue to allege that company executives in this case colluded and con-

spired to keep prices high chased a generic at their respective companies. We are holding them accountable for their egregious misconduct."

As part of settlement agreements, the two companies have agreed to cooperate in ongoing multistate litigations against 30 corporate defendants and 25 individual executives. Both companies have further agreed to a series of internal reforms to ensure fair competition and compliance with antitrust laws.

The second complaint was filed in 2019 against Teva Pharmaceuticals and 19 of the nation's largest generic drug manufacturers. complaint names



The third complaint, to be tried first, focuses on 80 topical generic drugs that account for billions of dollars of sales in the United States and names 26 corporate defendants and 10 individual defendants.

After creating a full color palate, students will design and create a full watercolor painting using the colors they created.



## Inflation-fighting strategies for retirees

different At inflation times, may be high or low, but, except in those rare periods of deflation, it's always with us. During your working years, when you may receive boosts in

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
