### **Important Indiana** property tax notice

Check with Auditor's office to ensure your exemptions are in place before end of the year

If you purchased a home or recorded a deed to change the title of your home in 2024, you should verify with your County Auditor that your homestead deduction has been applied and/ or is still valid before Dec. 31, 2024.

The deadline for filing for the homestead deduction using a Sales Disclosure Application, which must be filed with the Assessor and Auditor before the Deed can be recorded, is Dec. 31, 2024. The deadline for filing via the homestead application on a previously filed Deed and Sales Disclosure is Jan. 15, 2025.

If married (even if your spouse is not going in title), the spouse must provide their name and last five digits of their Driver's License and Social Security numbers in applying for a homestead deduction.

To file the homestead deduction, you need the tax ID number and the last five digits of your Social Security number. If you do not have a Social Security number, you will need the last five digits of a valid U.S.-issued ID.

The mortgage deduction is no longer available after Jan. 1, 2023.

A deduction OR exemption validly in place on Jan. 1 of any given year will remain in place for the current tax year even if the use or ownership of the property changes after Jan. 1.

Homestead Deduction forms are available at in.gov/dlgf/2344.htm.

If you have questions, you can contact the Hamilton County Auditor's Office by calling (317) 776-8400. The office is located in the Historic Courthouse in downtown Noblesville with offices in the basement and on the first floor. Property tax deductions can be filed online or in person at the Hamilton County Auditor's Office.

# Noblesville development clears first vote despite community fears for privacy, wetland wildlife

It was a contentious Noblesville Plan Commission meeting, but in the end, the board unanimously approved two petitions to rezone land in northern Noblesville – petitions that have been subject to much opposition and controversy.

The plan commission highly recommended changing the zoning of 173 acres of land initially zoned as single-family residential to multi-family residential, planned business, and light

Called Morse Village, the new development will be located on three parcels of land on 206th Street and Hague Road.

While the city is backing the project, those living near the marked-off area have expressed concerns about a lack of privacy, increased traffic, pressure on the schools, destruction of wetlands, and fears about the possible destruction of an eagle's nest.

Jami Ross, who opposed the development, says the plan's approval feels like a slap in the face.

"[Morse Village] is set requested. to occupy land that is undeveloped and replete with trees. [It] serves as a habitat to a diverse ecosystem," she

said 'We chose Noblesville for peace, for quiet, for nature, for family," Ross added.

The city said this is an opportunity to add a "missing middle" component to Noblesville. Sarah Reed, the community development director for Noblesville, says the amended plan will meet some of the "missing middle and housing analysis components" the city

Neighbors say the missing middle can go elsewhere.

The fight for and against the development is not over yet. The city council still needs to vote on the proposals. They will meet next on Dec. 3, and a vote is set for Dec. 17.





## **Indiana Senate Democrats reelect minority** leader amid sexual harassment allegations

Senate Democrats on Monday gave state Sen. Greg Taylor another term as Senate minority leader hours after reports surfaced of multiple allegations of sexual harassment against him.

Three female former staffers, one of whom is a former intern, told the IndyStar that Taylor sexually harassed them over a period of several years.

Taylor, who represents portions of Marion County's Pike and Center townships in the state Senate, is the second high-ranking Indianapolis Democrat to face accusations of sexual harassment in four months. Three former staffers for Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett this summer said Hogsett's former chief of staff, Thomas Cook, sexually harassed them. Two of them spoke on the record with News 8 at the time.

Taylor did not respond to requests for comment that News 8 left at both his Senate office and the law firm where he works.

Taylor was noticeably absent from Monday morning's annual legislative preview panel discussion sponsored by the Indiana Chamber of Commerce, which normally features the speaker of the House, the Senate president pro tempore, and both the House and Senate minority leaders.

House Speaker Todd Huston, a Fishers Republican, said he was not familiar with the allegations against Taylor, but added the Statehouse should be a safe place to work:

'Look, I am 100% concerned about any allegations of that," he said. "I've told our caucus multiple times, I want the Statehouse to be a great place for everyone to work."

When News 8 asked Huston if the Statehouse was a safe place for women to work, he replied, "I sure hope so. We fight every day to make sure it is."

Senate President Pro Tem Rod Bray left the panel before it ended but issued a statement on the allegations against Taylor late Monday afternoon:

'The Indiana Senate serves the people of the state of Indiana, and as such, we

said they would must hold ourselves to a high standard of conduct and foster a safe and positive work environment. It is extremely disappointing when a member's actions fall short of that standard." [...] "The safety of our personnel and senators is of utmost importance. Senate

policies make clear that allegations of harassment are to be taken seriously and thoroughly investigated."

Taylor's House counterpart. House Minority Leader Phil GiaQuinta, of Fort Wayne, condemned Taylor's alleged behavior in a statement released Monday afternoon:

"As Indiana House Democratic Leader, Ι strongly condemn sexual harassment, no matter who it comes from. I cannot ignore this principle simply because a Statehouse Democrat has been accused of sexual harassment." [...] "I want to remind all House employees that if something happened that you feel is worth reporting, our Ethics rules and the House's personnel handbook provide for a confidential investigation process and guarantee protection from retaliation."





# Second star to the right and straight on till Carmel

Carmel Community Players' Peter and the Starcatcher is a spirited and often hilarious take on the origin of J.M. Barrie's beloved characters. Directed by Lori Raffel, this production leans heavily into humor and creativity, feeling like a mash-up of Godspell and The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged).

Told in a vaudevillian style and peppered with anachronistic jokes (some of which feel tailor-made for a Carmel audience), the play invites us to laugh. imagine, and connect with the story of how Peter Pan became "The Boy Who Would Not Grow Up."

Adapted by Rick Elice from the novels by Dave Barry and Ridley Pearson, the story delves into Peter's origins, weaving a tale of adventure, friendship, and the magical substance "starstuff." The show's selfaware humor and inventive staging make it as much a celebration of theatre itself as it is a prequel to Peter Pan.

The cast of 14 actors portrays over 100 characters with boundless energy and wit. Mason Yeater captures the journey of the Boy (eventually Peter), portraying both his vulnerability and growing confidence as he discovers and builds his identity. Hannah Janowicz as Molly, the brave and quick-thinking Starcatcher-in-training, has an eager self-assurance, anchoring the more fantastical elements of the story with sincerity. Together, Yeater and Janowicz create heartfelt moments amidst the chaos.

The play's use of a minimalistic "Story Theatre" approach works beautifully, mirroring the way children play and reinforcing the themes of growing up and the power of imagination. With ropes doubling as doorways, boxes transforming into pirate ships, and fabric becoming waves, the audience is encouraged to fill in the gaps with their own creative energy. This approach showcases theatre at its most imaginative and interactive. Raffel's set design complements the script's playful nature, keeping transitions quick and the action flowing. Lighting by Karissa Henschen highlights key moments, particularly the magical glow of the starstuff, while Elizabeth Ruddell's costumes

If I have any criticism, it's that the play takes a little time to get going. The first half of Act One had some timing issues, which could likely be attributed to opening night jitters. For those who enjoy fast-paced humor, imaginative storytelling, and a fresh take on familiar characters, Peter and the Starcatcher delivers a delightful evening of theatre. The balance of laugh-out-loud comedy and heartfelt moments makes it a great outing for families, theatre enthusiasts, or anyone who wants to believe in magic again.





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# **Fishers teen wins \$200K** after scoring field goal during **College GameDay contest**

A Fishers teen scored big during College GameDay's classic kicking contest at the University of Georgia Saturday.

Originally, \$150,000 was on the line, but it was raised to \$200,000 when Silver and another student agreed to split the winnings. With a \$200,000 match for hurricane relief efforts, \$400,000 was at stake.

But in a spur of the moment call, host Pat McAfee doubled to \$800,000. "One kick - \$800,000 racks," Pat McAfee told the crowd of college students.

Silver stood back calmly as the College GameDay guys set up the shot. Kirk Herbstreit jokingly



Like a lot of kids who grow up in Indiana, basketball was Beckett Doane's first love.

"I was shooting baskets before I could even walk," Doane said by phone. "I played basketball my whole life, but I stopped this year."

He quit to focus on baseball because when you can throw a baseball 90-plus mph, stand at 6-feet-6, and are left-handed, the opportu-



nities are countless. "My goal right now is

to get drafted in the top two rounds out of high school," Doane said.

That could very well happen for Doane, who was recruited by every school in the Southeastern Conference before committing to play college baseball at Mississippi State.

'The coaches are amazing, the town is amazing, and the fans are amazing," he said. "It has everything you would want, and it checked all of my boxes."

Doane attributes his success to his work ethic, something that helped him go from a tall, lanky freshman into one of the top left-handed pitchers in the 2026 class.

"I was 6-feet-4, 140 pounds freshman year. I put

75 pounds on in a little under two years."

Part of that was a diet that consisted of over 6,000 calories a day; the other: pure work ethic.

"I wake up early every morning, I go four hours a day after school for training. Hard work really does pay off."

The Noblesville High School junior plays travel ball with the Indiana Bulls and works with pitching coach Jason Taulman in the off-season. "He's developed me into the pitcher I am.'

Doane also credits his family and his Noblesville community for helping him achieve his goals.
