# Coach Bud Wright resigns Go home & love your family

Editor's note: Sheridan High School Football Hall of Fame Coach Bud Wright mailed his resignation to school officials on Tuesday afternoon. His first phone call to discuss this decision was to Hamilton County Reporter Sports Editor Richie Hall.

A long and successful era at Sheridan High School came to an end on Tuesday.

Larry "Bud" Wright, the head football coach of the Blackhawks for 58 years, announced that he had resigned that position. Wright told The Reporter that the SHS administration gave him an ultimatum: resign or get fired.

"Several players and parents oppose me to continue coaching," said Wright. "I turned in my letter of resignation today. Mailed it in today."



Hamilton County tops all other U.S. counties in a specific gauge of math ability, but the state of Indiana as a whole falls well below average.

Those are the local headlines from a national study of "numeracy averages" from a spreadsheet and data analysis company called Excel Champs, based on figures compiled Ohio - 283.3 by the National Center for **Education Statistics.**

According to the Program for the Assessment of Adult Competencies, numeracy is "the ability to access, use, interpret and communicate mathematical information and ideas in order to engage in and manage the mathematical demands of a range of situations in adult life.'

Wright began coaching for the Blackhawks in the 1966 season. He led Sheridan to incredible heights during those years, including nine Class 1A state championships. The 'Hawks won their first title in 1980, beating North Judson 27-0. That would be one of four shutouts for Sheridan in a state title game.

The Blackhawks won state again in 1984 and 1987. Sheridan defended its title in 1988 with an unbeaten team that outscored its opponents 363-18 in six tournament games, culminating in a 59-0 championship victory over Bremen.

"Brett Law set six national records," said Wright. The coach remembered that Ben Davis won the 5A game that year, and the Giants fans were chanting "We want Sheridan!"

The 'Hawks were also state champions in 1992 and 1998. Sheridan then made a big impact in the 2000s, winning state titles during a three-year span (2005-06-07) and reaching the finals again in 2008, led by quarterback Nick Zachery, a starter for the Blackhawks during that entire run.

"That group of kids took us to the state championship four years in a row when they were freshmen, seven of them played in the state championship game as freshmen," said Wright. "That was a really good group of kids."

Wright said his first state championship and ninth state championship both "have a lot of special

meaning." He has also received national recognition: Wright was named the national Coach of the Year by the National Federation of High Schools in 2008. He was also named Indianapolis Colts Coach of the Year in 2023, which nominated him for the NFL's Don Shula High School Coach of the Year.

Wright, who turns 84 on Dec. 13, graduated from Sheridan in 1959. He began playing football in sixth grade despite his small size. When he asked his mother if he could play football, she said yes, as long as he didn't use his size as an excuse.

Wright played for the Ball State University football team his freshman and sophomore years; he graduated from there in 1963. He was an assistant coach at North Miami in 1963 and 1964, then spent his one year at Mt. Ayr before coming to Sheridan.

Wright said his time coaching the Blackhawks have been "very enjoyable years. People told me in 1966 that I should not come back to my hometown to coach, but I decided to do it anyway. I've never regretted it." At the same time, Wright emphasized that he is resigning, not retiring, and wants to stay involved in football.

In addition to coaching at Sheridan, Wright was also a health and physical education teacher and also a history teacher. He served as the longtime athletic director for SHS; he resigned from teaching and administration in June 2004.

### How INDOT reacted to slick roads & snow in central Indiana

Snow, slick roads, and slippery weather conditions led to multiple accidents in central Indiana Monday evening. Traffic slid to a standstill, ruining Hoosiers' commute home.

INDOT released a statement about how the snow impacted their plans to keep the roads safe.

"Due high-"Battalion Chief Ky er-than-forecast precipitation rates and accumulation amounts, INDOT was forced to react to roadway impacts during yesterday's snow event," INDOT Public Relations Director Kyleigh Cramer said. "As snow lin-

gered, crews pivoted to utilizing rock salt in impacted areas mid-to-late afternoon and throughout the over-

night hours." Even though it wasn't a heavy snow, it quickly made

the roads slick. 'While accumulations were light, generally under a half inch, traffic allowed the light snow to melt from friction and then refreeze from sub-freezing temperatures," Cramer said.

INDOT urges drivers to reduce speeds and drive cautiously during any winter weather event.

#### Carmel's settlement agreement addresses short-term rental violations

Owner prohibited from pursuing future rental listings in city

The City of Carmel has reached an agreement regarding reported violations of a city ordinance pertaining to short-term residential

rentals. The Nov. 21 settlement agreement with Vacation Homes LLC and its owner and sole member, Serena Burkard, prohibit either from listing the property on Singletree Court or any other properties within the city limits on any shortterm rental platforms. As a result of the settlement, any short-term rental listing by the LLC or Burkard will result in a \$5,000 per day per


sibility for any costs or fees incurred by the city.

On March 21 and again on May 31, Vacation Homes LLC, through Burkard, was issued notices of violation of the city's Unified Development Ordinance regarding the property's use as a short-term residential rental. The city then filed a lawsuit against Vacation Homes LLC and Burkard on July 11, citing the Singletree Court property as being illegally operated as a short-term rental.

The reached agreement effectively ends short-term rental concerns regarding

listing penalty and respon- the Singletree Court prop-

erty going forward. Residents who suspect that a property is being illegally operated as a shortterm rental are encouraged to contact city code enforcement. **Properties** may be used as short-term rentals if the homeowner is granted a special exception by a hearing officer of the Carmel Board of Zoning Appeals. Homes may be rented for 30 days or longer without authorization from the city.



It struck me this Thanksgiving while enjoying family, food, and football, that it's been a minute since we wrote about our finances. As a federally recognized 501(c) (3) (not-for-profit), reporting to



portant data points. We have no paid employees so that makes this easier. Our primary corporate sponsor, TalentLogistiX (tlxcorp.com), covers the salaries of two part-time staff and the cost of our facility, truck, and insurance. that benefactor, we operate on less than \$50,000 in donations annually.

Funding sources include corporations, grants, foundations, fundraisers, estates, individual donors, and civic organizations like the Noblesville Elks lodge. Large food donations come from individuals, families, food raisers at companies, churches, and other not-forprofits like Hamilton County Harvest. Interestingly, because of the Feeding Team's no-questions-asked model, we don't qualify for the larger brand-name food charities' free food programs. We are completing a new agreement with a large food charity that will allow us to purchase food at a discount over grocery store prices. Our plan is to purchase \$1,000 worth of food per month to fill in any gaps in our supplies of vegetables and proteins.

Presently, through a volunteer army of amazing caring people, we stock over 13,000 meals each month in over 40 pantries. Pantry hosts stock and manage over thirty pantries independently of those where we supply food. Each pantry can hold hundreds of meals. If they run short on food supply, we back them up. We have no way to track what collectively these remarkable pantry hosts supply to hungry neighbors. Nor do we have any way to track what you and others place directly in pantries; we are just grateful for so many people's participation in providing meals for those in need.

I mention this because it costs us between \$500 and \$800 for each delivery. We don't have a forklift, so we pay extra for a liftgate truck to be able to drop the pallets off in the parking lot.

Many of our pantries were built by donors, corporate sponsors, civic groups, and Eagle Scouts. Over the year's partnerships have developed where we provide the materials and volunteers

will build pantries. We are blessed to have Gaylor Electric as a corporate sponsor. Over 95 percent of Feeding Team pantries are picked up, transported to, delivered, and set up by Gaylor Electric associates using Gaylor Electric trucks. This saves hundreds of dollars for each pantry placed in service. When a pantry needs maintenance or repair, Feeding Team volunteers, Gaylor Electric staff, and frankly, kindhearted neighbors jump into action. We may incur materials costs, but people donate their time and talent to make sure each pantry is functional. We could not begin to calculate the dollar value of volunteers other than to say, if they weren't here, we wouldn't be able to

do this. The business model is simple: identify and secure a location, build a pantry, set up a location, get food, give food, and repeat. It's the cycle of service and the heartbeat of what we do. It is not cheap to execute, and we've spent years minimizing costs and improving efficiency. Every dollar possible goes into obtaining food and building pantries. 



### AG Rokita wins victory for Hoosier consumers in MV Realty litigation

Positive changes made to Indiana's law as a result of investigation

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has prevailed in a lawsuit against a Florida-based real estate company that negotiated contracts with Hoosiers that allegedly violated Indiana

After soliciting customers via thousands of robocalls, MV Realty unfairly locked Hoosiers into broker services contracts for a term of 40 years in exchange for modest up-front cash payments. Memoranda of these homeowner's chain of title in county recorder offices – thus creating problems for homeowners who wanted to refinance, obtain second mortgages, or undertake other transactions.

"Hardworking Hoosiers face burdens enough in financing housing costs without the added headache of dealing deceptive with schemes," AG Rokita said. "By successfully put-




