Horseshoe Prairie DAR places wreaths at graves of **Revolutionary War veterans**

Beginning on or after Monday, Jan. 13, Pleasant Street will be closed to thru traffic between 13th and 16th streets. The closure will last until Phase 2 is complete in early 2026. The closure is necessary to reconstruct and widen Pleasant Street to four lanes and includes replacement of the bridge over Wilson Drain. Westfield receives nearly **\$1.5M for road resurfacing**

The City of Westfield has received a Community Crossing grant from the Indiana Department of Transportation. The grant, totaling nearly \$1.5 million, will be used to increase funding for the 2025 road resurfacing program.

> To qualify for funding, the city must commit to providing a 50 percent match and have an asset management plan for maintaining existing roads and bridges.

According to INDOT, applications were evaluated based on need, current conditions, and impacts on safety and economic development.

More information about specific resurfacing projects will be released in the Spring.

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Health Spotlight: personalized drug cocktails may reverse Alzheimer's

The Alzheimer's epidemic continues to cast a shadow over the lives of millions of people. With no effective treatment currently available, this devastating neurodegenerative disease relentlessly erodes the memories and cognitive abilities of those afflicted.

Despite decades of research, researchers have yet to discover a cure or disease-modifying therapy that can halt its progression. However, researchers believe they are closer than ever before to finding effective treatments.

John Struckhoff has watched his wife of 50 years fade away. There's been very little help for patients like Lynn, until now.

"We're deteriorating. I mean, we're on a downhill

But Potter says a team at the University of Colorado found the drug called GM CSF – already approved for rheumatoid arthritis - and it actually reversed Alzheimer's.

"Not only do they get cognitively better, but the blood biomarkers of brain damage that are used to test drugs for Alzheimer's dissaid.

Two commonly used psychiatric drugs - imipramine and olanzapine – had a significant impact by blocking the ability of APOE4 to promote amyloid formation.

"It isn't just that they actually got better," Potter said.

The next step in the research is to find out how age and gender contribute to Alzheimer's disease in hopes of developing drugs that can reverse the underlying problems.

On Monday, U.S. Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) released the following statement after President Joe Biden vetoed the Judicial Understaffing Delays Getting Emergencies Solved (JUDGES) Act of 2024, legislation introduced by Young to address judicial emergencies and shortages across the country:

"This misguided decision is just another example of why Americans are counting down the days until President Biden leaves the White House. Issuing this veto is partisan politics at its worst. The JUDG-ES Act is a fair bill with strong bipartisan support that would have created 66 judgeships over three presidential terms to address our judicial backlog," Sen. Young said. "The President is more enthusiastic about using his office to provide relief to his family members who received due process than he is about giving relief to the millions of regular Americans who are waiting

Background on the **JUDGES** Act of 2024 The JUDG-

would address judicial emergencies and shortages across the country by increasing the number of federal district judges in the most overworked regions of the country, including the Southern District of Indiana. The bill passed Congress with strong bipartisan support in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The JUDGES Act of 2024 would act on the findings in the nonpartisan 2023 Judicial Conference of the United States report by creating the recommended judgeships during future presidential administrations. Additionally, the bipartisan bill includes new transparency requirements and provisions to ensure greater into law.

• Continues to prioritize mental health in the community and hosted Mental Health Mondays with licensed therapist Kristen Boice on Facebook Live.

• Innovation Mile and Noblesville Event Center: **Innovation Mile** is a more than 600 acre public/private partnership. It is located along Interstate 69 and is designed with a live, work, play, engage, and learn mindset. The Noblesville Event Center, set to open in summer of 2025, will be the future home of the Indiana Pacers G-League team and serves as the anchor of Innovation Mile. The district will feature event and entertainment spaces, retail outlets, recreational areas, residential spaces, and commercial opportunities. Surrounded by amenities such as Hamilton Town Center, Ruoff Music Center, healthcare facilities, and the Indiana Joint Replacement Institute, the district is envisioned to bring forth future job opportunities. The city received \$4 million through the READI 2.0 grant for a Marquee Pedestrian Boulevard within Innovation Mile, plus grant funding through Hamilton County Tourism's Business of Entertainment and Sports Tourism program.

• Morse Village: The Noblesville Common Council voted 6-3 to approve the \$250 million mixed-use development project, Morse Village. The LOR Corporation development covers 175 acres, featuring 30,000 square feet of commercial space and local restaurants near 206th Street and Hague Road, including a new roundabout at that intersection. Morse Village buildout is expected to be phased over seven to 10 years, with construction beginning in 2025. This development includes over 30 acres of dedicated greenspace, including six miles of trails and sidewalks planned. Click here to learn more.



CONSECRATION OF THE PRIESTS

"Consecrate those parts of the ordination ram that belong to Aaron and his sons: the breast that was waved and the thigh that was presented. This is always to be the perpetual share from the Israelites for Aaron and his sons. It is the contribution the Israelites are to make to the Lord from their fellowship offerings.

"Aaron's sacred garments will belong to his descendants so that they can be anointed and ordained in them. The son who succeeds him as priest and comes to the tent of meeting to minister in the Holy Place is to wear them seven days.

"Take the ram for the ordination and cook the meat in a sacred place. At the entrance to the tent of meeting, Aaron and his sons are to eat the meat of the ram and the bread that is in the basket. They are to eat these offerings by which atonement was made for their ordination and consecration. But no one else may eat them, because they are sacred. And if any of the meat of the ordination ram or any bread is left over till morning, burn it up. It must not be eaten, because it is sacred.

"Do for Aaron and his sons everything I have commanded you, taking seven days to ordain them. Sacrifice a bull each day as a sin offering to make atonement. Purify the altar by making atonement for it, and anoint it to consecrate it. For seven days make atonement for the altar and consecrate it. Then the altar will be most holy, and whatever touches it will be holy.

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
