record-setting amount for Open Doors of Washington Township

It's a tradition at The Mill Tavern in Westfield.

Each year, around the holidays, owners Christopher and Kristin Weiler hold a fundraiser they call Joey's Stockings. Patrons, known as the Milligans, have the opportunity to purchase a paper stocking, or other festive symbol, for \$5. The Mill then puts the money collected toward a worthy cause.

For the past four or five vears. The Mill has matched the funds raised and donated it to support Open Doors of Westfield Township.

This year, for the first time, Coca-Cola Consolidated came alongside The Mill in their efforts. The Milligans raised around \$3,000. The Mill matched that to make \$6,000. Then Coca-Cola Consolidated matched that total.

On Friday, Jan. 24, Open Doors accepted a check in the amount of \$12,000.

This donation is particularly well-timed according to Open Doors Treasurer Jerry Rosenberger as the organization holds the Thanksgiving Food Giveaway and Christmas Toy and Food Giveaway back to back at the end of each year.

"It's really important to recover the costs of those major projects," Rosenberger said. "It's significant for us."

Mandi Snyder, community relations manager for Coca-Cola Consolidated, said she first developed a relationship with The Mill Tavern as a patron. She realized they didn't have any Coca-Cola cups and made arrangements to get them some. That conversation

led to discussions about Joey's businesses, and The Mill Stockings.

The fundraiser first began to raise money for Chris Weiler's family members when his young nephew passed away after health complications.

"We were blown away with the response we got," Kristin Weiler said. "We thought maybe we can keep this going and do it for other people.'

That's exactly what they did. They cover the walls in wrapping paper and patrons fill them with notes written on colorful stockings, wreaths, snowmen, and more.

"It's really great that they carry on that tradition," Open Doors Vice President Kurt Wanninger said. "It's been growing throughout the years, and it really makes the place festive."

The fundraiser provided the perfect opportunity for Coca-Cola Consolidated, which looks to invest in the local community.

Open Doors is the only local pantry dedicated to serving Washington Township. The pantry works with between 180 to 200 families a month, according to Rosenberger. Families come in once a week and can visit the pantry as needed.

"Everything is free at Open Doors," Rosenberger said. "We're 100 percent volunteers, and we're really proud of that. No one gets paid."

Wanninger said that people who volunteer once with Open Doors often become regular volunteers.





### 'I broke my face'

Dashcam video shows Cicero police captain's drunk driving crash

Editor's note: Two videos showing dashcam footage from both inside and outside the vehicle can be seen at the link listed at the end of this story. One video is at the top of the webpage, and the other video is at the bottom. The crash happens at approximately the 1 minute, 25 second mark in both videos.

Newly released dashcam footage shows the moments before and after a Cicero police captain crashed his car while driving drunk on Christmas night - and tried to cover it up with the help of family members.

Capt. Edwin Hodson was formally charged on Jan. 16 with operating a vehicle while intoxicated, operating and endangering a person, and leaving the scene of an accident. He was placed on administrative leave immediately after the incident. It was unclear if he would return to the position anytime soon.

His wife, Lora Hodson, and father-in-law Charles S. Johnston, also face charges affiliated with the coverup.

Dashcam footage shared with News 8 by the Cicero Police Department provides a view of both inside and outside Ed Hodson's police vehicle in the time surrounding the crash.

40-minute-long videos open with the police captain behind the wheel of his marked SUV. He is seen swerving in his lane and driving erratically.

Around a minute-and-ahalf in, Hodson swerves off the road, into a ditch, and hits an underground cable pole. He veers back onto the road, and the SUV becomes inoperable.

A minute later, Lora Hodson arrives. She is heard opening the door and asking what happened. After a few seconds, Ed Hodson says, "I broke my face."

"The road," he answers. Through the camera audio, she's heard saying "If the cops end up here, we're in trouble."

The audio also captured Lora Hodson calling her father, Charles Johnston, asking for him and his wife Denise to com and get them. At some point, she tells her husband, "I figured you shouldn't be drinking and driving."

The pair are then heard arguing for several minutes, with Lora Hodson demanding her husband get out of the driver's seat. Multiple times, she offers to say she was driving the vehicle to alleviate some of the blame.

He refuses, saying it won't make a difference.

Around 10 minutes into each video, Charles Johnston arrives. The recordings catch Lora Hodson asking her father to make her husband get out of the driver's seat.

Charles Johnston then demanding Ed

By MICHAELA SPRINGER Hodson gets out of the SUV. "This is not an option," he states, followed by an expletive.

> Shortly after, Denise Johnston is seen pulling up to the crash, just as Ed Hodson exits the police SUV and walks away. Lora Hodson calls after him, but he does not respond. Denise Johnston then drives alongside Ed Hodson as he walks away, eventually picking him up and driving away a few minutes later.

While Ed Hodson and Denise Johnston leave the scene, Lora Hodson is heard inside the police SUV speaking to someone over the phone. She explains how Ed Hodson's police car is broken and asks about what towing services she should reach out to.

Around 15 minutes into each video, Lora Hodson turns off the SUV, puts on the emergency lights, and exits. She remains outside the vehicle for the remainder of the videos.

Throughout the footage, witnesses are recorded approaching the SUV. Lora Hodson is heard early on telling two of them that they were OK and she had called her parents to come

Cicero police did not make contact with Ed Hodson until three hours after the crash. When approached by detectives, Ed Hodson appeared unsteady, slurred his words, and spoke repetitively, court documents say.

Madison County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Andrew Hanna was selected as the special prosecutor for the case. He spoke with News 8 after charges were filed, and said "with great power comes great responsibility."






# Social issues, not just budgeting, on state legislators' agendas

As many of you know, the Indiana legislature revises the state budget in odd Because years. of this, I find this year's bills feel different from previous budget years.

• HB 1173, authored by Rep. Teshka, protects student speech in universities and provides that the race, color, or ethnicity of a student may not be used in certain decision-making processes.

• HB 1207, authored by Rep. Goss-Reaves, establishes the space science and technology grant program to provide grants focusing on atmospheric and outer space exploration.

• HB 1231, authored by Rep. Prescott, requires each school corporation to display the text of the Ten Commandments in each school library and classroom.

• HB 1435, authored by Rep. Smaltz, requires the adoption of a policy that prohibits certain foreign students from enrolling in or receiving instruction in a qualifying STEM program.

In the Veterans Affairs and Public Safety Committee, HB 1393, authored by Rep. Bascom, is a bill to require a law enforcement officer to cooperate with ICE. That bill passed a committee vote 9 to 2.

The Senate also has bills dealing with social issues in various committees. As an example:

• SB 143, authored by Senators Brown, Alexander, and Clark, prohibits a gov- number. ernmental entity from directing, or coercing a child to withhold certain information from their parent; or denying a child's parent access to certain information.

• SB 199, authored by Sens. Gaskill and Rogers, porter Newspaper.

reduces the number of candidates of a political party that are required to sign a written statement indicating their desire to name a watcher to be present at a county primary election.

· SB 235, authored by

rne, prohibits the use of DEI

in the hiring process or in the treatment of individuals by state agencies or recipients of state grants. That bill was transferred to the Judiciary Committee and passed on a vote of 8 to 2. • SB 284, authored by Sen. Byrne, reduces the pe-

riod during which in-person absentee voting may occur from 28 days to seven days ending at noon on the day before Election Day. It is encouraging to see

that our State Legislature is addressing issues of gender. free speech, affirmative action, immigration, technology theft, space exploration, etc. As of Thursday, Jan. 23, the only bill mentioned above to pass out of their chamber is SB 199 on Parental Rights.

The last day a bill can get to a third reading is Feb. 20 for both the House and the Senate. Bills approved by the House or Senate will go to the partner chamber for a hearing and vote before the Governor can sign it into law.



### Collaboration between physicians & APRNs is what's best for patients

cians and APRNs. Physicians consider APRNs valuable colleagues in the delivery and expansion of medical care, but as part of a physician-led team. APRN political leadership claims physician opposition to APRN independent practice is a competitive "turf" issue. Not true. It's about quality and safety of care. Any physician who has trained or worked with APRNs will tell you that



tions due to insufficient clinical training, knowledge, and experience, especially

as new graduates. The clinical training experience of physicians ranges roughly between

12,000 and 16,000 hours compared to 500 to 750 hours for APRNs. APRN training varies widely by school, and some are even partly internet based. Many schools have inconsistent and poorly organized and vetted clinical rotations. Their student experience is largely observational.

There are also important qualitative training differences. Physicians receive much more rigorous experiences, depth of responsibility, and intensive knowledge acquisition. Physician trainees have years of direct structured shoulder-to-shoulder supervision and mentoring with faculty. Practice collaboration agreements between APRNs and physicians are no substitute.

Patients come to a physician or an APRN in an undifferentiated manner. A symptom like chest pain or back pain could be of minor significance but could nature of APRN's research,

condition. APRNs must have the clinical training, experience, and judgment to recognize and appropriately address all such clinical scenarios and the subtleties and complexities that may be present. There is danger in not recognizing what one does not know.

If APRNs desire independent practice (I confidently believe most do not), they should receive the additional clinical training, either in professional school or post-graduation, necessary to better assure readiness and competence. APRN political leader-

ship asserts that APRN-independent practice is essential to increasing health-care access in underserved rural areas. This is refuted by using Centers for Medicare and Medicaid objective geographic mapping demonstrating a very similar practice location distribution of physicians and independent-practice APRNs.

APRN leadership claims to have research proving that the quality of care in independent practice is equivalent to or better than physicians' despite the disparity in training. The physician community has repeatedly pointed out the problematic

they have limita- also be a life-threatening much of which is of poor quality; confounded; and old, conducted at a time when physician supervision was required.

Many studies in the medical literature including research by the National Bureau of Economic Research, the Mississippi State Medical Association, and the Mayo Clinic demonstrate care provided by APRNs in comparison to physicians is more inefficient, of lower quality, and more costly. APRNs order more expensive diagnostic tests, request more specialty referrals, are responsible for more avoidable hospitalizations, and overprescribe antibiotics and opioids.

I know of an Indiana family physician who was previously an APRN. She reflected that after attending medical school and residency, "I realized how much I did not know."

Let's continue to expand patient access through increasing the number of physicians and non-physician providers working in physician-led collaboration.







### Do not believe Satan's lies! (Part 1)

looked around and thought, "How did we get here?" I mean as a culture. Where something foundational to creation has become hated, rejected, or blurred? Like marriage, gender,

family, etc. Has this world lost its mind?

Paul describes a similar culture where gentiles rejected God from their minds and cultures (Romans 1:18-32). So, God let them believe all of Satan's lies and He gave them over to all kinds of confusion and uncleanness. Here is the point: The further away we get from the Creator the further away we get from truths of creation itself. The further away we get from the light the darker our minds (and eventually our cultures) become. The further away from the source of truth the more we believe the lie.

That is what we are watching. We have all been there and done that. We have all given ourselves over to the "futility of our minds," "understanding had our darkened" and our lives showed the fruit of it (Eph 4:17-18). That is why God has called us to be transformed by the "renewal of our minds" (Rom 12:2).

since. Believe me,

Perhaps one of Satan's biggest lies is, "There is no such thing as truth." Have you ever heard that before? From college courses to political (im)moral discourses, it is the rationale for so many of our societal trends. Most people who say this do not believe this, but what they are really trying to say is something like this: "There is no such thing as your truth, and I want to tell you about my truth ... There is no such thing as objective truth, but truth is subjective ... What is true for you, is not true for me (and vice versa)."

Did you know the Bible warns us about this? Both Judges 17:6 and Judges 21:25 say something like, everyone did what was right in his own eyes." That is the bookend to the book.

In Judges 17:6, Micah had made some idols. There were a bunch of weird things going on with reli-

gious practices. We would call it "religious relativity." You can worship however you want to worship, and I can worship however I want to worship, and God will just have to be pleased with it. But that is not true! The truth is, God has a certain way He wants to be worshipped, and Micah was doing it all wrong.

In Judges 21:25, there were men desiring to know other men carnally and the Levite's concubine that they abused and then divided into pieces and sent body parts throughout the whole land. It was just a terrible story. That's what we call "moral relativity."

So, the moral of the story is that when men do not live by a higher standard, but do what is right in their eyes, these are the kinds of things that happen.

That reminds me of this description of God's people in Isaiah's day in Isaiah 5:20-21. Again, these were God's people. These are the sour grapes of God's vineyard (cf. Isaiah 5:1-7). He had done so much for them, hoping He would get good, godly, profitable, delicious fruit, but all he got was sour, worthless grapes.

This is what he got instead: "Woe to those who call evil good, and good evil; Who put darkness for light, and light for darkness; Who put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter!"

Have you ever seen that? Values trade places. Roles get switched. Where something once said to be right becomes wrong, and something said to be wrong becomes right. You do not have to use much imagination, do you? If you have lived in this country long enough you have even watched that happen, haven't you? Things God calls wrong, sinful, and even unnatural have not only become tolerated but celebrated.

THE TRUTH: What God calls wrong is actually wrong. What God calls right is actually right. Just meditate on those passages and consider them as you hear people preaching or proposing things like, "There is no such thing as truth ... You do your truth, and I can do my truth ... Who is to say one is right and the other wrong?

God has, and He is the standard.

WHEREAS, the City of Fishers ("City") has evaluated the City's municipal boundaries, surrounding territory, provision of local government service, existing developments, agreements for annexation, and opportunities for growth and development of the City and its surrounding community;

WHEREAS, the City has identified an area southeast of the City's current municipal boundaries for annexation to the City, generally known as the "Southeast Fishers"

WHEREAS, a map and legal description of the Southeast Fishers Annexation Area is attached hereto as Exhibit A and Exhibit B, respectively ("Annexation Territory")

WHEREAS, where the legal description attached as Exhibit B describes land that is contiguous to a public highway right-of-way that has not previously been annexed, the Annexation Territory shall include the contiguous public highway right-of-way even if it is not described in Exhibit B, except to the extent prohibited by I.C. § 36-4-3

1. S(c) or other applicable law;
WHEREAS, where the parcel of property within the Annexation Territory is adjacent to a parcel of property within the existing City limits, the Annexation Territory boundary shall conform to and match the boundary of the existing City limits so long as it does not result in adding or removing parcels of property from the Annexation

WHEREAS, the Annexation Territory consists of approximately 994.7 acres, and is contiguous to the existing City limits;
WHEREAS, prior to the introduction of this Ordinance, the City provided notice to landowners and conducted an outreach program in July 2024 to inform citizens

regarding the annexation, as required by I.C. § 36-4-3-1.7;

WHEREAS, prior to adoption of this Ordinance, the City, by resolution, adopted a written fiscal plan and policy for the provision of services of both a non-capital and aprital nature to the Annexation Territory, that meets the requirements of I.C. § 36-4-3;

WHEREAS, the terms and conditions of this annexation, including the written fiscal plan and policy, are fairly calculated to make the annexation fair and equitable to

roperty owners and residents of the Annexation Territory and of the City;
WHEREAS, the City has further determined the Annexation Territory is needed and can be used by the City for its development in the reasonably near future; WHEREAS, prior to the final adoption of this Ordinance, the City has conducted a public hearing pursuant to proper notice; and

WHEREAS, it is the determination of the Common Council that the annexation set forth herein is appropriate and the Annexation Territory should be annexed to the

City of Fishers pursuant to the terms of this Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FISHERS, INDIANA, THAT:

SECTION 1. The above recitals including Exhibit A and Exhibit B are incorporated herein by this reference as though fully set forth herein below.

SECTION 2. In accordance with I.C. § 36-4-3 et seq., the Annexation Territory described and depicted in Exhibit A and Exhibit B is hereby annexed to the City and hereby included within the City's corporate boundaries pursuant to the terms of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3. The Annexation Territory is assigned to Council District 1.

SECTION 4. The Annexation Territory shall maintain its current zoning classification(s) and designation(s) until such time as the City updates its respective temprehensive plan zoning and inspector caping and inspector capin

comprehensive plan, zoning ordinance, or zoning map.

SECTION 5. As provided in I.C. § 36-4-3-4.1, any real property in the Annexation Territory assessed as agricultural land (under the real property assessment rules and guidelines of the department of local government finance) is exempt from property tax liability under I.C. § 6-1.1 for "municipal purposes," and is not considered a part of the City for purposes of involuntarily annexing future additional territory, while the property's assessment classification remains agricultural land. As fire protection services are not uniquely a municipal service, the Annexation Territory will continue to pay the applicable fire tax rate (to the extent not otherwise exempt) until reclassified and assessed the full municipal tax rate. SECTION 6. There is hereby created a special fund titled the "Southeast Annexation Impoundment Fund" ("Impoundment Fund"). For a period of three (3) years

section 6. There is hereby created a special fund titled the Southeast Almexation Impoundment Fund. (Impoundment Fund.) For a period of three (3) years following the effective date of this annexation, all municipal property taxes imposed in the Annexation Territory after the annexation takes effect that are not used to mee the basic non-capital and capital services set forth in the fiscal plan shall be impounded in the Impoundment Fund. The impounded property taxes in the Fund shall be used to provide additional services that were not specified in the fiscal plan, and shall be expended not later than five (5) years after the annexation becomes effective. SECTION 7. There is hereby created an advisory board titled the "Southeast Annexation Advisory Board" ("Advisory Board"). The Advisory Board is governed by I.C. § 36-4-3-8.1, and shall advise the City on the provision of services to the Annexation Territory that are paid for with the municipal property taxes impounded in the Impoundment Fund. The Advisory Board shall be appointed not later than ninety (90) days after the annexation becomes effective, and shall consist of the following

(1) The township trustee of the township with the largest number of residents living within the Annexation Territory.

(2) One (1) member of the County Council representing the district with the largest number of residents living within the Annexation Territory;

(3) One (1) member who is the City engineer;

(4) Two (2) citizen members, appointed by the Mayor, who own real property and reside within the Annexation Territory;

(5) Two (2) citizen members, appointed by the County Commissioners, who own real property and reside within the Annexation Territory.

SECTION 8. All prior Ordinances or parts thereof that may be inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby superseded. The paragraphs, sentences, words, amendments, and Annexation Territory of this Ordinance are separable, and if a court of competent jurisdiction hereof declares any portion of this Ordinance or the Annexation Territory unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the remaining portions of the Annexation Territory or

SECTION 9. The effective date of this annexation shall be as soon as allowed by law following its adoption, execution, and publication as required by law. Any owners of real property within the area proposed to be annexed who want to remonstrate against the proposed annexation must complete and file remonstrance petitions in compliance with I.C. 36-4-3. A remonstrance petition may not be filed by an owner of real property that is subject to a valid waiver of remonstrance. Remonstrance petitions must be filed not later than ninety (90) days after the date that notice of the adoption of the annexation ordinance was published under I.C. 36-4-3-7.
