# Reading program at Noble Crossing Elementary is slam dunk for Mad Ants

The Indiana Mad Ants are making themselves right at home ... in the best possible way.

On Wednesday, Feb. 5, Noble Crossing Elementary School hosted Mad Ants Head Coach Tom Hankins and players Josiah-Jordan James and Ishmael Lane to celebrate readers by signing autographs and posing for photos.

Since 2023, the NBA G League team has been playing their games at Gainbridge Fieldhouse, which they share

with their affiliate team, the Indiana Pacers. Having made their home in Fort Wayne from the time of their inception in 2007, the Mad Ants moved to be closer to the Pacers.

Indiana Mad Ants Team President Tim Bawmann said he has been looking for ways to get the team involved in the local community.

"I mentioned it to the Noblesville Schools superintendent, and one thing led to another," Bawmann said.

Taryn Hassler, Noble Crossing media specialist, had been planning a book initiative related to biographies.

"It was perfect timing for both of us," Bawmann said.

The reading challenge, which started in early January, saw 270 students participate in the program, with 1,108 books read. In fact, according to Bawmann, Noble Crossing students checked out more biographies in the last few weeks than in the entirety of last year.

"I talked to kids who read books on LeBron James and Steph Curry," Bawmann said.

Having been involved in reading programs in Fort Wayne, the team recognizes that literacy is important across the board.

"We found there is a need to get reading levels up and get kids more interested in reading," Bawmann said.

The Noble Crossing students could earn various prizes from the Mad Ants, depending on how many books they read, starting with a Mad Ants bookmark for all who registered and culminating in items like team T-shirts and mini-basketballs.

In addition, everyone who participated got a chance to win four tickets to the Mad Ants Saturday, Feb. 8 game against the Motor City Cruise. That night

# IndyINTEGIRLS works to bridge the gender gap in STEM

Merriam-Webster defines the word as "essential to completeness."

In her freshman year at Carmel High School, Sophia Fu found math competitions and camps to be far from "complete" in terms of gender representation.

"I did a lot of math competitions in elementary and middle school," Fu said. "There was a lack of women, women-identifying, and people of different kinds of gender backgrounds. As a student who was a girl, it often made me feel isolated. I also noticed that there were a lot of my friends who wanted to participate in math competitions, but they didn't necessarily believe in themselves."

Rather than stepping back in

intimidation, Fu stepped up.

"It inspired me to take action in my own community to encourage girls and gender

identities to pursue math at the next level," Fu said.

The result was the birth of IndyINTEGIRLS.

"Integrals is a math term and a really widely used concept in



“I get more joy out of giving back and supporting the community than ever before,” he said.

Bawmann particularly enjoys giving people experiences that they would otherwise never have, like inviting kids out and having them sit on the floor.

“Any way I can find people in need in communities and help put a smile on their faces feeds my soul,” he said.

The plan is that the Mad Ants will open their 2025-2026 season at The Arena at Innovation Mile, which is being built at 14157 CJ Way near Interstate 69 and is targeted to be completed this summer.

“It’s going to be a great venue and just the right size for us,” Bawmann said.

calculus,” Fu said. “INTE-GIRLS is a play on words.”

The name IndyINTE-GIRLS pays homage to the fact that it began in the Indianapolis area. However, the organization, not associated with CHS, has grown beyond the city in the nearly three years since its inception and now has officers and members from all over Indiana.

One way IndyINTE-GIRLS strives to reach its goal of empowering and supporting women and gender minorities in STEM is by hosting math competitions twice a year, one in person and one online. The online competitions are open to out-of-state and international students as well. To date, IndyINTEGIRLS’ competitions have hosted more than 1,000 students from 25 countries, according to Fu.

In addition to competitions, IndyINTEGIRLS seeks to help women and gender minorities interested in STEM reach their full potential by providing opportunities and creating networking connections through its website and social media platforms, in-

cluding a Discord server. Having reached more than 200,000 people, the organization’s online platforms produce educational content and offer free STEM help.

IndyINTEGIRLS has also garnered more than \$50,000 in corporate sponsorships, with the largest being from Lilly and MiTek.

The next step for IndyINTEGIRLS will be to launch a mentoring program. At present, most of the IndyINTEGIRLS members are in middle school to early college.

“For me, as a high school student, what’s been really important to me is having women in STEM who are older than me who I can look to,” Fu said. “The idea of mentorship is really valuable to everyone.”

As a senior at CHS, Fu isn’t quite sure what she wants to study in college, but statistics and electrical engineering are among her top choices. However, she does know that she wants to continue her work with IndyINTEGIRLS.

# Introducing Walter Rippy, Westfield Fire Community Paramedic

Westfield Fire Department's (WFD) EMS Division is launching a full-time Community Paramedicine program, expanding its ability to provide proactive, patient-centered care beyond 911 emergencies.

Leading this program will be Paramedic Walter Rippy. He has six years of paramedic experience and 22 years as an EMT, bringing a wealth of knowledge to this critical role. Having worked in both hospital and field settings across urban and suburban environments, he is dedicated to bridging emergency care with long-term health solutions for our community.

A Community Paramedic is highly trained to help close the gap between emergency response and ongoing healthcare needs. This program focuses on chronic disease management, reducing ER visits and connecting patients with resources to help improve overall

community health. WFD's innovative approach includes EPIC (Engaging People in Crisis), a mobile integrated health program that partners with fire, EMS, and law enforcement. Using EPIC, first responders can refer patients to the department's Community Paramedic or Emergency Response Social Worker, for follow-up care – to assist them in receiving the right support at the right time.

The unique component of this program in Westfield is that WFD is one of the few fire departments with a full-time social worker embedded in the team. This allows WFD to address mental health crises, substance use, and other social determinants of health – providing, compassionate care and long-term solutions beyond the emergency.

With this approach, Westfield is providing progressive, community-focused care beyond the traditional emergency response.

# Sheridan reserve police officer charged with felony for shooting Maple Run home

On Jan. 19 at 12:30 p.m., a report of a shots fired call occurred in the Maple Run subdivision in Sheridan. The incident eventually led to the involvement of a Sheridan reserve police officer.

Sheridan Police Chief Mike Nielsen asked the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office to investigate the incident. As a result of their investigation, Reserve Officer William Vernon will be charged by the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office.

Officer Vernon was placed on suspension and processed for the arrest. The charge is one count of Criminal Recklessness, I.C. 35-42-2-2(a), a Level 6 Felony. "It is important that this investigation was handled in full transparency and without bias from the

beginning," Chief Nielsen said. "That is why I asked the Sheriff's Office to conduct the investigation that day. The Sheridan Police Department will always follow the rule of law and treat everyone the same. This incident is unfortunate and was not intended to happen. We are all thankful that no one was injured or killed. It is a very good reminder for all of us to always be aware of your surroundings, your backstop, how far a projectile will travel, and how close you are to town or housing additions when firing any type of weapon with projectiles. My thanks go out to the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office for their diligent work on this case. We will be patient as this case goes through the Hamilton County Justice System."

The time-honored tradition of sending care packages to our deployed troops continued as 2025 started here in Hamilton County.

On Saturday, Jan. 25 at the Lowell Beaver American Legion Post 470 in Fishers, 35 volunteers young and old gathered to pack up an incredible 147 care packages for our recently deployed Indiana National Guard's 38th ID unit. On Sept. 25, 2024, 600 citizen soldiers deployed in support of Operation Spartan Shield to the Middle East from Camp Atterbury. They are scheduled to be deployed for at least one year.

The Hamilton County Veterans Corp. # Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness delivers State of the City address

## Announces major new corporate & lifestyle investments

### The REPORTER

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness delivered his annual State of the City address Wednesday, announcing major new corporate and lifestyle investments and marking a decade of service as the city's first mayor.

Fadness highlighted Fishers' rapid growth over the past decade and the community's transformation from a small suburb to a major regional destination and fourth-largest city in the state. In addition to the accelerated population growth, the mayor cited the city's expanding infrastructure and lifestyle amenities over the past 10 years, referencing the 61 percent increase in park acreage, \$135 million investment in parks and trails, roadway improvements such as the 106th Street interchange and State Road 37 project, and new community amenities like the Fishers Event Center, Nickel Plate Trail, and upcoming Fishers Community Center.

Fadness also announced a lineup of major new investments that will bring new jobs and lifestyle amenities to the community. These investments include:

- **Expanded restaurant**

**& retail at Fishers District from BW Development:** A \$30 million investment from BW Development will bring new restaurant and retail space to The Crossing at Fishers District, home of the new Fishers Event Center. The 35,000 square-foot leasable space will provide new dining and retail options to this burgeoning entertainment district.

- **A mixed-use development joins new restaurant & retail at The Crossing:** In the coming weeks, a partnership with another development company will be presented to Fishers City Council to bring a new, mixed-use development to The Crossing. This proposed development will include multifamily housing, retail space, and a potential hotel pad.
- **AgriPark 2.0 in west Fishers:** The city is developing an AgriPark 2.0 in west Fishers to expand the offerings of one of the city's most unique and popular parks. This second AgriPark will bring the urban farm experience

to west Fishers, offering u-pick produce, special programming, and more.

- **New Target store in east Fishers:** A 148,000 square-foot Target store is coming to 136th Street in east Fishers, adding new jobs and a convenient shopping experience for eastside residents. The store will be located south of Southeastern Parkway at Exit 210 and will feature a dedicated drive-up order location, extensive native landscaping, and an improved pedestrian experience.
- **New investments from life science companies:** NCOG BioPharma Services has committed approximately \$280 million to build out its Fishers site along Fishers' Life Sciences & Innovation Corridor. The company plans to add nearly 100 new employees by the end of the year and another 100 in 2026, along with adding a third filling line and 114,000 square-foot building to their site. Stevanato Group, located at the Fishers Life Science & Innovation Park, is also

# Carmel City Council approves enhanced fire department staffing & additional ambulance

In support of Carmel's commitment to world-class public safety, the Carmel Fire Department is expanding staffing to better serve the growing west side community.

The City Council approved funding at the Feb. 3 meeting that will provide two firefighters per shift, six total, to staff the Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulance currently parked at Station 342. Located at 106th Street and Shelborne Road, Station 342 serves the southwest side of Carmel as the first fire and EMS response unit.

The additional staffing will:

- **Reduce ambulance response times** serving patients on scene, ensuring timely transport to hospitals for critical medical attention.
- **Enhance initial fire-ground operations**, reducing response times and minimizing property damage during residential and commercial fires and emergencies.

recommended response times to 911 calls within a fire department response district. The standards call for the first arriving unit within five minutes not less than 90 percent of the time, with a transporting unit arriving within nine minutes not less than 90 percent of the time. Carmel's districts all meet or exceed the standard, with the west side area targeted for the increased staffing occasionally falling under the standard.

The city partnered with the International Association of Fire Fighters Local 4444 on the assessment, which focused on increasing fire and EMS service delivery to areas of the city that are not currently meeting all national standards guidelines.

"We thoroughly reviewed current services, past incident numbers and response times and determined that additional equipment, facilities and personnel are needed to provide increased fire and EMS services to the west side of Carmel," Thacker said.

Council President Adam Aasen said council members are aligned with the Mayor on the enhanced team.

"We are committed to providing our community with the level of emergency response they expect and deserve," Aasen said. "As the west side continues to grow, we will continue to be proactive when it comes to safety."

Councilor Rich Taylor, finance chair, added: "We look forward to having this additional ambulance in service to better support the southwest side of Carmel."

The City Council's approval introduces \$800,000 to the budget in support of the additional staffing.

# Two mayors warn of major cuts as property tax hearings begin

Two Indiana mayors from opposing parties told lawmakers a more targeted approach to property tax reform could head off significant cuts, especially to public safety.

Six days after Gov. Mike Braun pushed for property tax reform in his State of the State address, lawmakers held their first hearing on

his plan last Tuesday.

In its current form, the measure would allow homeowners to either file for a 60 percent homestead deduction or have their tax bill reset to 2021 levels. It also would require property tax referendum votes to occur during general elections in even-numbered years, when voter turnout is higher for presidential and midterm elections.

Property tax rates sky-

rocketed following the pandemic. Braun's team shared data with the Senate Tax and Fiscal Policy Committee which showed that property taxes spiked by 5.6 percent for taxes paid in 2021, then another 49 percent for 2022 and 10.2 percent in 2023. Taxes paid for the years 2024 and 2025 will net homeowners back-to-back increases of 7.1 percent each year.

Those numbers carry

real-world consequences. While lawmakers took testimony on the plan upstairs, Braun hosted two homeowners for a fireside chat in his office. Indianapolis resident Jennie Reith said her property taxes went up by \$1,200 over the past four years, while Franklin resident Mark Gross said he pays at least \$1,000 a year more now than in 2021.

# Should Indiana townships be dissolved? A proposed Indiana House bill says yes

Should Indiana townships be dissolved and give control of municipal services, such as the fire department and EMS, to the county? A proposed bill would dissolve all fire protection districts and fire protection territories.

House Bill 1233, authored by Rep. Karen Engleman, R-Corydon, would require local government reorganization by Jan. 1, 2027. All counties, except for Marion County, will have their townships dissolved and their responsibilities absorbed by the county. The bill leaves room for the potential to dissolve towns, with a population less than

1,000, if its operating costs are too high.

Each county's board of commissioners would "assume the powers and duties of township trustees with regard to fire protection and emergency services" after all fire protection districts and territories are dissolved. The county would be responsible for providing fire protection and emergency services to unincorporated areas of the county, whether through contracting, volunteer firefighting departments, or agreements with other municipalities.

According to the bill, each county board of commissioners would have to develop a plan to consider what areas are over and under served in the county,

with "at least two" public meetings to discuss the plan. After the start of 2027, the county trustee can adopt amendments to that plan.

Every four years, all towns with a population less than 1,000 must submit a report costs to the county comparing services provided to citizens and the town's operating. The bill says a county could then dissolve the town if "the town's operating costs exceed the expenditures for delivery of services to residents."

Any debt a township and a dissolved town has will be taken on by the county; however, the bill creates a plan to levy taxes only on people who reside in the geographic area of the former town.

Public libraries would not immediately be affected a township being dissolved, the bill says. But, the county's legislative body could choose to withdraw from any responsibilities to libraries that the township had.

If the bill were to become law, a temporary township advisory group would be created to assist the county trustee; by Jan. 1, 2027, that township's advisory group would be disbanded.

House Bill 1233 has currently been referred to the Committee on Local Government for a first reading.

# Indiana Township Association concerned with House bill to dissolve townships

The Indiana Township Association is against efforts to dissolve all Indiana townships.

Debbie Driskell, the executive director of the Indiana Township Association, said efforts to take away township governments will harm Hoosiers by taking away services.

"You're removing those that were elected further from the people," Driskell said. "So, that's actually diminishing democracy."

Driskell said townships

have been around for centuries to protect the poor and public safety.

"Originally, township trustees were called overseers of the poor in Indiana, and we did just that," Driskell said. "Took care of the poor, and then over time, we evolved, and now, we offer life-saving services in fire protection and EMS services."

Townships can offer rental and mortgage assistance to residents and provide services for the

homeless.

"It's the trustee that gets our homeless folks off the street and sheltered," Driskell said. "But, at any rate, a family can come in and make an application to have help with their rent."

Driskell said this bill does not say which agency, if any, would be responsible for those services. The county emergency management director would manage fire and EMS services.

"That's a big job to lay

on top of a department that is already charged with some pretty important duties," Driskell said.

Driskell said fire and EMS consolidation can be more expensive in the long run despite the effort to make government more efficient.

The bill was referred to the Committee of Local Government. It has not been heard yet.

# Hamilton County Sheriff's Office investigates personal injury crash involving on-duty Tipton County Sheriff's Deputy

At approximately 3:50 a.m. Sunday, Feb. 2, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office received a request to respond to a personal injury crash involving an on-duty Tipton County Deputy at the intersection of County Road 725 West and State Road 28 in Tipton County.

Hamilton County units responded to the scene and conducted a preliminary investigation. The investigation revealed that the deputy was traveling west on State Road 28 when a second vehicle, traveling north on 725 West, disregarded a stop sign, resulting in a collision at the intersection.

The involved Tipton County Sheriff's Office deputy, Sgt. Dylan Vetur,

sustained minor injuries and was transported to IU Tipton for medical evaluation. He has since been treated and released.

The occupants of the second vehicle appeared to be intoxicated and were uncooperative with law enforcement. Both individuals denied being the driver of the vehicle. Search warrants were obtained for blood draws of both occupants. Their vehicle was transported to the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office for further processing, while the deputy's vehicle was towed to Miller's for additional investigation.

Following the execution of the search warrants, the occupants were released pending further investigation.

# Indiana must protect employer-driven health care choices

Across Indiana, businesses of all sizes work hard to provide quality, affordable health benefits for their employees and their families. But recent efforts – both at the state and federal levels – threaten to take those choices away.

Legislation like Indiana Senate Bill 140 and House Bill 1606 introduced last month, along with misguided proposals being considered in Congress, unfairly target pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) under the guise of reform. These efforts would strip employers of the tools they rely on to offer quality prescription drug coverage at an affordable price, ultimately raising costs for businesses and workers.

Employers and their employees are the first ones to feel the growing costs of health care, and they depend on PBMs to push back against those increases. PBMs play a critical role in our healthcare system, helping health plan sponsors offer the pharmacy benefits their employees need at a price the employees can afford. On average, PBMs save employers and families \$1,040 per person each year by leveraging their scale to negotiate lower prices and rebates. As a result, PBMs make it possible for businesses to offer high-quality, affordable benefits while keeping premiums and out-of-pocket costs in check. PBMs give employers flexibility and a wide range of choices so that each health

plan sponsor can design the benefits that best suit their needs. A national survey of nearly 700 employers found that “88 percent of survey respondents expressed satisfaction with their PBMs’ ability to provide the lowest costs for employees at the pharmacy counter.”

The value of PBMs extends far beyond employers and those who rely on prescription medications. The University of Chicago Economics Professor Casey Mulligan found that PBMs create an annual \$145 billion value for society. Mulligan’s research highlights that PBMs’ impact goes beyond the employer-PBM-patient relationship. They benefit the entire healthcare system – including drug manufacturers, pharmacies, and government programs – by introducing cost-saving mechanisms and competition that help lower prices.

However, lawmakers are targeting PBMs and creating a spider web of regulations to disable them. Proposals like spread-pricing bans, government-mandated pass-through pricing, and “delinking” policies would strip away these cost-saving mechanisms, leaving businesses with fewer choices and higher expenses. These misguided policies claim to help patients, but in reality, they would increase healthcare costs by over \$26 billion annually – a devastating hit for small businesses, workers, and families.

“Literally one day a month, my paycheck goes straight to paying taxes,” Gross said.

Braun’s plan carries a stiff price tag. The state’s budget writers estimate local governments could lose a combined total of more than \$1 billion next year and in each year following. State budget writers released estimates for every single township, city and county in the state, along with school corporations and special taxing districts. IMPD could lose \$4.2 million next year if the bill passes in its current form. Greenfield-Central Schools would lose \$2.9 million. The Monroe County Public Library would lose about \$900,000. All of those figures go up in the years that follow.

Carmel Mayor Sue Finkam, a Republican, and Terre Haute Mayor Brandon Sakbun, a Democrat, told lawmakers their cities would have to cut essential services if the plan passes in its current form. Sakbun said his city would have to reduce its total workforce by 10 to 15 percent. He said 82 percent of his city’s property tax revenue goes to public safety.

“In the city of Terre Haute, we are already reducing our total amount of personnel,” he said. “What’s abundantly important here is, when you have the conversation around taxation, it’s important to also say, well, folks, you get what you pay for.”

Finkam said Carmel already has one of the lowest tax rates in the state. She said her city would lose \$26 million next year, more than one-fourth of Carmel’s general fund revenue. As an example of the city’s uses for property tax revenue, she said Carmel already has two fewer fire stations than it needs to provide adequate

fire protection and the city council just voted Monday night to add another ambulance on the city’s west side.

“It’s how do we do that and still maintain the services that people deserve and expect and frankly have been invested in for years,” she said.

During his testimony, Sakbun noted 40 percent of the people who live in Terre Haute are renters rather than homeowners and said the property tax conversation should include them as well. Braun said while he’s open to that, homeowners have borne the brunt of the increase in property taxes over the past four years and so are in the greatest need of relief.

Braun said he’s open to conversations with local government leaders like Finkam and Sakbun on how to implement his plan in a way that minimizes impact to services. He said local governments are nearly always run more efficiently than state government, but that doesn’t mean there’s no room for cities and counties to find additional savings.

“This is an issue about listening to the taxpayers – some of them now feel that they may not be able to keep their home – and listening to the folks that we all want to be healthy and survive,” Braun said, adding he wants to make sure local governments weren’t simply taking advantage of a tax revenue windfall.

There was no committee vote Tuesday. Bill author Sen. Travis Holdman, R-Markle, said he plans to file an amendment based on feedback from Tuesday’s hearing, with a possible committee vote coming next week.



coverage more expensive and complicated to access.

Legislators should reject harmful policies undermining employer choice and free-market competition in health care. The right approach is straightforward: support businesses, protect the private market, and preserve the flexibility that keeps prescription drug costs under control for Hoosier families.

Legislation like SB 140, considered in Indiana, would add a \$10.64 tax on many prescriptions filled in the state and even ban employers from offering specific lower-cost pharmacy options, such as mail-order. Mail-order is a convenient and affordable option that helps patients stay on the medicines they need by ensuring they get their prescriptions delivered right to their doors.

As someone who spent years in the Indiana legislature, I know the importance

of allowing businesses to operate with flexibility and market-driven solutions. Employers – not government mandates – should decide how to structure their health benefits. When companies have the freedom to choose the best options for their employees, they can better control costs, improve coverage, and provide stability for their workforce.

Weakening PBMs would force businesses to make difficult decisions – either absorb higher healthcare

costs, shift those costs to employees through higher premiums and out-of-pocket expenses, or reduce their benefits altogether. None of these outcomes help working families.

Instead of interfering with employer-driven health plans, policymakers should strengthen the private market and ensure businesses retain the tools to keep health care affordable. Indiana’s workers and employers deserve policies that protect their benefits, not those that make

# Silence isn’t always golden

Most of us have heard the saying “silence is golden,” meaning it is often better or more respectful to remain silent than to speak. The full saying is “speech is silver, silence is golden.”


While that may very well be true in some cases, when it comes to silence and having my needs met as a person with a disability, this statement is untrue. In fact, it is better to speak up and voice my needs as someone who has needs that have to be met to keep me safe or make an experience as successful as possible for me.

A longtime friend recently reminded me how I used to “mask” my disability in middle and high school, and even into college. The last thing I wanted to do was draw attention to myself at that age, especially if I felt like I was putting someone out to get a need met. Often, I chose to silently suffer because I was too shy, too afraid, or not educated enough to know that it was okay to speak up for myself and what I needed as a young, disabled girl. To be honest, it was mostly because I did not want to be any more different from my peers than I already was. Blending in was the goal then, not standing out.

My high school had an elevator which I had to use after having a surgery. I also had permission to have someone leave class with me early to allow extra time to get to class and avoid crowded hallways of students unfamiliar with dodging a wheelchair. However, when I was not recovering from a surgery, using that elevator was the last thing I wanted to do. I chose to do things the hard way and very slowly make my way up the crowded stairways. I always hated that feeling of people effortlessly climbing the stairs all around me. We had exactly seven minutes to get to our lockers and get stuff for the next class. That was sometimes a challenge depending on the distance between classes, but it is what I chose to do.

Looking back, that seems silly to me. Unless I was forced to ask for accommodations, I was going to avoid it, even if it meant my life was more difficult and internally stressful.

I did it in my work life, too. For a long time, I never told my boss that I had to crawl up my clients’ stairs if they did not have a railing at their home during my hundreds of home visits over the years in social services. I just kept doing it, each time being horribly stressed out and humiliated. It is impossible to come across as confident

and capable when you are meeting your client or parents of a client when on your hands and knees, if they happened open the door up before I was able to get back up. Some were horrified, others compassionate. I did this for years and years. Why? I did not want to cause a fuss.

Even now, I often find myself staying quiet when I should be speaking up for an accommodation that I need in a certain situation. It is hard to ask for things when you do not know if you will be met with a kind attitude or a hateful one. I have gotten better at it, but sometimes I still try to avoid the interaction.

That certainly would not be my advice to a younger person asking me. I would tell them to absolutely speak up for their needs, boldly and confidently. Why? Because as human beings we should all have the same access to what society has to offer. It is absurd to think that because someone is disabled, they would not be given the same opportunities as a non-disabled person, but it is not at all uncommon. Living with a disability can be difficult without the added stress of constantly fighting for simple accommodations like access to a restaurant, theatre, airplane, restroom, tourist attraction etc.

In my role as the National Ambassador for the Muscular Dystrophy Association, publicly sharing my story helped me to grow in confidence tremendously. Each time I shared my story with an audience, I felt more empowered to voice my needs as a disabled woman.

Even though I am not perfect at speaking up for my needs, especially when I feel like I am putting someone out, or changing someone else’s experience, I am getting better at using my voice. How could I have expected my family, friends, or teachers to know what I needed when I was not saying a word? I could not. That is just part of my life’s reality. I do have to explain my needs and often follow up with a story about why.

Silence is not always golden. If you have the need to speak up for yourself, then humbly courageously do so, even if it feels like there are people who would rather you not.

# Tell it to my heart

“And the beat goes on ...” – Sonny and Cher, 1967

The beat of our hearts – something we often take for granted; though, I believe we are all aware of the American Heart Association’s use

of February as recognition of the importance of good heart health and the very serious situation that we face when we don’t care for our hearts. (In this column, I am writing about the physical aspect, not the emotional one – although that can certainly affect our health as well.) Additionally, unfortunately some of us are born with heart issues that are not a result of our lifestyles and again that is not a subject specifically referenced here. The statistics on heart disease are staggering, much like the statistics on obesity:\*


- Heart disease strikes someone in the U.S. about once every 43 seconds.

- Heart disease is the No. 1 cause of death in the United States, with over 702,880 deaths in the U.S. last year.

- Heart disease is the No. 1 killer of women, taking more lives than all forms of cancer combined.

In 2018, about 400,000 people experienced out-of-hospital cardiac arrests in the United States. Of those treated by emergency medical services, 10.6 percent survived. Of the 19,300 bystander-witnessed out-of-hospital cardiac arrests in 2011, 31.4 percent survived.

Less than 1 percent of U.S. adults meet the American Heart Association’s definition for “Ideal Healthy Diet.” Essentially no children meet the definition. Of the five components of a healthy diet, reducing sodium and increasing whole grains are the biggest challenges. Eating patterns have changed dramatically in recent decades. Research from 1971 to 2004 showed that women consumed an average of 22 percent more calories in that span and

men consumed an average of 10 percent more. The average woman eats about 1,900 calories a day and the average man has nearly 2,700, according to the government figures. Hypertension is projected to increase about 8 percent between 2013 and 2030.<sup>1</sup>

Heart health can be a complicated topic dependent upon your family health history and your lifestyle choices. Obviously, your primary care physician should have your complete health history which includes information about your family as well as your food choices, any drug, alcohol or tobacco use, and your usual level of activity. From that point he/she may, if warranted, refer you to a cardiologist for further evaluation. Cardiology can determine any steps needed to alleviate potentially serious issues.

In the meantime, we can all practice good heart health through a sensible eating plan which includes mostly vegetables and fruits with complex carbohydrates and clean protein while eliminating saturated and trans fats. Tobacco should be completely avoided and alcohol use kept to a minimum. Those of you who regularly read my column (thank you!) are aware that I am passionate about keeping these bodies moving! Whatever that is for you – walking, dancing (my favorite!), golf, pickleball, cycling, etc. there are many choices. There are many ways to incorporate movement into your life so just Do It! as Nike reminds us!

**6. Provide High-Quality Infrastructure** – Invest in the necessary utility, road and pedestrian infrastructure to ensure safe and reliable transportation throughout the City of Tipton.

Sheridan defends sectional title

Kenzie Garner's 40 points leads Blackhawks past Lapel

**SHERIDAN** — Larry Hobbs Gymnasium was packed last Saturday night, and the crowd got to see the Sheridan girls basketball team make history.

The Blackhawks defended their sectional championship, winning Class 2A Sectional 39 by toughing out a strong Lapel team 54-47. It marked the first time a Sheridan girls team defended a sectional title, and it was also the first time they won a sectional in their home gym.

"It's nice when you score and you just hear the crowd erupt," said Blackhawks senior Cecilia Timme. "It's a really good feeling and just pumps you up for the game."

Kenzie Garner was making the Sheridan crowd scream quite a bit during the game. The senior Ferris State commit scored the Blackhawks' first seven points of the game and finished the first quarter with 12 points.

Sheridan led 12-9 in the opening quarter, then went on a 10-0 run that finished at the start of the second period when Nova Cross drained a 3-pointer. The Blackhawks steadily increased their lead during the second and held their largest lead of the game at 34-15 when Shelby Eaton made a floater.

The Bulldogs scored four

points to finish the first half, cutting Sheridan's lead to 34-19. The start of the third quarter was a spirited battle between Garner and Lapel's star Laniah Willis. The two players were matching each other basket for basket during the first two minutes of the third.

Garner scored seven to start the second half, bringing her total to 29. Willis had already scored seven, and she increased that total to 11 for the quarter with a layin and a jumper. Those two baskets began a 10-0 run for the Bulldogs, getting them within 41-36 by the end of the third.

But Garner stepped up again. She opened the fourth quarter with nine straight points, getting the 'Hawks up 50-36 with under four minutes to go. The Sheridan defense was also doing its job, not allowing Lapel any points in the quarter until Willis scored at the 3:26 mark.

"The defense that Cecilia Timme and Shelby Eaton played on Laniah Willis is just unmatched," said 'Hawks coach Jaidlin Bradshaw. "They did an amazing job. Limiting her was our No. 1 focus. They just did a phenomenal job."

The Bulldogs continued to battle until the end, but Garner put the finishing touches on the sectional win by making two free throws

with 11.2 seconds left. That gave Garner 40 points for the game. She scored every which way possible, making layins, jump shots and floaters, and also went 9-of-12 from the free-throw line.

"I didn't think I had that many points," said Garner. "I came in, I shot this morning. The work just really paid off."

Timme scored six points, followed by Eaton with five and Cross with three. Garner reached double-double status with 13 rebounds, while Timme collected six rebounds.

Sheridan's record now stands at 24-1 for the season.

"I think it is a record, but we're hoping that it's not," said Bradshaw. "We're hoping that we get another one every week. They got a taste of it last year and they're ready to play hard and keep playing hard for as long as you can."

The Blackhawks will travel to Lapel on Saturday to play in the Class 2A regional. Sheridan will take on Lewis Cass; the Kings won their own sectional last Saturday with a 40-27 win over Oak Hill.

# Shamrocks win their first-ever regional crown

Westfield made history in dominating fashion last Saturday at the North Montgomery boys wrestling regional.

The Shamrocks claimed the school's first-ever regional title in that sport, scoring 173 team points for the championship trophy. Westfield scored over 50 points higher than runner-up Fishers, which totaled 119.5 points.

In addition, the 'Rocks qualified 10 for the New Castle semi-state, which takes place this coming Saturday. Five of those qualifiers finished first in their respective weight classes, starting with 106 pounds and finishing with 285 pounds.

"I think we wrestled really well today," said Westfield coach Tom Griffin. "We had a heck of a semifinal round. Putting eight guys in the finals of regionals is a big deal for us. They had a great week of practice and they really performed well."

Freshman Connor Maddox was the 106-pound winner. He won the final with a second-period pin over fellow freshman Lukas Scott of Southmont. Maddox is 34-1 for the season. Junior Job Mavrick triumphed at 285 pounds, getting past Tigers junior Camden Funk in a 7-2 decision.

In between, the 'Rocks claimed three consecutive championships in the middleweights. Senior Carter Niccum won another Westfield-Fishers battle at 132 pounds, toughing out an 8-4 decision win against ju-

nior Will Hruskoci.

Junior Alic Washburn was next at 138, and he got a 16-0 technical fall over Hamilton Southeastern senior Matthew Billet. Senior Jake Saez claimed the 145-pound title, beating Fountain Central sophomore Dakoda Willoughby in an 11-5 decision.


The top four wrestlers in each division advance to semi-state. Westfield's five champions will be joined at New Castle by three runners-up: freshman Brayden Head at 113, senior Porter Temples at 120 and junior Graydon Staley at 150.

The team runner-up Tigers qualified seven to semi-state, a list that includes three champions. Senior 126-pounder Chayce Yant was the first winner, beating Rossville freshman Luke Weaver by a 19-2 technical fall to improve his record to 33-2 for the year.

# Millers advance 10 to semi-state; Michael Cain leads Huskies' five

PENDLETON — As predicted, the eighth-ranked Cathedral Fighting Irish won the Pendleton Heights Regional wrestling team trophy last Saturday afternoon, but the Noblesville Millers made sure the rest of the standings didn't unfold as projected.

A week after claiming the Elwood Sectional team title over runner-up Alexandria and rival Hamilton Heights, the Millers (138.5) finished second at regional with 10 semi-state qualifiers overall, including three individual weight-class champions.

Cathedral (204.0) advanced 11 wrestlers with six individual champions, but the Millers and fifth-place Hamilton Heights (62.0) made their push with five Huskies moving on to the New Castle Semi-State next weekend.

Huskies' senior Michael Cain (42-1), who is ranked fifth at 165 pounds, according to IndianaMat, claimed his third-career regional title with a pin in 1 minute, 31 seconds to start his day and a pair of technical falls through the semifinals and finals in a combined 4:32.

"I'm really pushing the pace. This just helps me open up," Cain said. "I think I'm going to be sitting good at semi-state. I'm going to show who I am this year. I worked hard all offseason, and I'm ready to prove who I am."

Cain, a state qualifier in 2023-24, finished fourth at 157 pounds as a junior during the New Castle Semi-State. A three-time sectional champion, Cain is looking to end his career with a state medal.

"The goal is to place at state. Place or win. We're going for the championship, obviously, but I'm going to keep working hard like I have been," Cain said. "I'm just ready to put on a show from here on out."

Cain has 170 career wins, the most in Hamilton Heights program history, but a 7-2 loss by decision during the IHSAA state finals opening round kept him from a podium finish at Evansville's Ford Center.

"The job is not done. Now, we have to get to the state and get atop of that podium. That's our job," Hamilton Heights coach Gary Myers said. "It's going to be brutal to get to the final four (at semi-state) and once we're there it will be

brutal, but if we want to get to the top of that podium, we have to do well at the semi-state. We can't come in fourth."

Hamilton Heights had two third-place finishers at regional in Simon Kuhn (29-4) at 138 and Justin Tilton (30-7) at 144. Aidan Furst (29-12) and Cooper Doucette (31-11) both placed fourth at 150 and 120, respectively.

The Millers entered regional without a single ranked wrestler compared to Cathedral's seven, but freshman Zach Nekolite (35-7) at 126, junior Jackson Apple (27-5) at 285 and sophomore Cale Metzler (20-21) at 215 each won individual weight-class titles.

"I've been working hard all season. I took a bunch of tough losses, and I just really came out today and showed how good I really am," Metzler said. "Semi-state was my goal all year, and I finally made it. I didn't make it out of sectional last year, so this is big for me."

Metzler lost to 25th-ranked Jonah Ellis (30-1) of Frankton by decision 4-3 in the sectional semifinals last week. The two collided again in the regional semifinals with Metzler scoring some revenge with a pin in

3:00 to hand Ellis his first loss of the season.

The Millers weren't expected to contend this postseason after losing three starters to injuries, including Aidan Kincaide, who was fourth at state as a 157-pound freshman.

"Our kids have battled adversity all year. That's kind of been the big theme, losing a couple starters and a state-placer, so we're young. We had eight freshmen at sectional, so they've gotten tougher. That's the big thing," Millers assistant coach Andrew Fleenor said. "When you face adversity, I think it helps make you tougher, and I think that came out today."

The Millers had five wrestlers place third, including Kai Kaohi (29-16) at 106, Blake Weimer (16-21) at 120, Isaac Suddarth (20-19) at 132, Mason Presits (31-12) at 150 and Yan Tioua (32-11) at 190.

"It was a good day. We knew we had some decent draws, and it was just a matter of going out there and wrestling hard, and our guys did that," Fleenor said. "The big surprise was Cale. He battled today. He upset an undefeated kid who we lost to last week. That was big time for him."

The Carmel girls swim team took care of business at its own sectional finals last Saturday.

Carmel scored 581 points for the team championship, extending its consecutive sectional title

streak to 41. The ‘Hounds will be going for a record 39th straight state title next week.

Westfield finished second with 408 points. The Shamrocks qualified all three of their relays to state under the cut time. Evelyn Wheat finished fifth in the butterfly, but her time of 56.22 seconds was over a second under the cut.

Noblesville placed third with 374 points. Haddie Vohs qualified for state in two individual events, placing second in the butterfly and third in the 200 free, both under the state cut time. The Millers also qualified their 200 and 400 free relays for state by cut time. Eryn McMahon finished second in diving and will advance to Tuesday’s diving regional at Hamilton Southeastern. 
