least 25 people. Only eight people were initially identi-

fied. Thanks to the efforts of Hamilton County Coroner Jeff Jellison, more remains have been identified in the last three years, thus bringing the story

back into the national spotlight. The property where the remains were found was owned by Herbert Baumeister, an individual police suspected of luring gay men to his home and then killing them. Baumeister died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound shortly after the investigation began.

Starting in 2022, Jellison led a group of investigators representing the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, Fishers Police Department DNA Unit, Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department Missing Persons Division, Indiana State Police Biology Unit, the University of Indianapolis' Archeology and Forensic Lab, and deputies from the Hamilton County Coroner's Office.

Invest Hamilton County, along with Ivy Tech Hamilton County and the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, recently launched the Educational Empowerment Program, a forward-thinking initiative designed to support inmates at the Hamilton County Jail in their reentry journey.

This six-week program focuses on equipping participants with personal, professional, and career development skills, setting them on a path toward success upon release.

Each class session is structured to address critical areas of career development including resume building, interviewing, and employability



skills. Upon completion of this program, participants earn the equivalent one college credit hour to apply to an Ivy Tech educational pathway of their choice. The program is designed not only to impart knowledge but to inspire a mindset shift, helping inmates envision a future filled with possibility.

"Education is more than a means to an end; it's a gateway to hope, purpose, and transformation," said Robin Chaddock, instructor for the

education empowerment class. "My goal is to provide a safe space for learners to explore their potential and take actionable steps toward a brighter future."

This program is funded by Invest Hamilton County with support from community partners, including the Hamilton County Community Foundation, Hamilton County Tourism, and Hamilton County Government.

Ivv Tech's mission to provide affordable and accessible education to all is met by fostering confidence, resilience, and readiness in the participants.

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office's willingness to offer this program displays its dedication to rehabilitation and community well-being. Community volunteers also play a key role, guiding participants through the Career Coach and Resume Builder tools housed on the Invest Hamilton County website.

This combination of funding, volunteer effort, and community support underscores a shared commitment to addressing the systemic challenges faced by individuals in the criminal justice system, promoting rehabilitation over recidivism.





Cicero Kiwanis learn how Teter Farm feeds those in need

Teter Organic Farm, an outreach mission of Noblesville First United Methodist Church, grows over 40 varieties of vegetables and has a mixed-species orchard of 280 trees that produce apples, peaches, pears, and plums, as well as a cut flower field and 30 beehives.

"Our mission is to combat food insecurity, build community through meaningful relationships across barriers that sometimes divide us, and educate children and adults on the importance of environmental stewardship and care," said Amber Good, Teter's Associate Director, bers of the Kiwanis Club of Cicero.

Despite being the richest county in Indiana with a median household income just shy of \$115,000 according to the U.S. Census Bureau, more than 22,370 people throughout the county, which is about insecure. The percentage of food-insecure people is higher among children, at 17 percent.

This year, we hope to donate 50,000 servings to area food banks, meal programs and families in need," Good said.

That has been the mission of the organic farm since it was started is 2016. The farm also grows market produce that is sold through a 100-share community supported agriculture (CSA) program at local farmer's markets and to restaurants. Proceeds from the sales are used to support the farming operations.

"We grow food because we believe everyone deserves to eat healthily," Good said. "But the farm also offers tours, farm stays, and environmental education, as well as hosts outdoor weddings, retreats, cooperate outings, and family reunions - which means we are always looking for volunteers!"

Chief Deputy John Lowes releases data on illegal immigrant arrests

Chief Deputy John Lowes of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has released statistical data regarding the number of arrests in Hamilton County of illegal immigrants and the impact of non-U.S. citizen arrests within the county.

The data reflects the number of Hamilton County Jail bookings and the types of crimes committed by individuals without legal status, highlighting concerns related to public safety and law enforcement resources.

According to the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, over the past year, there have been 595 bookings involving individuals identified as illegal immigrants or non-U.S. citizens. These arrests include a range of criminal offenses, including but not limited to the examples below:







Lawmakers in Congress call on USPS to address delivery delays at Indianapolis hub

Indiana lawmakers in Congress have penned a letter to the U.S. Postal Service over delivery delays at its distribution hub in Indianapolis.

about the mail and package delivery delays in Indiana, particularly those linked to the Indianapolis distribution hub. The Indiana Congressional delegation has received dozens of calls over the past week from Hoosiers who have experienced significant disruptions in their mail service. These interruptions have continued to skyrocket in recent days, as local news stations are also highlighting the pain constituents are facing with these delays.

These delays have had real consequences for individuals and businesses alike. Constituents have reported late deliveries of medications, critical financial documents, and essential business shipments. This is primarily reflected

press serious concerns USPS Regional Processing Center on the east side of Indianapolis. Constituents consistently have packages "stuck in transit" unmoving from the processing center for days to weeks. Additionally in other parts of the state, we have heard of issues with mail being routed through Louisville, Kentucky, instead of the Evansville, Indiana, hub due to restructuring. This additional and further removed step prevents communities from accessing their mail system.

These delays and restructuring issues ripple out to rural communities in Indiana. The delegation has heard of multiple post offices shuttering, or limiting services, requiring rural residents to drive longer distances for daily services. in the issues found with the For rural communities that

rely heavily on the Postal Service, these issues are particularly disruptive.

Given the importance of USPS in ensuring timely and reliable mail service, we request a detailed explanation of the causes of these delays and the specific steps the Postal Service is taking to address them.

Additionally, we request that USPS update the Indiana Congressional delegation on the immediate changes at the Indianapolis facility to reduce package wait times, as well as a long-term strategy to ensure Hoosiers have reliable access to these essential services."

The price of vulnerability

At times, when I think about all the life experiences I have publicly shared - deeply personal stories of hardship and triumphs throughout my lifetime as a disabled person - it takes my breath away. Occasionally, I go into panic mode, questioning my decision to share so much. After all, once it is out there, it is there to stay.

I was on the phone with my college-aged son a couple of days ago. I have discovered that part of the beauty of having grown children is that the relationship broadens and some mature life conversations start to take place. We were discussing some positive feedback I received recently about my writing. It was timely feedback, as I was questioning my choice to be so vulnerable as the feedback came in. Should I be doing this? Does it even matter with so much else going on in the world? Sharing my little old life?

What my son said to me made me think. He said, "the reward is far greater than the cost if you take advantage of it."

I agreed.

The reward of helping a fellow human being is one of the best rewards there is. Obviously, there came a time when I decided I want-



risk of being vulnerable. Sharing from the heart, authentically, will always reach someone. We discussed that all humans have a story

and a choice to be vulnerable. Sometimes, those impactful vulnerabilities that are ours to share or not to share come at an extremely high price. For me, that price has been living my 50 years disabled.

Vulnerably telling my story has taught me that while living disabled causes many hardships, it has allowed me to share very impactful stories that have the potential to reach both disabled and non-disabled people. It has surprised me that it has affected people who are not disabled because when I set out on my "new mission" of sharing my story, I had only imagined it helping those who are more "like me." Sometimes, our minds tend to think on such a small scale. That has been the case, too, but the things that those who don't live disabled have told me they have learned from me has been so enlightening to me.

ed to take the and share with the public. You can be vulnerable in a one-on-one conversation and have meaningful impact, too. I have had many conversations with others who have been vulnerable with me, and it motivated me to make changes in my own life. Vulnerability is powerful when used with good intentions.

> In my experience as a disabled person, I have also noticed that many feel comfortable being vulnerable with me. They share deeply person things with me and tell me they have never shared those things with many - or anyone. I have even had strangers come up to me and share very intimate details of their lives because they thought it may help me in some way. Sometimes that is an amazing thing, and sometimes it is very awkward for me.

The scariest part about being publicly vulnerable is, of course, the risk of criticism or harmful comments. On the flip side of that, taking in all the good that can come from it is where the risk becomes worth it. Being vulnerable comes with the automatic responsibility of managing emotions in a healthy way. Understanding that not everyone is going to like, get, or agree with what you are saying. Weighing the To be vulnerable you outcomes before making that don't have to write about it decision. Finding the balance

between oversharing and not sharing enough to make the difference you could make. Ultimately, what it came

down to for me was that in order for me to be authentic for people to truly know and understand me as a person hoping to do a small part to educate others on life with a disability – I had to be comfortable with vulnerability and view it through a positive lens. For a long time, I viewed vulnerability as a negative thing. Once I changed my perspective, it allowed me to be more aligned with my path in life.

The ripple effect from choosing to share our vulnerabilities could spread farther than we could ever imagine. At the end of our conversation, my son said to me, "Your shift from being less vulnerable and open about your disease pre-diagnosis to where you're at now has been something I've really modeled my own life after."

Think of the ripple effect just he could have. The possibilities are endless.





INDIANAPOLIS Nothing can stop the Carmel girls swimming team when it comes to winning the IHSAA state meet.

Not even the flu.

The Greyhounds shrugged off the sickness and kept their historic streak going last weekend at the IU Natatorium. Carmel claimed its 39th consecutive state championship at the finals last Saturday, scoring 448 points to win the trophy once more.

"Our whole team got sick last week, and we handled it really well," said senior Lynsey Bowen. "We all got the flu and it was a lot of adversity, what (coach Chris) Plumb calls it, but I think we handled it really well and we still came out on top."





LAPEL – The Sheridan Blackhawks don't take winning for granted, but losing is never the goal. That trend held true, once again, during the Lapel Regional at Lapel High School.

Winners of 22 straight before the opening tip last Saturday, the Class 2A 11thranked Blackhawks (25-1) went to work immediately with a 15-0 run to start against Lewis Cass (19-7) and forced an IHSAA mercy-rule running clock before the start of the fourth quarter.



A year ago, the Blackhawks stood in the same position after capturing the program's first-ever regional title before losing to Eastern Hancock, 62-54, in overtime during the semi-state semifinals.

Seven Hamilton County wrestlers are headed to the IHSAA boys wrestling state finals after their performances last Saturday at the New Castle semi-state.

Two local wrestlers finished the day as semistate champions. First was Westfield freshman Connor Maddox, who won the 106-pound weight class.

Maddox won his first two matches by technical fall, beat Indianapolis Lutheran sophomore Caleb Morrow in the semifinals with a 7-2 decision, then pinned Cathedral freshman Tate St. Laurent in the second period of the championship match. Maddox is 38-1 for the year.

Carmel senior Michael Major also triumphed at the semi-state, winning the 165-pound title. He rolled into the championship match with a technical fall in the first round, then won his quarterfinal and semifinal matches by pin. In the final, Major got a 5-0 decision win over Hamilton Heights senior Michael Cain to improve to 37-3 for the season.

Cain, now 45-2 for the season, also reached the championship match easily. He won by technical fall in the first round and got a quarterfinal pin, then beat Rossville junior Jacob Cole by an 18-8 major decision in the semis.

Fishers had three wrestlers qualify for state, after each finished in the top four in their weight classes. The Tigers finished fifth in the team standings, scoring 61.5 points.
