The balancing act: cooking, career & community

Life in the U.S. required more than just adapting to a new kitchen – it meant juggling multiple roles.

Back in India, household tasks were often shared. Cooking was a communal experience, supported by extended family and household help. Chop-



ping vegetables, grinding fresh spices, and preparing meals were collective efforts that made the kitchen a space of togetherness rather than just a place of work.

When I moved here, the dynamic changed. Suddenly, my husband and I were juggling between work and being Uber parents for our girls and their extracurriculars – all while managing the responsibilities of running a household. The transition was overwhelming at first. I missed the comforting rhythm of home, where meals were slow-cooked with patience and food was a bridge to connection. But amid the chaos, I found my anchor: food itself.


In today's fast-paced world, we all look for ways to simplify cooking while keeping meals fresh and nourishing. While convenience is essential, I still hold onto the wisdom of slow cooking, fresh ingredients, and mindful preparation - practices deeply rooted in my upbringing. I've learned that balancing tradition with modern efficiency is key. Weekly meal prepping, batch cooking, and embracing new ingredients allow me to nourish my family while staying true to my roots. Keeping a balanced diet and incorporating Satvik food into our meals is my comfort - it keeps me grounded, energized, and connected to my heritage.

One thing we have made a point to prioritize is having at least one meal together as a family. No matter how busy the day gets, sitting down at the table allows us to wind down, share reflections, and stay connected. These moments, however simple, reinforce the idea that food is more than sustenance – it is a time to pause, listen, and be present with one another.

First, I will describe the pros of school starting later. The three main ideas that will be improved are attendance, attention, and grades. These benefits will mostly be centered at a high-school level due to the difference between adolescents' brains and adult brains.

As a person's brain develops rapidly during their teen years, they may need more sleep to help them function properly. That's why school starting at 9 a.m. would be more

For my first improvement, which is attendance, studies from the American Psychological Association (apa.org) show that when students get more sleep they are more likely to attend school long term. People may ask "Why don't the kids just go to sleep earlier?" Well, this is because during puberty hormonal shifts happen in the body that push kids to fall asleep later. This means that the problem is not as simple as it may seem, adding more credibility for a late start.

Secondly, there is a student's attention to consider. Studies show that having well rested students prevents a myriad of problems that involve attention: "Later start times were correlated with better attendance, less tardiness, less falling asleep in class, better grades, and fewer car crashes" (apa.org). All of these problems shown are mostly attention-based. A later start time would not only benefit a student's grade, but it would also benefit early morning commuters. With fewer car crashes associated with a later start time, commuters as well as students would benefit. Many area businesses also have their start time at 8 a.m.,

the cons. Perhaps the main cons of a late start school are the disruption of schedules, logistics of transportation, and extracurricular activities being moved later. These flaws are the main reasons that a late start has not been adapted by more

school systems. I will tackle the first two cons as they tie in together. The main problem that disrupts schedules is that the benefits of a late start are only seen at a high-school and middle-school level; this means there is no need for a late start in elementary school. This can pose a challenge as parents may need to leave earlier than the time the late-start bus arrives, meaning they will have to leave some kids at home. If the parents take their kids to school and some children start late and others don't, it can lead to a difficulty balancing getting kids to school and arriving at work.

Next, I will move onto bigger problem which is bus routes. Schools within a school system starting at different times means that buses need separate routes to accommodate the start times. This means that bus drivers need to be working and buses need to be driving longer.

For the last con of extracurricular activities, they pose a challenge as kids will need to be away from home later. Due to school ending later, extracurriculars will begin and end much later. This can dampen the amount of participation in these activities as either the kids or their parents will not want them to stay out later and impede on family activities such as dinner.

Has this essay changed your mind? This topic is important, and I believe improving the learning experience in school is necessary. Don't fall victim to 'smishing' toll road texts claiming you owe money

Hoosiers statewide like our peers across the able scammers to steal your U.S. – have seen texts pop

up on their phones in recent months warning of unpaid fees from toll roads.

In most cases, warns Indiana **Attorney Gener**al Todd Rokita, the texts come from scammers which Indiana

Toll Road label as SMS Phishing or "smishing" ruses – and the worst thing you can do is click on any of the seemingly helpful yet sinister links.

"These fraudsters try to create a sense of urgency," AG Rokita said. "Often, they include triggering phrases like 'final warning' or 'last chance.' They threaten increased fines or legal penalties if the supposed fees are not promptly paid. The important thing is to pause, take a breath and recognize the red flags."



• Interior plaster restoration: Repairing gallery walls and ceilings to ensure a safe and beautiful exhibition space.

This project has been funded in part by a U.S. Department of the Interior, National Park Service Historic Preservation Fund grant, administered by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology.

The grant requires a dollar-for-dollar match, which AMOA has successfully

secured thanks to the generosity of its supporters. With funding in place, work will begin this spring to restore and protect this historic landmark.

"This grant is a tremendous step forward in preserving our beautiful building, which has been a cornerstone of our community for more than a century," AMOA Executive Director Mandee Spano said. "We are deeply grateful for the support of our donors and the Indiana Department of Natural Resources for making this possible."

Regional preview, 4A at Frankfort

No. 1 Fishers Tigers (27-0) vs. Harrison **Raiders (19-6)**

Case Arena in Frankfort is the regional site for Fishers and Harrison tomorrow night. The top-ranked Tigers will play the nightcap at 7 p.m., following a Class 1A regional meeting between No. 3 Clinton Prairie (23-2) and Lafayette Central Catholic (12-14)

Fishers and the Raiders have met eight times previously between 2006 and 2014 when Harrison was a member of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. The Tigers hold a 6-2 record in those HCC games, the last on Feb. 28, 2014, 79-46. This will be their first meeting in the state tournament.

Fishers outlasted No. 8 Noblesville in the Sectional 8 championship last Saturday at Carmel, 55-46, to claim just their second sectional crown in program history.

The Tigers are aiming for their second straight regional trophy. They won the regional last season over Kokomo at the New Castle Fieldhouse, 66-52. Fishers then marched all the way to the state finals in 2024, defeating Ben Davis, 65-56 in the championship game.

Head coach Garrett Winegar is 105-23 in his fifth season at Fishers and 123-29 overall, going 18-6 at Warren Central in 2019-20.

Dating back to last season, Fishers is on a 40-game winning streak, the longest in the state currently. Overall, they've won 56 of 57 with just one mid-season loss at Carmel last season.

The Tigers continued their win streak into the season and amped up their schedule. Taking a 24-0 regular season record into the tournament, Fishers had quality wins over Ben Davis, Mount Vernon, Noblesville (twice), Warsaw, Greenfield-Central, Fort Wayne Wayne, Brownsburg, South Bend Riley, Avon, Westfield (twice), Peoria Manual (Ill.), Center Grove, Lawrence North and North Central. Sophomore Jason Gard-

ner, Jr. is the leading scorer at 14.6 points and dishes out 5.6 assists per contest. Senior Justin Kirby has both started and come off the bench to score 12.6, grab four boards and 2.3 assists. Sophomore Cooper Zachary stuffs his stat line with 11.4 points, 2.7 rebounds, 5.2 assists and 2.7 steals. Zachary also shoots a scorching 50 percent from three-point range (72-for-144) and 85 percent at the foul line (40

Regional preview, 3A Greenfield-Central

No. 5 Guerin Catholic Golden Eagles (23-4) vs. No. 3 New Palestine **Dragons (24-3)**

Greenfield-Central will host two regional championships on Saturday. The first game at 1 p.m. pits in two days at the Ray North Decatur (14-13) Furney Holiday Classic at against Liberty Christian Lawrenceburg on Dec. 27 (17-8) in Class 1A. At 4 p.m., the Golden Eagles and Dragons will play for a Class 3A regional trophy.

Guerin and New Pal have met four previous times, but this will be the first time in the state tournament. The Dragons won the most recent meeting, 66-51, on Feb. 11 at New Palestine.

Guerin Catholic captured its eighth sectional championship on Saturday night at Frankfort against Tri-West, 63-39. The Golden Eagles are in just their 19th season as a program.

The Golden Eagles are in search of their seventh regional crown in school history. They won the regional last season, also at Greenfield-Central, over Indianapolis George Washington, 56-39. Their quest for a fourth state finals appearance was halted by eventual 3A state champ Scottsburg in the semi-state championship game, 70-54.

Head coach Bob Allen is in his seventh season at Guerin (128-55) and is 184-129 overall in 13 years. Allen was at Knightstown for six seasons before taking over at Guerin Catholic.

Guerin has been on a pretty good postseason run lately. The Golden Eagles have won three regionals in the last four years and hope to make it five. They also peppered in that mix a state runner-up finish in 2023 two years ago to Northwood,

66-63 in overtime.

Starting off the season, Guerin was at 6-2 just before Christmas with its losses to 4A schools Westfield (53-40) and on a neutral court to Evansville Harrison (55-51)

The Golden Eagles would then win four games and 28 against the likes of Gainesville (Fla.), Jennings County, Whiteland and Silver Creek, all by 11 or more.

Those four wins started a 10-game winning streak included knocking that down Circle City Conference opponents Bishop Chatard, Heritage Christian and Brebeuf Jesuit, along with a last-second home win over Cathedral.

Since then, the Golden Eagles have gone 7-2 heading into the regional with the only losses to Noblesville (54-39) and on the road at regional opponent New Palestine, 66-51.

So, this rematch with the Dragons is for more than a regional title. It's for redemption from a double-digit loss just over a month ago.

Senior Bryson Cardinal leads with 19.5 points and 9.3 rebounds per outing. Sophomore Jake Grissom's 12.7 points and 2.7 boards, along with senior Ryne Paris' 10.4, 4.2 rebounds and 2.7 assists compliment the Golden Eagle offense for three averaging in double figures.

Senior Malcolm Houze scores four per game and grabs 2.5 rebounds and dishes out 2.6 assists. Sophomores Hayden Rogers (2.6 assists) and Carter Murans (3.8 points) and senior Jack Toles (3.6) help chip in for depth.

Historically, Guerin

12.7 points and 2.7 rebounds per game for the Golden Eagles this season. Guerin Catholic plays New Palestine this afternoon in the Class 3A Greenfield-Central regional.

Catholic has been quite successful in its short history. Coming out of the south, the Golden Eagles have won six regional and three semistate championships and are on the upward swing this postseason for a possible fourth state finals berth.

Guerin won the 2012 Class 3A state championship over Norwell, 64-48 and their second title in

2015 over Griffith, 62-56.

New Palestine has 12 sectional championships in program history. They have won five sectionals in the last seven seasons. A win in this week's regional and the Dragons would be in brand new territory, having never advanced out of the regional


