BRF is based in Hamilton County and serves young people at numerous locations in Hamilton and Boone counties. In December 2023, Ben’s Ranch assumed management of Koteewi Stable and Trails, located in Koteewi Park, Strawtown, just a few miles northeast of Noblesville. At the stable, the public can enjoy trail rides on horseback, pony rides, hold birthday parties, attend special events, and adopt a horse. This unique partnership between BRF and the Hamilton County Parks Department allows BRF interns and small group participants to do chores, take care of the horses and learn skills at the stable.

Vintage Adventures is a small, family-run business specializing in hand-painted wood wall art.

"Using a unique water-color technique, we create one-of-a-kind pieces that bring depth and character to any space," Chris Knuckles told The Reporter. "In addition to our hand-painted artwork, we use UV printing technology to produce high-quality reproductions of our original designs on wood, allowing us to expand our product line to include coasters, magnets, and jewelry while maintaining the artistic integrity of our work."

Vintage Adventures also offers custom merchandise services, providing personalized wood products for corporate gifts, employee appreciation, and promotional marketing.

"Our journey began in 2015 when we attended a

Protecting access to care & keeping costs down – Indiana can do both

Ensuring businesses and communities thrive requires smart policies that support growth, stability, and the well-being of Hoosiers. That includes making sure healthcare remains affordable – not just for employers, but for employees and their families.

Providing quality health coverage is one of the most important commitments businesses make to their workforce. Companies of all sizes work hard to offer strong benefits, ensuring that employees can get the care they need without facing unmanageable costs. Prior authorization plays a key role in making that possible.

This safeguard ensures that patients receive the right treatments, prescriptions, and procedures – without unnecessary delays or inflated costs. It prevents wasteful spending that drives up insurance premiums, out-of-pocket costs, and overall healthcare expenses. Without it, both employers and employees would face higher costs and fewer options for coverage.

For example, when a patient experiences severe abdominal pain, prior authorization can help confirm whether an ultrasound – a widely used, effective diagnostic tool – should be the first step before moving to a more expensive and invasive CT scan. This helps ensure patients receive the right care while avoiding unnecessary procedures, leading to faster diagnoses

and lower costs for families.

Yet, state lawmakers are considering a proposal that would weaken or eliminate prior authorization – removing a tool that protects patients from unnecessary treatments and businesses from rising premiums. If this legislation moves forward, healthcare costs will increase statewide, straining businesses, employees, and taxpayers alike.

Indiana has long been a pro-business, pro-growth state, but that doesn’t mean choosing between affordability and access to care. Prior authorization ensures patients get effective, necessary care while preventing skyrocketing costs that hurt families and employees.

Lawmakers should focus on solutions that reduce costs responsibly – without eliminating safeguards that work. Employers want to provide comprehensive, affordable healthcare, and Hoosiers deserve policies that help them do just that.

We must ensure Indiana remains a place where businesses grow, employees thrive, and families have access to the care they need. That means reconsidering [Senate Bill 480](#) and keeping effective cost-saving measures like prior authorization in place.

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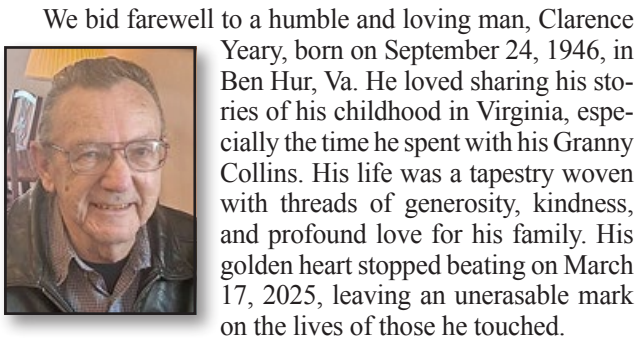


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Clarence Yeary

TODAY’S BIBLE READING

THE BREASTPIECE

They fashioned the breastpiece—the work of a skilled craftsman. They made it like the ephod: of gold, and of blue, purple and scarlet yarn, and of finely twisted linen. It was square—a span long and a span wide—and folded double. Then they mounted four rows of precious stones on it. The first row was carnelian, chrysolite and beryl; the second row was turquoise, lapis lazuli and emerald; the third row was jacinth, agate and amethyst; the fourth row was topaz, onyx and jasper. They were mounted in gold filigree settings. There were twelve stones, one for each of the names of the sons of Israel, each engraved like a seal with the name of one of the twelve tribes.

For the breastpiece they made braided chains of pure gold, like a rope. They made two gold filigree settings and two gold rings, and fastened the rings to two of the corners of the breastpiece. They fastened the two gold chains to the rings at the corners of the breastpiece, and the other ends of the chains to the two settings, attaching them to the shoulder pieces of the ephod at the front. They made two gold rings and attached them to the other two corners of the breastpiece on the inside edge next to the ephod. Then they made two more gold rings and attached them to the bottom of the shoulder pieces on the front of the ephod, close to the seam just above the waistband of the ephod. They tied the rings of the breastpiece to the rings of the ephod with blue cord, connecting it to the waistband so that the breastpiece would not swing out from the ephod—as the Lord commanded Moses.

Semi-state preview, Class 2A at Washington: University Trailblazers

University Trailblazers (18-9) vs. Linton-Stockton Miners (21-6)

We're down to the Elite 8 in each class for the IHSAA boys basketball state tournament.

Saturday's Class 2A south semi-state will be at the famous Hatchet House at Washington High School. The first game of the day at 10 a.m. features No. 4 Parke Heritage (24-4) vs. Forest Park (19-6), followed by the Blazers and the Miners at 12:15 p.m. The championship game is slated for 7:30 p.m.

This is the first meeting between University and Linton-Stockton.

Potential state finals opponents in the north semi-state at The Wolves' Den at Michigan City has No. 6 Gary 21st Century (20-6) facing top-ranked Wapahani (26-1) at 10 a.m. Central Time (11 a.m. Eastern Time) and the No. 3 Manchester Squires (23-2) battle the Jintown Jimmies (16-10) in the second semifinal at noon CT (1 p.m. ET). The winners collide at 7:30 p.m. CT (8:30 p.m. ET).

Head coach Justin Blanding seems to be the answer for the University boys basketball team. In just his second season, he's got the Blazers two wins from their first state finals appearance. Saturday's regional 44-43 victory over Triton Central, advancing to the program's first semi-state.

Blanding coached the University girls from 2015-23 and went 154-40, leading them to semi-state twice. They lost in Class 1A to Vincennes Rivet in 2019 and 2A in 2022 to Linton, who ironically is Saturday's opponent.

"Our system and how we do things is fit for everybody," said University head coach Justin Blanding. "They've really done a good job. Guys have bought into their roles and they're ready to step up when they need to."

Triton Central keyed in on leading scorer Max McComb and held him to five points, so it became a 'next man up' mentality and that's when junior Blake Gray found his way to lead the Blazers in scoring.

"I step up whenever I need to because that's what I do," said junior guard Blake Gray. "I'm a team player. I'll put others first."

"We got four or five guys that could really score the ball," said Blanding. "So, we knew somebody was going to do it. We knew they were going to key in on Max, but Blake stepped up."

Gray did just that and led University with 17 points, along with four steals defensively. Josh Henderson had eight points and Faisal Mohamud scored seven points.

The Blazers have won five straight heading into semi-state and are 'playing with house money,' being their first trip this far in the state tournament.

Linton-Stockton has won 31 sectional championships, six regional and three semi-state championships. The Miners have three 2A state runner-up finishes in 2013 to Bowman Academy, 2019 against Andrean and 2023 versus Fort Wayne Blackhawk.

Head coach Matt Britton is 39-11 in his second year at Linton-Stockton and 274-122 overall in 16 seasons at West Washington, Bloomfield and South Spencer. Britton led Bloomfield to the 1A state championship game in 2016, finishing as runner-up to Liberty Christian.

The Miners have quality wins over No. 4 Parke Heritage, Bloomfield, Cascade, Wayne (W. Va), Marshall (Ill.) and Providence.

Last week's regional win over Providence was the sixth in their program history. The Miners are in search of their fourth semi-state title.

Satterfield among three girls coaches honored by IBCA for 2024-25 season

Hamilton Southeastern girls basketball coach Brian Satterfield is among the three Indiana high school girls basketball coaches have been chosen as 2025 Bob King Coaches of the Year by their peers in the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association, it was announced Thursday.

Lenny Krebs of Class 4A state runner-up Warsaw and Hollie Anson-Eaves of Class 2A state champion South Knox have also been selected as honorees for the 2024-25 season through voting that occurred from late January through late February, IBCA executive director Marty Johnson said.

Honors are awarded according to IHSAA district boundaries, and one coach from each district is a recipient – Krebs in District 1; Satterfield in District 2; and Anson-Eaves in District 3. These three coaches will receive plaques as an IBCA District Coach of the Year during the 2025 IBCA Clin-

ic, which is set for April 24 and 25 at Mt. Vernon High School in Fortville.

The Coach of the Year award is named for the late Bob King, the IBCA executive director from 1984-94. King, a Lebanon native, coached at Sacred Heart and Shortridge high schools in Indianapolis before serving as an assistant basketball coach at Purdue University. He later also was an assistant athletic director and associate athletic director at Purdue.

A list of former IBCA/Bob King Coaches of the Year in girls' basketball is below. The 2025 IBCA/Bob King Coaches of the Year for boys' basketball will be announced later.

Satterfield was named the IBCA District 2 Coach of the Year after leading Hamilton Southeastern to a 27-1 campaign where his Royals were ranked No. 1 in Class 4A for much of the season and won Hoosier Crossroads Conference, Noblesville Sectional and

Marion Regional titles.

Satterfield has compiled an 83-16 mark in four seasons as girls' coach at Hamilton Southeastern, including three HCC crowns (2023 co-championship and outright titles in 2024 and 2025). His girls' success comes after 20 seasons guiding the HSE boys, where he amassed a 322-151 record with three sectional titles and mentored Indiana Mr. Basketball hon-

orees Gary Harris in 2012 and Zak Irvin in 2013.

The veteran coach previously was voted an IBCA boys' District Coach of the Year in 2003 and 2012, six times was honored as the Hoosier Crossroads Conference boys' Coach of the Year and twice has been selected HCC girls' Coach of the Year. He served the IBCA as a district representative from 2012-15 and currently is in the first year

of a second three-year term.

Satterfield has been named an assistant coach for the 2025 girls' Indiana All-Stars, and he previously was an All-Star boys' assistant coach in 2015. He also was head coach for the 2010 Indiana Class All-Star Classic and the 2012 North-South Game as well as an assistant coach for the 2012 Nike Global Games in Washington, D.C.

A 1986 graduate of Plainfield High School, Satterfield averaged 8.9 points as a senior for a 20-6 regional champion. He went on to

Wabash College, where he played three seasons for the Little Giants' varsity program and completed his bachelor's degree in business in 1990. After college, he worked for Met Life for three years before earning a teacher's certification through Indiana University in 1995. He then served as a boys' assistant coach at Madison, Triton Central, Avon and HSE before becoming the HSE boys' head coach in 2001-02.

Satterfield and his wife, Deb, are parents to Brooke, Nolan and Blair.

Indianapolis gets ready to host marquee March Madness matchups

The Madness is on! The NCAA Tournament tips off in Dayton's First Four, but next weekend, Indianapolis will play host to the Midwest Region's Sweet 16 and Elite Eight games in Lucas Oil Stadium.

With the way the bracket's built, the Midwest is one of the most intriguing regions on the bracket.

"We're just thrilled with the teams that we got," said Dan Gliot, the senior director of marketing and communications at Indiana Sports Corp. "You look those top four teams - Houston, Tennessee, Kentucky and then, of course, Purdue - just real powerhouses, great Power 5 schools, but really regional, as well, and Houston travels really well, so we're super excited for the possibilities that could end up that weekend."

Purdue's potential alone is expected to elevate ticket sales.

"Purdue has such a great fan base," Gliot said. "We've seen them for the last couple years. In the first and second rounds last year at Gainbridge, and of course they played in the Indy Classic, and they're such a passionate huge fan base. They travel well."

"Purdue playing in their backyard would be fantastic for our business," said Renny Harrison, CEO of Fanfare Tickets, which is based in Carmel. "Kentucky and Tennessee both travel really well - especially Kentucky. We'd love them to make it through and play here."

This will be the first time in 10 years Lucas Oil Stadium has hosted March Madness without any COVID restrictions. The venue will be sectioned off in half, with the fans and court on the south end of the stadium, similar to how it was when the entire tournament was played in Indy back in 2021.

No matter what teams are playing, the stadium's going to be filled with basketball fans - all while the city of Indianapolis gets ready to host the big one - the Final Four - in 2026.

"It's a really good opportunity to showcase what Indianapolis can do, what Lucas Oil Stadium can do, and really give every one a taste of what it's going to be," Gliot said. "We're going to crown four champions over the same weekend in 2026. Come out for 2025 to really get a preview for that, and then 2026 it's all about celebrating college basketball."

"I've been to other cities for NCAA events, and the spirit and the experience is nothing like it is when it's here," Harrison added.

All the celebrations start next weekend at Lucas Oil Stadium, with the Sweet 16 games on Friday followed by the Elite Eight on Sunday.

In the end, Indiana was defeated by a final score of 113-103. De'Vion Harmon had a standout performance with 25 points, eight rebounds and five assists for Indiana.

The Mad Ants played their second game in 24 hours after taking on Capital City on Wednesday. Jah-lil Okafor scored the first points for the Mad Ants. The former 76er battled through multiple defenders for a close-range hook shot.

With 6:30 left in the first quarter, the Mad Ants had an 11-10 advantage. Coming out of a timeout, Boogie Ellis extended the lead with a floater. On the next possession, Dakota Mathias scored with an off-balance jumper.

After a strong start, the offense stalled a bit for the Mad Ants in the second half of the first quarter. Heading into the second quarter, Delaware led 31-22. De'Vion Harmon led Indiana with seven first quarter points.

Harmon scored the first points of the second quarter for Indiana. In transition from a Delaware miss, the Texas Tech alum scored with a running layup. Next time down the floor, Okafor scored with a finger roll layup through traffic.

The Mad Ants trailed 48-36 halfway through the second quarter. Cameron McGriff cut the deficit back to single digits with a three-point field goal.

With two minutes left in the first half, Stephan Hicks knocked down a corner three. Next time down the floor, Harmon scored with a layup off the glass. At the end of the first half, the Mad Ants trailed 55-48. Harmon led Indiana with 13 points thus far.

In the early part of the third quarter, Indiana

fell behind by 14 points. Mathias ended the scoring drought with a three-point-er. The Purdue alum made four of his first eight shots from long range.

Halfway through the quarter, the Mad Ants continued to fight back. Obadi-ah Noel scored two points with a free throw. Next time down the floor, McGriff drained a three-pointer in the corner. Indiana trailed 64-58 with 5:45 remaining in the quarter.

In the final minutes of the third quarter, McGriff made his third three-pointer of the afternoon. Forty-five seconds later, Mathias worked his way to the rim and scored with a reverse layup. On the next possession, Harmon brought it to a four-point deficit with a layup. Heading into the fourth quarter, the Mad Ants trailed 82-74. Harmon led Indiana with 19 points through three quarters.

McGriff scored the first points for the Mad Ants in the fourth quarter. The Oklahoma State alum battled through defenders to score with a layup. Two possessions later, Mathias scored with a baseline jumper.

The Mad Ants continued to fight back in the fourth quarter. McGriff knocked down a three-pointer to make it a 105-95 ballgame. With 2:30 remaining, Josiah-Jordan James drained a three-pointer to make it a nine-point game.

The comeback effort was ultimately unsuccessful for Indiana as Delaware pulled away in the final minutes of regulation.

The Indiana Mad Ants conclude their road trip on Saturday against the Windy City Bulls. Tip-off is scheduled for 8 p.m. The final Mad Ants home game of the regular season comes on Monday against Windy City. Tip-off for that game is scheduled for 12:30 p.m. Indiana wraps up the regular season with two games at Grand Rapids on the 27th and 29th.

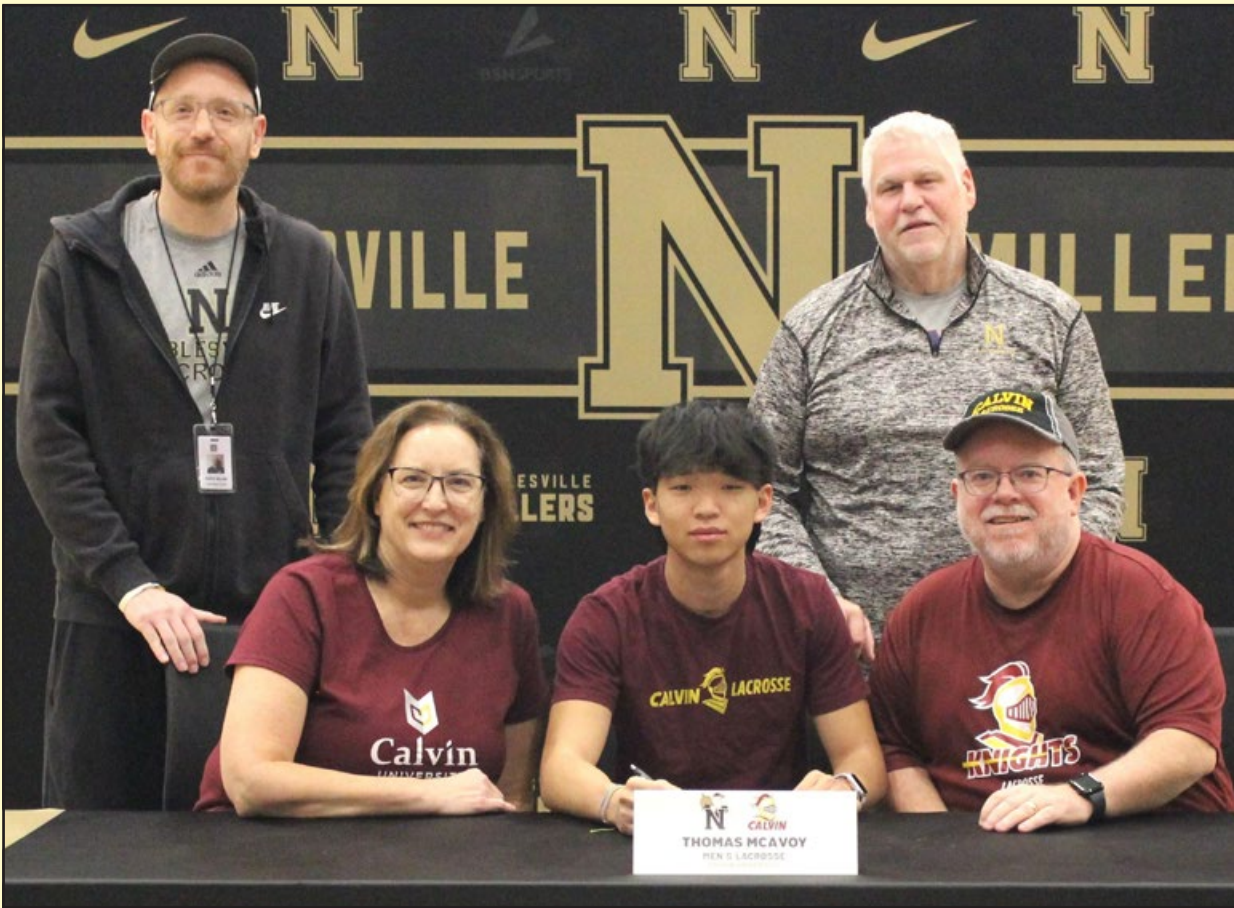
