

where I enjoy cheering on both the football team and basketball teams. Outside of school, I continue to pursue my passion for soccer by playing for Noblesville Soccer. I take my academics seriously and am a new member of the National Honor Society (NHS). Balancing school, athletics, and extracurricular activities keeps

me busy while maintaining good grades. Soccer is an old game and is still growing and gaining popularity. It was formalized in England in 1863 and became the sport we know and love today. Soccer has grown so much with support from the largest cities to the smallest ones that it makes walking on the field a hundred times more exciting.

Sheridan women's soccer had always been decent. In my opinion, when the classes of 2025, 2026, 2027, and 2028 started putting in the time and effort, it showed! This caused us to have a drastic change in communication, ball movement, and team sportsmanship, from hot turf fields needing to be brought indoors to rainy, cold, muddy, and soaked fields. The work of all athletes and coaches leads to the goal to head to state.

The Sheridan women's soccer team has dominated the Hoosier Heartland Conference (HHC) in Class 1A for three straight seasons, finishing 13-6-1 overall with a perfect 5-0 HHC record in 2023. As a result, in 2023, we received a national ranking of 2,042 and a state ranking of 113. In the 2024 season, we went 12-5-1 with a 4-0 conference record. This ended the season with a national rank of 1,571 and a state rank of 92. None of this would have

Paving work & lane closures coming to U.S. 31

The REPORTER

The Indiana Department of Transportation announces that on or after Monday, April 21, milling and paving work will begin on U.S. 31 in Hamilton County. Work will take place between 116th Street in Carmel and 216th Street, just north of State Road 38.

Motorists can expect overnight lane and ramp closures once work begins. Closures are scheduled between 9 p.m. and 5 a.m. each night. Paving work is anticipated to be complete in July.

Howard & Tipton counties

Lane and shoulder closures will begin or after Wednesday, April 9, for installation of median cable barrier in Howard and Tipton counties.

Inside lane and shoulder closures will occur between State Roads 26 and 28, progressing from north to south as work is completed. Installation will continue further south on U.S. 31 later this year, ending near Interstate 465 in Carmel. Median barriers are a proven safety measure that help reduce cross-median crashes.


Overpass construction & limited access upgrades in **Hamilton County**


Overpass construction is expected to begin this year on U.S. 31 to improve safety and reduce crashes between SR 38 and 286th Street. Work is planned as follows and will include intermittent lane closures on U.S. 31 and closures of adjacent county

- Starting summer 2025: Overpass construction at 226th Street (upon completion of Englewood Road connection)
- Starting late 2025/ early 2026: Overpass construction at 266th Street

Additional work along U.S. 31 is scheduled in 2026, including right-in, right-out conversion (right turns only) at 286th Street, and cul-de-sac construction at 216th, 246th, and 256th streets. Demolition work and drive removal will occur through next year.



The Indiana Senate on Thursday approved a bill that would ban transgender females from competing on women's sports teams at any public or private university in the state.

The bill passed without amendments from the version passed Feb. 18 in the Indiana House, so the measure will soon head to Governor Mike Braun for his

Since the early '70s, Florida guitar heroes Molly Hatchet have been injecting a heavy dose of boogie into Southern rock, crafting bluesy, metal-adjacent tunes like "Flirtin' With Disaster," "Gator Country," "Whiskey Man," "Bounty Hunter," "It's All Over Now" and the slow-building monster tune "Dreams I'll Never See."

Molly Hatchet has been churning out guitar riffs and boogie for over 50 years. Founded in 1971 by guitarist Dave Hlubek in Jacksonville, they experienced popularity and



commercial success during the '70s and '80s amongst southern rock and hard rock communities. They released six wildly successful studio albums on Epic Records between 1978 and 1984, including the platinum-selling Molly Hatchet (1978), Flirtin'

with Disaster (1979) and Beatin' the Odds (1980). Molly Hatchet has gone on to release many more studio albums since their split with Epic Records in 1985.

Recently, the band released a brand new song, "Firing Line," recorded at the famous Abbey Road

Indiana lawmakers three years ago banned transgender girls from competing on girls' scholastic sports teams at the K-12 level. The Indiana High School Athletic Association, which sanctions all high school athletics in Indiana, has said it is only aware of one instance of a transgender female athlete

applying for a waiver under reproductive biology, from its pre-2022 transgender athlete policy. That athlete withdrew their application before IHSAA officials could make a decision.

An outline of House Bill 1014 explains that it would prohibit "a male, based on the student's biological sex at birth in accordance with the student's genetics and

participating on an athletic team or sport designated as being a female, women's, or girls' athletic team or sport."

HB 1014 would also set up a way for a student or a parent to file a legal complaint about any suspected violations.



Addressing Medicare.gov confusion among retirees

logged into your Medicare.gov account and noticed that your Medicare Supplement policy appears to have a monthly termination date. you're not alone. Many people are seeing what looks



like a cancellation notice on their Medigap coverage, leading to confusion and un-

necessary panic. The good news is that your Medicare Supplement is not actually canceling each month. This is simply how Medicare.gov's system is displaying the information, and it does not mean your coverage is at risk.

Medicare.gov tracks policies differently depending on the type of Medicare coverage you have. Unlike Medicare Advantage or tion drug plans, which renew on a yearly basis and can change during open enrollment, Medicare Supplement policies work under a different set of rules.

Medigap plans are guaranteed renewable for life as long as you continue to pay your premiums. This means your coverage stays in place indefinitely unless you cancel the policy yourself or stop making payments.

However, Medicare. gov's system appears to generate a rolling monthly end date for Medigap plans. This may be due to the fact that these policies are billed on a monthly basis, but it does not mean the coverage is actually set to expire at

Part D prescrip- the end of each month. **Medicare Supplement** Plans are different from Medicare **Advantage**

> One of the biggest misconceptions about Medicare is assuming that all Medicare-related plans operate the same way. Medicare Advantage and Part D prescription drug plans must be renewed annually, and you have the option to switch plans during open enrollment. These plans are managed by private insurance companies but are closely tied to Medicare's annual open enrollment process.

Medicare Supplements, on the other hand, do not require re-enrollment and are not affected by open enrollment periods. Your Medigap coverage will remain in place as long as you pay your premiums on time, even if your insurance company stops offering the plan to new enrollees, and until you voluntarily cancel or switch to another

This is why the termination date on Medicare.gov does not mean your coverage is actually ending.

If you check your Medicare.gov account and see that your Medigap policy appears to be terminating each month, don't panic. This is simply a display issue. However, it's always good to double-check your coverage status by taking the following steps:

1. Check your premium payments. As long as your most recent payment has been processed, your policy remains active.

2. Call your insurance company. If you need reassurance, your insurance provider can confirm that your policy is still in effect.

3. Ignore the Medicare.gov term date. There is nothing you need to do as long as you continue paying your premiums on time.

The termination date you see on Medicare.gov is misleading and does not affect your actual Medicare Supplement coverage. Your Medigap plan will not cancel each month unless you stop paying your premiums or decide to switch plans.

If you're ever unsure about your policy status, the best thing to do is contact your insurance company directly instead of relying on the Medicare.gov system, which does not always display information accurately.

Indiana leads Midwest in February housing starts

Indiana continues to lead the Midwest in single-family home construction, with the latest data from the U.S. Census Bureau showing 1,399 single-family building permits were issued statewide in February 2025. This total surpasses neighboring states Ohio (1,152), Michigan (910), Illinois (635), and Kentucky (628).

While Indiana's 1,399 starts mark a 4 percent decrease from the 1,458 permits issued in the state in February 2024, it is a 3 percent increase from the 1,353 permits pulled in January 2025.

permit data on a year-to-date basis, single-family permits for the first two months of 2025 (2,752) are up 1 percent compared to the same period in 2024 (2,727).

According to the National Association of Home Builders, housing starts across the Midwest declined in February due to economic uncertainty and adverse weather conditions.

"Despite challenges, Indiana's strong permit numbers underscore the state's limited existing home inventory and persistent demand for new construction," Indiana Builders Association Looking at the statewide CEO Rick Wajda said.



cerned about debt? It's important to recognize this, but, at the same time, you may have more ways of gaining control of your situation than you had realized.



Nonetheless, if you're worried about what you owe, you've certainly got company. Nearly 60 percent of Americans say they are struggling with debt, according to a recent study by WalletHub, an online personal finance site.

How can you ease these struggles? It may help to follow these steps:

Know your debt

Create a list that includes your mortgage, auto loans, student loans, medical debt, credit card debt and any installment purchases you've made. Then, add up the total amount you owe and calculate your debt-to-income ratio by dividing your total monthly debt payments by your gross monthly income. (For revolving debt, such as credit cards, use the minimum payments in this calculation.)

Ideally, you'd like to have a debt-to-income ratio below 35 percent if you have a mortgage, or 20 percent if you don't.

Look for restructuring

opportunities By restructuring debt, you may be able to pay it down more quick-

ly. You can do this by refinancing debts, perhaps by transferring credit card debt to a new card with a low introductory rate or by replacing your mortgage or auto loan with one that carries a lower rate.

You might also consider swapping debts, possibly by using secured debt, such as a home equity loan or securities-based lending, to pay off higher-rate unsecured loans.

Or vou could consolidate debt by using secured debt to pay off several high-interest debts or transferring multiple credit card debts into one new card with a lower rate and minimal transfer fees.

Determine how much money will go to debt payments

You do have some latitude as to how much money you'll devote to paying debts each month. To avoid incurring late fees or other penalties, you'll need to make the minimum payments, which means a flat amount for some loans, such as your mortgage, and a percentage of the outstanding balance on other debts, especially your credit





The Fishers baseball team swept both games of a rollicking doubleheader with Fort Wayne Carroll Friday at Grand Park.

The Tigers took the first game 8-3. Deagan Repp led off the first inning with a triple, then scored after Huston Dunn hit a sacrifice fly.

Fishers added three runs in the third inning. Dunn batted in a second run with a single to send Owen Lukac home. Repp scored again to make it 3-0, then Trevor Hall bunted Zander Carnahan home.

The Chargers got one run back in the top of the fourth inning, but the Tigers put up three more in the bottom of the fourth. Sean Frey scored on an error, Lukac got home on a wild pitch, then Dunn singled to right field to score Repp. Carroll scored one run each in the fifth and sixth innings; Repp completed the scoring in the bottom of the sixth by steal-

ing home plate. Repp was 3-for-3 at the plate and totaled four runs, while Dunn was 2-for-2 and drove in three runs. Hayden Werner pitched four innings for the win, striking out

three and allowing two hits. Jase Ruggles also struck out three in 1.2 innings of relief.

Back and forth

The second game of the doubleheader was truly back and forth, with Fishers prevailing 16-14. The Chargers scored one run in the top of the first inning, but the Tigers came back with three runs in the bottom of the inning.

Repp led off with a walk, then scored on Dunn's right field triple. Dunn was quickly sent home after Carnahan hit a right field double. Hall batted in the third run with a left field hit to score Carnahan.

Fishers' Justin Kirby among Indiana All-Stars

Fishers senior Justin Kirby is among the 12 players that have been selected for the 2025 IndyStar Indiana boys' All-Stars, All-Stars game director Mike Broughton announced Friday.

Those chosen to the team will play three games in June – one exhibition game against the Indiana Junior All-Stars as well as home-and-home contests against the Kentucky All-Stars.

Kirby joins the following other players as 2025 Indiana boys' All-Stars, listed alphabetically: Chase Barnes of Fort Wayne Wayne, Dezmon Briscoe of Indianapolis Crispus At-Jeffersonville, Julius Gizzi of New Palestine, Brady Koehler of Indianapolis Cathedral, Braylon Mullins of Greenfield-Central, Dominique Murphy of East Chicago Central, Kellen Pickett of Fort Wayne Blackhawk Christian, Azavier Robinson of Lawrence North. Tre Singleton of Jeffersonville and Mark Zackery IV of Ben Davis.

The 2025 IndyStar Indiana Mr. Basketball will come from among the above play-

ers and be announced later. The '25 boys' All-Stars have five players who have been a part of state championship teams (Cooper, 2025 4A; Kirby, 2024 4A; Pickett, 2023 2A; Singleton, 2025 4A; Zackery, 2023, 4A) as well as three players who have been a part of state runner-up squads (Briscoe, 2025 3A; Kirby, 2025 4A; Zackery, 2024 4A). The squad also features one player who was selected 2025 IBCA honorable mention Academic All-State (Zackery).

Marc Urban of Chesterton has been named head coach of the 2024 boys' All-Stars. He will be assisted by Chris Hawkins of Indianapolis Crispus Attucks and

Jason Speer of Bloomington North.

Urban is 175-56 in nine seasons as head coach of the Chesterton boys, highlighted by a Class 4A state runner-up finish in 2022. His Trojans went 15-9 this past season, and he previously went 80-17 in four seasons as head coach of the Lake Central girls for an overall head coaching record of 255-73 in 13 seasons. His teams have won five sectionals (2013 girls, 2015 girls, 2019 boys, 2022 boys, 2023 boys) plus a boys' regional and boys' semi-state in 2022.

Hawkins guided Crispus Attucks to a 22-7 record and a Class 3A state tucks, Michael Cooper of runner-up finish in 2024-25. In nine seasons, his Tigers are 174-64 with four sectional trophies (2017, 2018, 2019, 2025), three regional crowns (2017, 2019, 2025), two semi-state prizes (2017, 2025) and the 2017 Class 3A state title.

Speer has a 113-75 ledger in eight seasons as the Bloomington North boys' basketball coach, including a 7-17 finish this past season. He is 228-123 in 15 seasons as a boys' coach, including a 115-48 mark in seven seasons at Columbus North. He also coached the Bloomington North girls for two seasons. His teams have won three sectionals (2013 at Columbus North as well as 2022 and 2023 at Bloomington North) and two regionals (2022, 2023), and Speer was recognized as Conference Indiana Coach of the Year in 2014, 2021 and 2022.

The Junior-Senior exhibition game is set for June 4 at Greenfield-Central. The first game against Kentucky will be June 6 at Lexington Catholic High School. The final game against Kentucky will be June 7 at Gainbridge Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

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
