State Road 32 & Hague Road to close in June

Beginning on or after June 2, Hague Road just north of the intersection with State Road 32 will close as crews construct a new roundabout as part of the Reimagine Pleasant Street project in Noblesville.

On or after July 7, SR 32 will also close to complete the roundabout.

In coordination with the Indiana Department of Transportation, the intersection is being reconstructed to a multi-lane roundabout. As part of the project, new pedestrian tunnels will be installed under SR 32 and under Pleasant Street to provide safe crossings for the Midland Trace Trail and Hague Road Trail.

"I am proud of the progress we have made on the Reimagine Pleasant Street project and the positive impact it's having

on our community," Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen said. "The new roundabout and pedestrian tunnels in this area will enhance traffic flow, reduce congestion,

and create a safer environment for pedestrians and cyclists enjoying our city's trails."

SR 32 and Hague Road are anticipated to be open to traffic in

October 2025. Hague Road will be closed to thru traffic between State Roads 38 and 32. Access will remain open for residents and the Hague Road Nature Preserve.

Then on Wednesday, May 14, the soon-to-be

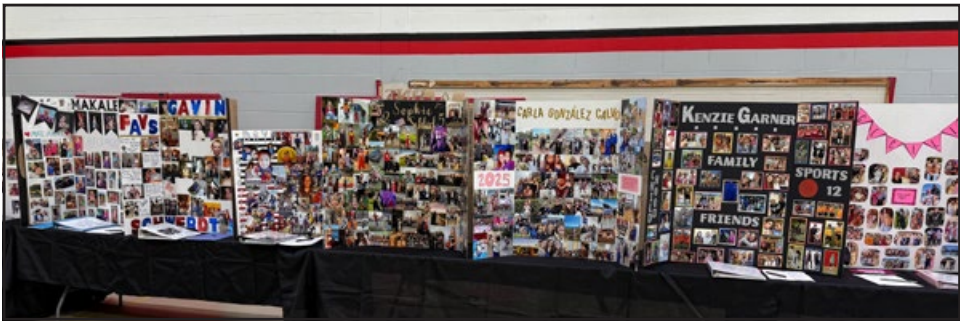

Civic Theatre announces 2025-26 Season lineup

In October, Civic Theatre will kick off the 2025-26 season in Carmel with the uproariously funny Shakespearean spoof *Something Rotten*.

Created by Grammy Award-winning songwriter Wayne Kirkpatrick, and successful screenwriters Karey Kirkpatrick and John O'Farrell, *Something Rotten* was lauded by audience members and critics alike, receiving several Best Musical nominations and hailed by *Time Out New York* as "the funniest musical comedy in at least 400 years."

Set in 1590, brothers Nick and Nigel Bottom are desperate to write a hit play but are stuck in the shadow of that Renaissance rock star known as "The Bard."

When a local soothsayer foretells that the future of theatre involves singing, dancing, and acting at the same time, Nick and Nigel set out to write the world's very first musical, but along the way, they realize that reaching the top means being true to thine own self.

For the holidays, Civic will revisit *A Christmas Story, The Musical*, which was a hit for Civic in 2022. This musical, based on the classic movie that runs round-the-clock on television every Christmas, earned rave reviews in its Broadway run.

Set in the 1940s in the fictional town of Hohman, Ind., audiences will again follow nine-year-old Ralphie, his quest for the Holy Grail of Christmas gifts – an Official Red Ryder carbine-action 200-shot Range Model air rifle, and his many funny and heart-warming adventures. The entire family will enjoy this holiday favorite.

Civic will present two plays that are new to audiences in early 2026.

In February, *The Great Gatsby* will come to the Knebel Stage in the Tarkington Theatre. The breathtaking glamour and decadent excess of the Jazz Age, captured in F. Scott Fitzgerald's classic novel, adapted by Simon Levy, will come to vivid life on Civic's stage.

In March, Civic will take

to the intimate Studio Theatre to present a bold, fresh adaptation of *The Scarlet Letter* by award-winning playwright Kate Hamill, whose lively takes on classics like *Pride & Prejudice* and *Sense & Sensibility* have previously delighted Civic audiences. This highly theatrical reimagining of the classic tale follows strong-willed Hester Prynne as she tries to find her own moral compass and raise her daughter in a society that harshly punishes women for independent thought, sexuality, or defiance.

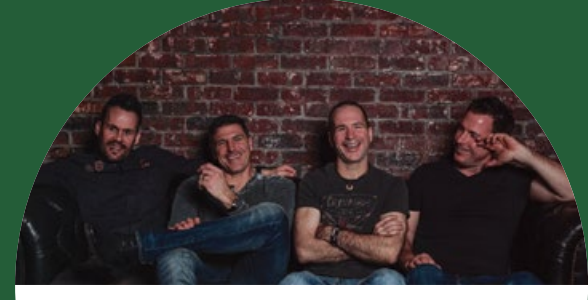

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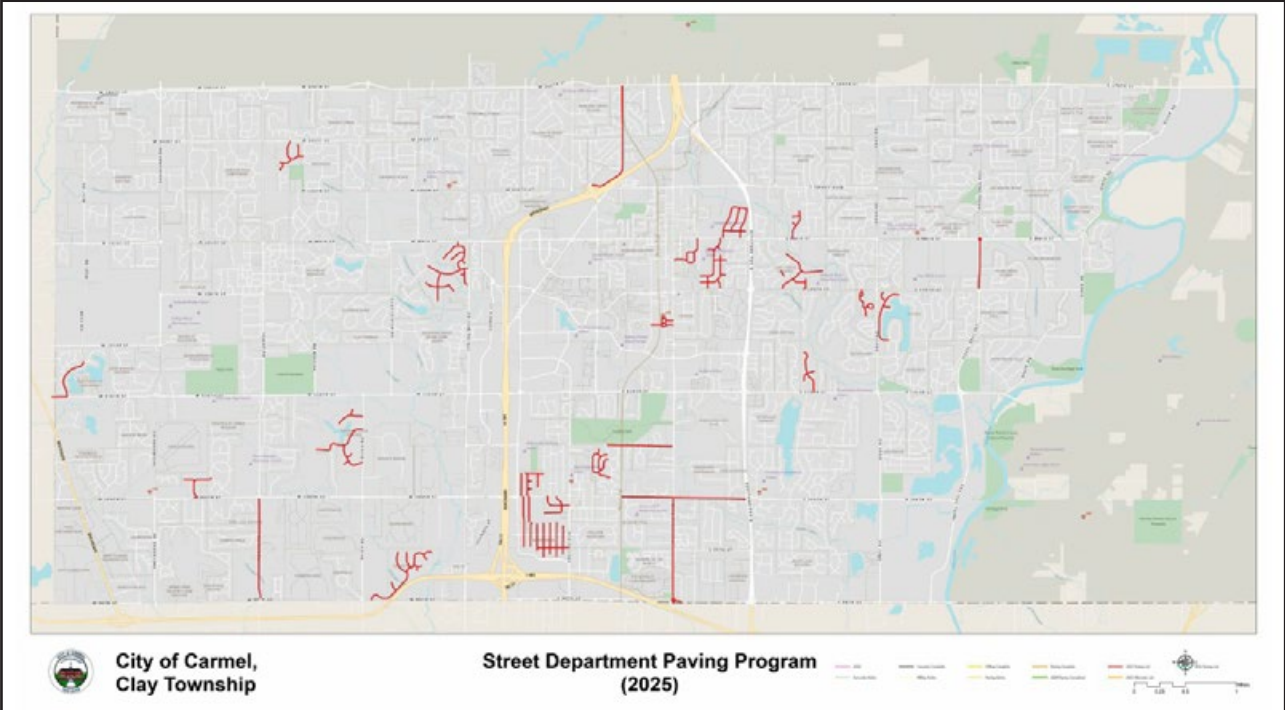

Carmel announces 2025 street paving list

The Carmel Street Department has released its list of 2025 street paving projects. More than 50 lane miles of roadway are scheduled for an upgrade this spring and summer as the Street Department kicks off its annual effort.
Each paving project begins with concrete and curb repairs, a phase that typically takes a couple weeks to complete. This is followed by milling the top surface of the blacktop and repaving it with a new, two-inch thick layer. Milling and paving projects require three to five days to complete and will necessitate lane restrictions.
The Street Department uses the Pavement Condition Index (PCI) rating system to determine the priority of repair for roadways. StreetScan is employed to survey all 1,400 lane miles of Carmel roads bi-annually. Laser-measuring technology assigns PCI scores to each road segment. This laser device is mounted at the rear of a vehicle with a roof-mounted camera for 360-degree imagery.


“By continuing to utilize data-driven asset management, we are able to objectively prioritize roads for resurfacing,” Carmel Street Commissioner Matt Higginbotham said. “This treatment method allows us to extend our road networks life, while ensuring high standards are maintained.”

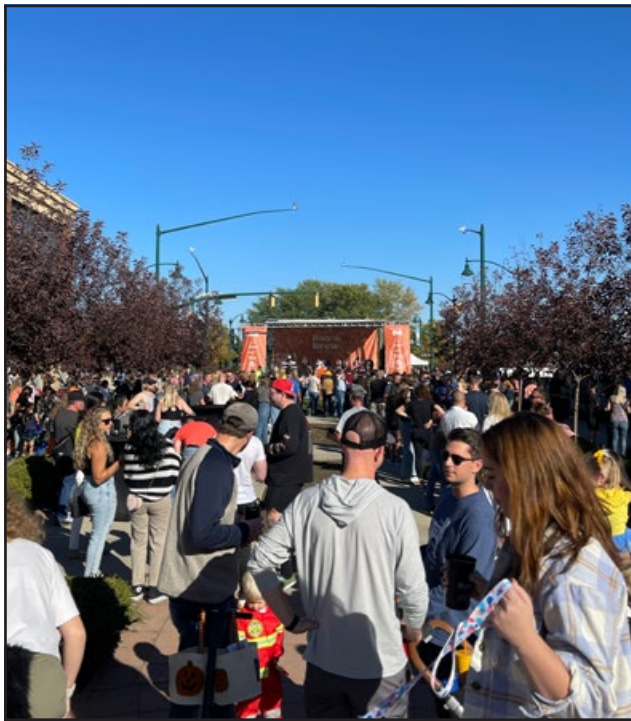

Carmel readies Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area

Memorial Day weekend will mark the activation of Carmel's new Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA), with the launch officially taking place on Friday, May 23.

This initiative will allow patrons to purchase alcoholic beverages from participating establishments and enjoy them within the designated DORA boundaries. Carmel joins Hamilton County neighbors Noblesville and Westfield, who launched their districts in 2024.

In July 2023, Indiana authorized municipalities to create DORAs, giving them the legal ability to designate

specific outdoor areas where people can carry and consume alcoholic beverages purchased at participating businesses during the following hours:

- Monday through Thursday: 5 to 10 p.m.
- Friday and Saturday: 11 a.m. to 11 p.m.
- Sunday: 11 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Based on research by Carmel City Councilor Jeff Worrell, which identified the DORA as a strong fit for the city's existing districts, Carmel's DORA ordinance was approved on July 17, 2024.

The area will span from just north of Main Street to Carmel Drive, and from west of the Monon Greenway to just

east of Range Line Road.

"Carmel's central core is a place where community thrives, especially when the sun shines," Worrell said. "The DORA will only amplify that energy, allowing our residents and visitors alike to fully enjoy the vibrant atmosphere of areas including Midtown, Monon

Boulevard, Carter Green and our Arts & Design District. It's about enhancing the experiences we already love."

Indy 500 sellout is 'imminent'; local TV blackout lifted

For just the second time in its history, the Indianapolis 500 is a sellout. Well, almost.

Doug Boles, president of the NTT IndyCar Series and Indianapolis Motor Speedway (IMS), announced Friday that a sellout is "imminent," and he expects the remaining grandstand tickets to be sold by the end of the day.

The first — and until now, only — grandstand sellout was in 2016 for the 100th running.

"The sheer size and scale of this crowd is going to be massive," Boles said. "The 109th Running will be a full-scale, nonstop spectacle that draws the eyes of the world to Speedway, Indiana."

"It's exciting," said Kathy Bedell.

Van and Kathy Bedell

are celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary at the track this week. They were at the 100th running, the only other time the grandstands have sold out. They compared the energy of the sellout to other non-sold out Indy 500's they've been to.

"The energy here is so high any time," Van said. "Even for practice, the energy is so high here. I'm not sure I could tell the difference because everybody is just ramped up and ready to go."

IMS officials say there are under 1,000 tickets remaining in the grandstands.

"The largest bulk of our tickets remaining are in the north end of the racetrack, which is in between turns 3 and 4," Boles said.

Boles says the track will continue to sell general admission tickets until supplies run out.

Tickets have been in high demand all spring, with less than 10,000 grandstand

seats available at the end of April. Brian Kaltenmark, senior marketing director for IMS, on May 1 said that **sales were up 4 percent year-over-year.**

With packed grandstands and space for 100,000 fans in the infield, race day attendance could hit 350,000 — more than enough for the "The Greatest Spectacle in Racing" to continue its reign as the **largest single-day sporting event in the world.**

A sellout doesn't just mean more people at the track, it means the race will be shown live on TVs across central Indiana for just the fourth time in 75 years.

IMS implemented a local TV blackout in 1951 after two years of live broadcasts, believing the race would draw bigger crowds if people could not stay home and watch it. Officials promised to lift the local TV embargo if the race ever sold out, and both of those

things happened in 2016. The blackout was lifted again in 2020, when the race was held in August due to the coronavirus pandemic, in 2021 after a reduced-capacity sellout, and a fourth time last year following a four-hour rain delay.

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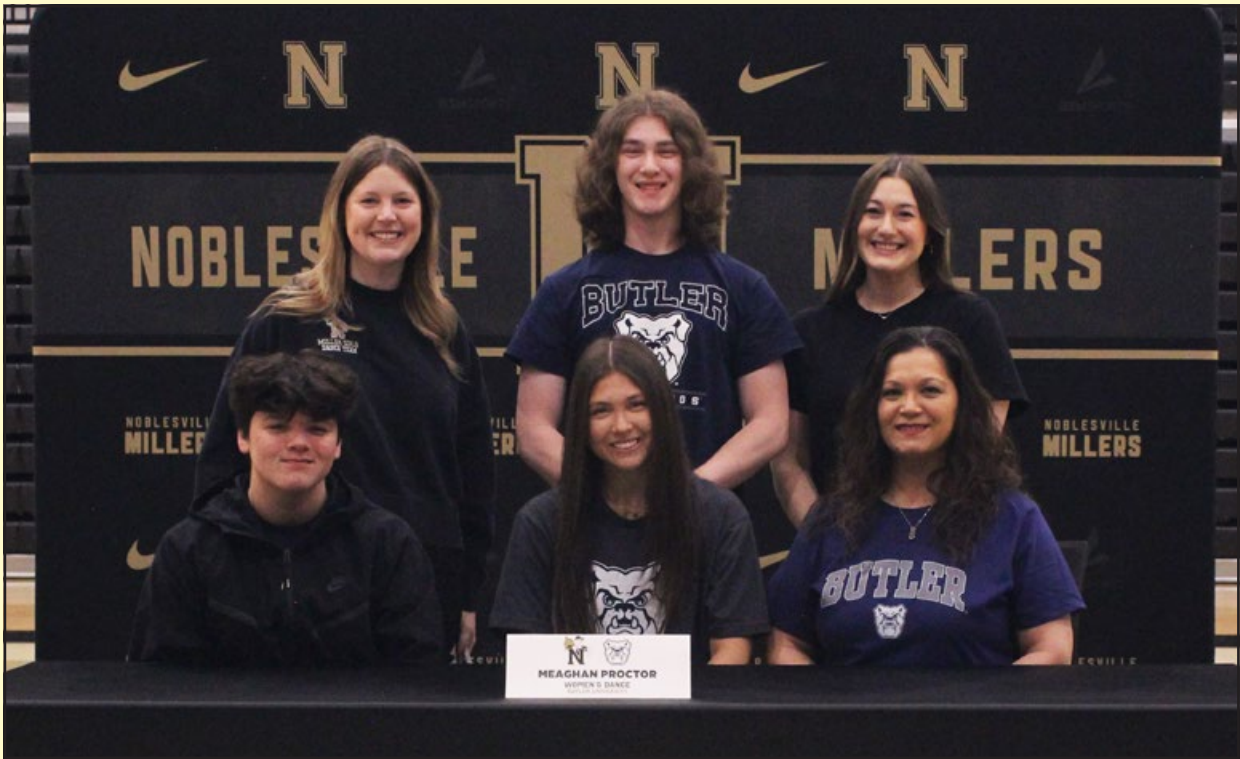
