I shouldn't be surprised

I shouldn't be surprised, but I am. It is happening in real time. To me, to us.

My husband sees it too. I can tell it breaks his heart, but he stays strong for me. Staying honest as he tries to soften the blow when I ask him directly, "Have I gotten worse?" He has known me since I was 14 years old. He is the closest person to me and sees the changes day in and day out.

We celebrate the good days, taking time to acknowledge them. *Today you seemed stronger*, he says. *Did you realize it?* I can tell; it was a good day. *Yes, I agree*, I say, secretly thrilled that he saw it too.

But its fleeting. It never sticks. A tease. It feels different than I envisioned. The physical decline, that is. Like not even close. Makes me wonder why I spend so much time thinking about how anything is going to turn out. One never really knows.

I envisioned quick and overnight. When I was young, I used to envision quick and overnight when thinking of a miraculous cure. In my vision, I would rise from my bed, and take a step only to realize I had been healed by some divine power in my slumber.

My vision has changed in some ways. It has remained the same in terms of quickness. But the end outcome has turned into a vision of being stripped of any independence overnight, my body overtaken by a less-than-spiritual power.

The reality is that it is more of a slow and painful burn, sneaky. Not quick and overnight. Not like a rip the Band-Aid off in one quick motion, but more of a slow and painful tug. Giving me just enough time to be cognizant of the pain of loss before digesting another.

I naively thought I would somehow have the power to stop it. If only I worked harder. Some may look at me and falsely judge me that way, but I know better now. I cannot stop it. It was just false hope disguised as reality.

Sheridan's own Maximus Grau recognized as Fever Ball Kid

Peyton Manning Children's Hospital (PMCH) at Ascension St. Vincent recently celebrated Maximus Grau, a remarkable young patient from Sheridan, who was honored as the Honorary Fever Ball Kid during the Indiana Fever home game on June 17.

Grau had the incredible opportunity to enjoy court-side access during warm-ups, meet Indiana Fever star Sophie Cunningham, and see his story showcased at halftime on the video board – an unforgettable experience recognizing his strength and resilience.

When Grau was just days old, he was diagnosed with prune belly syndrome – a rare genetic disorder that refers to the wrinkled appearance of the abdomen due to the lack of abdominal muscles – and underwent his first surgery. Over the next few years, he was hospitalized several times for infections or dehydration and experienced Stage 4 kidney failure.

His mother donated her kid-

ney to him on June 25, 2018, a day she will always remember. An Ascension St. Vincent associate, she feels blessed and grateful for this opportunity. In February 2020, Grau had his remaining kidney removed, and his family continues to look forward to many new beginnings. His journey is a testament to the outstanding care provided by the dedicated doctors, nurses, and support teams at PMCH.

"Ascension St. Vincent is committed to delivering compassionate, world-class care to children facing tough medical challenges," said Stephan Masoncup, Chief Strategy Officer at Ascension St. Vincent. "Honoring Max as the Honorary Fever Ball Kid is a reminder of the resilience and hope that drive everything we do."

The Honorary Fever Ball Kid program continues to shine a spotlight on the bravery and determination of PMCH patients, reinforcing the hospital's commitment to compassionate pediatric care and meaningful experiences.



Carmel hospital opens site to donate & access breast milk

Ascension St. Vincent Carmel, 13500 N. Meridian St., has opened Hamilton County's first site for donating and accessing life-saving donor breast milk, offering hope and health to Indiana's youngest residents.

The new milk depot and express site aims to address Indiana's high infant mortality rates, which rank the state 41st out of 50. Research indicates that a 100 percent breast milk diet can significantly improve survival rates for infants with necrotizing enterocolitis, a gastrointestinal disease with a high fatality rate.

"The State of Indiana has a long way to go when it comes to infant mortality health," said Chad Dilley, President of Ascension St. Vincent Carmel. "We know the breast milk and breastfed babies do better when it comes to infant mortality."

Ivy Tech Foundation receives \$35K workforce development grant from Duke Energy Foundation

Duke Energy Foundation announced on Tuesday it is awarding grants to four organizations in central and north-central Indiana supporting workforce development efforts. The shareholder-funded grants aim to equip Hoosiers with in-demand skills and industry-recognized credentials to meet the needs of the region's employers.

Among the awardees is Ivy Tech Foundation, which will receive \$35,000.

"Local business leaders regularly tell us that a skilled workforce is key to the continued economic growth of the communities we serve," Duke Energy Indiana President Stan Pinegar said. "These grants will help expand the state's skilled talent pool, cre-

ate opportunities for individuals facing barriers to employment, and strengthen Indiana's competitiveness when attracting companies. They are smart investments in our customers and the places they live and work."

With the grant, Ivy Tech will enhance its workforce development training for critical energy economy careers with its grant. The funding will support hands-on in-

struction, academic resources, and workforce alignment initiatives in high-demand trades such as welding, industrial technology, construction, and building maintenance. The expected outcome is increased enrollment and completion rates, a stronger workforce pipeline for the energy sector, and graduates equipped with the technical expertise to meet regional employer demands.

The grants awarded Tuesday will support innovative workforce training programs that prepare individuals with the skills necessary to thrive in the state's fastest-growing industries, including the energy, construction, and technology fields.

That will not stop me from fighting, though. I doubt I will ever stop fighting. I hope I don't.

I feel like two people sometimes. The one this is happening to, and the one who is watching it happen.

I find myself hesitating to share my true reality with others. They will not grasp the terror of how this feels. I fear I will feel diminished and alone. Yet, here I am, sharing this with all of you.

Isn't that why we keep so much pain to ourselves? We are afraid of not being fully understood, so we keep it inside. Hoarding it like some valuable treasure.

I am 51, but most days I feel like I move as if I'm 81. My body feeling so much older than my mind. I feel angry, sad, trapped, and frustrated more than I would like to.

I feel guilty at the order of things. I should be strong for others at this age. I want to live a full and vibrant life. I do not want to strip this time away from my family. They deserve more.

It is sobering to think back on all the years I spent wondering about these days I am currently living in. In some ways, it does not seem as bad as I imagined, and in other ways worse.

I always imagined my physical losses to be big losses all at once, but many are small. Things you would not necessarily think you would miss, but you do when they are gone. Things that others would say, *that is no big deal*, until it happens to them.

I shouldn't be surprised, but I am. Surprised at what a powerful reminder this is to me to honor every ability I have. Grateful for the forced reminder to be thankful for the little things.

Each independence we have is worth ruminating on and appreciating.

MilkShake Factory to open in Nora Plaza shopping center

The first of at least two Indiana locations of a milkshake and chocolate maker is set to open soon.

The Indianapolis north side will celebrate the opening of **MilkShake Factory** from noon to 4 p.m. Saturday, July 12 at the Nora Plaza shopping center in the former Garbanzo Mediterranean Fresh location. That's off East 86th Street west of Westfield Road.

The first hours of food will come with music, giveaways, and a special buy-one-get-one-free offer on all shakes, sundaes, and "molten cups" featuring fruit and house-made whipped cream topped with melted milk chocolate.

Chandler said in a news release issued Monday that they plan to open several MilkShake Factory locations in Indianapolis. The MilkShake Factory website says a future location

is planned for 8932 E. U.S. 36, the Avon Commons shopping center in Hendricks County about a mile west of Ronald Reagan Parkway.

"Necrotizing enterocolitis is a GI disease," said Lindsay McGuire, Assistant Director of Advancement at The Milk Bank. "Unfortunately, it has a 50 percent fatality rate for those who have it. Still, research has shown that when those babies are provided a 100 percent breastmilk diet, survival odds go up higher than 70 percent."

Ascension St. Vincent needs to screen about 150 women monthly to meet the high demand in the NICU. Last year, nearly 1,300 women were approved as active milk donors, but the need for new donors remains constant due to the temporary nature of breastfeeding and lactation. McGuire emphasized the ease

of becoming a milk donor, noting that large quantities of frozen milk are not necessary to contribute.

The establishment of the milk depot and express site at Ascension St. Vincent Carmel represents a significant step towards improv-

ing infant health outcomes in Indiana, offering critical resources to families in need.

The site is open to the public, providing more families with access to essential nourishment for their babies. If you would

IU Health Saxony renamed to IU Health Fishers; expanded services planned

Indiana University Health Saxony Hospital in Fishers has been renamed to IU Health Fishers as part of a major expansion project aimed at enhancing health care services in the rapidly growing area.

The Fishers Community Impact Project, to be completed by October, includes expanding the hospital campus by nearly 50 percent and adding new outpatient services. This initiative is designed to meet the health care needs of Fishers, now the fourth largest city in Indiana.

"When we began this work to expand services and access to better meet the needs of the increasing population, it became clear the hospital needed a name that better reflects this growth and the broader population we serve," Soula Banich, vice president and chief operations officer supporting IU Health Fishers, said in a press release.

The expansion will add 50 inpatient beds, bringing the total to 88, and introduce Riley Children's Health emergency medicine

services, including a dedicated pediatric emergency unit adjacent to the existing emergency department.

New and expanded services will include obstetrics and gynecology; ear, nose and throat; nephrology; neurology; and pulmonology.

Existing specialty programs in cardiovascular, gastroenterology, general medicine, general surgery, orthopedics, primary care, and urology will also grow.

The project will also see the development of stand-alone outpatient physician offices in McCordsville and Fishers, expanding access to primary care and specialists.

The hospital expansion is expected to double the workforce, accommodating the increased patient volume and expanded services.



AG Todd Rokita secures protections for Hoosiers' DNA amid 23andMe bankruptcy

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita continued his leadership on Tuesday in the fight to hold tech companies accountable for consumer privacy, announcing that the entity buying 23andMe has agreed to consumer protections as part of a bankruptcy sale.

"Hoosiers who have provided sensitive information to this company deserve assurance that their data will remain confidential and secure amid these bankruptcy proceedings," AG Rokita said. "The agreement we forged with the new owners of 23andMe helps achieve this objective, and I'm

proud of our team's work toward achieving a resolution."

Before 23andMe filed for bankruptcy in March 2025, AG Rokita co-lead a coalition of 44 attorneys general to investigate a 2023 data breach that impacted over 6.9 million 23andMe customers.

After the breach, sensitive data stolen from 23andMe customers was posted on the dark web for sale, including targeted sales within days of the 2023 Hamas attack on Israel of the data of at least 1 million individuals with Ashkenazi Jewish heritage. AG Rokita demanded that 23andMe comply with security and privacy safeguards to protect consumer

data. Undeterred by the bankruptcy filing, AG Rokita took additional decisive action, including:

- Issuing a consumer alert to Hoosiers reminding them of their right to delete their 23andMe accounts if they choose.
- Being the first state to appear in the bankruptcy proceeding to stand up for consumers' right to control their own genetic information.
- Pressing the Indiana General Assembly to pass HEA 1521, Indiana's new genetic privacy law, on an emergency basis, ef-

fective May 6, 2025, to further protect Hoosiers and ensure direct-to-consumer genetic testing companies like 23andMe act responsibly.

Leading states to work with the entity buying 23andMe to include consumer protections in the sale order, including security and privacy safeguards that Indiana demanded 23andMe adopt before it filed for bankruptcy.

TTAM – a nonprofit created by 23andMe founder and CEO Anne Wojcicki – was selected as the winning bidder in the bankruptcy sale. Key con-

ditions of the sale include:

- **No transfer of customer DNA** – Because TTAM is affiliated with 23andMe, no genetic data will be transferred to a third party.
- **Customer control over data** – TTAM has agreed, in perpetuity, to allow consumers to permanently delete their data at any time, with new mechanisms in place to ensure that deletion requests are honored and verifiable by the Attorney General.
- **Compensation for data breach victims** – TTAM's \$305 million bid will help pay claims to the over 6.9 million people affected by 23andMe's 2023 data breach.
- **Preserving scientific**

research – The nonprofit status of TTAM enables it to partner more freely with other public institutions and researchers, ensuring ongoing progress in critical health and medical research for data of consumers who have opted in to such research.

• **No disruption to services** – With the same founder at the helm, consumers who wish to continue to receive the services they paid for will see no meaningful change in ownership or use of their data.

AG Rokita says he will continue monitoring the transition closely, including enforcement of data deletion rights and compliance with privacy and data security laws.

Gov. Braun identifies environmental regulations to be revisited or rescinded

On Tuesday, Governor Mike Braun and the Indiana Department of Environmental Management released a report identifying regulations to be changed or rescinded to "support business development, job creation, and economic growth, while also striving to ensure responsible environmental protection and stewardship."

"Government naturally drifts toward over-regulation, and it's important to go through these regulations to make sure they ar-

en't stifling innovation an raising the cost of living for no benefit," Gov. Braun said. "My agencies have been directed to identify regulations that are raising the cost of living without benefiting our environment so they can be changed or rescinded; we can grow our economy while also safeguarding Hoosiers' health and preserving our natural resources."

On March 12, Gov.

Braun signed an executive order focused on growing the state's economy while preserving its natural resources by limiting environmental regulations to the robust federal standards.

Part of this executive order was a directive to state agencies involved with environmental regulation to identify "state environmental regulations that are unduly burdensome, significantly raise the cost

of living for Hoosiers, are not supported by current law and the best available science, or do not benefit Indiana's environment" and report them to the Governor to be revisited or rescinded.

The Indiana Department of Environmental Management issued this report on regulations that may be "unduly burdensome, significantly raise the cost of living for Hoosiers, not supported by current law and the best available science, or do not benefit Indiana's environment."

The report identifies 10 regulations for consideration to be changed or rescinded.

The Indiana Department of Environmental Management also solicited public feedback on regulations and received ideas from farmers, small business owners, and local government on regulations and practices they view as outdated, overly burdensome, or could be improved to work better for its intended purpose.

The Sectional 8 gauntlet: baseball coaches speak out

Editor's note: Reporter sports writer Craig Adkins contacted each of the Sectional 8 baseball coaches to get their thoughts on the competition and intensity of the sectional. Today's responses are from Justin Keever of Noblesville.

Describe Sectional 8 from your standpoint.

Sectional 8 is the most competitive, random, and unforgiving bracket in the state, at all levels of the state tournament. It possesses the most top-to-bottom talent and skill in a five-day tournament in the IHSAA. You've got six elite programs, all capable of making deep runs, packed into one sectional. It's not just competitive, it's high-end baseball right out of the gate. It is very well attended, with a semi-state atmosphere.

Why is it so difficult to advance out of Sectional 8?

You essentially have to win a semi-state just to advance to a sectional championship game. Sectional 8 is more of a purge than anything, as you're going to see five teams eliminated who are all good enough to make the final four or better. It's not about who's the most complete team or who's been the most consistent; it's about who best navigates the random bracket those five days. And that's those five former Sagamore schools – Crawfordsville, Frankfort, North

that only one team each year gets to experience a sectional championship, amongst so many other worthy champions.

No matter what the sectional draw outcome is, what keeps Sectional 8 such a gauntlet and a "meat grinder?" (Eerily similar to the Hoosier Crossroads Conference)

The depth and breadth.

Every team has frontline arms, talented bullpens, guys in the middle of the order who can do damage, and coaches who know what they're doing. There's no guessing, we all know each other. So, it becomes about execution under pressure. The draw might give you a little advantage here or there, but you're still going to have to go through two or three legit programs. And the random nature of the bracket makes the results feel just as unpredictable as they are tough.

Does hosting Sectional 8 make it that much harder to win it? (Noblesville is the last host to win in 2014)

I don't believe so, no. At least from our standpoint. I think that is just a correlation without causation.

How does Sectional 8 prepare you for the rest of the tournament?

I don't think Sectional 8 necessarily prepares you for a run any more than the daily accountability of the HCC schedule. That 14-game HCC schedule gets us ready for high-end, intense baseball. The sectional certainly has a sudden-death vibe to it, which gives you the experience of increased stakes and therefore intensity.

Carmel-Fishers highlights Week 1

The Carmel and Fishers football teams have played each other seven times in the post-season over the past several years.

When the 2025 campaign begins, the Greyhounds and the Tigers will be playing each other for the first time in the regular season.

Carmel travels to Fishers for Week 1 of the Indiana high school football season, which begins on Friday, Aug. 22. It's one of two changes for the Grey-

hounds this season. Carmel will host Columbus North on Week 5, with the Bull Dogs replacing Brebeuf Jesuit.

As for the Tigers, this will be the first change to their schedule since 2018. Carmel isn't the only new opponent for Fishers: the Tigers play their Week 2 game at Lawrence North. The Greyhounds and the Wildcats replace longtime opening opponents North Central (Week 1) and Pike County (Week 2), while Fishers' Hoosier Crossroads Conference schedule stays unchanged.

Hamilton Heights and Westfield both have one change to their respective schedules. The Shamrocks now play Homestead for their opener, replacing Center Grove, while the Huskies have replaced McCutcheon with Tippecanoe Valley for their Week 3 opponent.

Guerin Catholic also has two new opponents on its schedule in 2025. The Golden Eagles are hosting Pendleton Heights for their Week 2 contest, replacing Lebanon. In Week 8, Guerin Catholic hosts Culver Academies, with Culver replacing Terre Haute North.

McCutcheon and Lebanon have rearranged their schedules due to conference changes: the Mavericks are joining the Sagamore Conference after the departure of five schools from that league. The Sagamore now consists of four schools – McCutcheon, Lebanon Harrison and Danville – with Terre Haute North and Terre Haute South joining the league starting in the 2026-27 school year.

Those five former Sagamore schools – Crawfordsville, Frankfort, North
