## Understanding the difference: no contact orders vs. protective orders

When facing situations involving harassment, domestic violence, or threats, Indiana residents often seek legal protection through court orders. However, many people are confused about the differences between no contact orders and protective orders. Understanding these distinctions is crucial for anyone considering legal action to ensure their safety or that of their loved ones.



**No contact orders: criminal court protection**

A no contact order is typically issued in criminal cases by the Court as a condition of pre-trial release, bail, probation, or sentencing. When someone is arrested and charged with a crime involving another person – such as domestic battery, stalking, or harassment – the court may issue a no contact order to protect the alleged victim while the criminal case is pending.

These orders are automatic in many domestic violence cases and prohibit the defendant from having any contact with the victim, either directly or through third parties. This includes phone calls, text messages, emails, social media contact, and physical proximity to the victim's home, workplace, or other specified locations.

The key characteristic of no contact orders is that they are tied to criminal proceedings. They exist to ensure victim safety during the legal process and to prevent witness intimidation. Violating a no contact order is itself a criminal offense that can result in additional charges and potential jail time.



## ORDER

### Protective orders: civil court protection

Protective orders, on the other hand, are civil remedies available to individuals who need protection from harassment, domestic violence, or stalking, regardless of whether criminal charges have been filed. In Indiana, these are formally called "protective orders" under IC 34-26-5, though they're sometimes referred to as restraining orders in other states.

To obtain a protective order, the petitioner must demonstrate that they have been the victim of domestic or family violence, stalking, or harassment. The court will consider evidence of threats, physical violence, or patterns of behavior that cause reasonable fear of harm.

Protective orders can provide broader relief than no contact orders. They may include provisions for tem-

porary custody of children, temporary support, exclusive use of a residence, and other remedies tailored to the specific situation. These orders can last for up to two years and may be renewed.

### Key differences in practice

The most significant difference lies in how these orders are obtained and their scope. No contact orders are imposed by criminal courts as part of criminal proceedings, while protective orders are requested by individuals through civil court proceedings.

Additionally, protective orders allow for more comprehensive relief. While a no contact order simply prohibits contact, a protective order can address custody, support, and living arrangements — making it particularly valuable in domestic violence situations where the parties share children or property.

The burden of proof also differs. Criminal no contact orders are based on probable cause that a crime occurred, while protective orders require a preponderance of evidence showing the need for protection.

### When to seek each type of protection

If you're a victim of a crime and the perpetrator has been arrested, a no contact order will likely be issued automatically. However, if no criminal charges have been filed, or if you need broader protection beyond simple no contact, a protective order may be more appropriate.

Many situations benefit from both types of orders working in tandem — criminal prosecution with a no contact order alongside a civil protective order providing comprehensive protection.

Through flashbacks, his story is unwound with featured scenes of his formative steps, his early musical development and his huge successes followed by his waning years. Elvis's meteoric rise is portrayed not just as a triumph, but as a burden.

Luckily, it is the performances of Elvis' vast catalog of hits that make this production a memorable experience. The absolute highlight of the show is the fantastic portrayal by Nicholas Voss of Elvis as an entertainer and a man. Presley's look, his style, his mannerisms are all aptly captured here. Voss handles the many musical numbers with energetic style and true-to-The-King vocals. Elvis fans, and the audience seemed full of them, will be much pleased with what is offered here.

Voss is joined on stage by an impressive array of performers. Outstanding work is done by Henry Kirk as Kid Elvis. Young Mr. Kirk shows off his fine vocal, acting, and dance talents in the many flashbacks to Elvis' childhood. Multi-talented Sarah Hund is sweetly solid as Elvis' mother, Gladys, Isabella Agresta nails the complicated Priscilla Presley role, and Reagan Cole Minnette swings through her Ann-Margret with a wonderful styling of the actress' dance moves. Eddie Curry is perfect as Colonel Tom Parker.

In addition to a mental illness diagnosis, they often face accompanying challenges of poor physical health and chronic conditions.



## Slide into September by checking IndianaUnclaimed.gov for unclaimed cash

As summer starts giving way to autumn in Indiana, AG Rokita invites Hoosiers to visit [IndianaUnclaimed.gov](http://IndianaUnclaimed.gov) to discover unclaimed property possibly waiting to “fall” into their hands.

“There’s no reason for money rightfully belonging to you to sit in a government account,” AG Rokita said. “We want nothing more than to get these funds back into your wallets or bank accounts where they belong.”

Unclaimed property includes assets such as unclaimed wages or commissions, money orders, safe deposit box contents,

forgotten savings and checking accounts, refunds and overpayments on such things as credit card balances and cell phone bills.

During AG Rokita’s tenure, the office’s Unclaimed Property Division has set records for the amount of unclaimed property returned to Hoosiers – including \$81 million in 2023, the largest amount ever returned in a single year.

“Unclaimed Property Director Amy Hendrix and her staff have done incredible work,” AG Rokita said.

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
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# Bryan Clauson's legacy lives on at Strut 2 Save Lives event

Nearly 200 organ donor supporters, their four-legged friends, and 15 local vendors joined Indiana Donor Network for its ninth annual Strut 2 Save Lives on Sunday, Sept. 7 in Noblesville.

The morning event, in its ninth year, was a family friendly, one-mile dog walk through scenic Dr. James A. Dillon Park that honored organ and tissue donors and celebrated lifesaving gifts that transplant recipients have received.

Each year, Strut 2 Save Lives shares the legacy of former Noblesville resident Bryan Clauson, an IndyCar and USAC driver who died in 2016 from injuries sustained in an on-track accident in Kansas. As an organ and tissue donor, Clauson's gifts saved the lives of five people and helped heal countless others.

His parents, Diana and Tim Clauson of Noblesville, created the event in 2017 to honor their son and raise critical financial support for families of Hoosier donors during their times of need.

Proceeds from the event support the Bryan Clauson Legacy Fund of Indiana Donor Network Foundation, which provides financial assistance – including hotel stays, gas, food, and other necessities – to families of organ and tissue donors prior to, during and after the donation process.

More than 104,000 Americans are waiting for a lifesaving organ transplant,

including 1,400 Hoosiers. Signing up to be an organ donor saves lives.

There are five ways Indiana residents can say "yes" to being an organ donor:

- They can say "yes"

when conducting business at their local Bureau of Motor Vehicles branch.

- They can sign up when they apply online for a hunting, fishing or trapping license through the state Department of Natural Resources.

• They can sign up when they apply for or renew their professional license to work in Indiana through the state's Professional Licensing Agency.

- They can say "yes" through the Health app on their iPhone or iPad.


