More massage parlors turn out to be fronts for both human trafficking & prostitution

On Wednesday, Oct. 15, members of the Indiana State Police Peru Post, Indiana State Police Indianapolis Post, Kokomo Police Department, Battle Ground Police Department, Howard County Sheriff's Office, and the Department of Homeland Security executed multiple search and arrest warrants.

These coordinated efforts resulted in the arrest of three individuals on felony charges.

This operation stems from a 14-month investigation into human trafficking crimes linked to certain business owners and operators. The investigation revealed that these businesses were being operated as fronts for prostitution, disguised as legitimate massage parlors.

Felony arrest warrants were issued and granted by the Howard County Superior Court II for Yanyan Zhao, 35, and Xingchen Li, 36, both residents of Noblesville.

Search warrants were executed at several business locations and residences, including:

- Sun Spa, 608 E. Markland Ave., Kokomo

- Dahlia Spa, 2717 E. 56th St., Indianapolis
- Sunflower Spa, 5320 Madison Ave., Indianapolis
- 16264 Red Clover Lane, Noblesville
- 320 Uxbridge Lane, Carmel

During the execution of these search warrants, Ms. Zhao and Mr. Li were located, arrest-

ed, and remanded to the Howard County Jail without incident.

These individuals were arrested and face the following preliminary charges:

- Yanyan Zhao, 35, Noblesville: Corrupt Business Influence – Level 5 Felony; and Promoting Prostitution – Level 5 Felony
 - Xingchen Li, 36, Noblesville: Corrupt Business Influence – Level 5 Felony; and Promoting Prostitution – Level 5 Felony
- Additionally, 56-year-old Hui Li, found inside the residence on Clover Lane, was arrested for Corrupt Business Influence (Level 5 Felony). Ms. Li was remanded to the Howard County Jail without incident.

One of the businesses suspected to be used as a front for illegal activity was Dahlia Spa, 2717 E. 56th St., Indianapolis, which is now boarded up.

One adult victim was recovered during this operation and has been provided with services, support, and shelter by the Department of Homeland Security, Indiana Trafficking Victims Assistance Programs, and the Howard County Pros-

ecutor's Office to ensure their safety and well-being. This investigation is ongoing, and no further information is available at this time. Anyone with information is encouraged to contact the Indiana State Police Peru Post at (765)

473-6666. All crimes mentioned in this release are alleged, and all suspects are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

The Indiana State Police Peru Post received assistance from the Indiana

State Police Indianapolis Post, Battle Ground Police Department, Kokomo Police Department, Howard County Sheriff's Office, Howard County Prosecutor's Office, Indiana State Fusion Center, Indiana Department of Revenue, Indiana Trafficking Victims Assistance Program, and the Department of Homeland Security.

Powerful stories take center stage

Mary Susan Buhner, a FOX 59 Parenting & Family Lifestyle Contributor with over 30 years of experience in nonprofit work and education, will serve as emcee. Buhner has championed student mental health initiatives at Indiana University, Butler University, and Cathedral High School, and is the author of three books, including Life's Little Guidebook and Mommy Magic.

The breakfast will feature three Brooke's Place teen panelists sharing their grief journeys:

Brea Knapp felt completely isolated after her mother died from cancer in 2022. Through therapy at Brooke's Place, she learned about emotional intelligence and discovered how her pain could become a bridge to understanding others.

Brooks Riley was just 10 years old when his father, David, died by suicide. Finding Brooke's Place gave him a safe space to share his feelings and connect with other children who understood his pain. Through their support, he has learned healthy coping strategies and now hopes his story reminds others that they are never alone and that

a parent's suicide is never a child's fault.

Makenzie Yates has attended Brooke's Place for four years, grieving the deaths of her father and sister, Cheyenne. A Center for Leadership Development alumna, Yates dreams of becoming a business owner.

Dan Antle, a long-time Brooke's Place volunteer and Board Chair, will also share his story. Since 2002, Antle has provided invaluable time, talents, and financial support to ensure Brooke's Place meets the needs of central Indiana's grieving children. He first learned about the organization as a master's level student at Butler University and has been volunteering ever since. Antle often says, "Brooke's Place is the best thing I do."

- Adults should always accompany their children and use a flashlight at night, staying within their own neighborhood and known

homes. The use of glow sticks or reflective tape on costumes can also help with visibility.

- Watch for traffic before crossing any street.
- Avoid costumes that are long, which could cause tripping or costumes that have hard plastic or wood

props like swords that could be a hazard.

- Face paint is often a safer alternative to masks that may obstruct vision.
- It is also important to inspect candy before allowing children to have it; dispose of any candy that is unwrapped.



REDEEMING WHAT IS THE LORD’S

“If what they vowed is an animal that is acceptable as an offering to the Lord, such an animal given to the Lord becomes holy. They must not exchange it or substitute a good one for a bad one, or a bad one for a good one; if they should substitute one animal for another, both it and the substitute become holy. If what they vowed is a ceremonially unclean animal—one that is not acceptable as an offering to the Lord—the animal must be presented to the priest, who will judge its quality as good or bad. Whatever value the priest then sets, that is what it will be. If the owner wishes to redeem the animal, a fifth must be added to its value.

“If anyone dedicates their house as something holy to the Lord, the priest will judge its quality as good or bad. Whatever value the priest then sets, so it will remain. If the one who dedicates their house wishes to redeem it, they must add a fifth to its value, and the house will again become theirs.

“If anyone dedicates to the Lord part of their family land, its value is to be set according to the amount of seed required for it—fifty shekels of silver to a homer of barley seed. If they dedicate a field during the Year of Jubilee, the value that has been set remains. But if they dedicate a field after the Jubilee, the priest will determine the value according to the number of years that remain until the next Year of Jubilee, and its set value will be reduced. If the one who dedicates the field wishes to redeem it, they must add a fifth to its value, and the field will again become theirs. If, however, they do not redeem the field, or if they have sold it to someone else, it can never be redeemed. When the field is released in the Jubilee, it will become holy, like a field devoted to the Lord; it will become priestly property.

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

Greyhounds get past LN, Golden Eagles roll over Delta

There is one more game to go for a regional championship, but Carmel was allowed to celebrate a little bit after winning its regional semifinal Wednesday.

The host and Class 3A third-ranked Greyhounds got past Lawrence North 1-0 in a hard-fought game at Brian Murray Stadium. Carmel was looking for redemption after falling in the regional semifinals in penalty kicks last year at the Wildcats' stadium.

This year's game was just as close. Neither team scored in the first half and the second half was also ticking by without any score.

"Lawrence North played a fantastic game and had a great game plan," said Greyhounds coach Shane Schmidt. "I think our boys just stuck to the task and just kept going at it and going at it, and the opportunities were starting to be created a little bit more towards the end. I don't think in the first half we had as many opportunities."

The Hounds had a chance to finally score with just under 12 minutes left in the half, but a certain goal was off by millimeters. That seemed to boost the energy, and Carmel kept the pressure on with a few more chances in the ensuing minutes.

Finally, with 2:16 left, the Greyhounds broke

through when Troy Enslin got the ball in the net. Carmel easily held on for the remainder of the game.

"We just kept knocking on the door, kept the pressure on and gambled at the end there," said Enslin. "Just bobbled through and

I got a nice little tap-in."

Schmidt said Enslin "did the same thing on Saturday" during the Greyhounds' sectional final win over Zionsville.

"Super proud of him, super proud of the whole team," said Schmidt.

Carmel was also keeping things solid on the defensive end as well. The Hounds have yet to give up a goal in four postseason games, and in fact delivered their 13th shutout of the season.

"Our defense is outstanding," said Enslin. "I think they're the best part of our team."

Carmel is 15-1-3 and hosts No. 1-ranked Brownsburg at 2 p.m. Saturday in the regional championship.

Guerin Catholic, ranked No. 2 in 2A, cruised past host Delta 5-1 Wednesday to reach the Concordia Lutheran regional championship.

Conner Klen scored the Golden Eagles' first goal during the 10th minute. Delta answered with a goal in the 20th minute, and the score stayed 1-1 through halftime. Guerin Catholic dominated the second half, pouring in four goals.

Braden Lindley scored

the go-ahead goal in the 51st minute, then eight minutes later took a pass from Gus Allen and put it in the net. Christian Zermeno and Caleb McGee both scored goals during the final 10 minutes.

Guerin Catholic is 15-4 and plays West Lafayette at 2 p.m. Saturday for the regional title.

Hamilton Southeastern fell to host and No. 5 Harrison 2-1 Wednesday in a Class 3A regional semifinal.

The game was tied 1-1 at halftime. The Raiders scored first, then the Royals answered with a goal by Andres Mancillas in the 36th minute. But Harrison scored early in the second half and stayed in front from there.

Southeastern finished its season 11-4-5.

Carmel heads to LC, Westfield is at Franklin Central, Heights road trips to West Lafayette

No. 2 Carmel Greyhounds (7-1) at Lawrence Central Bears (4-4)

Carmel and Lawrence Central will meet for the 45th time tomorrow night. The Greyhounds are 26-17-1 against the Bears, although LC has won the last two by a total of seven points.

LC lost a home MIC game to Ben Davis last week, 31-30. After a loss at Lawrence North, wins over Zionsville and Edwardsville (Ill.) got them to 2-1. They're 2-3 since then with wins at both Pike and North Central.

The Hounds started 3-0 with convincing wins over Fishers, Westfield and Centerville (Ohio) by a whopping 131-34 combined. A 41-28 loss at Louisville Trinity briefly tripped up the Greyhounds.

Carmel's on a four-game win streak, routing Columbus North, North Central, Ben Davis and Warren Central by a 204-28 count.

Anthony Coellner is up to third on the career passing list at Carmel with 4,140 career yards. That puts him 145 behind Morgan Newton's 4,285 from 2006-08 and 187 to tie Mark Herrmann's record 4,327 during the 1975-76 seasons.

Jacob Bellin has caught

87 for 1,308 career yards, good for seventh all-time. Jalen Walker is first with 151 receptions and 1,966 yards (2014-16).

Andrew Pemberton ranks fifth in 6A with 828 rushing yards and has nine touchdowns. Coellner also has nine touchdowns with 446 rushing.

Harrison comes to Carmel on Oct. 31 in 6A Sectional 3.

6A No. 5 Westfield Shamrocks (6-2, 5-1 HCC) at Franklin Central Flashes (4-4, 2-4 HCC)

Westfield is a perfect 7-0 against Franklin Central in the Flashes' short time in the Hoosier Crossroads Confer-

ence. The Rocks won last year's 44-7 romp of FC.

Last week, the Flashes lost a close one late at Hamilton Southeastern, 38-35.

A 3-1 start with wins over Perry Meridian and Roncalli, FC dropped its HCC opener at Brownsburg, but came back in Week 4 with a win over Zionsville. Since then, they've gone 1-3 with a win three weeks ago over Noblesville.

Connor Moreland passes 59.6 percent (115-193) for 1,441 yards, throwing 18 TDs and eight interceptions. Nathan Sparks has 629 rushing yards (seven touchdowns) and Markell Bailey has 10 touchdowns in 24 receptions and 395 yards.

Westfield's two losses have come at No. 2 Carmel (34-10) and three weeks ago to No. 1 Brownsburg (14-10).

The Shamrocks' quarterback platoon of Aiden Grabowski and Cooper Melvin works. The two total 1,223 yards, completing 59.3 percent (95-160) of their passes.

Elliott Clevenger filled in nicely for an injured Deacon King last week against Fishers with 58 yards on 21 carries and also caught three passes for 23 yards. Andrew Noble continues to lead in receiving with 20 catches for 418 and four touchdowns. Caiden Snow also has 20 receptions, 279 yards and three TDs.

Zionsville visits Westfield in the other 6A Sectional 3 matchup.

Hamilton Heights Huskies (4-4, 2-1 Hoosier Big) at West Lafayette Red Devils (2-6, 0-3 Hoosier Big)

Tomorrow night is the 14th meeting with Heights and West Lafayette. The Red Devils have 10 wins to the Huskies' three, but Heights

won't forget their last trip to West Lafayette. They won the Hoosier Conference outright with a 26-23 win at Straley Field in 2023.

The other two Heights wins over WL were in 2012 in the sectional (18-0) and a 42-7 sectional semifinal in 2004.

West Lafayette lost three to start the season, beat Rensselaer Central and Lafayette Central Catholic and have lost three more.

Blake Biddle has 1,520 yards on 146-226 passing for 64.6 percent. Kojo Steffey has 849 rushing yards and 12 TDs. Fielder Melchi has 53 receptions for 544 yards.

Heights started 1-4 and now have a three-game win streak, defeating Logansport, Twin Lakes and Tipton, to even their record.

Drew Woodruff has 1,378 yards and 11 touchdowns through the air. AJ Flanagan has 552 rushing yards and five scores, while Cam Fleming has 516 yards receiving and six TDs. Hamilton Heights hosts Guerin Catholic in a 3A Sectional 29 first round game on Oct. 24.



‘Uncharted territory’: Royals will make state debut

When the Hamilton Southeastern boys tennis team heads to North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center on Friday, the Royals will be in what coach Doug Gernert calls “uncharted territory.”

Southeastern has played at North Central before, of course. But never in the IHSAA state finals – until now. The Royals will get their first chance at state when they participate in the quarterfinals, which take place at 10 a.m. Friday.

“I thought maybe they had done it before,” said Gernert. “The closest we had gotten before this was 2009, when we were beaten by Center Grove at semi-state.”

And Southeastern had to get past Center Grove to punch its ticket to state. The No. 9-ranked Royals edged out the host and No. 10 Trojans 3-2 to win the Center Grove 2 semi-state and earn a place in the final eight.

Southeastern won both doubles matches for a 2-0 lead. The No. 2 team of Ian Ransom and Max Weinberger got the first victory, then the No. 1 team of Logan Faust and Landon Osswald won their match.

The clincher was No. 2 singles, where freshman Parker Stump outlasted his opponent in a hard-fought battle – “not three sets, but it could’ve been,” said Gernert. Stump won 7-6, 7-5.

“That’s a lot to expect out of a freshman, but he’s

played big for us all year,” said Gernert.

The Royals dropped the other two matches, but No. 1 singles Brady Stump and No. 3 Evan Holderman both pushed their opponents to three sets.

“The kids were going crazy,” said Gernert. “It didn’t really set in with me until late, because I was still trying to win matches.”

Gernert said the victory began to set in once it was picture time and HSE was holding up the trophy. “I didn’t realize how much bigger they got every time,” he said.

After that, the Royals had a fun bus ride home. “It was a good time. We had the music playing, the kids were bouncing around,”

said Gernert.

Southeastern’s quarterfinal opponent at state is Silver Creek. The No. 28-ranked Dragons won the Jasper 1 semi-state by beating Evansville North 4-1. Earlier in the tournament, Silver Creek triumphed at the Jeffersonville regional with a 5-0 semifinal win over Corydon Central and a 3-2 victory against No. 21 Floyd Central.

“I’ve not seen them play at all,” said Gernert. “My guess is any team that’s made it this far is a solid team. Any team that’s ranked in the top 30 is a solid team.”

Gernert said that not knowing about Silver Creek makes the Dragons “scariest because you don’t know what they have. We’re going to take them very seriously.”

Familiar names, evocative sports cars racing in Indianapolis 8 Hour at IMS

Seven series featuring some of the most evocative sports car brands in the world will compete on the Indianapolis Motor Speedway road course Oct. 16 to 19 during the Indianapolis 8 Hour presented by AWS event weekend.

The marquee race is the Indianapolis 8 Hour on Saturday, Oct. 18, the longest event of the season at the Racing Capital of the World. Elite sports car drivers from around the world – and three familiar names to IMS fans – will compete in the season finale for the headlining Intercontinental GT Challenge and GT World Challenge America powered by AWS series on the 14-turn, 2,439-mile road course.

Teams of drivers will race from 12:20 to 8:20 p.m. Saturday, with headlights from the GT3 sports cars illuminating the circuit when the checkered flag flies in darkness – a unique site at IMS. Both headlining series race simultaneously, with overall winners in each series crowned.

There will be 25 cars competing in the eight-hour race from renowned manufacturers Aston Martin, BMW, Chevrolet, Ferrari, Ford, McLaren, Mercedes-AMG and Porsche. These are all GT3-specification sports cars, which resemble their showroom counterparts.

Three drivers very familiar to IMS fans are racing in the feature event Saturday.

Two-time INDYCAR SERIES champion and 2018 Indianapolis 500 winner Will Power will add another chapter to his long, legendary career by competing in sports cars for the first time. He will join fellow Australians Chaz Mostert and Kenny Habul in the No. 75 Express Mercedes-AMG GT3 EVO. Power has five NTT INDYCAR SERIES victories on the IMS road course.

NTT INDYCAR SERIES fan favorite Conor Daly returns to this event, joining Kenton Koch and Connor De Phillippi in the No. 99 Random Vandals Racing BMW M4 GT3 EVO.

Two other drivers with limited INDYCAR SERIES starts, Toby Sowery and Colin Braun, will share the No. 04 CrowdStrike by Riley Mercedes-AMG GT3 EVO with George Kurtz.

The third driver well-known to Central Indiana fans competing this weekend is a two-wheeled legend making his IMS four-wheeled debut in this event. Seven-time MotoGP World Champion Valentino Rossi will share the No. 46 Team WRT BMW M4 GT3 EVO with Kelvin van der Linde and Charles Weerts. Rossi rode the No. 46 Yamaha to victory in the inaugural Red Bull Indianapolis GP MotoGP race at IMS in 2008.

Rossi will be part of a fascinating duel for the Intercontinental GT Challenge driver’s championship, a duel between BMW drivers van der Linde, from

South Africa, and Raffaele Marciello, from Italy. Van der Linde leads Marciello, 85-80, in the standings with 25 points available to the winner Saturday.

Power also can help a teammate win a season championship Saturday. Co-driver Habul is a contender for the Intercontinental GT Challenge Independent Cup title, battling Porsche drivers Ralf Bohn of Germany and reigning Independent Cup champion Antares Au of Hong Kong. Bohn and Au are tied atop the Independent Cup standings, with Habul just six points back.

Intercontinental GT Challenge practice sessions will take place at 6:55 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 16 and 9:50 a.m. Friday, Oct. 17. Qualifying starts at 3:35 p.m. Friday.

Other sports car series racing from Thursday through Sunday at IMS include GT America powered by AWS, McLaren Trophy America, GT4 America, TC America powered by Skip Barber Racing School and Toyota Gazoo Racing GR Cup North America.

Former INDYCAR SERIES driver Mathews Leist is sharing the No. 47 NOLASPORT Porsche 718 Cayman GT4 RS Clubsport with Matt Travis in the GT4 America series. Jaxon Bell, the son of INDYCAR SERIES veteran and FOX INDYCAR analyst Townsend Bell, is racing in the No. 7 Copeland Motorsports Toyota GR86 in the Toyo-

ta Gazoo Racing GR Cup North America.
