## Friendly competition fuels big impact in Heights food drive

Hamilton Heights Elementary School just wrapped up another successful food drive, and this year, the spirit of giving came with a playful twist.

Thanks to the leadership of the K-Kids Club and a friendly rivalry between two fourth-grade students, the drive brought in hundreds of items to support Angels' Attic and the school's Food Backpack Program.

It all started in first grade, when Cooper Clemens decided to turn generosity into a personal mission. Each year, he rallies family and friends to donate funds, then heads out to shop for as many food items as possible. In third grade, Evelyn Robison joined the race, creating a spirited competition that's all about helping others.

This year, Cooper raised \$362 and purchased approximately 550 items, earning his class the top spot for the fourth year in a row.

The school-wide food drive also featured a grade-level competition, with students across Hamilton Heights Elementary

Now that everyone has mini-supercomputers that pretend to be phones in their pockets, it can be challenging to get young people to learn problem-solving skills that do not involve googling, "How do I...?"

Carmel High School seniors Jennifer Hu and Allison Shen co-founded Infinity Squared Mathematics, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to bridging the equity gap in math through competitive problem-solving opportunities.

When they were high school freshmen, in 2022, Hu and Shen wanted other young people in their community to see the beauty and significance of mathematics that they could see. As 2025 comes to a close, they have raised over \$6,000, gathered a list of sponsors and partners, and helped over 500 students through chapters in Indiana, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Brazil, Mexico, Rwanda, and Uzbekistan.

The Festival of Trees could not have taken place without the fine sponsors who stepped up, several of whom also bid on and won auction items that night.



They are currently gearing up for the Infinity Squared 2025 Winter Math Competition on Dec. 20.

“Originally we wanted to just start an organization where we could help expand math outreach or just teach younger students the concepts of competition math because, growing up, we were always doing math competitions,” Hu said. “We were always competing in them, and we always found them super fun. We wanted to just share our love for math to other students and younger students.”

Now that they have helped teach over 500 other math students, they have also learned a bit about teamwork.

“I feel like it’s really a lot of experience, but also working together with our strong team of other high schoolers, who are all just very passionate for mathematics,” Shen said. “That is what we hope to promote for everyone. Having that team and also knowing that so many students can actually be impacted and motivated to learn more about mathematics, especially since we know there’s a lot of that social stigma around [the idea that] mathematics is just memorizing formulas and that it’s a really hard subject. But we really want to show that there’s a lot more to mathematics that can come from it being fun, interactive, and promoting teamwork and problem-solving at a higher level.”

They try to instill the love of mathematics by making it concrete, rather than abstract.

“Since we want to kind of teach younger students things that they can’t really learn in school,” Hu said. “We want to teach them applications of math and how they can really use their problem-solving skills and develop more problem-solving skills. That is most easily done through math competitions and teaching them those concepts. That’s how we used to like to build our own math competition and problem-solving skill sets.”

In the past few years, Infinity Squared has hosted Meet the Math events at the Zionsville Public Library and Carmel Clay Public Library. According to both Hu and Shen, the event is what its name implies: students get to “Meet the Math” through interactive lectures and problems.

“We love to give real world applications that aren’t just limited to things like finances,” Shen said. “We often use concepts like nature or problem solving in your daily life. If you’re like splitting a pie or you’re splitting a cake, it’s a round object. Most people often think like, oh, we can just cut it down the middle. But there’s more ways than that.”

Hu agreed that problems based in tangible reality help turn abstract ideas into useful skills.

“I’ve seen a lot of interesting problems that really allow me to think more and use different applications from the math concepts I learned both through high school and outside of school,” Hu said. “I try to bring all these concepts together and try to delve into higher-level math like that.”

## Health Department offering insurance navigator services

The Hamilton County Health Department now has a certified Health Insurance Navigator available to help residents understand and apply for health coverage options.

The navigator is certified through the Indiana Department of Insurance after completing a financial navigator course and state exam. The Health Department is officially certified as a site where the navigator can work with residents to explore their insurance options.

Services include confidential, one-on-one assistance with Medicaid programs such as HIP, CareSource, Anthem, and other plans available under the Affordable Care Act. Support is also available for parents, children, WIC participants, and residents who are uninsured.

“We’re here to serve our community, no matter someone’s ability to pay, and every day we see patients who would benefit from insurance coverage but simply don’t know where to start,” Health Department Administrator Jason LeMaster said. “Our goal is to walk beside them through the process – because when more of our neighbors are covered, our whole community is healthier in the long run.”

Appointments take place in a private setting at the Health Department, and participants receive an aftercare packet with next steps and resources. Residents should bring necessary documentation such as birth certificates or proof of income to their appointment.

# Surveillance economy is on notice

AG Rokita: "Your personal data is your personal property"

On Tuesday, Nov. 25, Attorney General Todd Rokita and members of his team put the surveillance economy on notice with the "Data Consumer Bill of Rights."

"Protecting Hoosiers personal information has always been a priority of our office," Rokita said. "We've been in this game a long time. We've sued Google over their use of your location data, and we've consistently enforced the privacy rights under HIPAA regarding your health care information. Starting Jan. 1, 2026, we will enforce Indiana's new Consumer Data Protection Act because we now live in a full-blown, what I call 'surveillance economy.'"

According to Rokita, data from every online click, purchase, and search, as well as every visit to a doctor and dollar you spend is tracked, packaged, and sold.

"Your personal data is your personal property, and for years now, decades now, it's been taken from you," Rokita said. "Your personal data has been treated like someone else's property for too long. Thanks to unanimous bipartisan action by our General Assembly, we now have a huge first step, not a complete solution by any means, but a huge first step in empowering Hoosiers to steward and protect their own data. You've got to put the power in our own hands to keep our property ours."

Companies that do business with Hoosiers will be required by law to put a clearly marked "privacy notice" or "your data rights" information link in a prominent position on their websites.

"A common practice, and what we suggest, is that companies put that on the bottom right-hand corner of their home page," Rokita said.

Starting Jan. 1, Hoosiers have the right to correct inaccuracies in personal data held by a company, delete personal data held by a company, and obtain your personal data in an easily transferable form. After 45

days, if a company has not complied, you call the AG's office for assistance.

"By far, it's not a perfect law," Rokita said. "There are exemptions in this law that special interest groups and lobbyists put in, and some have no sense whatsoever. The idea that utilities – our power generators – need an exemption from this law in this day and age when it's in the non-nuclear context is absolutely ridiculous. Some of our nonprofits are the biggest takers of our private personal data, but they're exempted from this law. Why? Who knows? Other exemptions may be in place because they're preempted by federal law."

Examples of exemptions from the Indiana law that are preempted by federal law include banking and HIPAA-related statutes, according to Rokita.

Scott Barnhart, Chief Counsel and Director of Consumer Protection at the Office of the Indiana Attorney General, echoed Rokita's position that this law is a good start.

"This is a good first step," Barnhart said. "The surveillance economy is there. It's not going away, but this allows for an opportunity for consumers to recapture some of their privacy, recapture some transparency into the system, [and] to better understand how data brokers and others are using their information. There is a reason why there are approximately 56 data centers in Indiana. Those data centers are accumulating information, and they're accumulating data on consumers, and they're using it. This will allow the opportunity for consumers to empower themselves to better understand how that data is being used."

According to Rokita, the consumer protection division of the AG's office is its second-largest division.

"It's a very active division," Rokita said. "We were the first in the nation to sue the Chinese government, for example."

Doug Swetnam, Section Chief of the Data Privacy & Identity Theft Unit at the Office of the Indiana Attorney General also spoke on Tuesday.

"There are areas that

are not covered because of the exemptions, and I think that we will certainly make recommendations moving forward with the General Assembly about ways that we could protect consumers even better," Swetnam said. "But we're looking forward to being able to have a new tool in our toolbox for enforcing the rights of consumers to privacy and the ability for them to control their data. The section is set up where companies are required under this law to provide a privacy notice that explains what data they're collecting from you and how they're using it in a simple to understand way."

According to Swetnam, examples of complaints consumers will be able to make through an online portal hosted by the AG's office include:

- I couldn't find their policy.
- I don't know how to delete my data or correct my data.
- I read what they had on their website, but it was complicated and I couldn't understand it.

"That transparency into how companies are collecting the data and using it is something that will be new for consumers, and that really gives a lot of power to consumers to make choices about who they do business with," Swetnam said. "If you don't like what they're doing, you do have a choice not to do business with that company and that may become a differentiator in the market. We are looking

forward to making sure that that law is enforced and that consumers have some level of protection, finally, where they used to have none."

The Consumer Data Protection Act was passed in 2023 and takes effect Jan. 1, 2026. Due to that long delay in implementation, Rokita said there is no excuse for a company to claim ignorance as a way to avoid penalties for non-compliance.

"Any company that wants to claim ignorance needs to change their lawyers," Rokita said.

When asked if there will eventually be an online location for consumers to see a list of companies that have not complied or have a pattern of not complying, Rokita said, "I will commit to that to the extent I can under the public records laws and everything else. I'll compile that and publish it. I think that's a great deterrent. And again, it's a tool to empower consumers."

# Strength training can benefit anyone

"Age is not a cage." – Renee Landers, 73, award-winning body builder

I love this quote for a few different reasons, but today I will purpose it for the explanation and encouragement of why it is so important to strength train, and that pertains to both sexes.

As a baby boomer I was always under the impression, until my mid-50s, that strength training was primarily a focus and purview of men. That is completely untrue. Strength training for women will not only help us to obtain the size and shape for which we are striving but also to allow us to better recover from injuries we may sustain.

Renee Landers began strength training in her late 50s to relieve pain from spinal injuries and a resulting surgery. She began slowly, yet consistently, training three days a week and when she was 69 she entered her first bodybuilding competition. She credits both proper

nutrition and following a workout regime that transforming her body. Her training also included changing her diet to focus on plant-based proteins, included fish, and the elimination of processed foods. The combination helped to eliminate her pain and transform her body. (Inflammation is a major cause of illness and resulting disabilities. More about that in a future column.)

I am not one to pass on an opportunity to improve the physical appearance of my body. Vanity? Yes, and I readily admit that. However, as I age, the health benefits of strength training are uppermost in my planning. Strength training can, and will if one commits to the process, reduce the risk of diabetes, create stronger bones and skeletal mass, lower blood pressure, improve cognitive function, and result in longer life.<sup>1</sup>

When we consider a "longer life," we of course wish to en-

vision the quality of that longer life. Many will find it interesting that a study of adults in their 80s and 90s who lifted heavy weights found that they gained strength and muscle mass in just 12 weeks!<sup>2</sup> Most of us as we approach our 60s, 70s, and beyond believe we are on the waning end of regular workouts and strength training. As you can see from the statistics quoted here, nothing could be further from the truth. In fact, lack of activity and strengthening can contribute to unbalance, falls, and overall weakness which can result in a shorter lifespan. I have heard female friends remark that they do not wish to "build bulk," which in truth is highly unlikely unless one participates in a strict regimen of heavy lifting, increased protein intake, and other body building protocols.

It is important, as I often suggest before any fitness or dietary changes, to have a full checkup and bloodwork with your physician. If you are given the green light, you can – and should – endeavor to add strength training to your self-care.

I will not, in this format, suggest specific weights to use or weight lifting techniques as those can vary from person to person depending on their current fitness level and the outcome they wish to achieve. However, it is important to begin with light weights for your personal safety and, if possible, retain the services of a knowledgeable trainer. There are some online resources that can be helpful as well but make certain of the credentials of those presenting the information.

Also, dear readers, think of the quote above as it also relates to your social, intellectual, and joyful self – age is not a cage – and have a Happy Thanksgiving!

# Be cautious of a politician giving medical advice

On Sept. 22, President Trump and Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy, Jr. held a press conference strongly urging against Tylenol (acetaminophen) use during pregnancy. They associated its use with the development of autism and other childhood neurodevelopmental disorders.

Trump rambled off script, declaring that "we found the cause of autism," repeatedly advising against the use of Tylenol during pregnancy, and saying, "just tough it out." He continued by stating that babies should also not receive Tylenol and then ventured into questioning current childhood vaccination schedules.

The press conference was

chaotic and reckless, resulting in misinformation and confusion. Trump's conclusion that Tylenol use during pregnancy was "very high risk" and "strongly associated with autism" goes well beyond what the scientific evidence supports.

Studies have found an inconsistent association, and no studies support a causative relationship.

Association is not causation. It's impossible to conduct prospective placebo-controlled studies (the "gold standard" for demonstrating causation) for Tylenol use during pregnancy for obvious ethical reasons. All studies are retrospective and observational.

Observational studies are burdened with confounding variables that may make an as-

sociation appear causative. For example, the senior author of an April 2024 *Journal of the American Medical Association* study, widely considered the definitive research on Tylenol use during pregnancy, offers this scenario: Eating ice cream in the summer is statistically associated with the risk of drowning. It's actually hot weather that increases both ice cream consumption and swimming (which would increase the likelihood of drowning).

Similarly, conditions that prompt Tylenol use, such as fever and infection during pregnancy, have been linked to autism and other neurodevelopmental conditions if left untreated. These could plausibly be the actual causative factors.

Observational studies can indicate causation, but only when there is an enormous amount of irrefutable evidence over time.

Smoking causing lung cancer is an example. Tylenol use during pregnancy is very far from this level of evidence. A recent review in *Environmental Health* of 46 studies demonstrated conflicting results regarding an association. Some studies finding an association were criticized for a lack of scientific rigor and study design.

The aforementioned *JAMA* article was a Swedish study of 2.4 million children over 24 years. The study actually demonstrated an association between Tylenol use and autism, but that association disappeared when applying sibling controls who were not exposed to Tylenol during pregnancy. The sibling controls accounted for genetic and other environmental factors. Additionally, no escalating dose-response outcome

# Hamilton County Public Safety agencies conduct multi-agency training exercise at Ruoff Music Center

Public safety agencies from across Hamilton County and central Indiana have participated in a large-scale, multi-day training exercise designed to validate coordinated response efforts during a major incident.

The objective of this exercise is to strengthen multi-agency communication, response, and coordination during complex emergency scenarios. Training includes active-threat situations, suspicious ob-

jects, and multiple simulated victims. All this helps to provide realistic, high-pressure environments for responders.

Over the course of four days, approximately 400 public safety personnel and more than 550 volunteer crisis actors took part in 12 scenarios, representing the culmination of 19 months of planning.

was found, as would be expected with a causative agent. A Japanese study of over 200,000 children with sibling controls also yielded the same conclusions.

Federal health officials selectively cite and misinterpret studies to support Kennedy's agenda. It's noteworthy that the American Psychiatric Association, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, the Society for Maternal-Fetal Medicine, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and others consider judicious use of Tylenol safe during pregnancy.

Despite the press conference's rhetoric and a safety warning to be added to Tylenol's label, the Federal Food and Drug Administration's recommendation is that the lowest effective dose be

used for the shortest possible duration. Good advice for most medications used during pregnancy. Nothing new here.

Under pressure, Kennedy has since admitted that he doesn't have sufficient evidence to support a causative link - yet.

Women should feel safe prudently using Tylenol during pregnancy. It's one of the few options available to treat pain and fever. Consult your physician for advice and cast a critical eye on whatever Kennedy or Trump may advise medically.

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# Palmer Ault named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year

*Noblesville star now playing for Indiana University*

Palmer Ault's soccer career has been filled with record-setting performances.

He was a four-year varsity starter at Noblesville High School, and over those four years he totaled a school-record 173 points on 67 goals and 39 assists. He was awarded state player of the year, Mr. Soccer 2021, by the Indiana Soccer Coaches Association and aided Noblesville in winning the 2021 IHSAA Class 3A state championship.

Ault continued his career at Butler University where he was named Big East Freshman of the Year along with many other awards, and by the end of his junior year with Butler he had 21 goals and 12 assists, totaling 54 points.

He is now finishing his college career at Indiana University, where he was just named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year, a credit he is extremely grateful to receive.

"It's been a fantastic season and receiving that honor means a lot to me, but as much as that may seem like an individu-

al award, to me it's more about the collective effort that we've had this season and my teammates putting me in good positions to succeed," said Ault.

Transitioning from the Big East conference to the Big Ten conference is a drastic change. While IU is only 30 minutes farther from home than Butler, the Hoosiers' soccer reputation is anchored with eight NCAA championship wins under their belt.

"Making that switch [in December] allowed me to go through some adjustments early on, but once I hit the ground running in a few spring games and over the course of the spring season, coming into the fall has been nothing new to me," said Ault.

Ault adapted quickly and integrated cleanly with the team on and off the field, his coach is especially impressed with the impact he has made on the team.

"He's been phenomenal on the field, in the locker room, and off the field, how do you not cheer for that kid, he's just a really good human," said IU's head coach Todd Yeagley.

The Trailblazers opened their season at the U Center to host Park Tudor in a sold-out game. Fans were getting turned away at the door and it was standing room only – not a spare seat to be found.

Those that got to see the game were treated to a hard-fought contest, where the Panthers held off University 70-65. The Blazers come into the season as last year's Class 2A state runners-up and were ranked No. 6 in the pre-season poll, while Park Tudor is not ranked, but should be.

Henderson nailed a 3 to start the third quarter and gave University a 30-29 lead. Mohamud later made a jumper to tie the game at 32-32.

After that, Park Tudor launched a 21-3 run to go ahead 53-35, the largest

Baskets by Blower and C.C. Quigley tied the game at 32-32. But Carmel finished the third quarter on a 7-1 run and never trailed again. Fisher started things with two free throws, Wallace made a jumper, then Fisher grabbed a steal and scored while being fouled, making the free throw for

the and-1. While the Greyhounds stayed in front for the entire fourth quarter, Noblesville kept things close. Ally Hutchinson scored the Millers' first eight points, then hit a 3 with just over a minute left to keep her team within 48-46. But Carmel held on for the win; Ramsey got the last point with a free throw at the 3.9-second mark.

Ramsey scored 21 points to lead the Greyhounds, followed by

Wallace with 13 and Fisher with 11. Natalie Whelan-Edwards led the rebounds with six, while Wallace dished out four assists.

Hutchinson scored 13 points, with Blower adding 10 points and four assists. Quigley collected six rebounds.

"I definitely loved our fight and I thought our kids in that second half definitely played their butts off," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley.



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
