No one writes sports like Hall

Sports Editor earns Ink-Stained Wretch Award during final month of coverage

The Hamilton County Reporter is proud to name Sports Editor Richie Hall as the Spring 2026 recipient of our Ink-Stained Wretch Award. Hall's award certificate reads, "In recognition and appreciation for many years of service to the Hamilton County high school sports community."

Publisher Stu Clampitt and Reporter Owners Ray Adler and Isaac Taylor presented Hall with his award on Thursday, July 2. Hall also received a fountain pen inscribed with the words "Ink-Stained Wretch," and a \$100 gift certificate for a celebratory dinner at Pasto Italiano, 3150 E. State Road 32, Westfield.

An ink-stained wretch is an old idiom from the halcyon days when people wrote with pens. [Editor's note: A pen is a physical device filled with ink with which we used to scratch words on paper. "Ink-stained wretch" was a phrase for those of us who made a living from writing.]

Hall has been reporting on Hamilton County sports for 19 years. While he had worked as a sports writer at non-Hamilton

County newspapers for a while, he started his time in this county under the tutelage of the legendary Don Jellison long before Don helped found The Hamilton County Reporter.

Hall is a member of the Hamilton County Basketball Hall of Fame, having been in-

ducted as a writer in 2021.

On July 24, Hall will write his final sports byline in the newspaper industry. He told The Reporter in late 2025 that he wanted to do something different with the remainder of his working life. We know players, parents, coaches, and fans will miss him.

"I have worked in the print industry for longer than I care to admit, and I have never met anyone who can do what Richie does at the level that he does it — every week of the year," Reporter Publisher Stu Clampitt said.

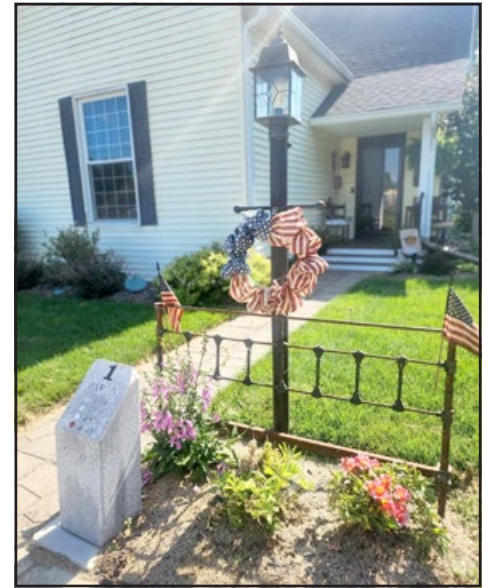

I hope our veterans feel appreciated. Many of my friends' dads fought in World War II. James Williams was one of them. My best friend, Patrice, still shares his stories. May we never forget The Battle of the Bulge, Normandy, Pearl Harbor, Iwo Jima, and many others. Thousands of lives were lost in Europe, Asia, and the Pacific from 1939 to 1945. If you've never watched *Saving Private Ryan*, you need to.

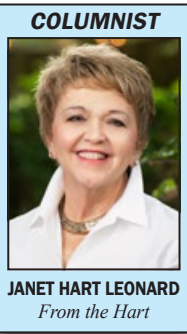
My friends, Dan Gamble and Jim Earl, along with my cousin Clay Stinson, fought in Vietnam. Sadly, their return home was not celebrated. It was an unpopular war. The men returned home with battle scars not only on their bodies but also in their minds. Some stories still haunt them. We are truly the land of the free because of the brave.

Today, I am reminded of the speeches by great men who had our entire country's best interests at heart.

Frederick Douglass said in a speech on July 5, 1852, that the Declaration of Independence had principles, saving principles. He urged his listeners, who paid 12 ½ cents to enter Corinthian Hall, to stand by those principles, on all occasions, in all places, against all foes, at whatever cost. He ended with these words, "I do not despair of this country." The audience rose in applause. He then continued, "The life of the nation is secure only while the nation is honest, truthful and virtuous."

Theodore Roosevelt gave a speech that included, "Americanism is a question of principle, of idealism, of character. It is not a matter of birthplace, or creed, or line of descent." Can I get an "Amen?"

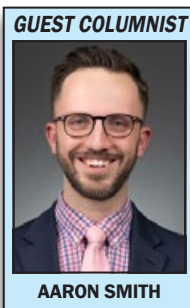

America was, and is, an ambitious dare

Two hundred fifty years ago, a lawyer from Massachusetts sat down to write his wife a letter — and made a prediction that seems especially fitting this week.

The war was going badly. He had just put his name to what amounted to a death warrant. And in the middle of all of it, John Adams told Abigail that the day just past would be remembered forever — celebrated by "succeeding Generations" with "Pomp and Parade... Bonfires and Illuminations, from

one End of this Continent to the other."

He was describing our fireworks, two and a half centuries early, inside a cause most reasonable people expected to lose.

He wasn't fooling himself about the price. He knew it would cost "Toil and Blood and Treasure." And still, he wrote, "through all the Gloom I can see the Rays of ravishing Light and Glory."

That may be the most American sentence ever written — the audacity of a man

who could sit in the dark and describe the sunrise.

That audacity is exactly what we've misplaced lately. We treat the founding as a pile of documents to litigate, when it was first of all a nerve — an improbable, all-in bet by people who pledged "our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor" on odds that should have buried them. The country began as a dare. And as we celebrate 250 years, I've grown convinced that the best thing we can do for the next 250 is the very thing that started it: be bold.

That cuts against the whole mood of the moment because

ours is an age that has elevated cynicism. Despair is the house style now. It's what the feeds reward, what the panels sell, what lands in the inbox begging for \$25 before midnight because the end is near. Pessimism sounds sophisticated; hope sounds naïve. But turn it over and the truth shows that the cynic risks nothing and builds nothing. Doom is the one posture that asks nothing of us. Adams had every earthly reason for gloom and chose the bonfires anyway. Call it what it was: courage.

Main Street Productions (MSP) is taking audiences of all ages on a journey to another world when *Alice in Wonderland* hits the stage at Basile Westfield Playhouse, 220 N. Union St., from July 16 to 26. Wonderland is such a strange and trippy place that The Reporter needed a guide through that wonder-filled world. While Alice had her Cheshire Cat, we spoke with MSP Director Amber K. Roth.

"Our production is very much catered to what we call

in theater TYA, which is theater for young audiences," Roth said. "Our concept is larger than life, so we are following very closely to Lewis Carroll's book. Not only does the script stay very true to the book, but it's not Disneyfied."

While Alice's journey is one written for younger readers, this play has something to offer everyone who's ever taken a journey of imagination.

"Piper Williams is my assistant director for this production," Roth said. "She got a minor in theater back in college and is currently an elementary school teacher in Carmel Clay

Schools. Her first-grade class is our main demographic to watch the show, but anybody from three years old to 93 is a hundred percent welcome to come and dive into the world of Wonderland."

Alice falls asleep in a garden while reading stories and dreams of being in a magical world of symbolism and adventure, and MSP will take you into that dreamworld.

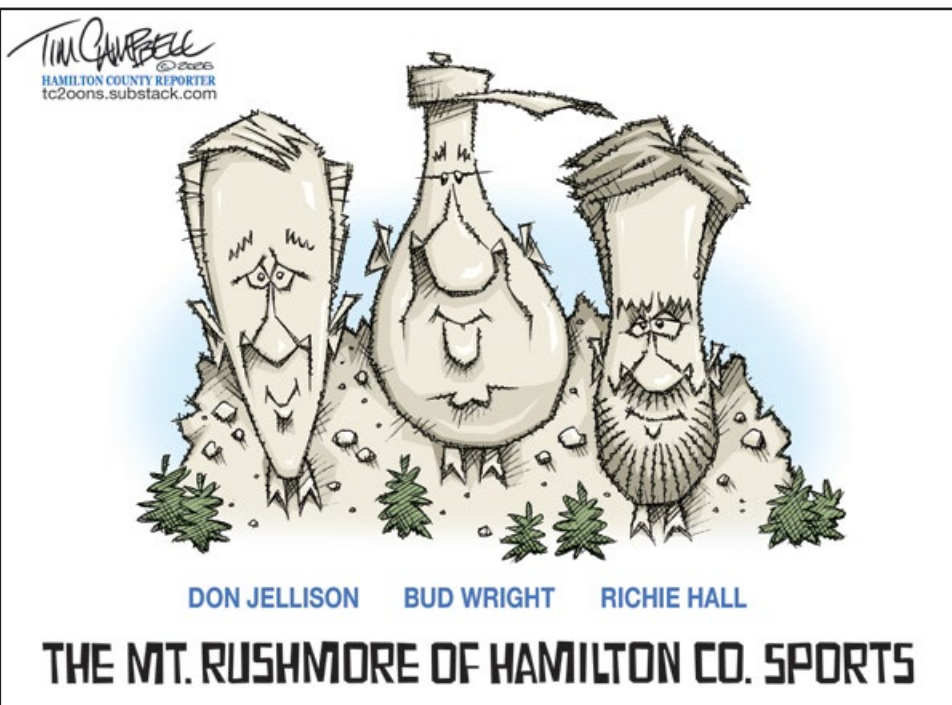
"What we see in that dream is magnified," Roth said. "In our whole world of Wonderland, we are going

Lantern stops in Hamilton County for America 250

Hamilton County residents had the opportunity to experience a unique piece of American history at the end of June when Indiana's Revolutionary Lantern made stops across the county as part of the America 250 celebration.

The lantern, which represents the signal displayed in Boston's Old North Church on April 18, 1775, traveled throughout Hamilton County June 26 to 28, appearing at the Hamilton County Government and Judicial Center, the Time Traveler's Ball at Coxhall

Gardens, the Arcadia Train Depot, the Spark!Fishers Parade, and the Westfield Washington Public Library.

Throughout the weekend, the Hamilton County Historical Society encouraged residents to preserve family memories and personal experiences by sharing them with local historical organizations.

"History isn't just found in books and archives," Hamilton County Historian Jessica Layman said. "It lives in the memories of the people who experienced it. By recording and preserving family stories today, we

ensure that future generations understand not only what happened in Hamilton County, but how it felt to live, work, celebrate, and build a community here."

The Hamilton County stop was part of a statewide initiative led by the Indiana Daughters of the American Revolution and the Indiana America 250 Commission. Ten symbolic lanterns are traveling to all 92 Indiana counties before being permanently displayed at the Indiana War Memorial in Indianapolis as part of the state's commemoration of America's 250th anniversary.

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into the garden itself that she has fallen asleep in, as if Wonderland was smaller. We're seeing super tall, large, flowers. We have six-to seven-foot-tall blades of grass. This is definitely larger than life. Everything that we see in a normal garden has been magnified so that we are as small as ants."

This youth production draws on a cast of 27 ranging in age from 10 to 18 years old. That age group provides for a wide physical range in the actors, helping build the illusion that Alice is in a larger-than-life setting.

"Our Queen of Hearts is substantially taller than our Alice," Roth said. "She's already at least five nine, and our Alice is five feet. We have added an additional three more inches to our queen of hearts with high heels."

Roth told The Reporter this show has impressive costume work to go with the massive set decoration.

"Our Cheshire cat really leads our show," Roth said. "He introduces Alice to us. He's the one that tells us our hellos and our goodbyes, and keeps our guardian watch over Alice. We have this beautiful jacket that has this really cool tiger-like print to it that has been completely structured for our Cheshire. Everything is custom-made. There's nothing in there that I would say you could typically find anywhere else."

In addition to seeing a great show, supporting young actors, and reliving a classic story, audiences might also walk away with a few philosophical questions to ponder in the days to follow.

"We are getting philosophical in this show," Roth said. "We are getting very deep down to understanding who we are as individuals, why we go on the path that we do, and how we navigate them while being able not to just understand ourselves

but understand others. We do dive deep into that, but overall if you are looking for a fun, family-friendly time, do not let these young actors fool you - you are getting a professional-quality performance at a friendly community rate. If you ever thought for a second that your child would like theater and like to be exposed to it, definitely take them to see *Alice in Wonderland!*"

Cicero launches crowdfunding push for Community Park playground

Cicero residents and visitors will soon enjoy a farm-themed playground in Community Park for ages 5 to 12 thanks to an IHCD's CreatINg Places crowdfunding campaign that launched last Friday, July 3.

CreatINg Places is a program of the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHCDA). The Town of Cicero is leading the campaign.

"We're thrilled to be participating in the CreatINg Places program once again," Cicero Parks Superintendent Jim Hunter said.

"We're confident our community will help us raise our goal so we can receive a matching grant from IH-CDA to build this new playground by the fall."

If the campaign reaches its \$50,000 goal by Sept. 3, the town will receive a matching grant of \$50,000 from IHCDA's CreatINg Places program.

The CreatINg Places program is available to projects located in Indiana communities. Non-profit entities (with 501c3 or 501c4 status) and Local Units of Government are eligible to apply.

Eligible projects must have a minimum total development cost of \$10,000, where the recipient will receive \$5,000 in IHCDA matching funds should they successfully raise \$5,000 through Patronicity. IHCDA will provide matching grant funds up to \$50,000 per project. Learn more at in.gov/ihcda.

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Area mayors gather to discuss public safety

Mayors from cities in Boone, Hamilton, Hancock, Hendricks, Johnson, Madison, Marion, and Shelby counties gathered on Friday, June 26, at Gainbridge Fieldhouse in Indianapolis with the goal of improving public safety.

Other civilian leaders and police chiefs from the cities took part in the Regional Mayors' Public Safety Partnership Summit.

In collaboration with Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett in hosting the summit, Carmel Mayor Sue Finkam said, "Crime takes a toll on every community. Individuals who commit crimes often move among jurisdictions, creating challenges that no single community can solve alone. As mayors, we are committed to working together to address this critical issue on behalf of those we serve."

For the initial gathering, the focus was on establishing a shared understanding of regional crime trends and challenges, identifying opportunities to improve operational cooperation among law enforcement agencies focused on repeat offenders and creating a framework for ongoing cooperation. The gathering additionally emphasized information-sharing related to repeat violent offenders and emerging crime trends, as well as developing recommendations regarding legislative and operational policy changes.

Following the meeting, Mayor Finkam described it as a critical first step that will be followed by conversations with prosecutors, judges, and state legislators.

The next regional meeting will focus on understanding gaps and barriers in the legal system.

Gov. Braun extends gas tax holiday for 30 days

Governor Mike Braun announced on Thursday, July 2 that he will continue the suspension of Indiana's gas taxes for 30 more days.

As a result of the ongoing suspension, Indiana now boasts the cheapest gas in America.

"Affordability is my top priority," Gov. Braun said. "I am once again extending these gas tax savings to make life more affordable for Hoosier families. Hoosiers will be able to celebrate 250 years of American independence this Fourth of July with the

cheapest gas in America." Last week, Gov. Braun directed his administration to make local governments whole for any gas tax revenues missed while the ongoing energy emergency is in effect.

"We are running government more efficiently," Braun said, "and as a result, we have the resources to offer tax relief while supporting local partners."

Gov. Braun had previously noted this is the final time he can unilaterally suspend the state's gas taxes without action from the General Assembly.

"Every school. Every sport. Every season. It's astonishing. He took the ball from Don Jellison and ran with it all the way to the hall of fame. Then he just kept running!"

Hall built a sports coverage team that is second to none in the Midwest.

"The owners of The Reporter had several conversations about what we would do in a post-Richie era, and we realized no one can ever live up to his standard for coverage," Clappitt said. "He is the end of the Jellison legacy. The best we could possibly do would be to find someone who provides the kind of coverage you see everywhere else, and that is a sadly low standard in the modern world. That's why we made the decision to make The Reporter a news-only paper go-

ing forward. When Richie goes, so goes the best sports coverage this county will ever see."

Hometown Weatherman and Reporter Owner Paul Poteet said Hall handled sports like no one else ever could.

"Richie is a one-man 24/7 content machine, and a living library of Hamilton County sports," Poteet said. "We've been so fortunate to have him on The Hamilton County Reporter team. I just picked up one of our last newspapers on our coffee table and counted about six bylines. I'll miss that!"

Reporter Owner Isaac Taylor agrees that Hall is one-in-more-than-a-million.

"Richie Hall is that elusive combination of caring, knowledgeable, and good at what he does," Taylor said. "Many moons ago, he

dedicated himself to giving high school student-athletes the press he knew they deserved, and he's proven that dedication time and time again. While this is a new era both for him and this newspaper, no one dares question the value of everything he has done for the people of Hamilton County and the surrounding areas for the last 25 years. Well done, Richie."

You can see Hall at his final series of sports events this month in Hamilton County, and you might catch him at the 4-H Fair July 16 to 20 at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds, 2003 Pleasant St., Noblesville, when he pitches in for our giant 4-H results special edition, publishing the first week of August.

Hall got ink in his veins at an early age, and we are

And then there are the words of the Declaration of Independence, mostly written by Thomas Jefferson, which establish the fundamental American ideals of inalienable rights, human equality, and the right to self-governance.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness.

The Declaration of Independence also includes grievances against King George III and details how he repeatedly violated their rights. The Preamble of the Declaration of Independence outlines the government's core values, principles, and purposes.

Martin Luther King Jr. said, "I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the

true meaning of its creed: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal.'"

He went on to say, "When we allow freedom to ring — when we let it ring from every city and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing the words of the old Negro Spiritual, *Free at last, Free at last, Great God a-mighty, We are free at last.*"

"Man's capacity for justice makes democracy possible, but man's inclination to injustice makes democracy necessary." — American theologian Reinhold Niebuhr

"Our flag does not fly because the wind moves it. It flies with the last breath

of each soldier who died protecting it." — Author unknown

It was Ralph Waldo Emerson who said, "America is another name for opportunity."

I was raised with the idea that America is about liberty and justice for all. Not just for those backed by corporate dollars. Not just for those whose voices are louder. Not just for those in power. BUT FOR ALL. Justice looks different when you have had it taken away because of your bank account, color of your skin, religion, or lifestyle.

So what does that kind of nerve look like now, for the rest of us who will never sign a Declaration?

It looks, first, like showing up for the people around us. It's bold to know the family two doors down in a society now built to keep us scrolling alone — to belong to something that meets in a room, to cross the street when staying in would be easier. Tocqueville marveled that where other people waited on the government, Americans simply rounded up their neighbors and got to work. It's the same reflex that still encourages a bus driver and middle school students to remove weeds from an old downtown brick sidewalk in their free time. That is a kind of courage, and it is ours to keep or to lose.

It looks like building

things meant to outlast us. In the 1870s, a still-young county of farmers spent a small fortune to raise a grand Second Empire courthouse over the Noblesville square — drawn by the architect who would go on to design the Indiana Statehouse, and, the day it opened, without equal in the state. It was a wildly ambitious thing for a place that size to build. And every generation since has made its own bold choice to keep it, to restore its clock tower and mansard roof, to guard it from the wrecking ball when trading it for something cheaper would always have been easier. We plant trees we will never sit under and lay brick for feet that can't yet walk.

Adams had a word for it: Posterity. He was building it for us.

And at its boldest, it looks like investing in the generation coming up behind us — the new hire, the apprentice, the kid down the street with far more grit than guidance. It looks like coaching the team when you have no free time, teaching the class. Heck, even starting a business that hires that gritty kid. For my wife and me, it meant starting a family in the face of infertility after years of hoping, and the quiet heartbreak so many carry and too few admit out loud.

We should all refuse to be the generation that pulls the ladder up behind it because at its root, the most defiantly hopeful thing a person can do is stake a claim on someone or something that doesn't yet exist.

Adams, through all his gloom, could see us — he

was even a little off on the date, so sure we'd celebrate the second of July that he missed the fourth. But he saw the bonfires, and he was right. We will light them again this week, from one end of the continent to the other, exactly as he foresaw.

The only question worth asking on the Fourth is whether the Americans of 2276 will look back on us the way we look back on him — as people who, through their own gloom, kept the nerve.

Together, let's raise up the next generation. Let's light our bonfire. America was a dare from the very first day, and the boldest, most hopeful, most patriotic thing we can do with our turn is to go on daring.

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Life-long memories fostered at ALA Hoosier Girls State

Tomorrow's leaders are shaped through formative high school experiences.

Each year the American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) hosts a week-long summer camp for girls entering their senior year of high school. ALA Hoosier Girls State (ALAHGS) centers around instilling leadership and patriotism through a mock election process on the city, county, and state level, with subsequent party divisions and other nuances of the real political process.

The program isn't exclusive to just girls, with an ALA Hoosier Boys State hosted yearly, following the same structure and basic organization.

The Reporter spoke with Kayla Aba, Alisha Kundi, and Madeline Wiemeyer, all girls who attended the 2026 ALAHGS season.

Aba, a Carmel High School student and the 2026 ALAHGS governor, said she chose to run on the state level, vying for governor and successfully securing the position.

"I tried and pushed myself to do what I wanted to do. I didn't wanna have any regrets," Aba said.

Aba said another central reason why she chose to run was because she wanted to show people leadership comes in many different forms.

She said, "You don't have to fit a certain box, anybody can be a leader, and everybody is a leader in their own way."

According to Kundi, delegate and Carmel High School student, she chose to run for a state-level position as well.

"Even though I lost, I feel like I didn't truly lose anything because I came back home with a lot more friends and connections all over the state," Kundi said. "It gave me a new perspective and I think I can apply it to future endeavors."

Wiemeyer, a delegate and Fishers High School student, said she ran for County Circuit Court Judge and County Federalist Party Chairman.

Wiemeyer said with her role as party chairman, "In different state meetings, I would be one of the voting delegates, which was a fun experience."

Friendship

Aba, Kundi, and Wiemeyer all attested to the significance of building new friendships at ALAHGS with girls from incredibly different communities.

According to Aba, she learned how to be a better team player and supporter to her friends through activities like making posters and campaigning alongside other girls.

"Girls State made me connect with so many different people, people that I have nothing in common with," Aba said. "The things I would talk their ears off about if they lived in Carmel, I literally didn't speak of because I didn't need to. We connected on literally so many other things."

According to Kundi, she thinks the program shows that you don't truly need

to know someone for years to have a significant connection.

"Just having one thing in common or just knowing a little bit about someone else is enough to create lasting friendships," Kundi said.

Improvements

Although Kundi and Wiemeyer said they enjoyed their experience overall, there are areas where structural improvements could be made.

According to Kundi, much of the program focuses on election success. That idea inherently encourages many girls to be disappointed with themselves even though the process is incredibly subjective.

Kundi said she would hate it if other girls took away significant discouragement from the experience, particularly if it were one of their first times putting themselves out there, speaking to a crowd of hundreds of people, only to be met with failure.

According to Wiemeyer, the first couple days at the camp were very confusing for her and many other girls.

"It's a lot of information. They're condensing six years of politics and elections in just a couple of days," Wiemeyer said. "Making those explanations more clear or providing definite rules and their descriptions would help."

Advice

Aba said she strongly encourages any girl who's on the fence to sign up for ALAHGS. She said she didn't know if any of her cur-



rent friends would attend, but she still signed up and made some of the most important connections of her life.

Kundi said she encourages girls not to treat it like a competition, with you against someone else, but just treat it as a whole group experience where all of you guys are doing this together.

Wiemeyer said she believes girls need to push themselves, both socially and within elections, to make the most out of ALAHGS.

"You're living with people in these dorms and nobody knows each other, but you all grow such a strong connection," Wiemeyer said. "That only happens if you put yourself out there and allow yourself to talk to new people and get outside your comfort zone."

All Indiana high school students currently in their junior year are eligible to register for ALA Hoosier Girls State or ALA Hoosier Boys State. Each student is typically sponsored by a local community member, covering a significant portion of the fee. Students should consult their school teachers or administration for more information.

According to Aba, "It was one of the best experiences of my summer and probably one of the most memorable moments of my life."

Two of us normally volunteer each time, although if a reader can't make it, one of us can cover everything. Our training told us to always be ready for both readings.

I first downloaded the app and figured I'd follow what it said over anything else. When I saw I was volunteering with Alan a few weeks later, I vowed I'd get things right. So, when I saw Alan that Saturday evening, I cheerfully announced, "Okay, I'm the second reader, and you're the first – right?" He smiled and nodded.

When I first met Alan a few years ago, he kind of scared me. Whenever we would both go to sign in to show we were there to volunteer, he would scowl and we'd have the same brief conversation.

What happened next surprised me. We stood and talked for a while. I learned he was a solo churchgoer like me. Alan has also been taking care of his wife, who is mostly homebound due to health issues, for a few years. Due to her situation, she is no longer able to attend church.

"I don't really think you're the second reader," Alan would say.

The more we both volunteered together, the more I got to know Alan. I discovered he has a great sense of humor. He surprised his wife by converting to Catholicism decades ago before their wedding.

"Oh ... but that's what I'm listed as right here and on the schedule that's sent out every quarter," I would reply.

Alan also agreed to be interviewed for my new book, *Happy and Solo at Church – Light Your Fire and Worship with Joy*.

"Yes, I know ... but according to the app, I'm the second reader."

One of the things I had the hardest time with when my husband and I decided to move back to Indiana, after living in Memphis, Tenn., for about five years, was leaving our two giant magnolia trees that were in the front yard of our first home.

I had a deep attachment to those giant, beautiful, and fragrant trees. They were stunning! They brought me so much peace when I sat on the front porch of our home.

A couple of years after we moved back, my husband and I were thrilled when we came upon a tiny magnolia tree as we were plant shopping. It was the only one in sight. Without hesitation, we added it to our cart.

Everyone told us, "That tree won't grow here. It is not the right climate for it to thrive."

We planted "Memphis Maggie" and hoped for the best. Each year we said, "It is getting a little bigger and stronger!" It was hard to see, but there was a tiny bit of growth each year. Then people said, "It will never bloom."

It took several years before our beautiful tree began to grow substantially. It was adjusting to the environment. It had a few rough patches when we thought everyone was right, it would not make it.

I even remember a particularly bad storm when we watched that tree nearly bend to the ground. Surely it will break, we thought. The tree survived the storm.

Despite our doubts, we never gave up hope on that tree. When we added onto our home several years later, the contractor said we would have to remove the tree. We

told him not a chance, and we designed around it.

As I sit here today, I marvel at Memphis Maggie's size and gorgeous, heavenly smelling blooms. She made it despite

all the doubts, I think. Not only did she make it, but she is absolutely thriving. Each year, I have my husband or sons cut a few of the blooms, so I can examine them up close and smell their intoxicating smell.

When my parents first started my diagnostic search, they heard similar statements. Things like, she may not survive or she will not be able to walk long. Preparing them for the worst. They knew better, even though there was not any good explanation.

Just as we did with our tree, they planted me anyway and were optimistic for my growth. They expected me to thrive despite the negative things they heard. It was a guessing game at that point, and they knew it.

There were setbacks and years I did not "bloom" as beautifully as others, but we kept pushing forward, and my roots began to spread. They kept believing that "growth" was possible.

My muscles did not become stronger, but my spirit did.

My doctors spent a lot of time talking about all the things I could not or would not ever do. And yes, there are many of those things, such as running, that I could never do in a "typical" way.

My family and friends helped and encouraged me to focus on what I could do. I found and created new ways to do things others told me I would never do. Just as

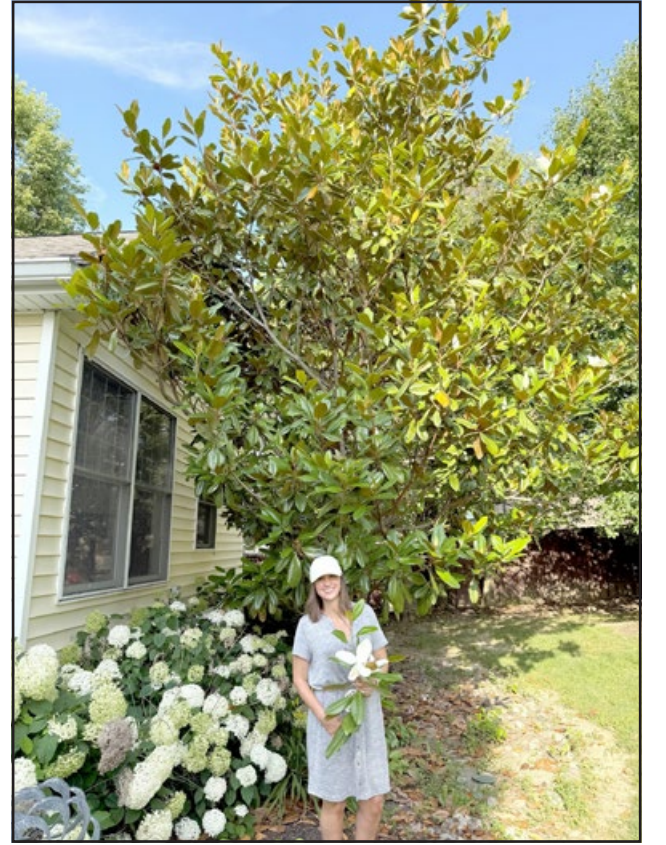

I still do today.

I am thriving outside of my expected "climate."

My life would look vastly different if my parents had not placed so much hope in me. My growth would not be the same, and I do not think I would have the same fighting spirit. All because they chose to fight for me from the beginning.

The trajectory of my life depended on decisions that were incredibly difficult for them to make. We lived with so much uncertainty because it took so long to diagnose me. We were truly pioneers of my long medical road.

With no one to depend on for a road map, we made our own.

I adjusted and bloomed right where I was, even if it was not the perfect climate. Just like our beautiful tree.

I was honored to deliver a lasagna to Alan's house a few weeks later and get to know his beautiful wife. I wished I could have stayed longer, as she's one of the best listeners I've ever met.

Now, I look forward to seeing Alan each week. He's a terrific reader, and a snappy dresser - he often wears a pink sport coat and tie and looks like something

from a *GQ* magazine cover. Alan even joked with me about arm wrestling to take back the book of gospels after mass last Saturday.

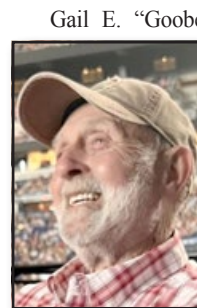

‘Older player’ Watts placed fourth at Indy Amateur

HSE & Ball State grad having more fun

INDIANAPOLIS — Here’s a message to the young golfers of today: if you keep playing, you’ll eventually become one of the elder statesmen.

It happens sooner than one would realize. Not too long ago, Johnny Watts was fresh out of Hamilton Southeastern High School. Watts would go on to play at Ball State University and spend a few years in the professional ranks.

Today, Watts lives in Fort Wayne, is married with children and has a sales job, but he still has his golf game intact. He proved that by finishing fourth at the Indiana Amateur Championship, which concluded Wednesday, July 1 at Broadmoor Country Club in Indianapolis.

“I’ve turned into the older player out here, seeing a lot of the high schoolers and college players, reminiscing on how it was back when I was in high school,” said Watts.

Even at age 30 — which is not old, of course — Watts can still keep up with the youngsters. After a first-round score of 70 on Monday, Watts vaulted into the top 10 with a seven-under par score of 65. He followed that up on Wednesday with a final-round total of 67, five under par.

For the tournament, Watts finished 14 under par with a score of 202. He made seven birdies in his final round and 17 for all three rounds. Watts also eagled hole No. 12 during the second round.

“Definitely got off to a bit of a slow start on Monday,” said Watts. “There are a lot of

birdies to be had out there, so we knew coming in the last two days that we had to go as low as we could. It was a lot of fun playing the back nine pretty well coming down the stretch.”

Watts graduated from Southeastern in 2014 and went on to play at Ball State, graduating from there in 2018. After that, he joined the PGA Tour Latinoamérica, playing on that tour from 2018 to 2020. (PGA Tour Latinoamérica merged with PGA Tour Canada in 2024 to form PGA Tour Americas.)

“It was a lot of fun, a lot of travel,” said Watts. “But it was a grind, too. It’s not as glamorous as it seems on TV. When you’re at that level, you’re sharing hotel rooms with friends and eating fast food and trying to save money wherever you can.”

After his pro days were finished, Watts reapplied for amateur status. Doing so meant a two-year wait where he could not play any tournaments, so he was happy to get back.

“It’s a lot more fun now when it’s not my livelihood and I can actually play a little looser and know that my paycheck is not dependent on how I play on the golf course,” said Watts.

Watts is a family man now. He married in 2023 and has two children, ages 2 and 6 months, and works in medical sales. Watts also finds time to play in tournaments, saying his job “allows me to play some golf here and there.”

“I’ll play in a handful of events now throughout the year, this being probably the largest of the year,” said Watts.

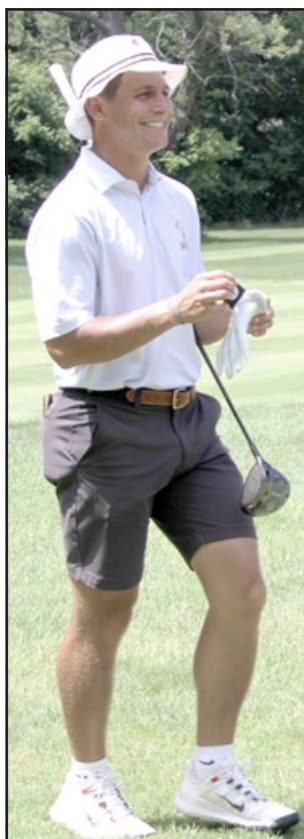

Working man Stirrsman still has game
Carmel golfer in top 10 after Indiana Amateur second round

INDIANAPOLIS — The heroes of high school golf eventually become like everyone else: working for a living.

That doesn’t mean they still can’t play. Some of them play rather well, such as Clay Stirrsman. A two-time state champion for the Carmel Greyhounds, Stirrsman took a few days to compete in the Indiana Amateur Championship, which took place last week at the Broadmoor Club in Indianapolis.

Stirrsman was tied for sixth place after the first two rounds (Monday, June 29 and Tuesday, June 30). He scored a two under par 70 for his second round, following a seven under 65 opening-round performance. Stirrsman made eight birdies in the first round three birdies in his second round.

In fact, Stirrsman briefly held the lead during the second round. He competed in the morning wave,

so a few of the afternoon wave golfers moved ahead of him throughout the day.

Stirrsman scored 73 in the third round and finished tied for 10th, scoring an eight under par 208 for the tournament. He made two birdies during the third round for an event total of 13.

Stirrsman told The Reporter on Tuesday, June 30 that he is “super grateful to be in contention and in the hunt again.” Stirrsman said he hasn’t been “playing a ton of tournament golf,” since he is in the working world now.

“I work at Collier’s Capital Markets,” said Stirrsman. “We represent institutional and private capital clients across the Midwest for their industrial disposition needs.”

Stirrsman is enjoying his job and also said he’s “grateful to them for giving me the opportunity to get out here and play this week a little bit.”

After winning two state championships with the Greyhounds, Stirrsman

played golf for four years at Wake Forest University, graduating in 2024. While he still plays “three times a week,” Stirrsman said his last official tournament was last year’s Indiana Amateur, “unless I’m missing something incredibly big,” he said.

“I played some scramble tournaments since then, but for real individual golf, I think it was State Am last year,” said Stirrsman.

And yet, Stirrsman was a viable contender for the championship. He credits his maturity and an adult’s perspective for his ability to be able to come out and play high-level golf, even after a long time away from tournament play.

“My mind has matured since I’ve been in the ‘all things golf’ realm,” said Stirrsman. “Now that I’m

full-time working, it’s pretty easy to understand that there’s bigger problems than being upset with the way you’re playing golf right now. I see different community impacts and what really happens in the real world. It’s been a little bit eye-opening and all that perspective has propelled me into a better seat now.”

But as long as he’s playing, Stirrsman will do his best to get the trophy.

“I would love to be in contention and get an Amateur one day,” said Stirrsman. “I got the junior [championship] in 2020 and I’ve been looking for a State Am or a State Open ever since, and that’s what I’ll always look towards is summer golf and trying to get one done in the summer.”

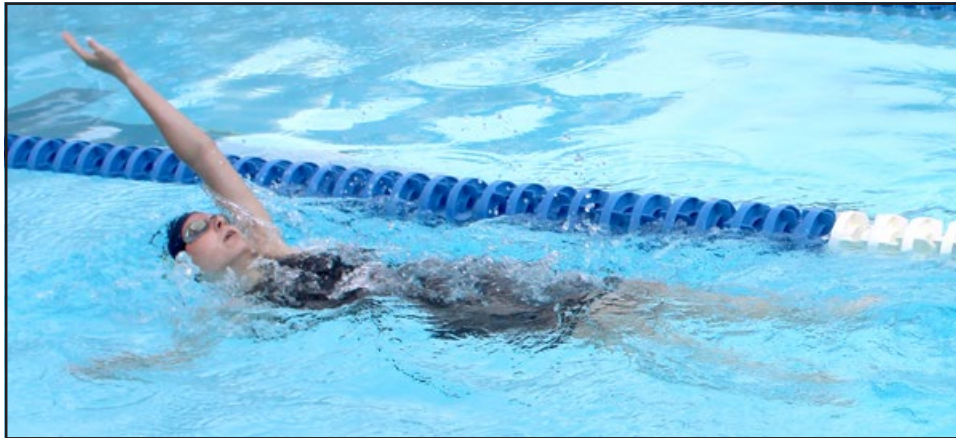
The awesome announcer, Adam Biddle, also kept swimmers going with the "hot laps," where music is played during a race.

Tyrese Haliburton 'looking forward to helping' Braden Smith adjust to the NBA

Westfield grad and former Purdue basketball superstar Braden Smith made a special appearance Saturday, June 27 at Tyrese Haliburton's annual kids basketball camp.

Hundreds of young kids in grades 1 through 8 filled the gym. They rotated through stations designed to teach the fundamentals of the game, and Smith was right there alongside them, helping out throughout the afternoon.

The newly drafted Pacer is fresh off a four-year career at Purdue, where he cemented his legacy as the NCAA's all-time assists leader. Now, as Smith prepares to suit up for his hometown team, Haliburton spoke about just how surreal this moment must feel for him.

"I keep telling him like bro, that's got to be a dream come true," Haliburton said. "To be an in-state kid, go to a state school, and then end up on the NBA team, that's so, so fire to me. That's what dreams are made of."

Smith was sent to the Pacers from the Chicago Bulls as part of a draft-day trade. Indiana traded away Kam Jones, two future second-round pick swaps, and cash considerations in order to select Smith at No. 38 overall.

Haliburton described how much he's looking forward to helping Smith get acclimated to the NBA level.

"It's really cool, obviously, we play the same position, so we'll be spending a lot of time together with position groups and stuff like that," Haliburton said. "I look forward to just helping him out as much as I can."

Haliburton also detailed what impresses him the most about Smith's game.

"By the time I was a sophomore, I felt like I had perfected the pick and roll at the collegiate level," Haliburton said. "It didn't matter who was guarding me, going right, going left, whatever pass I needed to make, I could make. I felt that same way when I watched him [Smith] play. He can really make any

read offensively. He's very talented in that regard, being a point guard and knowing how to play the right way. I think that will not be a problem for him in his NBA career. Looking forward to helping him as much as I can."

Smith competed for the first time in a Pacers uniform at the start of the NBA Summer League games, which began on July 5.

Noblesville running star Banner Barnes can call himself an All-American boy.

The incoming Millers junior competed at the New Balance Nationals Outdoor meet, which took place in June at the University of Pennsylvania's Franklin Field. Barnes had his best finish in the Championship Boys' Mile race, where he placed sixth.

The mile race took place on Saturday, June 20, with the top six runners earning All-American honors. Barnes clinched sixth place by finishing the mile in 4 minutes, 7.02 seconds. Barnes stayed in the top six

for the entire race, running the final lap of the race in 1:00.80.

The race winner was Philip Cupial of Downers Grove (Ill.) Track Club, who paced the mile in 4:01.15, just ahead of Carter Smith, who represented the Juniata Valley (Pa.) Striders. Smith's time was 4:01.72.

Barnes competed in the Championship Boys' 800 run the next day (Sunday, June 21), where he finished 17th in a time of 1:51.07.

A few other runners competed at the New Balance Nationals. Annabel Pollert, an incoming Carmel senior, finished 19th in the Championship

Girls' 2-Mile event on Friday, June 19, clocking in at 10:28.76. Pollert ran in the Championship Girls' Mile race the next day, placing 21st with a time of 4:48.91.

Another Carmel runner, incoming senior Cooper Szotek, ran in the Championship Boys' 800, placing 123rd in a time of 1:56.31.

Fishers' Garrett Rusnak competed in the Middle School Boys' Mile, where he finished 71st with a personal-best time of 4:45.32.

Jillian Tichenor, also from Fishers, raced in the Freshman Girls' 800, placing 81st in 2:22.96, a personal best.



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
