Day said he had been attending the 4-H fair ever since his early childhood. Growing up in Hamilton County, he was a 10-year 4-H member.

“The 4-H auction is a special night for a lot of kiddos and was something that was special for my brother and I growing up,” Day said.

Day said he experienced one particularly special night during his childhood when his brother won the Supreme Showmanship Contest.

“The winning side of it has been a lot of fun, but really, a lot of my closest friends are all ones that I’ve met from 4-H and showing livestock,” Day said. “Showing livestock and 4-H in general has just opened up my world.”

Day said he ended up learning to run a professional auction on a whim 12 years ago,

Arcadia secures \$3M state loan for new housing project

Development will build 264 homes in four stages

The Town of Arcadia has closed a \$3 million low-interest loan from the state for the Langdon Crossing workforce housing project. The development will include approximately 264 single-family detached homes across 86 acres in four phases.

The loan is provided through the Indiana Residential Infrastructure Fund (RIF).

“Indiana’s economy is growing, and our housing supply needs to grow with it,” Governor Mike Braun said. “These investments will save local communities money while helping them ensure Hoosier families have access to a variety of housing options.”

The RIF loan program was created in 2023 to provide financial assistance to municipalities to finance infrastructure projects that support residential housing development in communities that demonstrate the need for additional housing inventory based on local job growth.

Blind Indiana Veteran Lonnie Bedwell aims for the North Pole, attempting historic Explorer’s Grand Slam

Indiana native and blind U.S. Navy veteran Lonnie Bedwell is preparing for the adventure of a lifetime, a grueling ski expedition to the Geographic North Pole that could place both him and his home state of Indiana in the history books.

Bedwell is attempting to complete the Explorer’s Grand Slam, one of the most elite achievements in the world of exploration. The feat requires climbers to summit the highest peak on each of the seven continents, known as the Seven Summits, and reach both the

North and South Poles.

Only 73 people worldwide have ever completed the Explorer’s Grand Slam. If successful, Bedwell will become the first blind person and the first Hoosier to achieve the distinction.

The North Pole expedition is the final milestone in a decade-long journey that began with Bedwell’s quest to summit the Seven Summits. In October 2025, he reached the top of Carstensz Pyramid in Indonesia, completing that portion of the challenge and leaving the Arctic as the final frontier.

To mark the significance of

the moment, Bedwell will carry an official Indiana state flag provided by Governor Mike Braun to the top of the world, a symbolic tribute to the Hoosier community that has supported him throughout his journey.

Bedwell’s story began in the small town of Dugger, Ind., where the values of resilience, service, and determination shaped his life. After losing his sight, he refused to allow blindness to define his future. Instead, he built a reputation as one of the world’s most accomplished blind adventurers.

Arcadia’s loan is one of six announced this month, totaling more than \$25 million. Other localities across the state receiving loans include Attica in Fountain County, Austin in Scott County, Elkhart in Elkhart County, Ft. Wayne in Allen County, and Terre Haute in Vigo County.

“Through the RIF program, these communities will – in aggregate – save more than \$6.2 million in principal and interest costs, compared to open-market financing,” said Sherry Seiwert, RIF program director with the Indiana Finance Authority.

Seiwert said the IFA, which manages the RIF program, has closed more than \$87 million in loans with housing developments throughout Indiana since 2024, benefiting 20 communities across Indiana.

Bedwell became the first blind kayaker to paddle the entire Grand Canyon and was named National Geographic Adventurer of the Year in 2015. Today, he continues to push boundaries while inspiring veterans, people with disabilities, and students across the country through his speaking and advocacy. His mission is simple: prove that limitations do not determine what a person can achieve.

“Vision,” Bedwell said, “is nothing more than a dream unless you do something to turn it into reality.”

Bedwell’s pursuit of the Explorers Grand Slam has been more than a personal journey, it has become the focus of a feature-length documentary currently in production.

Common Ground Films, a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to mission-driven storytelling, is producing the film in collaboration with Blueline Pictures, an Indiana-based production company. The documentary will chronicle Bedwell’s decade-long journey and his final push to the North Pole. The film is currently in production and expected to be completed in 2027.

Lonnie Bedwell is a blind U.S. Navy veteran, award-winning adventurer, and motivational speaker. He has kayaked some of the world’s most challenging whitewater, climbed the Seven Summits, and is internationally recognized for his advocacy and leadership in the blind and veteran communities.

I shared the joy of finding Chuck Leonard in the waiting room at Don Hinds Ford, where I sold cars. You saw the pictures of our reception in the showroom, with over 300 of our family and friends, on a snowy day in February 2014.

Writing about how I was raised has always been fun. Jim and Audrey Hart married at 16 in the hills of Kentucky, moved to Indiana before they were 20, and adopted me when they were 30. I was loved and maybe a bit spoiled.

When COVID hit in March 2020, it felt as if we all entered *The Twilight Zone*. Life would never look or feel the same. Community will forever be something I treasure. I need my people.

My mother was one of the COVID casualties. I made so many visits to her window just to spend time with her. I’ll never forget my last visit with her, the night she passed. It was

sacred. I was allowed to be with her for only three hours. A month later, I received an apology for being forced to leave. Let’s just say this church lady had never been so angry and hurt. I voiced my feelings loudly that night as I was escorted out the door by those just following protocol. I’m not a fan of protocol. It was a strange time.

Sharing life with Chuck Leonard has shown me that God sure writes the best chapters, even as we enter the winter of our lives. Always let God hold your pen as He writes your story.

I do not take for granted that I have been given a voice. I love my community and my country. I believe that words reflect the condition of the heart and that actions reflect the condition of the soul. That’s what I was taught. Jesus said the second greatest commandment is to *love your neighbor as yourself* (Matthew 22:39). I will do my best to love my neighbor until I take my last breath.

I had no idea that 20 years after Jay dared me, I would have written more than 1,000 columns for four newspapers and published two books, *When the Hart Speaks* (2022) and *From the Hart* (2026). I’ve received awards from the International Christian Book Awards for both books. In 2025, the Hamilton County Reporter honored me with the Ink-Stained Wretch Award for my writing. I do not write about these awards with anything but awe, wonder, and gratitude. Dreams really do come true. Never give up on a dream.

I’ve written columns while wiping away tears. I’ve prayed as I’ve tapped the keys on my keyboard, hoping I would say the right things. I never want to judge or be critical. I want to make people think, to relate to what I write and perhaps hug their hearts.

I won’t argue about religion or politics. I’ll speak in a soft voice when I’m trying to get my point across. Anger never convinces anyone to change their mind.

Of course, after reading about my travel adventures, none of you want to travel with me.

Chuck says 20 years of columns is a lot of words. Maybe I’ve got another 20 years’ worth of words left . . . time will tell.

Thank you, readers, for reading my words. Thank you to the men who publish the Hamilton County Reporter. You allow me to share my life, especially my faith. Stu, Ray, Isaac, and Paul . . . you are brave. Newspapers are so needed, especially in today’s world.

Thank you, Jay Snider, for the dare. I’m glad I followed through with accepting it.

Carmel student pens children’s book to help them understand rare MOGAD diagnosis

Editor’s note: In April, The Reporter interviewed Carmel High School student Ayan Kalra about his diagnosis of myelin oligodendrocyte glycoprotein antibody-associated disease (MOGAD), which is a rare neurological condition where the immune system mistakenly attacks a protein called MOG. He then founded MIND (the MOGAD Initiative for Navigation and Direction) to raise awareness about MOGAD and, perhaps, help others avoid the long period of uncertainty and countless tests it took to diagnose his own condition. Inspired by his own experience, he wrote “The Gray Cloud” at age 15 to help children understand what a MOGAD diagnosis can feel like and to remind patients and families that they are not alone.

part of his vision, he knows something isn’t right. What follows is a journey through hospital rooms, eye exams, MRI scans, new medical words, and big emotions. Inspired by a true story, *The Gray Cloud* helps children and families understand MOGAD through the eyes of a young patient, showing how support, understanding, and hope can make even the darkest clouds feel a little lighter.

Tipton County Chamber of Commerce launches free AI, financial tools & credit-building program for local businesses

The Tipton County Chamber of Commerce, in partnership with Bankable, is launching a free program to help local small business owners build business credit, access capital, and put practical AI tools to work in their businesses.

The AI & Business Financial Foundations program will be held from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday, Aug. 10 and Monday, Aug. 17 at the Tipton County Foundation. Participation is limited to 30 Tipton County businesses on a first-come, first-served basis. Lunch will be provided at both sessions.

Every participant who completes the program will receive a \$500 credit-builder loan through Bankable, a \$500 grant-funded stipend to cover loan payments, a one-year Claude Pro AI subscription, a one-year

Tipton County Chamber of Commerce membership, and access to one-on-one business coaching through Bankable’s support network. Current Chamber members and new members are both eligible.

“Partnerships like this one with Bankable are exactly how we bring real, high-value programming to Tipton County businesses,” said Riley Harden, Executive Director of the Tipton County Chamber of Commerce. “We want local business owners to walk away with tools and resources they can put to work immediately, and this program delivers that in a way that removes every barrier to participation.”

The two sessions will cover business financial foundations and capital readiness, including understanding business credit, preparing for future financ-

ing, and managing business finances effectively. The second track focuses on using AI for financial decision-making, covering topics such as analyzing financial information, building budgets and cash flow projections, organizing records, and creating forecasting tools.

The program is part of a broader effort to increase financial confidence among Tipton County entrepreneurs, expand access to responsible capital, and drive adoption of practical AI tools among business owners.

Registration is open now, and Tipton County businesses can register online at [tinyurl.com/TiptonChamberAI](#). Interested business owners are encouraged to register early, as the

program is capped at 30 participants.

Zionsville Plan Commission approves new gas station despite resident protests

The Zionsville Plan Commission on Monday, July 20, approved a plan to build a Friendly Market convenience store and gas station in the town, despite widespread protest from nearby residents who are concerned about its possible environmental impacts.

The commission voted in favor of the plan 5-1.

Mann Brothers Holdings LLC years ago purchased the land in the Holliday Farms district. One of the co-owners said he hopes the gas station will be open by the end of 2026.

Prior to the vote, community members voiced their

concerns about the project, which included the possibility of increased traffic and noise, a lowering of property values, and negative environmental impacts including air pollution and gas spills.

"There [are] very serious health risks, all the benzene ... which is a Class I Carcinogen," said Holliday Farms resident Kory Geyer. "This is in a major environmental risk area. It's part of the Eagle Creek Watershed, which feeds all of central Indiana's water supply."

After the vote, some people at the meeting voiced their displeasure, and the majority immediately left the meeting.

"No one that you saw tonight will ever step foot

in the Friendly Market in Holliday Farms," said resident Patrick Leone. "There will be a boycott, and no one from Holliday Farms will go there. They won't even go there [for gas]. ... Now our kids are at risk. I have a 14-year-old daughter 150 feet from it."

One of the co-owners of Mann Brothers Holdings

LLC told News 8 that he's thankful to the commission for the support, and he's committed to building a clean site.

Noblesville receives \$12M BUILD Grant for State Road 37 Project to begin in 2031

The City of Noblesville received \$12,000,000 for the State Road 37 Improvement Project through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Grant Program.

This highly competitive grant process resulted in Noblesville being selected as one of only 127 communities in the United States awarded.

Grant funding will be used to complete the final design for reconstruction of a 1.6-mile segment of State Road 37 between Greenfield Avenue and State Road 32, convert the

corridor into a grade-separated highway, replace three signalized intersections with continuous-flow roundabout interchanges, and include an overpass bridge, bridge replacement, and additional access improvements. The upgrades made in this project will enhance pedestrian safety and improve traffic flow.

"I'm grateful that Noblesville received the BUILD grant, which will keep the State Road 37 project moving forward and improve one of our most traveled roadways. I appreciate U.S. Senator Jim Banks for advocating on behalf of this pivotal infrastructure investment,"

Mayor Chris Jensen said. "As America's Hometown continues to grow, the State Road 37 project will reduce congestion, improve safety, and make travel along this busy corridor easier. Projects of this magnitude take multiple partners working together to make the vision become a reality. I applaud INDOT, City of Fishers, Hamilton County, and the U.S. Department of Transportation for their contributions to improving safety along SR 37 in Hamilton County."

Currently, construction of the southern portion of the corridor is programmed to start in 2031. The southern section extends from

Greenfield Avenue to Town & Country Boulevard. The BUILD grant federal funds will help finalize the design of the entire corridor, so that construction of the remainder of the project can be shovel ready once construction funds become available.

"INDOT is grateful for the partnership with the City of Noblesville as the State Road 37 Improvement Project moves forward," INDOT Commissioner Lyndsay Quist said. "This BUILD grant is an important investment in the final design work that will help improve mobility and make travel safer for the people who live, work, and visit Noblesville."

To the Moon & beyond

The evening of July 20, 1969, I sat transfixed staring at the television along with other staff members of the summer camp where I was working. We were watching the unbelievable. In awe, we saw astronaut Neil Armstrong step onto the lunar surface with the words, "That's one small step for [a] man, one giant leap for mankind."

In the 57 years since, we have seen other spectacular space flights. Most recently, the Artemis II Orion spacecraft rocketed into space with a diverse crew of four astronauts. Their mission? To travel into space farther than any human being had ever traveled before. Their space voyage to the moon captured the imagination and emotional investment of innumerable people back on Earth. It was exciting and uplifting to share the adventure taking place 238,856 miles away!

USA Today writers, Amanda Lee Myers and Marc Ramirez in their article in *The Indianapolis Star* April 12, 2026, wrote that the impact in the USA was "The wonder of it all helped us forget our differences – at least for a few spins of the Earth." In this same article, an aerospace watercolor painter, Jade Boudreaux, was quoted as saying, "There is something special inside of you that you have in common with every other person watching ... It's innate. It's in your heart and it's in your soul. It's very human."

The mission pilot, Victor Glover, spoke for all the members of the crew



when he observed while in space that "We're still able to feel your love from Earth. And to all of you down there on Earth, and around the Earth, we love you from the moon." The power of love knows

no bounds!
A time capsule buried in Philadelphia on July 4, 2026, will be unearthed 250 years from now. What contents for that time capsule – what objects, what documents, what history – would we choose to represent the USA in 2026? What message would we want to communicate to those in 2276 who would be "discovering" who we were July 4, 2026? Would that message relay that we were "One nation under God?"

The Artemis II astronauts also experienced something that other astronauts sensed when looking out of their spacecraft and viewing our planet Earth – the "overview effect." *The Indianapolis Star* published an article on April 11, 2026, explaining this phenomenon further. "Space philosopher Frank White coined the phrase in 1987, and astronauts for decades have described a similar feeling: the realization that everyone back on Earth shares more in common than we realize. The phenomenon leads to the realization that borders and divisions aren't visible from space."

In England when I was a graduate student, I shared the experience with 49 other students chosen from around the world. The first week I met three women:

Sometimes, the places we remember most aren't the newest or the fanciest. They're the ones with creaky wooden floors, weathered brick walls, and stories tucked into every corner. They remind us that while history tells us where we've been, it also gives us a place to create new memories.

Earlier this month, during our Fourth of July trip to Michigan as America celebrated its 250th anniversary, my family spent an afternoon watching an air show before stopping in Battle Creek for lunch. We expected a quick meal. Instead, we found ourselves stepping into history.

Clara's on the River is housed in a beautifully restored railroad depot, where the original brick walls, hand-painted stained-glass windows, towering fireplace, and preserved railroad character transport visitors to another era.

Battle Creek's railroad heritage helped shape the city into the "Cereal Capital of the World." The rail lines brought in grain and carried Kellogg's cereal to tables across the nation. Rather than erase that past, the owners of Clara's chose to preserve it. Named after one owner's mother, Clara, the restaurant opened in 1992 while honoring the build-

ing's much older history. Every meal served there becomes another chapter in a story that began generations ago.

As I looked around the dining room, I couldn't help but think about home.

Noblesville is filled with places that do the same thing. They don't simply preserve old buildings, they preserve traditions.

Syd's Fine Foods & Spirits, located in the historic J.L. Evans Building on the courthouse square, has welcomed generations of visitors. People come for the famous burgers, but many stay for a game of shuffleboard, sharing laughs with family and friends in a space where countless memories have already been made. The walls have witnessed changing times, yet they continue to bring people together.

Just down the street, Alexander's on the Square carries on another beloved tradition. Its classic soda fountain and vintage ice cream parlor atmosphere remind visitors of a simpler time, inviting families to slow down over cones, sundaes, and milkshakes.

For my Girl Scout troop, Alexander's has become part of our own story. For the past six years, we've gathered there to celebrate the beginning of each new

scouting year. What started as a simple ice cream outing has become a tradition our girls eagerly anticipate. We've watched Brownies become Juniors, Juniors become Cadettes, and friendships deepen with every passing year. The photos may show growing girls holding colorful scoops of ice cream, but they also capture confidence, laughter, and a sense of belonging that grows stronger with each visit.

As I sat there enjoying my ice cream in Noblesville, another memory surfaced from halfway around the world. It felt familiar. Growing up in Rajkot, India, one of our family's favorite stops was Shree Satya Vijay Patel Ice Cream, founded in 1913 and recognized as one of the city's first ice cream parlors. After its founders discovered hand-churned ice cream technology in London, they brought that innovation back to Rajkot, creating a tradition that has delighted generations for more than a century. Even today, the shop retains its historic charm: the thick glass ice cream bowls, the large windows, the vintage décor, and the familiar feeling that welcomes everyone who walks through its doors. Thousands of miles away and many years later, I can still taste that rich, creamy ice cream. It reminds me that while recipes may bring us back, it is the places themselves that become part

of our family's story.
That is the beautiful thing about historic places. They aren't frozen in time like museum exhibits. They continue to evolve because people continue to gather there. Every birthday celebrated, every family dinner shared, every reunion, every first date, every Girl Scout tradition, and every familiar scoop of ice cream adds another layer to their history.

As our nation reflects on 250 years of history, perhaps the greatest way we honor the past isn't simply by reading about it. It's by walking through historic downtowns, supporting locally owned businesses that preserve these landmarks, and creating traditions of our own within their walls.

History isn't only something we inherit. It's something we help write.

The next time you step into a historic restaurant, café, or neighborhood gathering place, pause for a moment. Imagine the conversations that filled those rooms decades before yours. Then add your own laughter, your own stories, and your own memories. One day, someone else may walk through those same doors, and the history you helped create will become part of what makes that place feel timeless.

sun went down it cooled down just enough for us to not catch flames overnight.

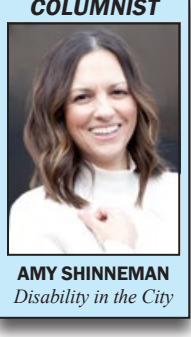

Disability in the City

In just under one month, we will begin our journey to Sydney, Australia, to run the Sydney Marathon. For those who are new to my story, this will be my sixth full marathon and fifth world major marathon. My husband has pushed me across each of these finish lines in our duo bike.

Last weekend we had a 20-mile training run. Trying to avoid the summer heat is not easy. For my husband, it is important to get out early before the sun comes up and it becomes scorching hot.

I have never been able to run, but I can gather by watching those who run that running in the summer heat looks torturous.

To beat the heat, we rise around 4 a.m. on Sunday mornings, which is our normal long training run day. I am typically an early riser, but that is a little earlier than I would like to roll out of bed on a Sunday morning.

After a long run like that his body is obviously exhausted. Anyone would guess that as we know what physical exertion does to our bodies. For me, although I did not run 20 miles, I am exhausted by a different kind of stress and muscle exhaustion.

I feel weak when I get out of the bike. My diseased muscles are always very weak, but it is on a different level. It affects me the rest of the day as I attempt to outrun the exhaustion.

For both of us, the end goal is the same, crossing the finish line of the Sydney Marathon.

Although we are running together, the way we achieve that goal is so vastly different. We are connected and running as he holds onto the bike, but each of us has a completely different experience despite being connected.

We see and hear different things while running. Our focus is on different things, yet we communicate effectively and often.

Not being able to see him is one of the hardest parts for me. When I am in the bike, I surrender all control and trust. I do not have a brake or steering of any kind.

At times, I get extremely anxious and filled with adrenaline in the duo bike. If I can tell he is struggling, which of course happens during a marathon or long training run, I get worried. I feel a rush of guilt for being the person in need of the ride to the finish line. My negative thoughts

can really take over in those moments.

While he is training his legs, I am busy training my mind. Training my mind to stay calm and do my part as the "coach" of our team. I go through my check-

list of questions I ask when he is struggling to keep him safe, hydrated and properly nourished. I can whip out an energy gel packet like no other and fill water bottles on the go over the side of the bike.

With this being our sixth marathon together, we have ironed out most of the kinks, but there are always surprises. It could be with him or me. That is also part of our training and preparation. Talking through scenarios.

It is ideal when our sons run with us. It gives us both a feeling of security. Unfortunately, they will not be able to join us this time around. College does not allow for such an extended period away.

We are both excited and nervous for the unknowns of this entire process, just the two of us. We have conquered many mountains for a long time. I have no doubt that we will continue to face this one with confidence and a vision of success.

So far, the Humbly Courageous Corporation has raised \$5,000 to go towards buying a duo bike for another duo who wants to run their race together. We want others to have the same experiences we do. Our generous donors help to make this possible.

It is not lost on us how incredibly unique the experiences we have conquered across the world in this bike have been.

My disability has opened our eyes to possibilities we never would have seen without it. This truth forces the narrative of gratitude for the things it brings to our lives, rather than the sorrow of the things it destroys.

There is much more to come in the weeks ahead on the road to Sydney. I look forward to writing about our trek there, during and back. Stay tuned!

Ruckelshaus proposes state 'Water Czar' to safeguard Indiana's water future

Water is one of Indiana's most precious resources. We need to nurture and protect our state's water system, not just for today, but for generations to come. Having grown up on the Eagle Creek Reservoir, I have a deep, personal connection to our local waters. I know firsthand how vital these resources are to our communities, our wildlife, and our way of life.

The current water issue at Eagle Creek, however, is not unique around the state. It is a symptom of a much larger, systemic problem that demands immediate and decisive action.

The controversy surrounding the Boone County LEAP Innovation District project has exposed significant gaps in Indiana's water-rights laws. Currently, our state lacks a formal framework for assessing large-scale water withdrawals. This regulatory void leaves state leaders to manage our most critical

resource through a patchwork of quasi-governmental agencies, such as the Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC) and the Indiana Finance Authority (IFA), and other agencies. This approach is unsustainable and inefficient. We cannot continue to view water merely as a tool for near-term, opportunistic economic development.

Citizens, industry, and agriculture all need water. Therefore, it is in everyone's best interest to have one point person who can constantly monitor our state's reservoirs, lakes, rivers, streams, and underground sources of water. We need a centralized regulatory authority – a Water Czar – to oversee and protect our water resources comprehensively.

The Office of the Water Czar would be appointed by the Governor and subject to confirmation by the Legislative Council,

ensuring bipartisan oversight from leadership in both chambers. Operating under the umbrella of the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) and funded through the state's general fund, this office would serve as the ultimate guardian of Indiana's water.

This role would encompass several critical responsibilities. First and foremost, the Water Czar would oversee a stringent permitting process for any entity seeking to withdraw massive amounts of water – such as more than 10 million gallons per day – to be transported across watersheds.

Furthermore, the office would focus on long-term strategic planning, balancing the needs of high-tech manufacturing with the essential requirements of manufacturing, farming, and pharmaceuticals across all 92 counties. The Water Czar would also manage concerns regarding wastewater and environmental impact, ensuring that any water reintroduced into our

systems meets Clean Water Act standards and does not degrade local ecosystems.

Crucially, this office would mandate public engagement. It would provide a much-needed forum for public input – something critics rightly claim the IEDC currently lacks – by hosting public hearings and ensuring genuine collaboration between state and local governments. This office will be a direct contact point for citizens to log complaints, seek clarification, and ensure that all rules and laws are being enforced.

Where agreements are made between stakeholders and water systems, this office will ensure that promises made will be promises kept. We cannot afford to gamble with our water. It is time for Indiana to establish a Water Czar to protect our citizens, our environment, and our future.

Westfield awarded \$121,500 Homeland Security grant for new Emergency Operations Center

The City of Westfield has been awarded \$121,500 through the Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS) State Homeland Security Program for the Federal Fiscal Year 2025.

The grant will support technology upgrades for the city's new Emergency Operations Center (EOC), which is being developed as part of the new Westfield Police Department headquarters.

The project will provide updated communication tools, digital displays,

secure access technology, and other equipment that will help Westfield Police, Westfield Fire, Emergency Management, the city's Informatics Department, and regional partners share information and coordinate more effectively during emergencies.

"This investment will help ensure our public safety teams have reliable technology and timely information when every second matters," Mayor Scott Willis said. "As Westfield continues to grow and host major events, we must also continue strengthening our

ability to prepare for and respond to emergencies. We appreciate the Indiana Department of Homeland Security's support of this important project."

The EOC will serve as a central location for coordinating responses to severe weather, public safety incidents, cyber threats, large-scale events, and other emergencies. The grant-funded improvements will make it easier for multiple agencies to work together, view the same information, and make informed decisions in real time.

The project will also

strengthen the city's technology systems by improving reliability, protecting sensitive information, and reducing the risk of interruptions during an emergency. City assessments, training exercises, and reviews of previous events identified the need for more secure and connected communication tools.

The State Homeland Security Program provides federal funding to help state and local agencies prepare for, protect against and respond to terrorism, natural disasters and other major emergencies.

Ian Taylor heading to Toronto Blue Jays

Guerin Catholic star signs undrafted free agent contract

After Ian Taylor signed a contract with the Toronto Blue Jays, he called Dave Schrage, the Guerin Catholic baseball coach.

“Coach, what a year I had,” said Taylor.

It would be hard for anyone to top Taylor’s year. He graduated from Guerin Catholic, helped the Golden Eagles win their first ever state championship, then put his name on an

undrafted free agent contract with the Blue Jays last week.

“Ian has wanted to pursue this and it was one of his goals,” said Schrage. “He worked extremely hard on his strength and conditioning to try to hit more home runs. That came to fruition for him. It’s great to see when you have a really great kid.”

Taylor threw his hat in the ring for the Major League Baseball Draft, which took place July 11 and 12.

Schrage said there were “two or three teams that had reached out to me and also to his family just to see.”

Taylor was not drafted, “and when that didn’t happen, I know they were pretty disappointed,” said Schrage.

But it wasn’t the end. Toronto was one of the teams that showed an interest in Taylor, then contacted him to see if he wanted to sign an undrafted free agent contract. And he did.

“He got a really good deal,” said Schrage.

Taylor, 18, had committed to play baseball at George Mason University last August, but will now forego college to pursue his dream.

“I’m sure he’ll be at their spring training facility, to finish out the rest of the summer and then they’ll place him somewhere next year in the organization. It’ll be a great chance for him to grow and develop as a player.”

“We’re extremely proud of Ian Taylor’s growth and ability as a part of the baseball program,” said Guerin Catholic athletic director Ryan Davis. “He’s been an outstanding member of our program and wish him the

very best moving forward. The Blue Jays are getting a great kid with high character and high ability.”

Taylor helped the Golden Eagles to a 28-3-1 record and the Class 3A state title. For the season, Taylor led Guerin Catholic with nine home runs and 44 runs scored, and was second on the team with 35 base hits, 36 RBIs and a .412 average.

Maddox, VanKirk get multiple match wins at Fargo

Hamilton County had a sizable presence at the 2026 U.S. Marine Corps Junior Nationals wrestling tournament, which took place July 10 to 19 in Fargo, N.D.

Two Westfield wrestlers were part of the Junior Boys Freestyle competition.

First up was Connor Maddox, who put together a solid performance at the tournament, reaching the Round of 16 at 113 pounds. Maddox won his first three matches by technical fall before dropping a 7-4 decision to Hawaii’s Analu Woode.

Cohen Davis competed at 165 pounds. He beat Utah’s Karl Ledbetter by fall in the Round of 256. Davis lost to Pennsylvania’s Owen Campbell by tech fall in the next round.

Meanwhile, five local wrestlers competed in the 16U Boys Freestyle division. The best result came from Hamilton Southeastern’s A.W. VanKirk, who went 5-2 for the tournament in that division.

VanKirk defeated Rhode Island’s William Morosetti by tech fall in the Round of 64, then beat New York’s Kasen Hardy in the Round

of 32 with a 7-1 decision. Illinois’ Anthony Samanich ended VanKirk’s run with a pin in the Round of 16.

VanKirk moved to the consolation bracket, where he won three more matches. He beat Michigan’s Treyton Werth by tech fall, Indiana’s Vanbawi Lian by a 6-1 decision and Mississippi’s Kage Stewart by a 3-1 decision to reach the consolation semifinals. That was a rematch with Morosetti, and the Rhode Island wrestler won by tech fall.

Noblesville’s Henry Antrobus dropped his first-round match in the 106-pound championship bracket but came back to pick up a victory in the consolation bracket. Antrobus defeated Michigan’s Austin Jacobs by pin in the sub-round of 64, then lost to Mississippi’s Tavor Cole by tech fall in the next round.

Westfield’s Brayden Head competed at 120 pounds. He lost his first match in the championship bracket before taking two matches in the consolation bracket. Head edged out California’s Joshua Garcia by a 7-6 decision in the sub-round of 64, then pinned Oklahoma’s Cordeus Wahl

in the round of 64. Head fell by decision to Texas’ Jaxon Kraemer in the sub-round of 32.

Noblesville 132-pounder Brody Weimer won two championship-bracket bouts to reach the round of 32. Weimer pinned South Dakota’s Jackson Dargatz for his first victory, then got a tech fall over Oregon’s Shae Morrison to reach the last 32. Weimer dropped his R32 match to Pennsylvania’s Jack Cole by tech fall.

Westfield’s Trevor Humburg picked up a pair of consolation-bracket wins at 138 pounds. After losing by tech fall in the championship bracket, Humburg defeated Florida’s Javaris Ross and Mississippi’s Drake Hegarty by pins to reach the sub-round of 32. New Jersey’s Kurt Pellegrino edged out Humburg in that match by a 6-5 decision.

Greco-Roman results

Once the freestyle competition was done, wrestlers switched to the Greco-Roman tournament.

In the 16U division, VanKirk shined again, placing fifth overall. He won two matches in the championship bracket to reach the quarterfinals, where he

fell to Minnesota’s Sawyer Schendel by a 4-0 decision.

VanKirk won two matches in the consolations bracket, lost in the sub-semis, but rebounded to beat North Dakota’s Garrett Cowan in the fifth-place bout by a 10-3 decision.

Meanwhile, Antrobus won a match in the 106-pound Greco championship bracket, defeating Wisconsin’s Gavin Lamers by tech fall. Antrobus dropped his next match by tech fall.

Humburg won two consolation matches in the 144-pound competition. He beat Mississippi’s Santiago Diaz Suarez by tech fall and New York’s Caleb Brown to reach the consolation Round of 32.

Head won a consolation match at 120, with a tech fall over Wyoming’s Talon Walker.

Weimer also picked up a consolation-match victory at 132, pinning Washington’s Nathan Nguyen.

Davis competed in the Junior Greco at 165 pounds, as did Noblesville’s Cale Metzler at 215 pounds. Both wrestlers dropped both their first championship and consolation match.

Notice is hereby given that on July 21, 2026, the Town Council of Sheridan, Indiana adopted the following Ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 72 (PARKING SCHEDULES) OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF SHERIDAN, INDIANA

WHEREAS, the Town Council (the Council) of the Town of Sheridan Indiana (the "Town") is authorized by Indiana law to regulate the stopping, standing, and parking of vehicles on streets and other public rights-of-way in its jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the Town previously adopted a parking schedule (the "Parking Schedule") which is incorporated into the Town's Code of Ordinances (the "Code") under Chapter 72 to identify locations where parking restrictions apply; and

WHEREAS, the Council has reviewed the Parking Schedule and determined that it is necessary to amend the parking schedule to address changing traffic patterns, public safety concerns, roadway improvements, and the efficient use of public streets; and

WHEREAS, the Council now finds that amending the Town's Parking Schedule as provided in this Ordinance is in the best interest of the Town and its residents.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED, BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SHERIDAN, INDIANA AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The following Sections, or portions thereof, of Chapter 72 of the Code are hereby amended by the deletion language that is stricken-through, and by the addition of language that is bolded, to read as follows:

SCHEDULE I. NO PARKING ZONES.

(A) In addition to those areas where parking is prohibited by statute, as described by IC 9-21-16-5, when signs are erected it also shall be unlawful to park any vehicle in the areas or portions of the town streets as set forth in this schedule:

“These kiddos push each other a lot,” said Skripsky. “They want to compete but they want to be the best teammates that they can be, too. A lot of that hype is actually cheering on their teammates, cheering on siblings or whatnot. A lot of growth has gone into that.”



The campers will all get a tangible way to measure their growth during the camp.

“By Friday, each player will have an individualized player evaluation,” said Skripsky. The coaches have been making notes about the growth they have been seeing each day.

In addition, the staff will

be giving out player shout-outs – if one camper sees that another camper is doing something well, then they tell a coach to give their fellow player a shoutout.

“Definitely peer positive, but also they will be receiving skill development feedback from each coach,” said Skripsky.
