

“Meating” The Need sets new record in donors & donations

102 local donors contribute over \$42,000 to fight local hunger

Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank (HCH) has sponsored its 11th year of “Meating” The Need, a partnership between 4-H Beef, Dairy, and Swine projects and the Food Bank.

HCH is a non-profit organization that supports local food pantries and meal programs year-round in Hamilton County. This year HCH purchased seven beef and 12 swine at the Hamilton County 4-H Livestock Auction on Tuesday, July 21. An amazing 102 local donors helped fund this year’s Meating the Need project with over \$42,000 in donations, *both new records.*

The 4,937 pounds of meat supplied 25 Hamilton County food pantries with farm fresh beef and pork raised by local 4-H members. Meat Distribution Days were in August. St. Christopher’s Episcopal Church Men’s Group, Carmel, and Food Bank volunteers helped with distribution.

The 19 4-H members who designated their animals for sale to the Food Bank helped to feed families and children in our own community with the equivalent of 19,748 meals of good, healthy protein. Donations to this program went towards the appraised market purchase price of the 4-H animals, processing, and to the 4-H members as they pursue their 4-H, education, and life goals. 10

Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference hosts tomorrow’s leaders

Leadership takes shape in many different forms and evolves over time. A group of young people from across the region recently had the chance to sharpen their skills right here in Hamilton County.

The 30th annual Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference (MIC) Student Leadership Workshop was held on Aug. 24 at the Carmel Learning Center. Students and teachers from eight schools, including 10 from Carmel High School (CHS), took part in the day-long leadership event.

The MIC schools hold prestige in their respective communities, with all schools boasting more than 300 championship wins in various both athletic and non-sports competitions during the last 30 years, securing consecutive accolades in areas of swimming, football, and basketball.

Founded in 1996, the MIC originally involved academic bowls, arts competitions, and shows. Going back to their roots, leaders made an effort to bring the focus of the conference back to more than just student athletes.

The Reporter spoke with

CHS Principal Tim Phares, CHS senior Sophie Collier, and North Central High School junior Sophie Dodson.

With CHS re-entering the conference this year, Phares said he was excited to be back together and host student leaders from a diverse range of talents.

According to Phares, CHS invited student leaders from all grade levels.

“We have students here today representing the communications department, performing arts, athletics, and students excelling in certain academic departments,” Phares said.

Phares told The Reporter CHS holds a long-standing tradition of hosting leadership conferences at the beginning of the year.

“I felt that was important because it kicks off the year in a way where students would be able to take action immediately within their schools,” Phares said.

Youth leadership development speaker Ted Wiese featured as prominent leader of the conference.

According to Phares, Wiese inspired students to think about leadership differently with his “true gift of connecting with kids and being dynamic.”

Tailored Society Co-Founder Wade Forman is one of only 15 master bespoke clothiers in the country. Forman is also a Certified Custom Clothier through the Custom Tailors & Designers Association.

“When we first established our business, we were focusing on menswear, specifically taking care of the dress wardrobe, if you will, for a gentleman,” Forman told The Reporter. “Fast forward to today, we become more of a bespoke lifestyle company for men and women.”

Tailored Society, 23 E. Main St., Carmel, is a bespoke clothing workshop producing work at a level Hoosiers would normally travel to New York or London’s Savile Row for: a \$187,000 Himalayan crocodile bomber jacket, \$120,000 exotic-skin travel

Big questions take center stage in Footlite Musicals’ Pippin

Can you blunder into a good life just by following your heart? If you aren’t sure, then you should watch a young Frankish prince on his journey to find the meaning of life in the sensational coming-of-age musical, *Pippin*.

Footlite Musicals will stage *Pippin*’s daring expedition at Hedback Theatre, 1847 N. Alabama St., Indianapolis, on Thursdays through Sundays from Sept. 18 to Oct. 4. Footlite Director Claire Slaven spoke to The Reporter about Footlite’s unique interpretation of the classic musical.

While the latest revivals of *Pippin* focused heavily on circus tricks and acrobatics, Slaven said she decided not to

go that route.

“I think it’s really cool when it’s done that way, but in my opinion, the music and the story are really beautiful, and so I wanted to focus more on that,” Slaven said. “We decided to pay homage to the big top circus by having an abandoned circus feel. It still has elements of a circus, but it’s a little bit darker, a little bit simpler. I think it elevates the music and the story a lot more, which is something that people tend to miss when they’re so focused on the tricks and the sparkle of the show.”

With more room to expand on the emotion and character development in the show, audience members will see themselves in *Pippin*. Regardless of age

bags, and \$85,000 vicuña sport coats lined with Hermès scarves. Some of these exotic pieces are among the only ones of their kind being made in North America. Clients choose wedding attire and full wardrobes over a cocktail, surrounded by 18th-century French country antiques.

You can enjoy that experience even without paying those prices.

While the high-end portion of the business is what makes it stand out on the international level, the bulk of his work is about providing bespoke clothing options in a price range that can fit Midwestern professionals' budgets.

To become a bespoke clothier, Forman had to go through an extensive training process that involved far more than just taking the right measurements for a more commonly available custom garment.

A bespoke garment is fitted to you and you alone.

"The big focus with bespoke versus a custom garment is identifying the body structure," Forman said. "How are their shoulders sloping? How is their back rounded or do they have erect posture? Is one hip higher than the other? Is one arm lower than the other? Identifying those kinds of imperfections, if you will, for lack of a better term, within a person and saying, 'Okay, what are we going to do when we are drafting that client's own pattern? How are we going to improve

their overall silhouette to make them look as good as possible?'"

The training process for this kind of craftsmanship takes approximately a year and involves several courses on individual pieces of clothing, pattern drafting, styling, measuring, history and fabrics.

All of this is to say the Tailored Society experience is second-to-none.

"It's going to take about four to six months for the first garment that we create for a client because we've got to get your pattern down and do the multiple fittings," Forman said. "Once we've got your pattern down, repeat orders take about 10 to 12 weeks roughly for a garment."

Before the first appointment is booked, Forman makes sure his business model is a good fit for the client.

"We'll go through our process and our timeline, and then the last piece is the investment range," Forman said. "Our suits start at \$2,550. Our sport coats start at \$2,250. Trousers at \$775 and shirting starts at \$375. That's the bulk of what we do. And so we'll lay that out there and say, 'This is our investment range.' This is what the average client is spending with us in each one of those categories or on a wardrobe."

That is Tailored Society's entry level, and Forman himself wears his company's entry-level suits.

"We also do other things,

too, and so it's up to the client to decide what their budget is," Forman said. "But lay that out there. And then if they think that makes sense for them and they're ready to move forward with a garment or a purchase, that's when we go ahead and schedule our in-person appointment."

Tailored Society's studio runs by appointment only.

"The client comes in and the door is locked," Forman said. "If they'd like a bourbon, a cocktail, or a wine, then they can have a drink. We'll get to know each other again and dive deeper into their lifestyle. Who are they in front of? What's their previous clothing history? Just understanding as much as we can about that person. And then we'll start taking a look at fabrics and go through the process and pick out whatever garment we're doing."

Everything starts with a phone call.

"Whether you're referred to us or find us online, usually it's a 15, 20 minute conversation," Forman said. "What do you do? Who are you in front of? What's your lifestyle? What do I think would make sense for them from a fabric perspective and understanding who they are, and what they do. Then it's about what they feel their need is. I try to understand what they are looking for and who they are."

Forman told The Reporter he is proud of the fact that he gets to work with peo-

ple right here in Hamilton County, as well as clients from across the globe.

"The scope of what we do is huge," Forman said. "We can work with the gentleman right out of school all the way up to any amount of wealth. Yes, it's cool and fun to talk about all the really costly and special projects we do, but at the end of the day, we still love working with our local guys that come in and just need a couple pieces. We can work with everyone. It doesn't just have to be someone at a certain level."

Forman's story is a hometown one: a world-class experience, growing a national and international clientele, but with plenty of options for the local men and women or reasonable income, operating right here in own county.

the screen, grabs your comfort-and-joy bucket, tips it over, and the tears will fall.

If you don't want to cry, then don't listen to Dolly singing with Brad Paisley.

"Yeah, when I get where I'm going, and I see my Maker's face, I'll stand forever in the light of His amazing grace. Yeah, when I get where I'm going, there'll be only happy tears."

Sorry, Dolly, there are a lot of us crying with sad tears down here. You may have had a few nips and tucks, but your heart was the real deal.

Dolly was part of so many of our lives. Her music helped tell our story.

Thousands of children sit down with their parents and read books that Dolly sends them every month at no charge. Her heart was bigger than her ... bank account.

Some of my favorite quotes from Dolly are:

"Find out who you are. And do it on purpose."

"Never use religion to judge others, because if you love God, you must know that He loves all of us without exception."

"When someone shows you their true colors, believe them."

And of course, "I was the first woman to burn my bra – it took the fire department four days to put it out." I loved her sense of humor.

Dolly will be remembered for her immense talent, but most of all for her character and kindness. Money can't buy those things.

In a world full of not-so-nice people, be a Dolly.

Dolly wrote a final song she does not want released until January 19, 2046.

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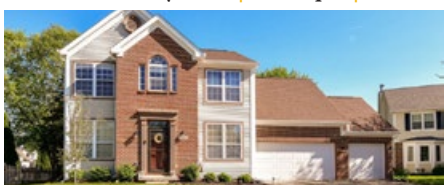

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IU Health’s Mobile Lung Unit coming to Noblesville

The IU Health Mobile Lung Unit is traveling across Indiana, offering low-dose CT scans to individuals at high risk for lung cancer.

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States, claiming more lives each year than breast, prostate, and colon cancers combined. Yet, what many people don’t realize is that lung cancer is often preventable, and highly treatable, when detected early. Unfortunately, most cases are diagnosed at an advanced stage when treatment options are limited and survival rates are low.

IU Health’s mission is to promote early detection, which can significantly improve treatment outcomes and save lives. This initiative is not only about providing access to care; it’s about giving Hoosiers a fighting chance.

Details

Low-Dose CT Lung Screenings for eligible individuals ages 50 to 77 who are current or former smokers of 20 years. (For-

mer smokers who have quit in the past 15 years may also be eligible.)

The screening is covered by most insurance plans, including Medicare and Medicaid. IU Health will cover the cost for those without insurance.

Commissioners extend local disaster declaration

Travel ban along White River lifted, but caution is encouraged

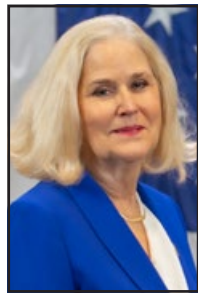

Last week, the Hamilton County Board of Commissioners has extended the county’s local disaster declaration for another seven days as flood recovery efforts continue, remaining in effect through Thursday, Sept. 3.

At the same time, Commissioners have lifted the travel warning prohibiting recreational travel on the White River, effective immediately. The ban was initially issued Aug. 18 due to dangerous conditions created by flooding, contamination, debris, and changes to the river’s flow.

Recent inspections and

testing indicate conditions have improved significantly. Water sampling by the Hamilton County Health Department found the White River has returned to pre-flood sanitation levels. The river’s course has also been corrected so it no longer flows into the Martin Marietta quarry in Carmel. The Indiana Department of Environmental Management has determined the river is navigable, while the Indiana Department of Natural Resources found no im-

President of the Hamilton County Commissioners. “We are comfortable lifting the travel ban based on the testing and inspections that have been completed, but we still need people to use good judgment on the river. Debris and other hazards may remain in some areas. At the same time, families

diate threat to the public that would prevent recreational activity.

“This is an important sign of progress, but it does not mean our recovery is over,” said Christine Altman, and neighborhoods across Hamilton County are still recovering from tremendous damage, which is why extending the disaster declaration remains necessary.”

The extended disaster declaration allows Hamilton County Emergency Management and other county departments to continue coordinating response and recovery efforts, requesting assistance, and pursuing potential reimbursement from state and federal agencies.

The declaration notes that flooding impacts remain throughout the county, including significant infrastructure damage.

Forested wetlands helped reduce flooding along White River

Thousands of trees planted slowed water’s flow along the river during flooding

The Central Indiana Land Trust, Inc. (CILTI) has spent two decades saving forested wetlands and planting thousands of trees in three areas along the White River in Hamilton County that aid in slowing down and reducing flooding along the river.

While the historic flood of 2026 has been devastating to so many people and areas, the flooding could have been much worse along the White River had it not been for conservation efforts to save and restore the forested wetlands. The trees are located in a floodplain that acts as a natural bathtub, filling up with water during flooding events. In areas with forested wetlands, the water is slowed down because it has to navigate between millions of trees and shrubs that resist the water’s flow and reduce the amount of flooding in the area.

“Flooding will still happen in these areas, because they are floodplains and nature designed them to flood,” CILTI President Cliff Chapman. “But by purchasing these lands and saving and planting trees, we’ve mitigated the severity

of the floodwaters’ damage. If this land had remained as farmland or grassy areas – or if it had been developed – we’d be looking at an even worse scenario. When we say CILTI is strategic about protecting natural areas, this is exactly the kind of thing we mean.”

CILTI areas with forested wetlands along the White River in Hamilton County:

- **Burr Oak Bend Nature Preserve:** The nature preserve sits along 206th Street and the White River on the southern end of Noblesville. CILTI began purchasing the land in 2002, restoring the floodplain by planting trees to improve water quality and reduce flooding. In 2022, CILTI gifted the preserve to the Hamilton County Parks and Recreation Department. The nature preserve is home to the Riverwood Canoe Landing.

- **Nonie Werbe Krauss Nature Preserve:** The 77-acre nature preserve is located at 116th Street and Eller Road in Fishers in Hamilton County and was purchased to restore forested wetland and reduce flooding. CILTI planted 19,000 trees in 2008 and an additional 15,000 trees in early 2025 in the na-

ture preserve.

- **Stony Creek Conservation Easement:** The privately owned property is located along Allisonville Road just south of downtown Noblesville. CILTI holds a conservation easement on the property, protecting the forested wetland found there in perpetuity.

Farther south, CILTI owns and maintains Oliver’s Woods Nature Preserve, a 53-acre urban nature preserve located off River Road just south of I-465 in Marion County. The nature preserve, which is where Carmel Creek and the White River meet, holds millions of gallons of water during flood events. Over the years, CILTI staff, with the help of thousands of volunteers, spent countless hours removing invasive species that had eroded the banks of the White River on the property. Restoring the forested wetlands here helped improve soil stability and floodwater absorption. When the White River floods, floodwater

flows backwards in Carmel Creek. Had this area been developed for commercial and residential use, the flooding in this area – and downstream on the river – would have been far more significant.

To date, CILTI has planted more than 73,000 trees in these properties and continues to seek areas to restore additional forested wetlands.

(CILTI) preserves the best of Central Indiana’s natural areas, protecting plants and animals, so Hoosiers can experience the wonder of the state’s natural heritage. Westfield police: suspects accused of battering teen girl at Casey Acres Apartments on the run

Two suspects were on the run Friday morning, Aug. 28, after Westfield police say they attacked a 16-year-old girl at an apartment complex and fled the scene.

The information comes as an update to a large police investigation at the Casey Acres Apartments off of West 176th Street and Ditch Road early Friday.

According to the West-

field Police Department, dispatchers received a 911 call around 3:41 a.m. reporting that a 16-year-old girl was hurt in a disturbance with a firearm.

Officers and other first responders arrived and found the teen had been “battered with a blunt object,” leaving her with “significant” head and facial injuries.

As the investigation continued, police learned the suspects’ identities: Markeyzus Dean, who was wanted out of Marion

County on gun charges; and Tyanna Bonds, who officers believed may have a firearm.

Investigators set up a perimeter around the complex, warning residents and community members to stay indoors and avoid the area.

No one was inside the apartment when emergency services searched the area, though police did find an open window with a torn window screen. Officers say they believe Dean and Bonds fled the

area on foot before the area was blocked off.

The shelter-in-place order was lifted within an hour; Westfield PD says this was an isolated incident, and there is no active threat to the community.

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Devastating flood destroys years of sets, props & costumes at The Point Theater

The Point Theater is facing a heartbreaking recovery after more than four feet of floodwater filled its Noblesville warehouse and remained there for days, destroying much of a collection which was built over more than a decade.

For nine years, the warehouse has been the behind-the-scenes home of The Point Theater, housing thousands of costumes and accessories along with the props, furniture and set pieces that bring its productions to life.

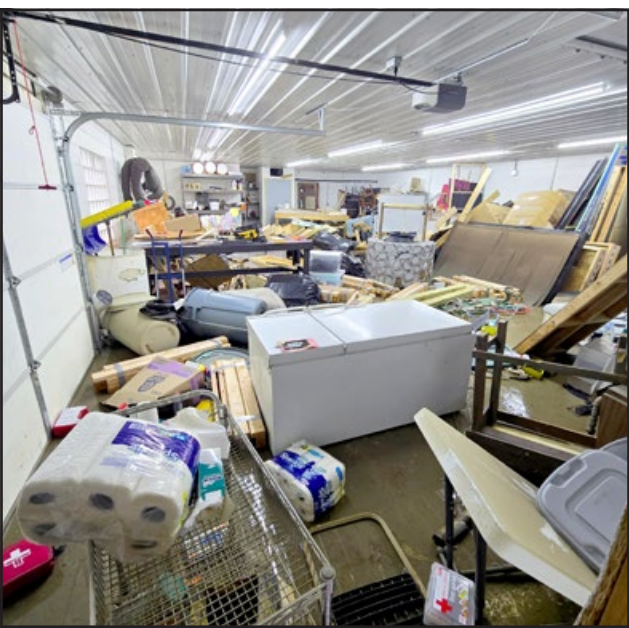
Among the losses were Cinderella’s carriage, Lord Farquaad’s throne from *Shrek the Musical*, the lockers from *Footloose* and countless pieces carefully built, collected, donated, and saved through the years. They represent thousands of volunteer hours and memories from decades of young performers.

“This warehouse holds so much more than stuff,” said Laura Baltz, Founder and Artistic Director of The Point Theater. “Every costume has been worn by a child who stepped onto a stage and discovered they could do something they didn’t know they could do. Every set piece has a story. Seeing so much of it destroyed was absolutely devastating.”

But almost immediately, The Point Theater’s community did what it does best: it showed up.

Parents rescued and washed more than 60 bags of costumes. Longtime supporter Classic Cleaners is dry cleaning costumes requiring special care at no cost, and Red Dawn Construction and Renovation will donate a complete industrial cleaning of the warehouse. MFR Properties, who owns the building, is working quickly to replace all the drywall, flooring, and the HVAC system so the theater can move back in as quickly as possible. Anderson University Theater has generously donated its space to build sets for The Point’s upcoming fall shows, *Radium Girls* and *The Lion King, Jr.*, and theaters as far away as Michigan have offered to loan costumes, set pieces, and props until The Point is back on its feet.

The Point Theater serves thousands of young people between the ages of 4 and 18 through productions, classes, workshops, and camps, creating a place where students can build confidence, friendships, and a sense of belonging. No student is turned away because of financial need, making the cost of rebuilding especially difficult for the nonprofit.



“We would much rather spend our resources putting kids onstage than replacing things we already owned,” said Kim Drake, the theater’s Managing Director. “Unfortunately, right now we have to do both.”

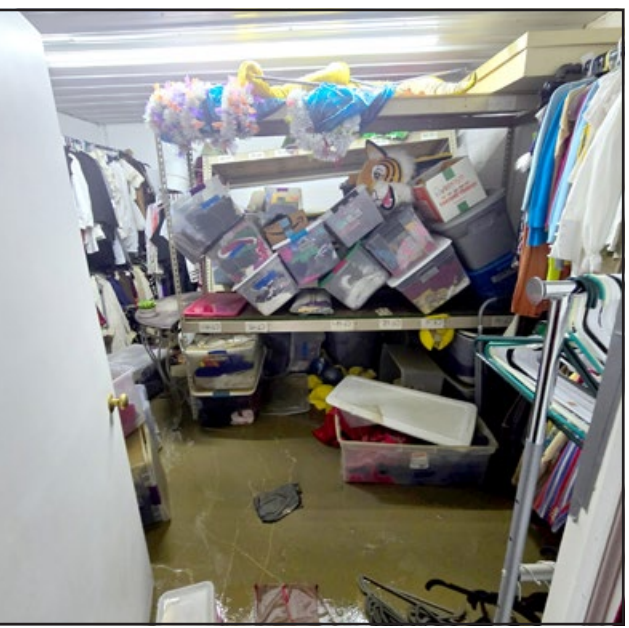

A flood may have taken a warehouse full of memories, but it did not take the community that built them. With that community’s help, The Point Theater is ready to build again.

Carmel updates on recovery progress after historic flood

As recovery efforts continue after the severe flooding that impacted Carmel and Hamilton County earlier this month, city crews, county partners, and local organizations continue work to repair infrastructure, reopen parks, and support residents.

Below is an update on where things stand.

Federal disaster declaration & relief funding

President Trump’s approval of a major disaster declaration secures direct federal funding for Carmel and Hamilton County. These federal dollars will directly aid municipal repair projects, offset cleanup costs, and open pathways for direct assistance for affected residents and local small businesses.

“This major disaster declaration and federal relief funding bring much-needed financial support and hope to our community as we navigate the road to recovery,” Mayor Sue Finkam said. “We extend our sincere thanks to President Trump, Governor Braun, and our federal delegation for standing with Carmel. Our focus remains entirely on getting our res-

idents the help they need and restoring our city.”

Infrastructure & quarry operational plan

City officials are collaborating closely with state and federal agencies alongside Martin Marietta to develop a safe plan to remove the water from the flooded quarry, stabilizing ground conditions so operations can safely reopen.

The Hazel Dell Parkway bridge remains closed following its collapse. Hamilton County is expediting replacement plans and evaluating options to repair or realign Blue Woods Creek. The city is assisting county engineers on both fronts.

Carmel Utilities status

The damaged 30-inch raw water main and 12-inch finished water main remain out of service. Preliminary tests show the city’s three impacted wells are in good working order, and teams are designing a temporary bypass for the 30-inch main to bring these wells back online soon. Plans are also underway for a new line to supply finished water to the wastewater treatment plant and assessment of the integrity of the force mains is ongoing to determine next repair steps.

Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation updates

• **White River Greenway:** Fully open.

• **River Heritage Park:** Cleanup is on track to reopen the park by or before this weekend.

• **Flowing Well Park:** Trails, restrooms and parking are open. The namesake well remains closed while crews perform a chlorinated flush after total coliform was detected; the well will reopen once two consecutive daily water tests come back clean.

• **Founders Park:** Open, except for the south pond, paved trail, which is closed for installation of a new floating boardwalk (expected completion by late October).

• **Hazel Landing Park:** Closed indefinitely due to severe creek damage. City, park, and county officials met this week with engineering and Ball State University archaeology and geology teams to plan long-term park restoration alongside creek repairs.

• **Historic Moffitt House:** Water remediation continues in the crawlspace; the house sustained no structural damage

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Sheridan Community Schools receives lunch debt relief through ‘Propane for Purpose’

Sheridan Community Schools (SCS) was one of 34 school corporations to receive funding through Keystone Cooperative’s Propane for Purpose program.

The program’s aim is to help eliminate lunch debt for students across rural communities. Keystone Cooperative hoped to raise \$150,000, but surpassed the goal by raising \$177,450. SCS was nominated and then evaluated based on enrollment, free and reduced lunch participation, and existing school meal debt.

The initiative, which launched during the 2025-26 school year, turns everyday propane into support. For every delivery stop, Keystone was able to contribute 50 cents, and then

HSE Schools celebrates transformation of expanded Fishers Elementary School

One of Hamilton South-eastern (HSE) Schools’ oldest buildings has been transformed for a new generation of students.

HSE administrators joined staff, members of the school board and community members on Thursday, Aug. 20, to cut the ribbon on the renovated and expanded Fishers Elementary School, marking a major

milestone in the three-year construction project.

Located at 11442 Lantern Road, the site has a long history of serving local students. The property once housed the original Fishers High School before becoming an elementary school in 1958. Additional sections were built in 1989 and minor renovations in 2003.

The transformed Fishers Elementary now offers more than 107,000 square feet of

learning space, nearly doubling the size of the previous building. The number of classrooms increased from 28 to 36. Approximately 23 percent of the original structure remains and received extensive updates as part of the project.

“When you walk through this building, you can see how thoughtfully it was designed around students,” Superintendent Dr. Matt Kegley said. “It

provides our teachers with flexible learning spaces, strengthens safety and gives Fishers Elementary room to serve families for years to come. We are grateful to everyone who helped bring this project to life.”

The building incorporates concepts used in the design of Deer Creek Elementary while incorporating enhancements for the Fishers Elementary community. Improvements include a more secure main entrance, an expanded parking lot and a dedicated bus area to improve traffic flow and student safety.

Wurster Construction managed the construction of the facility, which was designed by CSO Architects. The project had an approved budget of \$45 million and was financed through the sale of bonds. The additional space will increase the school’s capacity as enrollment patterns shift across the district.

Construction took place in phases, allowing students and staff to continue learning and working at the school throughout the project.

“This project honors the history of Fishers Elementary while giving our students and staff a school designed for how they learn and work today,” Principal Dr. Emily Supergan said. “Our school community showed tremendous flexibility throughout construction, and it is rewarding to see everyone enjoying these new spaces.”

Students returned to the transformed building Aug. 5 for the start of the 2026-27 school year. They were also welcomed by Supergan, who is beginning her first year as principal of Fishers Elementary.

Big Tech gets put on notice by AG Todd Rokita & others

Meta to pay up to \$419M to Indiana & implement sweeping child-safety reforms

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita and his team actively participated in a multi-state lawsuit that will deliver a guaranteed \$296 million – and up to \$419.4 million – to Indiana as part of a landmark \$17.1 billion settlement with Meta Platforms, Inc.

The settlement resolves allegations that the company knowingly designed and deployed harmful features on its social media platforms intended to addict children and teens, as well as claims by 47 states and four territories.

On Wednesday, Aug. 27, AG Rokita submitted the settlement agreement in Indiana’s joint lawsuit against Meta in the Northern District of California. Subject to the Court’s approval, a consent judgment will be entered, delivering this historic result.

“This settlement is a milestone victory for Hoosier families,” AG Rokita said. “For years, Meta prioritized engagement and profits over the mental health and well-being of our children. Today, we are securing both meaningful accountability and concrete changes that will help protect the next generation. Parents will finally have stronger tools, including opting their

teens out of algorithm-driven scrolling designed to keep them hooked.”

This marks one of the largest state consumer protection settlements in history outside the Big Tobacco settlements of the 1990s. In addition to the payment, Meta must implement a sweeping set of safety features designed to protect children on Instagram and Facebook.

Beginning in 2021, nearly every attorney general in the country cooperated to investigate the social media industry for designing and promoting platforms to children and teens despite known harms. After a bipartisan nationwide investigation found that Meta designed Instagram’s features to addict children – while internally documenting the resulting mental health harms and failing to warn parents – attorneys general across the country sued the company. At that time, Meta falsely assured the public that these features were safe and suitable for young users.

The agreement requires Meta to implement robust, ongoing changes to Facebook and Instagram to protect teens in states that join the settlement.

These are groundbreaking changes, more significant and comprehensive than any court has previ-

Key provisions of the settlement

- Hard cap daily time limits and “Productive Pauses” for children: For its two platforms, Instagram and Facebook, a combined two-hour daily time limit with mandatory pauses after 15 minutes of continuous use and again at 60 and 90 minutes to interrupt endless scrolling. These limits remain in effect for five years. If Snapchat, TikTok, and YouTube adopt comparable terms, the daily limit on each platform will drop to 60 minutes for 10 years;
- “Nighttime blocks” restricting children’s access from midnight to 6 a.m.;
- Limited school-time access for children, eliminating push notifications on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. during the school year;
- Robust age assurance measures to more effectively verify the age of young users;
- Safer, age-appropriate content controls, including stronger safeguards against bullying, content promoting eating disorders, and content related to suicide and self-harm;
- Stronger, more user-friendly parental controls;
- Limits on social comparison features, including beauty filters and visible “like” counts, that have been linked to poor mental health outcomes in kids and teens; and
- Both the implementation and efficacy of the features will be regularly assessed by an independent auditor and the settling states.

ously ordered. They are designed to reduce compulsive use, mitigate risks of anxiety, depression, disordered eating, sleep disruption, and other documented harms, and give parents greater ability to supervise their children’s online activity.

AG Rokita said the settlement equips Indiana to confront the documented harms these platforms inflicted on children and young adults, giving the state resources to support affected Hoosier families while continuing to partner with other states on lasting protections.

“This is not just about money – it’s about changing how these platforms operate so they stop exploiting the developing brains of our kids,” AG Rokita said. “Indiana will continue

working with other states to secure similar protections from companies like Discord, Roblox, Snapchat, TikTok, and YouTube. Our children deserve better, and we will keep fighting until they get it.”

AG Rokita is particularly thankful for the work of his Consumer Protection Division on this case, specifically Chief Counsel and Director of Consumer Protection Scott Barnhart; Section Chief of Consumer Litigation Corinne Gilchrist; and Deputy Attorney General Mark Snodgrass.

The settlement also resolves the states’ claims against Meta for its sharing of nonpublic information about Facebook users with third parties, like Cambridge Analytica, leading up to the 2016 election.

Fishers Jr. High student charged with possession of imitation firearm

On Tuesday, Aug. 25, the Fishers Police Department’s School Resource Unit was made aware of a situation at Fishers Junior High (FJH) involving a 13-year-old male student.

FJH staff were made aware that the student might be in possession of an imitation firearm. As of 2026, it is illegal to possess an imitation firearm on school property or on a school bus.

After being alerted to the situation, the SRO at Fishers

Junior High and the administrative staff began an investigation and located an imitation firearm in the student’s backpack. The item was collected as evidence, and the student was placed under arrest. The student is charged with Possession of an Imitation Firearm on School Property or on a School Bus, a Class B Misdemeanor.

Any disciplinary action will be addressed by FJH.

All criminal defendants are presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

Fishers prepares for return of Geist Race Series

The City of Fishers is preparing to host its largest community race, the Geist Race Series, on Saturday, Sept. 12. This year’s event will feature a new race distance, expanded course entertainment, and a new vendor lineup for the post-race party.

The 18th annual waterfront race around Geist Reservoir is an iconic community tradition, attracting both locals and runners from around the country. Last year’s event drew 2,500 participants from 26 states, and race organizers anticipate an even larger crowd this year. Heinzmann farm honored with Hoosier Homestead Award

Area legislators are recognizing the latest local recipients of the Hoosier Homestead Award, which honors farms owned and maintained by the same family for 100 years or more.

Represented by State Sen. Scott Baldwin (R-Noblesville) and House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers), the Heinzmann farm in Hamilton County was presented with the Centennial Award at the Indiana State Fair.

The Hoosier Homestead Award Program honors families who have made significant contributions to Indiana agriculture. Instituted in 1976, the program has recognized more than 6,400 family farms that have impacted Indiana’s economic, cultural and social advancement.

“For the last 100 years, the Heinzmann farm has worked tirelessly to provide for our community and state,” Baldwin said. “This impressive milestone is a testament to the Heinzmann family’s dedication to Indiana’s agricultural legacy, and I congratulate them on this well-deserved award.”

To be named a Hoosier Homestead, farms must be owned by the same family for at least 100 consecutive years and consist of more than 20 acres or produce more than \$1,000 of agricultural products per year. The award distinctions are centennial, sesquicentennial, and bicentennial – for 100, 150 and 200 years, respectively.

“Hamilton County is home to many farm families and agricultural busi-

nesses, and farms like the Heinzmann’s have been critical in building and sustaining that legacy,” Huston said. “Congratulations to the Heinzmann farm on 100 years of hard work and determination required to achieve this milestone and thank you for your longstanding commitment to our community.”

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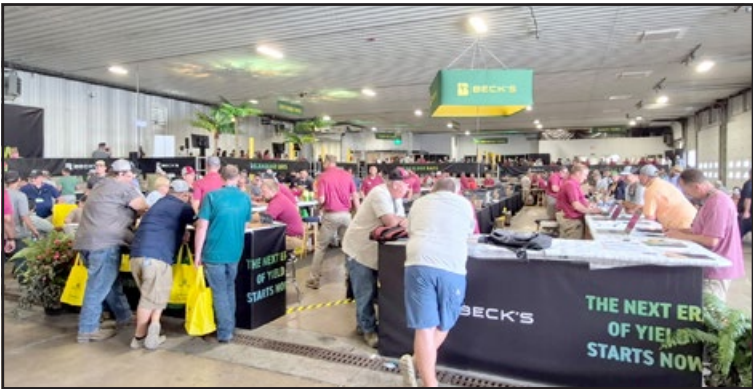

A Love of Leadership

"I've been a dean at three different universities, and it is always the people I miss most when I leave each place." Tom spent his career transforming institutions, but it was his passion for people that many will remember most: noticing them, crediting them, and celebrating them.

Tom graduated from Davison High School in 1960, and then earned a bachelor's degree in industrial engineering from General Motors Institute and a master's degree and Ph.D. from Purdue University. Tom served as Associate Professor of the State University of New York at Buffalo (1970-1983), Dean at Southern Illinois University (1983-1992), Dean and Distinguished Professor of the University of Connecticut School of Business (1992-2002) where he helped elevate the school from regional prominence toward national recognition, including leading the construction of the \$27 million School of Business building; and, Dean and Distinguished Professor of the College of Business and Innovation at the University of Toledo where he retired from academic life in 2016 as Dean and Professor Emeritus.

Even with advanced-stage Alzheimer's Disease, his leadership instinct never left him. During his time in memory care, Tom gathered staff and residents together, certain he ran the place, and asked everyone to join him in a round of applause for the caregivers. It was fundamentally Tom: his memory faded, but his belief in empowering the people around him never did.

A Love of Learning

Always the academic, Tom carried his love of learning to his personal life. He was an avid reader who could always be found with a book in his hand, at home, at the mall, or even quietly reading in the middle of a party. Tom and Judy also shared a love of travel, exploring Europe, China, India, Korea, Egypt, and a South African safari. Tom's love of adventure spilled over into family trips as well where he would stop at questionable roadside diners, press on for hours without a restroom break, and get lost repeatedly so the girls got to see many things twice. It was Tom's lifelong appetite for the world around him that turned into unforgettable adventures for the whole family.

A Love for Family

Throughout all of Tom's professional accomplishments, his wife Judy was always by his side.

A dedicated professional, Tom still found the time to support his daughters' athletic endeavors, including early morning rides to swim practice, supporting from the stands and mission trips. He relished the small things, with regular visits to Mary Lou's, his go-to-diner in Carbondale. More than anything, he taught his girls the value of hard work and resilience, lessons that stuck long after the lecture was over.

That same warmth spilled into smaller moments too. He once came home from the pet store with three kittens, not wanting to leave the smallest kitten behind. Around the holidays, he would trade his business suit for a red one, surprising family, friends, and even children in the local hospital as Santa Claus.

Tom used to say, "a dean was only as good as the people who supported him." By that measure, his greatest achievement wasn't his PhD or a first of its kind learning center ... it was Jude, at his side for 61 years, the family they built together, and the many lives he touched.

He will be deeply missed, forever remembered, and always loved. A memorial service took place Saturday, August 29, 2026, at Geist Christian Church, 8550 Mud Creek Road, Indianapolis.

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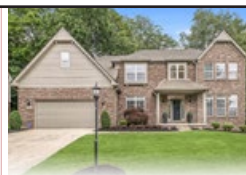


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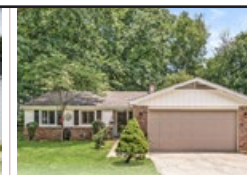


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Martha Carolyn Greene

Traveling with patience

Traveling is an exciting thing to do but requires a lot of patience. Whether traveling by car or plane, there can be delays and travel woes to deal with. Having a lot of patience is helpful.

Traveling with a disability requires a lot of preparation and keeping a calm demeanor, often dealing with airline staff, especially.

There are many things to line up to help ensure that things go smoothly and to minimize damage to equipment that is vital to my wellbeing and independence. The goal is always to get my wheelchair back at the end of a flight, undamaged.

I have seen countless stories of those who arrive at their destination only to get their chair back damaged and useless. It is like taking someone’s legs away. From there begins the long and painful process of filing a claim to fight to get it repaired, often waiting weeks or months to get their customized wheelchair back.

Open communication and educating the staff on my wheelchair is the best strategy, but once it is out of my sight, I cannot control what happens to it. We always remove as many parts as we can and take them on the airplane with us.

When arriving in a new city, when we do not have a rental car, we educate ourselves ahead of time on how to get an accessible

Slow your roll

I was thrilled a few weeks ago to spend an entire Sunday afternoon typing away for my next book. Long blocks of uninterrupted writing time are precious – and rare – for most writers.

By Monday morning, however, my wrists were killing me. Thankfully they felt better by Wednesday. I realized – once again – I had been going too fast.

Longtime readers are probably sensing a theme to my column this year, as this is the third time I’ve addressed the topic about how we need to slow down in life. But the typing incident made me think.

Society tends to reward us for going fast. I remember the days of typing classes back in high school. The faster we typed (with accuracy, of course) the better our grade. I remember receiving an A+ in my summer typing class with an average of 120 words per minute.

Fast forward – pun intended – to my early 40s. I noticed increasing pain and tingling in my left wrist and arm, which worsened after spending a day at work typing. I tried to follow all the ergonomic guidelines, but eventually I had to have carpal tunnel surgery. Thankfully it erased my pain entirely.

Did I slow down my typing? Nope. But as my recent story indicates, I probably should start, especially since I make my living as a writer. My goal is cutting my speed in half, which is still a good 60 words per minute. My new motto is “slow your roll.”

I thought about where this phrase came from. Casual online research revealed “slow your roll” is a metaphor for “apply the brakes.” The saying may have originated from truck drivers who know their vehicles carry a lot of momentum. The drivers often realize when they are going too fast in situations and when they need to apply the brakes.

My friend Denise and I were discussing our fast-paced society last week, and she commented the trend probably began during the Industrial Revolution. While I didn’t spend hours researching this theory, I saw articles and websites on the topic with words like “rapid, speed, rush” jumping out at me. It makes sense.

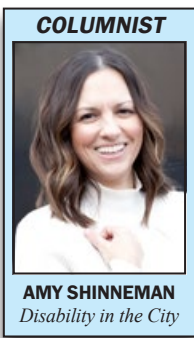
I’m not the only one fighting to change this “go, go, go” pace of life. Recent social media videos have shown women making the conscious decision to stop rushing through their daily tasks. I applaud them and want to be just like them when I grow up.

As I’ve mentioned before, we’re more productive when we focus on one thing at a time and we allow ourselves to take breaks. Science even backs this up.

I’m starting with the baby step of slowing down my typing. I also deliberately changed to a different Sunday afternoon activity recently by baking a peach pie – and giving myself all the time in the world to complete it. The pie turned out to be one of my best, and I enjoyed each mindful step of the process.

Readers, I challenge you to start to “slow your roll” this weekend, even if it’s in only one area of your life. I guarantee you’ll be happier.

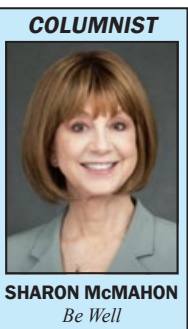

Your most basic habits have everything to do with well-being

“We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, therefore, is not an act but a habit.” – Aristotle

To excel is a lofty goal; one that may seem daunting for many of us. I can’t say that I excel in many, or maybe any, areas of study, lifestyle, or attributes. Does that mean to say I should not strive in any of these or other areas? (Rhetorical question!) Of course not! No matter what age, circumstance, or lifestyle you possess, we can all focus on habits which can, and will, make a difference in our quality of life; habits which are beneficial to our very independence.

I was thinking recently of habits I have tried to focus on as I reached middle age and then – beyond! These habits are not ones that we were specifically taught growing up or that we learned at any level of our educational achievements. Rather, these are more practical functions of our daily lives which make a difference in our overall physical and mental health.

And, interestingly, these specific essential everyday habits are ones that we first learned as babies and toddlers when we first began to stand and walk. Realizing that our habits have been with us for a very long time in many cases, you may be skeptical about changing for the better, but believe me it is not only possible but essential to your well-being.

Let’s take a look. *(Readers: please note that these suggestions are general in nature and not intended for those who have disabilities or illness which preclude them from using these movements as noted.)*

To Sit

How often do you rise from a seated position without using your hands or arms to help push yourself up? We are hardly conscious of using our arms or hands to assist with a movement done many times each day for most of us. It is imperative that we work to stay as strong as possible as we age.

The optimal method of standing from a seated position is to stand without using your arms at all. First, plant your feet. Use your thighs, hips, and abdomen to power yourself up and down and you will find that you have improved stability and strength. In practicing this in my FlexAbility class, we extend our arms out front of our body so that we are not tempted to use them to assist our standing from the seated position.

To Stand

Your feet should always position below your hips. From that position the majority of your weight should be in the heels of your feet, with the remaining in the toe box or ball of the foot. This positioning will help you maintain your balance, a critical issue in keeping you upright as falls can be a debilitating issue. Using this proper stance, your body will allow you to keep your shoulders above your hips and pelvic area and using this method can offer you relief if you suffer from back pain.

To Walk

As I have mentioned in previous columns, most of us walk incorrectly, placing the balls of

the feet down first as we step forward. This can through off the alignment of the body as the torso is pitched forward. Again, this can be an issue in keeping your balance. Place your heels down first, followed by the ball of your foot as you step forward. Keep your shoulders pulled back and swing your arms forward, making sure that the swinging arm is opposite the leg in front as you move.

To Breathe

I have written several times about the importance of breathing properly and will continue to remind my readers about replacing quick, shallow breathing with deeper belly breaths. This, like anything we wish to change, requires practice!

Sit, stand, walk, and breathe with intention and you will find your body responds in appreciation.

White River flooding sparks many feelings

Well, Mother Nature got bitchy on us on Saturday the 15th as the incessant rain that has been inundating the state of Indiana resulted in a hundred-year swelling of the White River, which passes a quarter mile or so from our house.

My wife Donna and I have lived together in our home for the past 30 years; she has lived there more than 60. Only once, on New Year’s Day in 1991, had the river swelled to make a wet visit into the house on Ralston Avenue in Ravenswood. Five inches of depth ruined furnishings, walls, rugs, flooring, and emotions.

It’s very strange to have a river intrude into your home. It doesn’t care a dot about any puny preparations you might have made – putting furniture up a foot or so, taking bottom drawers out of their positions so that the water won’t soak clothing, or foods, or cherished keepsakes. It just bursts in as it pleases – leaving behind its wetness, stink, and heartbreak.

Although we couldn’t see the actual damage to our prop-

erty until Monday, we were sent images that showed the awful effects of the flood on our neighbor Ron’s home. It was so upsetting, my wife and I both broke into tears, knowing our place was no better.

And when we finally saw the after-effects at our address, we cried again. Nothing prepares you for a shock like that. The water line marks on the walls showed the depth had been well over two feet, nearly three in places where a surge must have happened. Mud was everywhere. Our huge refrigerator lay on its face, across the room from where it had stood. Our mattresses had been in dirty river water, as had our dresser drawers, kitchen shelves, couches, chairs, and televisions. It was very nearly a complete loss.

But next – there was nothing to do but start the arduous task of reforming your lost comforts.

First, where to stay? Many displaced people are staying with family. We had offers, but our close family lives on the west side of Indy. We needed to stay closer, and were very lucky

as Donna’s son Tony rushed his RV to our driveway and set us up with A/C, Wi-Fi, bed, TV, and a small kitchen.

We began the work of sorting through what was ruined and what might be saved – taking the spoilage to the curb. After that task, we hired workers to come in and take out furniture and remove wet portions of wall board. (Our RV son is also a contractor, so more luck there.)

As of writing this column, we are now on Day 5 of our recovery, and some lasting impressions have emerged.

First and foremost – when stuff like this happens, people are great, giving and generous. The cost of all this is a nightmare. There are government programs to take advantage of, but ready cash has come to us from family, friends and even strangers. It isn’t just sympathy with words that we are getting – all manner of help is available at a local church, where you can walk in and take anything they have – fans, food, cleaning supplies, personal care items, buckets, bags, paper products. As items go out, new stuff is wheeled in – an overwhelming supply of need-fillers.

Secondly: This is a terrible

event in our lives. I have NEVER had a tragedy of this nature happen to me. It truly is overwhelming and I have felt every bit of being angry, lost, confused, hapless, and cursed.

Third: The truest feeling I have – the one that occurs again and again, and brings to me an overwhelming sense that being an American, being a Hoosier, is a special gift – is the kindness, the heartfelt generosity, and the seemingly endless caring we have been offered and have gratefully accepted. Strangers have given money, gift cards, and help. Family have gifted us collections of funds, transferred money into our account, and promised help with purchases. Frankly, the love we feel is more overwhelming than the tragedy in many ways.

The people who have had this happen to them really are hurting. If you have any feeling of compassion for a flood stricken loved one, seek them out and offer your help. It will mean so much to them.

If you have no such connection, you might try to find a way to make a difference through churches and charities. This really is a widespread, crushingly painful event for many.

Cuts to public health funding have direct consequences

The Cyclosporiasis outbreak is more than just another foodborne illness. It’s a stark reminder that our public health system is only as effective as the investment and expertise supporting it.

Cyclospora is a microscopic parasite that taints fresh produce irrigated or washed with water contaminated with human feces. It’s “sticky” and unlike most pathogens, it cannot be easily washed away and is resistant to agents used to disinfect produce. Infection causes explosive watery diarrhea, abdominal cramping, nausea, weight loss, and dehydration. Symptoms may persist for weeks or months if untreated, and only one antibiotic is effective.

Identifying a Cyclospora outbreak source is especially challenging because symptoms often begin weeks after exposure. By then, the source may not be apparent, unlike most cases of food poisoning. Identifying the origin requires laboratory testing, epidemiologic surveillance, and coordination among local, state, and federal health agencies to prevent fur-

ther spread.

The outbreak quickly blossomed. Initially, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration linked the cases to Taylor Farms-supplied shredded iceberg lettuce served at Taco Bell in five Midwestern states (including Indiana).

Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy, Jr., prematurely announced that the source had been identified and the outbreak was “under control.” Shortly after that announcement, the outbreak expanded to nine states, and the test on produce identifying Taylor Farms as the source was determined to be a false positive. As of Aug. 11, there are 6,358 confirmed illnesses reported in 15 states specifically linked to Taylor Farms lettuce. Nationwide, however, there are about 22,000 confirmed or suspected cases, 517 hospitalizations, and two deaths in 47 states. No positive tests link any source to the outbreak. The unusually high number of Cyclospora infections may represent multiple outbreaks involving different growers, suppliers, pro-

duce types, and contamination events.

The outbreak exposes a weakened foodborne disease protection infrastructure under Kennedy. This includes severe reductions in federal health agency staffing and a scaled-back FoodNet foodborne disease surveillance network. These cutbacks impair the rapid and efficient identification of outbreaks, outbreak investigations, food inspections, tracing of contaminated foods through supply chains, and expeditious communication with health departments and the public. Last year, the CDC also reduced state health department funding by almost \$6 billion and suspended required FoodNet monitoring of Cyclospora due to lack of funding. The CDC’s parasitic diseases program declined from 11 specialists to just three.

Former CDC Director Tom Frieden warned that reducing surveillance capability leaves the nation less able to detect outbreaks before they become widespread. Former CDC Principal Deputy Director Anne Schuchat cautioned that experienced epidemiologists, laboratory scientists, and outbreak investigators cannot be easily replaced. Former CDC official Dan Jernigan advised that

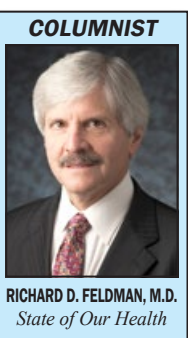
diminishing federal capacity weakens coordination with state and local health departments during outbreaks.

Kennedy’s tenure has also been marked by broader organizational chaos. The dismissal of scientific advisory committee members, scientific censorship, leadership turnover, and changing vaccine and other health policies based on personal and political agendas have compromised institutional stability, evidence-based decision-making, and scientific independence and expertise – all essential for national public health preparedness.

The lessons from the Cyclospora outbreak are clear. When public health systems function well, we are a healthier and safer nation. The outbreak should serve as a warning that the cost of neglecting public health is measured in greater preventable disease, lost public trust, and lives lost.

We are paying the price as yet a new Salmonella outbreak emerges. Poor decisions are coming home to roost.

The best thing to arm ourselves with is knowledge and an understanding of how things work. Also helpful is having a plan B.

We thought we had gotten our duo bike’s journey to Australia all figured out. We made the decision to ship it two weeks before we were set to arrive. For months, my husband had been talking with the company who made our bike, as they have experience shipping the bikes internationally.

They sell a special box

to package the duo bike in, and work with a shipping carrier that guarantees shipment arrival on the date we chose.

My husband spent a couple of hours taking the bike apart and packaging it for pick up the next day. Everything was ready to go, except that we did not yet have the shipping label. The 14-hour time difference made communication difficult.

In the end, we decided to forgo the shipping of the duo bike and take it with us on the airplane because we did not get the shipping label in enough time ahead. This option is not ideal, as

we are going just the two of us this time. This creates a lot of extra stress and physical exhaustion for my husband. Not helpful before running a marathon.

We pivoted and contacted our hotel who is working with us to get a van to pick us up once we arrive in Australia. A normal cab or Uber cannot fit our large bike, my wheelchair, plus us and our luggage.

Going with the flow is not easy for me. Everything in me wants things nice and neatly planned out. However, that is not reality when traveling, and especially such a long distance from home.

The end goal is for us and our bike to safely make it to Australia, so however that needs to happen is what we will have to do. Focusing on everything that can go right, and looking for the silver linings will be key.
