Taco Bell Foundation makes \$25,000 donation to BGCN

The funding will support the Club's Teen Center programs that are helping youth in Noblesville and Hamilton County access essential resources to achieve their goals by focusing on character & leadership development.

"This grant allows us to reach more teens with the tools and guidance they need to build a successful future," BGCN Executive Director Becky Terry said. "We're grateful to the Taco Bell Foundation and K-MAC Enterprises for believing in our mission and investing in the potential of our youth."

2026 is Taco Bell Foundation's biggest Community Grants year yet: a record \$32 million supporting 700 nonprofits nationwide, representing a 40 percent increase in nonprofit

Who would've thought your most vibrant Friday night could be spent trying to get out of a prison cell, and paying for the privilege? Prison Island welcomes Indy to the newest entertainment craze.

The Reporter spoke with Yan Rigoulet, Head of Operations for Prison Island, and Paula Olaya, Public Relations and Communications Senior Manager for Prison Island's partner company, Fever.

According to Rigoulet, the original Prison Island concept was created 12 years ago in Sweden. The company grew into a franchise in Europe, and now opened their first U.S. location in Indianapolis, 6020 E. 82nd St.

Olaya said Indianapolis was the perfect place to bring Prison Island considering the unique environment the city brought as a sports, convention, and entertainment hub.

"For us it was an obvious choice," Olaya said. "We want to serve the families that live

here as a growing city that has more people moving in from different states and the growing tourism base coming to Indy."

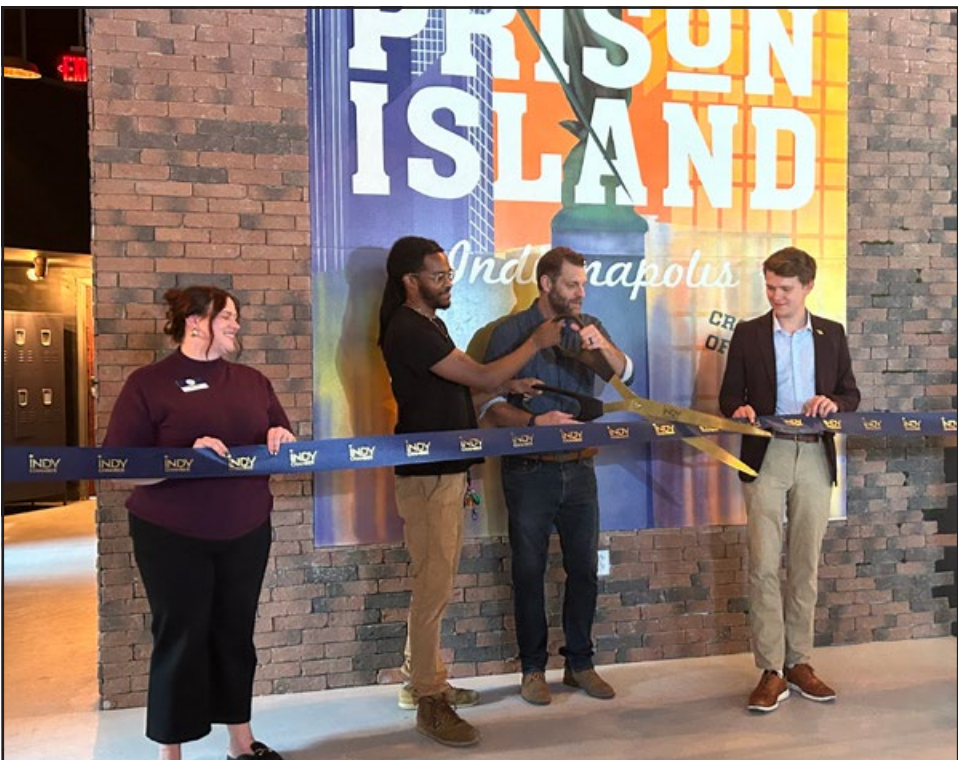

Prison Island features 47 rooms, each with its own unique challenges. Perform well in a room, earn more points, and compete on a leaderboard. Participants are welcomed to navigate however many rooms as they would like.

Rooms test an array of different skills, including your wits, strength, and agility. For example, one room challenges participants to match a sound with a pin-point on a map, while another tests your group’s ability to shoot hoops.

Rigoulet told The Reporter it’s hard to “grasp the concept until you walk through those doors.” He encourages community members of all ages to visit, and if they expect to be surprised, Rigoulet said, “[Prison Island] will certainly deliver.”

The Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra (ISO) and Indianapolis Ballet are expanding their artistic partnership for the 2026-27 season, bringing the full power of live orchestral music and professional ballet to Clowes Memorial Hall for three major productions.

The expanded collaboration marks the fourth consecutive season the organizations have joined forces and, for the first time, will bring the ISO to the pit for three Indianapolis Ballet productions in a single season. The partnership offers Central Indiana audiences the opportunity to experience some of ballet's most beloved and groundbreaking scores performed live by Indiana's largest professional orchestra alongside

Indianapolis Ballet's professional dancers.

The 2026-27 collaborative season will feature:

Cinderella Nov. 6 to 8, 2026

Sergei Prokofiev's lush and dramatic score accompanies the timeless story of Cinderella in this production choreographed by Cincinnati Ballet Artistic Director Emerita Victoria Morgan. Andrew Grams leads the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra.

The Nutcracker Dec. 17 to 22, 2026

Comfort and relief from pain is given to us through other aspects of God's creation, including through other humans. Unfortunately, we cannot be human without some kind of suffering, but we are promised relief, something much, much better! Read on.

“10 In his kindness God called you to share in his eternal glory by means of Christ Jesus. So after you have suffered a little while, he will restore, support, and strengthen you, and he will place you on a firm foundation.”

Do not relinquish your faith in a mighty God. Do not doubt (at least for long) that He will deliver on his promises to care for you and to love you.

Psalm 34:18, *“The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and will rescue those whose spirits are crushed.”*

This particular passage has been etched in my heart since I became a widow. I know for a fact. He will rescue you!

Our God is a God of love; a God of healing, redemption, and restoration, not a God of punishment. We suffer more by turning away from him and thinking these untruths. Remember the new covenant through Jesus Christ! He didn't walk this earth to condemn us, but to save us (even from ourselves).

And finally, some great advice from other verses in 1 Peter 5:6-7, 11-

“6 So humble yourselves under the mighty power of God, and at the right time he will lift you up in honor. 7 Give all your worries and cares to God, for he cares about you.”

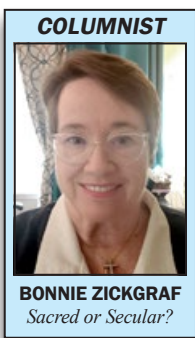
What then of our suffering?

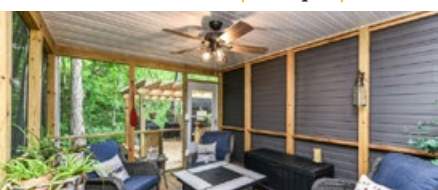

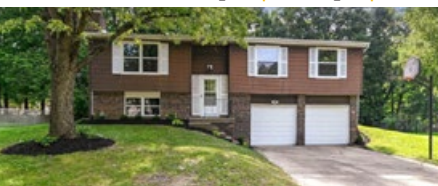

Local governments set to receive gas tax reimbursements for July

Indiana counties, cities, and towns will once again receive gas tax reimbursements after the State Board of Finance unanimously approved on Tuesday, Sept. 15, the reimbursements, continuing to deliver on Governor Mike Braun's promise to provide Hoosiers historic relief at the pump without taking funding away from local communities.

"Indiana has enjoyed the lowest gas prices in the country all summer while continuing to make local communities whole, protecting local roads and infrastructure," Gov. Braun said. "I want to thank the Board of Finance for their partnership in once again helping us keep that promise."

The State Board of Finance unanimously approved \$138,903,493.28 in reimbursements for the period of July 1 through July 31, following its unanimous approval last month of reimbursements for April and May. The Indiana State Comptroller's Office will

distribute \$46,192,429.96 to counties, cities, and towns over the next week.

"The Comptroller's Office is committed to restoring funds to our local government partners and is prioritizing this distribution so critical operations can continue at the local level," Comptroller Elise Nieshalla said.

"Indiana's continued extension of the Gas Tax holiday is a reminder of what good fiscal stewardship and sound economic policies can allow us to do," State Treasurer Daniel Elliott said. "I commend Governor Braun for continuing his leadership on this issue and ensuring that Hoosiers have affordable fuel prices."

"The Board takes seriously its role in supervising the fiscal affairs of the state and remains steadfast in its commitment to responsible fiscal stewardship," State Budget Director Chad Ranney said. "Continuing the exercise of transferring funds to make the local whole during the gas tax holiday is a top priority for the State Board of Finance."

Young introduces bill to boost housing mobility vouchers, give families increased access to affordable housing

On Wednesday, Sept. 16, U.S. Senators Todd Young (R-Ind.) and Chris Van Hollen (D-Md.) reintroduced the Family Stability and Opportunity Vouchers Act, legislation to create 250,000 housing mobility vouchers for the nation's most vulnerable families with young children.

The bill couples rental assistance vouchers, which allow families to choose eligible privately owned housing units and pay rent equal to 30 percent of their income, with evidence-based mobility support services, such as housing counselors and landlord coordination, to help families find affordable housing in high-opportunity areas.

"Every child deserves the opportunity to grow up in a safe, stable home and reach their full potential," said Senator Young. "Research has shown that children who move from high-poverty areas to neighborhoods with greater opportunity at a young age can see sig-

nificantly higher earnings later in life. Our legislation will give families facing homelessness and housing instability more choices about where they live, helping more children access strong schools, safe neighborhoods, and opportunities to succeed."

Research shows that higher opportunity areas offer children a greater chance to succeed. The bill builds on this cutting-edge policy research to help families overcome barriers to opportunity and achieve generational economic mobility. In the Fiscal Year 2019 appropriations package, Senators Young and Van Hollen secured the authorization and funding of their Housing Choice Voucher Mobility Demonstration Act. The Family Stability and Opportunity Vouchers Act would build upon their previous efforts by expanding this legislation – providing increased funds and making 250,000 more vouchers available over the next five years.

Nigerian man previously ordered removed from U.S. convicted of unlawfully possessing firearm

A federal jury has found Djamalou Ousseini, 56, Niger, guilty of unlawful possession of a firearm by an illegal alien. Ousseini was indicted on Dec. 17, 2025.

According to court documents and evidence presented at trial, records maintained by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) show that Ousseini, a citizen of Niger, illegally entered the United States in 2000 using a false passport

under the name "Abdou Dijbo." An immigration judge ordered him removed from the United States on April 29, 2008. Ousseini was eventually released from immigration custody in 2008 and was under an Order of Supervision, wherein he was required to check in with immigration officials regularly.

Ousseini was never granted lawful status in the United States and never obtained legitimate travel documents, though he was

repeatedly instructed to do so. Ousseini stopped communicating with immigration officials in 2022.

On Nov. 5, 2025, at approximately 8 a.m., FBI Special Agents and ICE officers arrived at Ousseini's Indianapolis residence to arrest him on his removal order. When Ousseini answered the door, investigators immediately observed a Smith & Wesson SW40VE .40 caliber handgun in a holster on his hip. The firearm was loaded with multiple

live rounds.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement investigated the case. U.S. District Judge James P. Hanlon presided over the trial and will sentence Ousseini at a later date.

U.S. Attorney Wheeler thanked the prosecution team – Assistant U.S. Attorney Kelsey L. Massa, Paralegal Specialist Sarah Helbig, and Systems Manager Kathy Wells – for their work on the case.

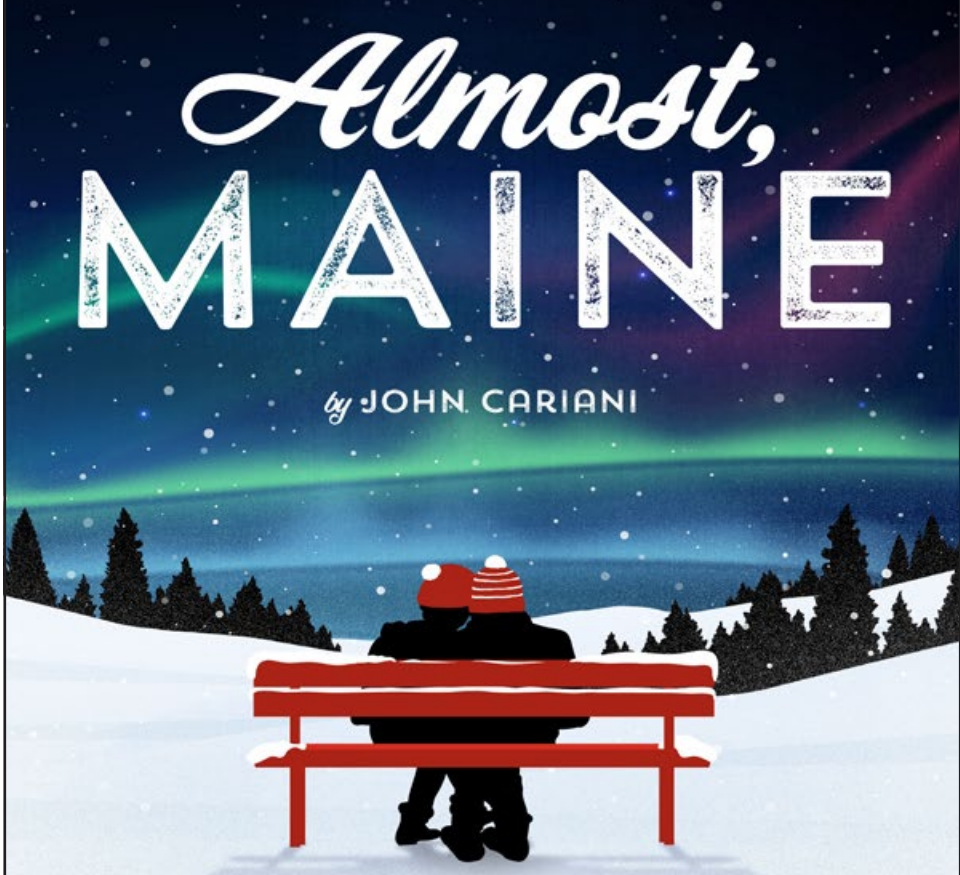

Indiana Right to Life PAC endorses Max Engling for Secretary of State

Indiana Right to Life Political Action Committee announced on Wednesday, Sept. 16, its endorsement of Max Engling for Indiana Secretary of State.
The pro-life organization said it endorses Engling because of his track record and commitment to making Indiana a national model for supporting pregnant mothers and protecting unborn babies. The PAC also cited Engling’s commitment to safeguarding

the integrity of Indiana’s election system, calling it essential to preventing fraud and preserving Hoosiers’ trust in the polls.
The PAC’s endorsement draws a sharp contrast with Engling’s opponent, Beau Bayh, who the PAC noted has been endorsed by an abortion-rights organization. The PAC linked that endorsement to the record of Bayh’s father, former Governor Evan Bayh, during whose administration more than 13,000

unborn children died by abortion annually in Indiana – among the highest yearly totals in state history.

Indianapolis native serves with Navy’s first unmanned patrol and reconnaissance squadron

Petty Officer 2nd Class Adrian Garnett, a native of Indianapolis, Indiana, serves the U.S. Navy assigned to Unmanned Patrol Squadron 19 (VUP-19), the Navy’s first unmanned patrol and reconnaissance squadron.

Garnett graduated from Pike High School in 2008.

The skills and values needed to succeed in the Navy are similar to those found in Indianapolis.

“Growing up in Indy taught me that there is no time or place to complain about the weather or workload; you just have to lace up your boots and get straight to it,” Garnett said. “I’m used to being around different people, cultures and constantly moving. I learned to navigate different environments and connect with folks from all walks of life. Being from my city prepares you to talk to anyone and to rely on a team. Various obstacles may be thrown my way on the daily, from long hours of duty to running across flight lines or climbing on top of numerous aircraft, but no matter the challenge, I get through it and always remember my true Hoosier grit.”

Garnett joined the Navy five years ago. Today, Garnett serves as an aviation electronics technician.

“My inspiration to join the Navy came from my family and the great sup-

port system we have,” Garnett said. “The mentality of wanting to make my kids proud gave me the ultimate push I needed to join.”

Members of VUP-19 support the “Big Red” mission, a historical nod to the command's role in the Korean War. In 1951, during night interdiction missions, the squadron would drop red night illumination flares to support allied air and ground units.

Today, more than 500 Sailors serve at VUP-19. Members of the squadron maintain and launch the MQ-4C Triton aircraft to provide persistent Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance, distributing valuable and time-critical intelligence to combatant and fleet commanders.

With 90 percent of global commerce traveling by sea and access to the internet relying on the security of undersea fiber optic cables, Navy officials continue to emphasize that the prosperity of the United States is directly linked to recruiting and retaining talented people from across the rich fabric of America.

Garnett has many opportunities to achieve accomplishments during military service.

“My proudest accomplishment is graduating from boot camp while be-



ing over 30 years old and after numerous attempts at different career paths,” Garnett said. “Recently, I am proud of being promoted to

petty officer 2nd class.”

Garnett serves a Navy that operates far forward, around the world and around the clock, promoting the nation's prosperity and security. “Serving in the Navy means growth, gratitude and grit,” Garnett said. “It is all about looking back to where it all began, where I came from and ultimately knowing I’m making my family and friends proud every single day. It’s an incredible feeling to know what I do in the Navy is not just a job; it’s service to my country, and I am proud of knowing I am making a real difference.”

Garnett is grateful to others for helping make a Navy career possible.

“I would like to thank my wife, Saleetra, and my godmother, Karen,” Garnett added. “They have been the motivating force behind me making a change to pursue a career in the military.”

Garnett plans to make the most out of his career in the Navy and further his knowledge and education.

“I am now enrolled in Embry-Riddle to earn my associate's degree in the unmanned aircraft vehicle program,” Garnett said.
