

Re: IN Senate District 31 Election Poll Results

Change Research conducted a survey of likely voters in Indiana's newly drawn state senate district 31, August 9-14, 2022. A total of 552 likely November general election voters were interviewed online, and the survey has a margin of error of 4.7 percentage points. Post-stratification weighting was performed on age, race/ethnicity, sex, education, geographic region, and 2020 presidential vote. Weighting parameters were based on voter file data.

KEY FINDINGS

In the race for state senate,
Jocelyn Vare, a Democrat, is
statistically tied with
incumbent Republican
Senator Kyle Walker: 41% to
Walker's 39%. 19% are
undecided. Neither candidate
is well-known–58% of likely
voters have never heard of
Vare and 58% have never
heard of Walker–but Vare's net



favorability among those who have an opinion (net +7) exceeds Walker's (net -7).

Because Vare is outperforming Biden's margin among likely 2022 voters in the district, Vare and Walker are tied in an environment that voted for Trump. 49% of respondents report voting for Trump in 2020, 46% for Biden. Vare's +2 margin against Walker exceeds Biden's -3 margin among these same voters. With more than a third (35%) of her support coming from independent and Republican voters, Vare appeals to those outside the Democratic base.

APPENDIX: METHODOLOGY

Change Research surveyed 552 likely general election voters in Indiana's State Senate District 31, August 9-14. We used the following sources to recruit respondents:

- targeted advertisements on Facebook
- text messages sent, via the Switchboard platform, to cell phone numbers listed on the voter file for individuals who qualified for the survey's sample universe, based on their voter file data

Regardless of which of these sources a respondent came from, they were directed to a survey hosted on Surveymonkey's website.

Ads placed on social media targeted likely 2022 voters registered in the district. Those who indicated that they were not registered to vote in Indiana or not likely to vote in November were terminated. As the survey fielded, Change Research used dynamic online sampling: adjusting ad budgets, lowering budgets for ads targeting groups that were overrepresented and raising budgets for ads targeting groups that were underrepresented, so that the final sample was roughly representative of the population of likely voters across different groups. The survey was conducted in English.

The survey was conducted on behalf of Indiana Senate Democrats and conducted online by Change Research. Post-stratification was performed on age, sex, education, race/ethnicity, geographic region, and 2020 presidential vote. Weighting parameters were based on the demographic composition of likely 2022 general election voters, obtained from the voter file. That is, if a given age bracket represented x% of all registered voters on the voter file, then that same group would be weighted to x% in this survey. 2020 presidential results were based on numbers released by the Indiana Secretary of State.

The modeled margin of error* for this survey is 4.7%, which uses effective sample sizes** that adjust for the design effect of weighting.

* We adopt The Pew Research Center's convention for the term "modeled margin of error"(1) (mMOE) to indicate that our surveys are not simple random samples in the pure sense, similar to any survey that has either non-response bias or for which the general population was not invited at random. A common, if imperfect, convention for reporting survey results is to use a single, survey-level mMOE based on a normal approximation. This is a poor approximation for proportion estimates close to 0 or 1. However, it is a useful communication tool in many settings and is reasonable in places where the proportion of interest is close to 50%. We report this normal approximation for our surveys assuming a proportion estimate of 50%.

^{**} The effective sample size adjusts for the weighting applied to respondents, and is calculated using Kish's approximation (2).
